The Passing of Professor Rick Behr: Updated with service information

The SUNY Broome community mourns the passing of Professor Rick Behr, Chair of the Business Department.

Services will be held on Saturday, July 15, at J.A. McCormack Sons Funeral Home at 141 Main St. in Binghamton. The viewing begins at noon, followed by the memorial service at 2 p.m.

A valued member of SUNY Broome's Business and Public Services Division nearly 40 years, Professor Behr was a SUNY Broome graduate himself, going on to earn his B.S. and M.B.A. from Binghamton University. He headed the Business Department twice during his long tenure: from 1988 to 2001, and from 2009 to the present.

"I was always impressed with his professionalism and his stalwart courage in the face of his illness," said SUNY Broome President Kevin E. Drumm. "He was always a delight to interact with."

Colleagues remembered his unwavering dedication to his students, as well as his collegial nature, unique sense of humor and his ability to create innovative academic programming. Professor Behr was the force behind the creation of SUNY Broome's highly successful Sports Management degree program.

"Whenever anyone interacted with Rick, they always got the real deal. Whether discussing, hunting, fishing, sports or the academic course schedule, one knew they were going to get his honest perspective and sage advice," reflected

Executive Vice President and Chief Academic Officer Francis Battisti. "Rick, thank you for all that you have given us. You will truly be missed."

Remembering a friend and colleague

Behr had been a student in Professor John Bunnell's class years ago, and after he was hired by the college in 1978 the two became good friends. They hunted and fished together, and were even partners in a consulting business for a few years, Bunnell remembered.

He recalled the laughter and the good times – and Professor Behr's dedication to both the college and his students.

"He was very student-focused, and spent much of his time over the years advising and mentoring students, and took pride in their success," Bunnell said.

Outside the classroom, Behr was devoted to his wife Lisa and their two children, as well as his dogs. An animal-lover, he aided a raccoon in distress once – and ended up getting bit for his efforts, Bunnell said.

Professor Bunnell expects that he'll remember his friend and former student every snowstorm. It was a tradition of sorts: After every storm, Behr – in Castle Creek – would call his friend Bunnell, in Windsor, to ask how much snow had fallen at his house.

"No matter what I would say, he would say, 'That's nothing we got ...' and it would always be more," Bunnell recalled with a laugh. "He'd always have to one-up it! I could never win."

One day, Bunnell chanced across a photo he just had to share with Behr – showing a man driving a car with a good four feet of snow piled on the top. He captioned it "Rick Behr coming to work."

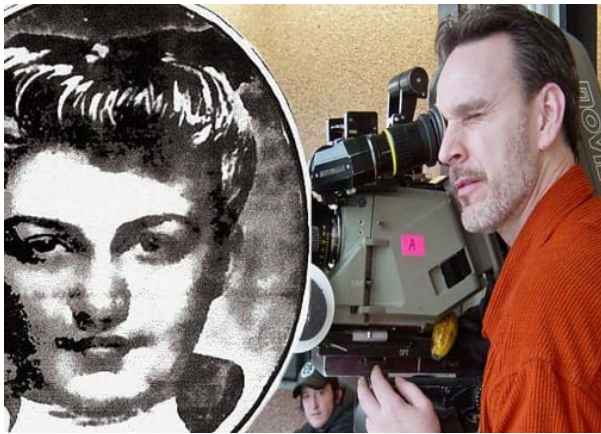

My Moral Life

Mark Halliday

Two years hence. When I'm ready.
After one more set of poems
about my beautiful confusion.
After I've read Anna Karenina
and Don Quixote
and the first volume at least of Proust
and one big novel by Thomas Mann—
say three years. Three years hence:

after I've written an essay about the word "enough"
and after I've done something so delectable
weaving together phrases from Henry James and Bob Dylan
and after I've written an amazing meditation on Luis Buñuel
and after I've spent a month in Frankfort, Michigan
being very real and thoughtful and full of perspective
and fresh cherry pie
then—
then—

in four years at the most—
I see it there ahead of me casting a silver shadow
back upon me now, bathing me in its promise,
validating the self that will arrive at it
in four years or less (maybe just two years?)...
Glimpsing it there is sometimes like already living it
almost and feeling justifiably proud.
Water pollution and toxic waste and air pollution;

A New Chapter: Vice President Debbie Morello looks forward to an entrepreneurial future

From the start, she availed herself of new opportunities – including art classes through Continuing Education, a department she later came to head. She became Vice President of Student and Economic Development, as well as engaged her own passion for teaching – via art classes in the Continuing Education program, a course in Internet Marketing for SUNY Broome’s Business and Public Services Division, and classes for Binghamton University’s Master’s in Public Administration program and the University of Phoenix.

At the core: Her sense of mission, and that she was in the precise place she needed to be. “I felt that SUNY Broome gave me a path and a purpose for my life,” she explained.

Making a difference

Morello has experienced many meaningful moments during her time at SUNY Broome, from the pride of Commencement to interactions with colleagues. But looking at the many strands of her career, she holds three accomplishments close to her heart.

In the late 1980s to early 1990s, the Binghamton region underwent a major economic downturn as the former employment powerhouse – IBM, founded in Endicott – uprooted many of its operations. As assistant director of Continuing Education, Morello was in a position where she could aid dislocated workers – and made it her mission. She helped laid-off employees find alternate jobs, including one friend who taught in Continuing Education and wrote a book before getting rehired at the tech firm that laid him off.

She found a different kind of purpose in 2010, after a devastating earthquake rocked Haiti. She was able to track down the college’s Haitian students and immediately work with them to ensure that their families were safe, and spend time with them as they dealt with fear and uncertainty. The college community also rallied with a massive fundraiser, Have a Heart for Haiti, to aid recovery efforts.

During her 25-year career at SUNY Broome, Debbie Morello has played many roles: The shrewd mind behind economic development programs impacting the region. Compassionate ear to students from close to home and around the globe, and the unofficial Mom of the Student Village. Maker of tough decisions – and even, once upon a time, an art teacher in Continuing Education.

In retirement, she’ll add a few titles: Entrepreneur, published author – and, potentially, web celebrity.

“I’m my next boss!” she said with a grin. “I worked with so many entrepreneurs over the years. I wanted to be one. But even though I had these side gigs, I never had the freedom because I had responsibilities.”

She’ll be missed at SUNY Broome, where she was known for her high energy and spirit, and her steadfast dedication to students’ welfare.

“No college has ever had a more committed or dedicated vice president,” SUNY Broome President Kevin E. Drumm said. “She administered and led a diverse portfolio of responsibilities that few would have the background to take on and she did it with skill and verve.”

Morello, who holds a Master’s in Business Administration degree from Binghamton University, came to SUNY Broome from Lourdes Hospital, where she had served as director of strategic planning for four years.

She started at the college as alumni director under Mary Dean – one of the many excellent supervisors she remembers, including former vice president

The construction of facilities has long intertwined with Morello's sense of mission; back in her Lourdes days, she co-authored a grant to develop the hospital's first off-site primary care clinic. The Student Village, SUNY Broome's very first residence hall, marked a major transformation for the college.

Residence halls were first considered in a 1969 master plan for the campus. Momentum picked up in 2011, with the groundbreaking in 2013 and a grand opening in Fall 2014. Home to 366 residents, the village has been full every semester, often with a waiting list for interested residential students.

"That was purposeful, coming from a first-generation college family and seeing all the first-generation students, having the opportunities that they wouldn't have otherwise had," Morello said, reflecting on the project. "How grateful I am to have had the opportunity! The students I met through the Student Village have touched my life deeply."

And so have SUNY Broome's traditional, commuter student population, she noted. Long after they walk down the aisle at Commencement, many SUNY Broome graduates have remained in touch with Morello, sharing their accomplishments and their appreciation of their alma mater.

Executive Vice President and Chief Academic Officer Francis Battisti appreciates Morello for her creative thinking, her ability to build relationships and collaboration opportunities in the community, and for her strong commitment to students. Students sometimes ended up in her office when they found themselves in trouble, and Morello truly listened to their concerns and encouraged them to take responsibility for the lives and education, Battisti said.

Coming from the academic side, Dr. Battisti sometimes had different perspectives on issues than his long-time colleague, but knew he could always count on her integrity and her commitment to the college.

"I have always trusted her word and trusted she would be there," he reflected.

"Sometimes you're on a path and you have to pivot," she said. "I'm very excited about the future."

What's next

Morello is currently writing the next chapter of her life – quite literally. On the day of her interview for this story, she was 50,000 words into her future book, *The Power of Friends at Work*, which will explore such issues as communication, trust, loyalty, conflict, boundaries, teamwork and more.

In her work, she draws on her own life experiences, as well as those of friends and interview subjects in a range of fields.

Her first experience of teamwork came in elementary school, when she and her classmates put together donation boxes for the Red Cross. Many people have childhood experiences that later play into their work friendships, such as giving each of their classmates a Valentine; these lessons in sharing and cooperation are later applied to their colleagues in the career world.

To engage with an increasingly digital world, Morello plans to have a Work Buds v-log – that's video blog, for the non-tech types – where she showcase interviews related to work friendships and related matters. She will also be involved in SUNY Broome's Entrepreneurial Assistance Program, continuing her work as mentor to those who want to achieve their dreams.

SUNY Broome professors volunteer for the Boy Scouts of America

SUNY Broome Professors Erin Heard (Environmental Science) and Lynda Carroll (History, Philosophy and Social Science) not only cross paths in the Natural Science Center on campus, they also both have sons in the same Cub Scout Pack! This summer, Heard, Carroll and their young scouts all spent a week at Cole Park at Cub Scout Day Camp.

This year, the Baden-Powell Council's Cub Scout Day Camp at Cole Park brought together 83 young scouts (ages 5-11) for a week of fun in the sun (and thunderstorms) in Harpursville. This year's camp theme was "Scout Investigations," which introduced Cub Scouts to all different types of sciences – from crime scene investigations and forensics, various scientific principles, and Archaeological Investigations. Heard and Carroll both volunteered to run week-long science and investigation stations for the boys and girls.



Heard and another volunteer ran the science station, where scouts learned about electricity, the strength of arches in construction and polymers, and built their own stethoscopes. This was the third year Heard has volunteered at day camp, but public outreach and education has been a part of her mission for 13 years.



Carroll set up an archaeological station, where scouts learned about New York State history and prehistory, ancient technologies, laboratory techniques in ceramic analysis, and the study of ancient animal bones (zooarchaeology). The scouts even learned how to "measure brown" using soil color charts. Helping others: Kelly returns to school in her 50s – and finds a new career

Telecommuting might appeal to some people, but not Kelly Devine.

Born and raised in the Southern Tier, she spent more than 20 years in the local manufacturing industry, working as a purchasing manager in Endicott. After her company moved, she worked out of her home for three years – and hated it. One of her strengths lies in her ability to connect with others, and the prospect of replacing human contact with a computer screen and fuzzy slippers just didn't appeal.

"I had severe people withdrawal," she explained.

With deep roots in the Triple Cities and a love for the area, following her job out of state was also off the table. At age 51, she decided to go back to school and retrain for a different field – a big step for Devine, who achieved various certificates through her career, but hadn't pursued a degree since high school.

While she continued to work part-time at a local church, she decided to major in Chemical Dependency Counseling at SUNY Broome, inspired by a desire to help others.

"I'd rather have a career instead of a job," she reflected. "I think there's a

difference between the two."

The degree program prepares students as entry-level counselors in the field of alcohol and substance abuse treatment. The current job demand for professionals is high with the nation's growing opioid epidemic. In addition, there is an anticipated shortage of trained counselors due to projected retirements, with a majority expected to retire in the next five to seven years.

Back to class

Devine already had some experience of campus life – as a parent, taking her son on campus visits across the state. Even during those visits, SUNY Broome stood out and she felt comfortable choosing the same college for herself, for both the quality of education and the "campus feel."

Now in his final semester at SUNY Broome, her son is a Liberal Arts major interested in psychology; the two have taken a few classes together, as well as helped each other study.


"I'm glad he's looking at working with people, too," she said.

Her favorite class: Cultural Competencies in Chemical Dependency Studies, which she took with her son.

Initially, she felt a bit like she was "dropped in a foreign country," but she caught the rhythm of campus life, helped by the campus' diverse student population, which includes a large range of ages. The availability of services such as free tutoring also boosted her confidence, as she juggled her role as a full-time student with a part-time job.

"There's so much available. If you want the extra help, you can get it," she said.

Preparing for a new field

Contrary to popular belief, addiction isn't just about personal choice. It's a real disease:  involving changes in the brain – and in the client's core identity.

“When you have people who are being treated for addiction, you’re asking them to change a huge part about themselves and how they act,” Devine reflected.

To keep prospective counselors from suffering career burnout, SUNY Broome’s program include an emphasis on self-care that Devine finds helpful in her new career. Professors and coursework help students understand and take care of themselves, which then allows them to take care of others in need.

Students also have opportunity to engage in their chosen field directly through internships that can also lead to job opportunities. Interns also have class together, during which they process their own unique experiences in the work field, Devine said.

She had her own internship September through December 2016 at the Addiction Center of Broome County, juggling school work, paid employment and 15 to 20 hours a week in the field. It taught her a good deal – and led to an immediate full-time job in the field. The Center hired her on Jan. 3, and she graduated from SUNY Broome in May.

“I was totally prepared to work there, which totally blows my mind. It doesn’t often happen that people are completely ready to go into a new field,” she said.

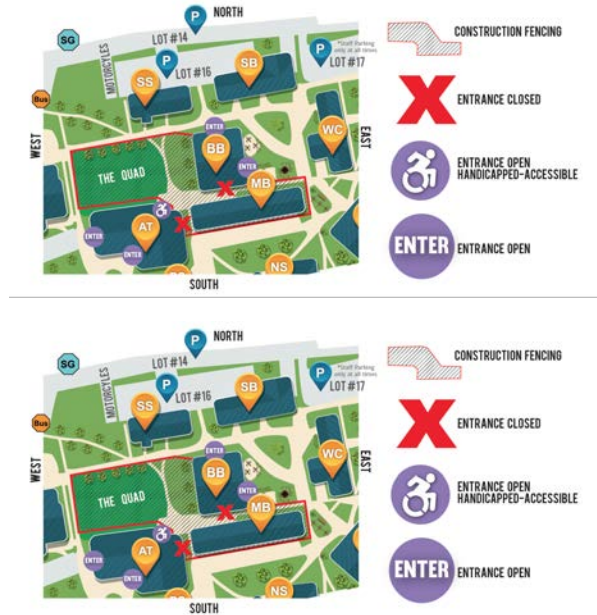

Dedication of Mrs. G's Weather Station on Aug. 4

Join the SUNY Broome community at 10 a.m. Friday, Aug. 4, for the dedication of Mrs. G's Weather Station on the second floor of the Natural Sciences Center (NSC).

Named for the late Physical Sciences Professor Sallyann Giuffrida, the weather station is actually located on the roof of the Applied Technologies Building and visible in a Natural Science Center laboratory.

Known to students as Mrs. G, Professor Giuffrida passed away in March 2014 after an illness. She earned her bachelor's degree in Meteorology and Oceanography from Brooklyn Polytechnic Institute in 1978, one of the few women in science at the time. She started at SUNY Broome as a technical/lab assistant that same year, and later taught physics, physical science courses and their corresponding labs.

Mrs. G's true love was in meteorology, and she designed the curriculum and labs for the Meteorology course that is still taught to this day. The Sallyann Giuffrida Memorial Scholarship Fund was established through the Broome Community College Foundation in her memory, and provides scholarships for students planning to further their education in science.

The station named in her honor – a Davis Instruments Vantage Pro Plus 2 – includes a weather webcam that displays current conditions on campus, and transmits data to both the college's Weather Underground site and to a computer in the NSC, where it is archived. The NSC kiosk is run by an iPad pro display locked to the Weather Underground station page, and presents opportunities for students to interact with a display.

"This is especially helpful in this region because often conditions on our hilltops will vary from what is happening in the valley," said Professor Kennie Leet, chair of the Physical Science department. "National Weather Service forecasts often rely on weather webcams throughout the forecast region to see what is

happening in different locations."

The event will include the SUNY Broome community, Professor Giuffrida's former students and members of her family. Light refreshments will follow the event.

Known as “traditional” or “classic” Decentralization (DEC) grants, Community Arts (CA) grants

provide support for arts and cultural projects to community-based organizations, groups, collectives or individual artists. Individual artists must apply for a CA grant for a community-based project in partnership with a local nonprofit organization. CA support enables emerging artists and organizations to grow professionally and to enhance the cultural vibrancy in communities and neighborhoods where they live and work. CA grants provide support to develop, foster, promote, enhance, and increase community arts that address current cultural needs in Broome county.

Arts Education (AE) Grants: AE grants offer two funding categories: (1) K-12 In-School Projects and (2) After-School & Community-Based Learning Projects. Funds can support arts education projects that take place in-school during the school day and/or in after-school and community-based settings for youth and/or senior learners. Emphasis is placed on the depth and quality of the creative process through which participants learn about the arts. Projects must focus on the exploration of art and the artistic process. Intercurricular collaboration for in-school projects is encouraged but not required.
