

The campus-wide Convocation Committee is pleased to announce that Dr. Christopher Chabris, psychologist and co-author of the best seller *The Invisible Gorilla: How Our Intuitions Deceive Us*, has been selected as our 2018 Convocation Day speaker. Chabris earned a Ph.D. in psychology from Harvard University and taught there before his current teaching post at Union College. He has spoken at Google, Goldman Sachs and Microsoft, among other places. Our speaker is a chess master and games enthusiast who writes a monthly column for the Wall Street Journal.

Convocation 2018 will focus on important and relevant themes such as how cognitive illusions impact our daily lives. As a creator of one of the most famous experiments in psychology, Chabris will discuss how our intuitions lead us astray, affecting our decisions in business, the criminal justice field, the health sciences and even how we drive.

We hope that Chabris will inspire students and faculty alike to consider how illusions about attention, memory, confidence, knowledge, cause and potential can cost us dearly, and how to manage these illusions. Please note that **Tuesday April 17, 2018 is Convocation Day, on which no day or**

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More Details Regarding *The Invisible Gorilla:*

Reading this book will make you *less* sure of yourself-and that's a good thing. In *The Invisible Gorilla*, we use a wide assortment of stories and counter intuitive scientific findings to reveal an important truth: Our minds don't work the way we think they do. We think we see ourselves and the world as they really are, but we're actually missing a whole lot.

We combine the work of other researchers with our own findings on attention, perception, memory, and reasoning to reveal how faulty intuitions often get us into trouble. In the process, we explain:

- Why a company would spend billions to launch a product that its own analysts know will fail
- How a police officer could run right past a brutal assault without seeing it
- Why award-winning movies are full of editing mistakes
- · What criminals have in common with chess masters
- · Why measles and other childhood diseases are making a comeback
- Why money managers could learn a lot from weather forecasters

Again and again, we think we experience and understand the world as it is, but our thoughts are beset by everyday illusions. We write traffic laws and build criminal cases on the assumption that people will notice when something unusual happens right in front of them. We're sure we know where we were on 9/11, falsely believing that vivid memories are seared into our mind with perfect fidelity. And as a society, we spend billions on devices to train our brains because we're continually tempted by the lure of quick fixes and effortless self-improvement.

The Invisible Gorilla reveals the numerous ways that our intuitions can deceive us, but it's more than a catalog of human failings. In the book, we also explain why people succumb to these everyday illusions and what we can do to inoculate ourselves against their effects. In short, we try to give you a sort of "x-ray vision" into your own minds, with the ultimate goal of helping you notice the invisible gorillas in your own life.




April 19 event: Keeping Sane in an Over-Connected World

SUNY Broome Associate Professor of Visual Communications Patricia Evans will present a new exhibit, Faces: The Underground Railroad, April 3 through 30 at the Gallery @ SUNY Broome, located on the first floor of the Cecil C. Tyrrell Library on campus.

The gallery is open from 7:30 a.m. to 9 p.m. Monday through Thursday, 7:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Friday, 1 to 5 p.m. Saturday and 3 to 7 p.m. Sunday.

Professor Evans will be showcasing a series of classical realist larger than life-size portrait drawings created by her beginning drawing students, along with historical photos and life stories. Notable slaves, abolitionists, writers, conductors and stationmasters are featured in the exhibition. Portraits are rendered in charcoal, pencil, and mixed media.

Evans offered her ART 115: Beginning Drawing students the opportunity to research the history of iconic individuals associated with the Underground Railroad, including birth and death records and individual contributions toward the freedom of slaves, culminating with profound lessons on social and cultural history.

Each semester, Evans' students focus on a marginalized and overlooked group of people, drawing attention to the sacrifice and struggle that it takes to make a difference. Her students enthusiastically take on the challenge of researching individual roles then begin the process of creating a likeness based on archival photographs.



April 11 film screening: 'Fire'



The permanent power transition for the new Calice Advanced Manufacturing Center will begin at 7 p.m. Wednesday, April 4, 2018, and should be completed by 7 a.m. Thursday, April 5, 2018. During this 12-hour time frame, the following campus interruptions will take place:

Focus on Financial Aid: Students may be eligible for third disbursement of Pell

The Department of Education has announced that students that are eligible for Pell Grant may be able to receive a third disbursement of the Pell Grant. Beginning with the 2017-2018 academic year, an eligible student may now receive full Federal Pell Grant for summer 2018 even if they received a full Federal Pell Grant during the fall and spring semesters.

To be eligible for additional Pell Grant funds:

- Student must have completed their 2017-18 FAFSA and must be otherwise eligible to receive Pell Grant funds
- Student must be enrolled at least half-time (6 credit hours) during the summer term
- Student must be maintaining satisfactory academic progress

Hung Dang Dao

Decades ago, Hung Dang Dao spent three years in law school – but the Vietnam War interrupted his educational and professional aspirations, and so much more

The war and its aftermath made life incredibly difficult in south Vietnam, and Dao spent three years in a hard labor camp. In 2007, he sought asylum in the United States—and immediately embarked upon a new journey: to learn the language and culture of his new country.

"I wanted to stay in my country to do something, but living there is very hard," he said of his decision to leave Vietnam. "I was experiencing a very hard situation for a very long time."

He arrived in April, and by July began taking English as a Second Language courses. By 2009, he had enough proficiency with the language to begin taking classes at SUNY Broome.

Pursuing a wide range of classes through the years, he has captured the attention of his professors for his dedication and commitment to learning.

He will graduate this May at the age of 74, with an Associate's degree in Liberal Arts – Individual Studies and a grade point average of over 3.0 – no small feat for an adult immigrant who needed to learn a new language from scratch.

"When I came here, I wanted to learn everything about the American culture – what they think, what they do," he said. "The most important thing is we must learn the other people's language first."

Mastering English takes a good deal of work, but Dao is inspired to work hard. He understands about 70 to 80 percent of what people say, he said, but he hopes to improve.

He even attempted to learn more languages through Spanish and French classes. He particularly enjoys hearing Spanish-speakers talk in their native tongue, although he found the classes to be highly challenging as he progressed. The same could be said for his photography course, although his professor is very supportive.

"You can do it,' the professor says," he related.

He learned to tell his own life-story through Professor Michael Gee's Autobiography class, and also volunteers in the Food for Thought pantry as part of a Community Internship course under Professor Doug Garnar. Every week, Dao helps assemble bags of food for students in need.

Even though he is graduating, Hung Dang Dao plans to continue his education with additional classes, furthering his mastery of English and his knowledge of American culture – and proving that you're never too old to tackle something new.

"I want to learn," he said. "I hope someday I will write out what I think."

Karissa Newkirk's father worked as a police officer and corrections officer, so it was natural that she would gravitate to law enforcement as a career path. A volunteer opportunity, however, opened the Criminal Justice major's eyes up to a different option: teaching.

Before attending SUNY Broome, Newkirk attended a different community college closer to home — SUNY Sullivan – but didn't enjoy the experience and failed to establish a rapport with her professors. Since her boyfriend attends nearby Binghamton University, she decided to give SUNY Broome a try and was glad she

did.

"My experience has been uplifting," said Newkirk, who forged connections with both Weber and Criminal Justice Professor Leigh Morrissey, who alerted her to the many opportunities open to Broome students.

It was Professor Morrissey who alerted her to an intriguing volunteer opportunity at OASIS, an afterschool program for teens in Endicott founded by SUNY Broome alumna Holly Welfel. Established in 2006, the program provides a range of services to disadvantaged youth, from nutritional snacks, tutoring and homework help to fun activities.

Karissa volunteers daily at OASIS, often tutoring teens who need a little extra help and - when the work is done - playing games and socializing. She recommends volunteering for OASIS to fellow Hornets who want to give back and make a difference in a youngster's life.

"I was having a rough patch in my life and I wanted to do something," she said of her decision to volunteer. "It makes me so happy to go there."

Newkirk also lends a hand on campus as well as a tutor to her fellow students. She conducted her first on-campus tutoring session the other day and felt it went well, she said. Overall, SUNY Broome has brought her more than academic success; it also helped her develop a love of service, teaching and giving back.

"I feel like there are a lot of opportunities. I really like it here," Newkirk said.

Cyber Warrior: Adjua strives to make the digital world a safer place

When Adjua Lake obtained her first laptop computer, she – like so many of us — eventually ended up with a virus.

Instead of fear or frustration, she responded with curiosity – and developed a lifelong love for computers and the effort it takes to safeguard them. Graduating this May with a degree in Computer Security and Forensics, Lake's long-term dream is to become a part of the national agencies that safeguard the country's cyber welfare.

"Let's say some hacker has gotten control of your computer. I go to hack the hacker, or get the virus off the computer," explained Lake, who describes herself as "the computer geek" in her family.

A native of St. Thomas in the U.S. Virgin Islands, Lake took a year off after graduating high school. Then, she attended Glendale Community College in California, where she stayed with family. After discovering it would take too long to earn her degree, she began investigating programs in computer forensics.

She was interested in the University at Albany, but it was too expensive to attend for all four years. So she opted for SUNY Broome, which is a transfer partner with Albany for the Bachelor's of Science in Digital Forensics.

She quickly came to love SUNY Broome – although she's not a fan of Upstate winters, being from the Caribbean. (In case you're wondering, her family back home is doing fine and has largely recovered from the damage their homes sustained in the 2017 hurricanes.)

"SUNY Broome is an awesome school for students who want to do a quick two years and go into the workforce and do something they love," she explained.

Partnership programs, such as the one she is participating in, give students even more options for seamless transfer. Small class sizes and the opportunity to forge personal connections with professors are assets as well.

"Broome is small and to me, sometimes small is good. Being on a small campus, teachers know you by your name and not a number, and that is what all students look for while attending class," she said.

At home in the Student Village

Adjua Lake also found a home at SUNY Broome in another way: as a resident and now a Resident Assistant, or RA, in the Student Village. During her first year as a resident student, the RAs were very welcoming. One became a friend and convinced her to apply. She joined the Residential Life staff in October, and has come to feel part of "one big happy family."

It also gave Lake the opportunity to give back - something she missed from her high school days, when she stayed active with community service, including teaching the elderly how to navigate computers. Not only does she enjoy her role, she plans to apply to become an RA at her transfer school.

"It's not only a job, it's a way to help students," she explained.

Cybersecurity: You need it!

After she earns a bachelor's degree, Adjua plans to pursue a master's and ultimately a career with a government agency such as the FBI, CIA, Homeland Security or the Department of Defense fighting cyber crime.

A likely but somewhat unexpected minor: photography or graphic design. She has picked up the former as a hobby, shooting family and school events, and came to enjoy graphic design by way of her involvement in computers.

"I can't draw for my life, but I can do so many things with the computer," she said.

As someone pursuing a career in the field, she advises her fellow digital citizens to take their own cybersecurity seriously. Recognize that smartphones can be hacked, especially if you use public, unsecured wifi. Use only secure networks and make sure that you never leave apps or webpages with sensitive information – such as bank accounts – open when you're done using them.

If you have wifi at home, make sure it's password-protected. That's not foolproof, but it does provide some measure of security. And you may want to consider adopting Adjua's own practice: "Whenever I leave my house, I always turn off my wifi," she said.

Above all, stay alert to new technologies – and not just the opportunities they represe their risks as well.

"Every development, every new technology out there – you've got to be aware," she sa

The campus-wide Convocation Committee is pleased to announce that Dr. Christopher Chabris, psychologist and co-author of the best seller *The Invisible Gorilla: How Our Intuitions Deceive Us*, has been selected as our 2018 Convocation Day speaker. Chabris earned a Ph.D. in psychology from Harvard University and taught there before his current teaching post at Union College. He has spoken at Google, Goldman Sachs and Microsoft, among other places. Our speaker is a chess master and games enthusiast who writes a monthly column for the Wall Street Journal.

Convocation 2018 will focus on important and relevant themes such as how cognitive illusions impact our daily lives. Convocation 2018 will focus on important and relevant themes such as the role attention plays in police-civilian encounters, the problems with eye-witness testimony and memory, the ways in which talented medical experts and pilots may miss what is right in front of them and how our belief in the power of confidence shapes our selection of leaders.

Reading this book will make you *less* sure of yourself-and that's a good thing. In *The Invisible Gorilla*, we use a wide assortment of stories and counter intuitive scientific findings to reveal an important truth: Our minds don't work the way we think they do. 

ASK! A fun, interactive and informative Convocation Day event

The President's Task Force on Diversity and Inclusion is proud to offer ASK! again this spring as part of Convocation Day events from 1 to 2:25 p.m. April 17 in D-201.

ASK allows you to interact with students and faculty of all different backgrounds and ask questions that you might have been wondering but never had the opportunity to ask. It is a fun, interactive and informative event that creates a safe space for dialogue around difference.

The Invisible Gorilla challenges us to take a second look. What are you missing about people you work, learn and live with? People representing some of the diverse categories of human beings (race, age, ethnicity, and disability, as well as people representing a broad array of cultures, religions, and affiliations like veterans, gamers, weight lifters and pagans) will be on hand to answer questions.

You'll be issued a passport upon entry which will be stamped by each identity table where you may ask a question (or two). Ask questions you want to know but didn't know who to ask or use questions that will be posted at each person's table.

Venessa Rodriguez, Director of the Educational Opportunity Program, participated in prior ASK! events representing Latinx people. "Being Puerto Rican is a source of great pride for me and I wanted to ensure representation, but I also know that there are many unfortunate stereotypes that exist about Latinx people and I wanted to have an opportunity to dispel any untruths," she said.

Director Rodriguez felt she made a connection with students who attended the event. "It was nice to engage in conversations with students I don't typically have access to and discuss issues of diversity, equity, inclusion as it relates to the lived experiences of Latinx people. It was also a great opportunity to showcase the idea that I am just one person within this community that is very diverse in and of itself," she said.

In their book, *The Invisible Gorilla*, Christopher Chabris and Daniel Simons explain how our brains trick us into thinking we see and know far more than we do. Rodriquez sees a relationship between this and perceptions society has about her.

"Yes, I think that we (humans) rely on stereotypes and assumptions to categorize everything around us, including each other," she said. "I think this process is an oversimplification that can prevent us from looking deeper and is what leads to unconscious bias and even hatred of persons we have deemed other. The more we expose ourselves to people who are different from us, the more we can see our commonalities and bridge divides where none need not exist."

Sesime Adanu, Dean of Institutional Effectiveness and Enrollment Planning, participated in ASK! "to offer the curious minds of the campus community the opportunity and safe space to have their questions answered about people from Africa."

Dean Adanu felt that representing people from Africa was important "considering the varying perceptions people have about the African continent. My interaction and response to students' questions piqued their interest with more questions asked." He received a wide range of interesting questions from students. "Some of the questions centered on issues the students would not have felt comfortable asking in a different setting," he said.

Associate Professor Patricia Evans in our Visual Communications Department encourages her talented art and design students to show kindness and compassion towards those that are different than them through the creation of meaningful visual form. Their artwork, highlighting individuals integral to the Underground Railroad will be on display at the ASK! event, and students will be available to answer questions.

Evans' kindness and compassion campaign, called Exhibition Series: FACES, has shined a light on women suffragists, Holocaust survivors and non-survivors, and most recently iconic individuals integral to the Underground Railroad including slaves, abolitionists, mammies, authors, writers, conductors, and stationmasters. This series of FACES is currently exhibited in our Cecil C. Tyrrell Library on the SUNY Broome campus through the month of April in the research area, and all are welcome to attend this ongoing display; highlighting the importance of social and cultural history as a teachable moment.

Evans reiterates that her students enthusiastically take on the challenge of speaking for those who cannot, and quips, When you think that you have had a bad day, think again!

Please join us on April 17 for a little over an hour to ask questions of those who can specific about their experiences, their beliefs, their identity, and find the commonalities that we all share as part of the SUNY Broome community.

Wild Thoughts: Maria finds herself through writing and self-publishes a book

When Maria Chapero was 12 years old, she began to write. Her immediate inspiration was a journal she purchased at IKEA. In

it went her ruminations, musings and dreams, first in her native Spanish and later in the English she had begun to master.

She wrote when her native Venezuela began to fall into chaos, and her family left Maracaibo – a northwestern city called "The Beloved Land of the Sun" – for Vestal in snowy Upstate New York. She wrote when she attended Vestal High School and when she came to SUNY Broome. She's still writing today.

"Suddenly I started writing every day," said Chapero, a Liberal Arts major who will graduate this May. "I want to write books – any kind of books!"

Honestly,

For your understanding, I'm going to tell you What's in my mind.

She has already written one: *Wild Thoughts*, a book of her poetry, now available online at Amazon and, eventually, Barnes & Noble and The Book Depository.

On April 20, she will discuss her experience in self-publishing at Speakers of the House, SUNY Broome's chapter of Toastmasters International, at 3:10 p.m. in Wales Building Room 203-B.

"Everyone can do it and it's not that expensive," she said of self-publishing. While the process was much more intensive years ago, "there's now an easier path and I want people to know about it," she said.

Chapero was 16 years old when her family left their native land, once the richest country in Latin America but now in the grip of a humanitarian crisis.

"It was pretty bad. We knew it was going to get worse," Chapero said of her family's decision to leave.

As a teen, she learned a new language – and shifted her writing accordingly.

"At first my writing was just in Spanish, but now I write in both languages," she explained. "My brain thinks in both languages."

Her poems are spare and confessional, featuring short lines and a sense of space. Sometimes she writes poetry using her smartphone, which lends itself to a more abbreviated art form.

Before I moved, I wanted to switch Things a lot, Destiny listened to me And gave me the opportunity To switch the way I see life. You see, before everything, Life was awesome, I felt awesome, I had a loving family, I had loyal friends (They are still my friends, and my family still loves me, Hello!) but then, everything got taken away from me and I almost let Sadness take over me And destroy me like A tornado. Maybe that's it. My mind was just a tornado of emotions.

Chapero has enjoyed her time at SUNY Broome. Her favorite professor is Kathleen McKenna, whom she met during her first semester on

campus. Maria's English wasn't as polished then, and she credits Professor McKenna with helping her improve her public speaking skills.

"Before speaking, I would get really nervous. She really helped me with that," said Chapero.

Now, back in the present, I'm happy, very happy I must admit. It wasn't that easy But at the same time It wasn't that hard. I learn to remove

Now, I'm learning
To throw away my fears
And start on my projects.
This is the first step to it.

Maria's own favorite writer is Chilean author Isabel Allende, whom she reads in her native Spanish.

It may seem counterintuitive for an introvert to self-publish a book of poetry – and speak about it to a group of people on campus – but that's part of the writer's life, something Maria aspires to and works toward.

When people read her work, "they are reading something very personal, but it can mean whatever they want," she said of her decision to share her poetry with the larger world.

After graduating in May, she plans to attend Binghamton University and major in creative writing – another step closer to her dreams of being an author.

The Literacy Legacy Project is excited to announce the launch of a new initiative, Talk It Up on Thursday, from 6 to 8 p.m. April 26 at WSKG. Talk It Up is a community read of the book *Thirty Million Words: Growing a Child's Brain* by Dana

Suskind. This initiative is designed to engage the community in open dialogue on what it takes to ensure that all children in Broome County achieve optimum brain development beginning at birth.

Suskind's book helps readers understand, through a comprehensive review of various research studies, the critical importance human interactions have on the development of young child's brain. Eighty five percent of brain development occurs in the first few years of life. During these early years, the words read, spoken or sung to children help build neural pathways that lay the foundation for learning.

The main research study around this work was conducted by Betty Hart and Todd Risley, and showed that children in poverty hear 30 million fewer words by age three than children from working class families. According to research, "follow-up studies showed that these differences in language and interaction experiences have lasting effects on a child's performance later in life." (http://www.wvearlychildhood.org/resources/C-13_Handout_1.pdf).

This is why early language experiences are vital. Language experiences – such as talking to a baby and reading a book together – greatly increase the likelihood that every child will reach his or her full potential in learning and life.

Following the launch on April 26, the Literacy Legacy Project will convene a series of book discussions to co-create a strategy that addresses this issue. We eagerly invite all stake-holders to attend the launch, read Suskind's book and contribute viable solutions. We hope that reading the book *Thirty Million Words*, will inspire and empower families, organizations, schools, libraries and institutions – the community – with new knowledge and understanding about the importance of early, frequent and pleasurable language experiences for all children.

This collaborative community initiative was developed by the Children's Reading Connection and launched in Tompkins County earlier this year.

SUNY Broome's Center for Civic Engagement created the Literacy Legacy Project to promote, inspire and support a culture of talking and reading to young children as part of everyday life in families and communities. The program will serve as a connector, convener, catalyst and collaborator sharing high-quality resources and models to ensure that all children in Broome County are surrounded by an abundance of language-rich experiences, beginning at birth. We believe one of the best investments we can make in Broome County is to join together to ensure all children experience the joy and power of loving words through talking, singing, reading and playing every single day.

The Literacy Legacy Project was developed through SUNY Broome's Douglas C. Garnar Center for Civic Engagement, in partnership with the Children's Reading Connection.

The team will be racing a re-purposed ¾-size electric Vantage Green Van, which has been improved upon since last year. The van, once used by SUNY Broome's Maintenance department, was out of commission and about to be sold off at the Broome County auction. DiGiacomo championed the idea of acquiring the van to be used as a student project. This year, the van is sporting lots of new instrumentation: A custom voltage display panel, a custom dash display, a power meter, side view mirror cameras, and a GPS.

This data will help the team more accurately monitor the batteries and associated systems, and allow them to get a more accurate MPGe rating.

Modifications have also been done to improve stability for the autocross.



SUNY Broome Executive Vice President and Chief Academic Officer Francis Battisti contributed a story to Connie Goldman's *The Gifts of Caregiving:* Stories of Hardship, Hope, and Healing.

The 2018 book, published by the Society of Certified Senior Advisors, shares the personal stories of those who have accepted the responsibilities of being a primary caregiver. In their stories, these caregivers discuss the changes, challenges and sacrifices they face, but also the gifts of inspiration, insight and healing that a commitment to caregiving brings.

Dr. Battisti cared for his father, an Italian immigrant, during his final years of life. During his time as a caregiver, he learned the importance of simply being with and relating to his father, not focusing on tasks that needed completion.

"My relationship with my dad in those years of his illness fed my own midlife growing experience," Dr. Battisti told Goldman.

On stage, she provides words of empowerment that lift up marginalized voices, enabling survivors of all races, genders and classes to know they are not alone, while creating a place of comfort and healing for those who have experienced trauma

The #MeToo campaign has emerged as a rallying cry for people who have survived sexual assault and sexual harassment, and its "silence breakers" were named *TIME* magazine's 2017 Person of the Year.

A sexual assault survivor herself, Burke has dedicated more than 25 years of her life to social justice. She currently is working under the banner of the #MeToo movement to assist other survivors and individuals who work to end sexual violence. She is also senior director of programs at the Brooklyn-based nonprofit Girls for Gender Equity.

According to Professor Margherita Rossi, founding member of the Women's Institute, "Sexual harassment and sexual assault happen to so many. We need to listen and act. This is more than a viral moment. Because of the work Tarana Burke has done, we actually have the opportunity to hand our children a different world."

Edward Jose Marte Rosario is an Individual Studies Liberal Arts major in his second semester here at SUNY Broome. Here is his story:

I moved from the Dominican Republic to Binghamton five years ago. My entire family still lives in DR. I attended and graduated from Binghamton High School. Before going to Binghamton High School, I was going to the American Civic Association for ESL classes. I was 16 years old and I was taking classes with adults. I was advised to take ESL classes and then take my GED.

I came to this country to make a better life and wanted an opportunity at a better education, so I decided that I was going to work very hard to learn English and then attend high school to earn my Regents diploma. The Binghamton Boys and Girls Club helped a lot because it gave me the opportunity to interact with kids my age. I am grateful that they opened that door for me because that is my second home. I accomplished my goal and graduated from Binghamton High School with my Regent's diploma. I am now here at SUNY Broome.

I am the only one from my family that is in college. I want to make my family proud. I want to make a better life not only for me but to make a better life for my mom. Even though she lives far away, my mom always calls me and is a great source of encouragement and support as I continue my education.

My goal is to graduate from SUNY Broome and be able to attend a four-year school so that I can give back to my community. I want to help other people. My goal is to become a counselor and work with immigrants to help their transition into the U.S. My experience was made a little easier because I learned how to speak a little bit of English from the American Civic Association classes before I went into the high school, but not everyone has that and it is not fair for those students to be thrown into a situation where they are attending school in an English-only setting. So my hope is to support people in that situation.

My first day of college, I met an international student from Mexico. I volunteered to assist them with getting to know the area. I wanted to make sure that they had what they needed. I was there to support them throughout their time here in Binghamton. For me, that was a great experience because I want to help people and that experience helped me to know that I am on the right track as a Liberal Arts major. I have also been hired as a tutor for Spanish and I am only in my second semester, so this makes me proud. In my first semester, I also became a Student Assembly Senator and I am a Student Ambassador for the Admissions Department, a member of the Leadership Honor Society and a proud EOP student.

One of the challenges that I face is time management. I work two jobs and so juggling work, school and life can be challenging at times. Even though this is a challenge, my EOP Counselor is always there to help me with my needs. I have also had the benefit of meeting other staff members who believe in my ability to graduate and have a better life... This is important! The campus-wide Convocation Committee is pleased to announce that Dr. Christopher Chabris, psychologist and co-author of the best seller *The Invisible Gorilla: How Our Intuitions Deceive Us*, has been selected as our 2018 Convocation Day speaker. Chabris earned a Ph.D. in psychology from Harvard University and taught there before his current teaching post at Union College. He has spoken at Google, Goldman Sachs and Microsoft, among other places. Our speaker is a chess master and games enthusiast who writes a monthly column for the Wall Street Journal.

Convocation 2018 will focus on important and relevant themes such as how cognitive illusions impact our daily lives. As a creator of one of the most famous experiments in psychology, Chabris will discuss how our intuitions lead us astray, affecting our decisions in business, the criminal justice field, the health sciences and even how we drive.

We hope that Chabris will inspire students and faculty alike to consider how illusions about attention, memory, confidence, knowledge, cause and potential can cost us dearly, and how to manage these illusions. Please note that **Tuesday April 17, 2018** is **Convocation Day, on which no day or**

Convocation 2018 will focus on important and relevant themes such as the role attention plays in police-civilian encounters, the problems with eye-witness testimony and memory, the ways in which talented medical experts and pilots may miss what is right in front of them and how our belief in the power of confidence shapes our selection of leaders.

More Details Regarding *The Invisible Gorilla:*

Reading this book will make you *less* sure of yourself-and that's a good thing. In *The Invisible Gorilla*, we use a wide assortment of stories and counter intuitive scientific findings to reveal an important truth: Our minds don't work the way we think they do. We think we see ourselves and the world as they really are, but we're actually missing a whole lot.

We combine the work of other researchers with our own findings on attention, perception, memory, and reasoning to reveal how faulty intuitions often get us into trouble. In the process, we explain:

- Why a company would spend billions to launch a product that its own analysts know will fail
- How a police officer could run right past a brutal assault without seeing it
- Why award-winning movies are full of editing mistakes
- · What criminals have in common with chess masters





Health and Safety update on the bedbug situation

Public Safety has received a report concerning bedbugs in the Digital Lounge and Commons. As a result, they made the decision on April 16 to promptly shut down the DLC and arrange for an exterminator to inspect and, if necessary, treat the room.

Please note that the exterminator, in previous visits to campus, informed us that bedbugs are often hitchhikers, coming in to campus with individuals. Because of this, there is no preventative that can be applied.

What are bedbugs?

Bedbugs are a small, flat, parasitic insect. They feed on blood, but aren't known to spread disease. They are more of an annoyance. Bites may or may not be noticeable; however, an allergic reaction may occur in some people. If this occurs, seek treatment.

Infestations usually occur where people sleep and bugs tend to live within 8 feet. During the day, they hide in mattresses, box springs, bed frames, headboards, dresser tables, inside cracks or crevices, behind wallpaper, or any other clutter or objects around a bed.

Signs and symptoms of an infestation include:

bite marks on the body (may not appear for one or more days if at all, but the marks would be similar to a mosquito or flea – a slightly swollen and red area that may itch)

To avoid bedbugs, always check seams and folds of luggage, overnight bags, folded clothes, bedding, furniture and anywhere else where they can hide. If you suspect that you have an infestation, get help from a professional pest control company that is experienced with treating bedbugs. If you are bitten, you can apply antiseptic creams or lotions and take an antihistamine.

Facilities and Public Safety will remain vigilant and address situations as they occur. Please notify Public Safety immediately if you become aware of the presence of a bedbug.

The Gorilla in the Room: Convocation Day speaker explores how our minds deceive us

Conley, a uniformed officer, responded at the same time, pursuing the actual suspect over a fence and making the arrest. Accused of covering up the assault, Conley said he never saw his fellow officers beating Cox. A jury didn't believe him and Conley was convicted of

Have you ever surfed the web while listening to your professor in class, or answered a text message while behind the wheel?

Common sense tells us that multitasking is real, even preferable; efficient people, we reason, should be able to do two things at once. We build our environments based on this assumption, such as the multiple computer terminals of a stock trading floor, or the many devices surrounding an operating table.

One problem: Common sense is utterly wrong, as the many Internet videos of people walking while texting can show you – and the inevitable ignominious end in a fountain, body of water or open manhole. Less humorous are the police reports of serious and even fatal accidents of drivers who thought they could text and drive at the same time.

"We don't have enough mental resources to do multiple tasks at once, and when we do, we perform worse than if we do one task at a time," explained Dr. Christopher Chabris, the 2018 Convocation Day keynote speaker.

The invisible gorilla

A cognitive psychologist and researcher, Chabris is the co-author of the best-selling book, *The Invisible Gorilla: How Our Intuitions Deceive Us.*

He began his lecture with the tale of two Boston police officers,



and Conley was convicted of Professor Gian Roma and Dr. Christopher Chabris during the Convocation Day question and answer session perjury and obstruction of justice, fired from the force and sentence to 34 months in prison.

The Boston case is an example of "inattentional blindness." Paying attention closely to one thing, we often fail to notice others – even when they are obvious or we're looking right at them, Chabris explained.

One popular experiment asks participants to watch a video of people bouncing and passing basketballs, asking them to count the number of passes made by the people in white shirts. Invariably, they end up missing the gorilla walking behind them and thumping its chest on the screen – the invisible gorilla of Chabris' book.

And it's not just a product of today's technology-inundated environment, or solely an American problem. People in South Korea missed the gorilla, as did Hadza hunter-gatherers in Africa.

"Inattentional blindness is part of the way all human minds work," Chabris explained. "Attention is a limited, zero-sum resource."

Our expectations also play a major role in what we see – and what we don't, in the case of the gorilla. Another factor is "change blindness" – our inability to recognize changes in our visual field when we are not paying attention.

Playing into both concepts is also the "illusion of attention," the belief that we pay attention to and notice more than we actually do, and the "illusion of memory," the mistaken belief that our memories are more complete, objective and biased than they actually are.

"When we recall a memory, we combine different elements that go together into a coherent story," he explained.

Sometimes, however, those stories are obviously wrong – such as President Donald Trump's "memory" of thousands of people in Jersey City cheering the fall of the World Trade Center on 9/11, or Hillary Clinton on the 2008 campaign trail recounting a visit to Bosnia in a hail of bullets when she was First Lady. (Neither happened, as evidenced by news reports of the respective days' events.)

In short, memories reconstruct what we *expect* to have seen or experienced, and are subject to distortion whenever we recall them and potentially mix them with new influences. Memories from traumatic events – considered by many to be inalterable – are not immune to this.

Taken as a whole, inattentional blindness, change blindness and the illusions of memory and attention are good explanations of why eyewitness testimony can be wrong – such as in the case of Officer Conley.



More illusions

Other types of illusion also affect our outlook. "The illusion of competence" makes us more likely to overestimate our abilities – and the less capable we are, the less we are aware of it. In a discussion following the main lecture, Chabris described his diagnosis of Lyme Disease during graduate school, in which he saw a physician consult reference books to confirm whether the rash met the parameters of Lyme.

It did, as it happens. Many people, however, would view such a physician more negatively than one who confidently diagnoses a problem without double-checking – even though the former might be doing the job more effectively.

There is also "illusory correlation," when you believe that two things go together without evidence. This concept underlies such popular books as *The Secret*, which claims that we manifest our thoughts, a repackaging of the power of positive thinking. To remedy this illusion, Chabris suggests using the fourfold table:

looking at not only when two phenomena correlate, but all the times they don't. Exonerating Officer Conley

While he was teaching at Union College, Chabris had his students put inattentional blindness to the test by conducting an experiment. The students were asked to jog 30 feet behind another runner, counting how many times she touched her head. Along the way, another group of students would be engaged in a brawl behind a fraternity house.

The experiment was designed to mimic as much as possible the conditions of the Conley case. Could the officer have missed the beating that occurred right in front of him?

The answer was yes. During nighttime, which is when the Conley incident occurred, only about a third saw the fight. In broad daylight, that number rose to 40 percent. No one stopped to intervene.

Officer Conley did, in fact, appeal and was granted a new trial nine years later after it turned out that one of the eyewitnesses was using hypnotically enhanced memory and didn't disclose that to the jury. He was ultimately exonerated and returned to the Boston police force as a rookie, working his way up to detective and then sergeant. Michael Cox remained on the force as well, working his way up to deputy Superintendent.

Knowing such concepts as inattentional and change blindness, the illusions of confidence, memory and attention, and illusory correlation can help people become better decision-makers, Chabris said. While we cannot eliminate these tricks of the mind, we can learn to account for them.

"The first step in making better decisions is to keep in mind the limitations of how the human mind works," he said. "It's very counter-intuitive to think that something can be right in front of you, you set your eyes on it and you don't see it," he added during the question and answer session.

This May, Johannes Nightingale is earning two Associate's degrees – one in Liberal Arts Individual Studies from SUNY Broome and another in Liberal Arts from Berkshire Community College in Massachusetts, where he now lives.

He's taking a gap year before pursuing the final two years of his bachelor's degree, but is keeping busy – with his three business enterprises, and as a nationally ranked Observed Trials bicyclist. (Well, technically, he's ranked seventh in all of North America.)

Did we mention that he's just 17 years old?

Early college - and early CEO

SUNY Broome students from several years ago may remember a young Hornet in their classes, often accompanied by his mother, Regina Mason. The youngest of five children, Johannes grew up on a farm in Coventry and began attending classes at SUNY Broome in 2013, when he was just 12 years old, through the Early College program.

His first course – at the recommendation of his flute instructor – was music theory. He then took the placement exams required of full-time students, following it up with classes in English, math, computer programming and other core courses, as well as sound engineering. In addition to flute, he also performed with the college's Chorus and the Chamber singers.

He left SUNY Broome in 2015, and studied for a year at Bard College at Simon's Rock in Massachusettes. The academics there weren't the right fit, he said, so then he enrolled in Berkshire Community College, where he focused on engineering design and film and continued to study flute.

He finished his Associate's at SUNY Broome in December and will earn his Associate's at Berkshire this June. In May, he will be at SUNY Broome's Commencement ceremony as one of the Liberal Arts Division's student marshals. Johannes has been the recipient of a Jack Kent Cooke Foundation Young Scholar scholarship since seventh grade, and he just won a JKCF College Scholarship worth up to \$40,000 a year to finish his Bachelor's degree.

He currently runs Johannes Nightingale Productions, a digital media production company that focuses on cinematography, pre- and post-production work and color-grading; projects include commercials and music videos, he said.

In the works is an online store that will sell watches, clothing accessories and other luxury items. Right now, he's also laying the groundwork for an independent record label and records local artists in his own home studio. They come from all genres, from folk and country to hiphop, rap and rock, he said.

"My goal is to find local artists on a smaller scale and give then a chance to start their careers," he said.

While he is currently applying to four-year schools for a bachelor's degree in business – Bentley University and Babson College are among his picks, and he's already been accepted at the Rochester Institute of Technology – his current businesses are more than just a hobby. Through them, he hopes to lay the groundwork for his ultimate dream: to start and run large-scale companies in industries ranging from media and advertising to technology, e-commerce, transportation and more.

Part of his interest in business is prosaic: "I've always wanted more money," he quipped.

But there's passion, too. "I love creating things, creating new products and helping people through my work," he explained. "Nothing makes me happier than running a company."

Getting his start

Johannes planted the seed in many of his endeavors while he was still a SUNY Broome student. In fact, that's when he took up trials biking as a hobby and it took off from there, leading to competitions and national rankings.

The seeds of his business enterprises – in music, e-commerce and more – also were planted during his Hornet years.

"SUNY Broome was life-changing for me in every way possible," Johannes reflected. "Simply letting someone my age take classes – it made everything after that possible."

The single-day event featured a fuel-efficiency competition for drivers of alternate-fueled vehicles; fully electric, hybrid and traditional gasoline- or diesel-powered vehicles all competed. Individuals, colleges, universities, car clubs and manufacturers were all invited to participate. The day included a 100-mile, two-hour fuel economy event on the 2.45 mile WGI short track, and an Autocross sanctioned by the SCCA.

SUNY Broome's student IEEE club took a broken and retired electric utility van and

converted the lead acid batteries to newer lithium ion batteries. Batteries were donated by BAE- hybrid bus division, as well as Gentherm of California. This year, modifications were focused on instrumentation. Students designed, built, and installed a custom voltage display panel, a custom dash display, a power meter, side view mirror cameras and a GPS.

This instrumentation helped the vehicle calculate a 157MPGe rating, which far exceeded their expectations!



According to Professor Margherita Rossi, founding member of the Women's Institute, "Sexual harassment and sexual assault happen to so many. We need to listen and act. This is more than a viral moment. Because of the work Tarana Burke has done, we actually have the opportunity to hand our children a different world."

Departments involved in the effort include Medical Assisting, Nursing, Health Information Technology, Radiologic Technology, Physical Therapist Assistant, Dental Hygiene, Clinical Laboratory Technologies, Criminal Justice and Emergency Services, Communications, Hospitality, Business Information Technology, Special Events and Productions, Office of Marketing & Communications, Public Safety and Chemistry.





Aiming for the top: How SUNY Broome inspired Branden to reach his potential

Branden Desmond dares to dream big.

Interested in politics and law, he's already run for public office – conducting a write-in campaign for Smithville town supervisor. While he netted only 15 votes, he actively hit the campaign trail, connecting with his fellow residents.

Perhaps his political career began a bit earlier at Greene High School, where he ran for student council president twice – on a communist ticket. (His slogan: "Go red for Greene.") His interest in communism began in high school, when he began researching the topic, and culminated recently in a research project for SUNY Broome's challenging Honors program.

His long-term goals: Become an attorney, visit the tomb of Lenin and someday make a run for the White House, contributing to the betterment of his country. His presidential role models are the Roosevelts, both Theodore and FDR.

"I want to be president. I've dreamed about it since I was about 12," he said.

'A second home'

Desmond enrolled in SUNY Broome at the very last moment. He was set to go to the University at Albany, but the campus just didn't feel right and he opted to stay closer to home.

"When I first took my tour of the campus, I knew that this is where I wanted to be," he said. "SUNY Broome has almost become a second home to me since I first started. I have met amazing teachers here, and have had a chance to grow both academically and as a person."

While he was a B+ student in high school, he strived for excellence in college, achieving a near-perfect GPA every semester. He has a dual major in Paralegal Studies and Liberal Arts, to help prepare him for law school down the road.

He enjoys the challenging nature of the Honors Program, and the connections he forged with professors Steven Call and Leeland Whitted, with whom he conducted his Honors project.

"I like the freedom it gives me in class, especially in connecting with a teacher you like. It really shines when you have that interaction," Branden said of the Honors Program.

In his Honors project, Desmond drew on his interest in communism and explored how its principles were enacted – or not – in societies such as the Soviet Union, Israel and North Korea, as well as Europe prior to World War II. He also explored American communities, such as the Transcendentalists, which espoused communist principles.

While Desmond has a deep appreciation for communist ideals – the pooling of resources and shared ownership by the people, and the focus on altruism in particular – he found that all too often it can lead to a totalitarian society, so-called "barracks communism" in which life is bureaucratically regimented. Rather than nation-states, communism proved more successful in small-scale communities where people pool their resources. (Communism, he points out, is also distinct from the socialism found in many European countries, in which a private sector exists and people have their own money and resources.)

The ideals underpinning communism often get lost in the West, especially considering the legacy of the Cold War during which communist societies were viewed as "The Red Menace."

"It truly is beautiful, the idea of everyone working together for the betterment of society," Desmond reflected.

Outside of class, Branden aids his peers as a tutor and is president of the Tutoring Club. He also has a work-study job in Liberal Arts, aiding Professor Lisa Strahley, and works as a supervisor at CVS. Life can be hectic and he averages only four to six hours of sleep at night, juggling schoolwork with his employment.

What keeps him going? "I tap into that ambition and passion for everything," he replied

He's also co-manager for sales for Blues on the Bridge, a popular music festival in do wown Binghamton. He became involved with the event as a summer job in high school selling advertising, and his work blossomed from there. His role in the event converges with his interest in law, as it requires him to know about contracts.

'Life-altering' connections

Like many local students, Branden pondered transferring to Binghamton University. His professors, however, urged him to broaden his horizons and consider the Ivy League – Cornell University, or even Harvard. He's applying to both, with the eventual aim of getting into their law schools.

In essence, Branden views his ambitions in law and politics as two sides of a larger system of societal justice. In some senses, politics is a macrocosm of justice while attorneys operate in the microcosm, as they seek justice for their individual clients.

While Branden Desmond has enjoyed many aspects of his SUNY Broome experience – the academic rigor, the campus and the community – he credits his professors with making his time here truly memorable and shaping his path to come.

"SUNY Broome has been life-altering," he said. "If I hadn't met Professor Whittaker or Professor Call, I wouldn't have come to grasp my intellectual potential."

He is also part of the Men of Excellence program, which provides SUNY Broome's men of color with intensive academic, professional and social support – and in Brandon's words, helps guide participants to be the best they can be.

"Getting to know people and what they're about and their background is good for everyone. It's a human thing," he reflected. "Life is an experience and you should never limit yourself to one point of view."

The Student Village resident also has seen his GPA climb, reaching a respectable 3.6 last semester. Pursuing his true passion has made all the difference.

"I like how they're very tough because they want you to succeed. They push you in a good way," she said.

After graduating this May, she plans to work in her field, either in Binghamton or her hometown. Eventually, she plans to pursue certification as a respiratory therapist.

"I like the medical field because I like fast-paced environments. As a respiratory therapist, there are moments where you're going to have a lot of adrenaline and use your skills," she said. "There are a lot of code blues, where patients need to be intubated."

She is part of the SUNY Broome Health Research Team, which this year explored campus awareness of hands-only CPR and AEDs and conducted a campaign to inform and teach the community their use. They presented their findings at the Student Undergraduate Research Conference at SUNY Oneonta.

Figuera also expanded her horizons in other ways by becoming a Resident Assistant, a role she has held for the past two years. It can be a tough job for an introvert, as RAs are considered role models and seek to resolve any issues that arise in the Student Village. Kayla found the work enjoyable, and it helped her develop confidence.

SUNY Broome isn't Griswold's first college experience, but it has been by far her most successful. She began at Fordham University, where she played Division I softball and helped her team win the Atlantic 10 Championship. But she admits that her focus was entirely on her sport and not on her academic success.

Thinking a change of scene would help, she transferred to the University at Buffalo but continued to struggle. Disillusioned, she dropped out of school and spent five years working for Chipotle, working her way up to general manager. While she enjoyed working for the company, she felt that her future called her elsewhere.

She enrolled at SUNY Broome, where her mother also attended classes as part of the partnership program with Excelsior College. To ease the transition, she began with a few summer courses and was pleasantly surprised.

"I had really great professors," she said. "I love being here. I love being engaged in campus. It really feels like home."

With softball out of the picture, she found other ways to become engaged in campus life, such as the Broome Educators of Children Association, and improved academically, earning a spot on the President's List. She also became involved with public deliberations, working with Professor Lisa Strahley, coordinator for the Douglas C. Garnar Center for Civic Engagement.

Unlike debates, deliberations aren't adversarial in nature. Instead, groups of engaged citizens discuss aspects of a problem, potential solutions, and the pluses and minuses of each. There is a focus on listening and inviting a variety of voices to the discussion, Griswold explained.

"Deliberations are a better way of hearing everyone and everyone having a voice at the table. Everyone can hear each other," she said.

Under Professor Strahley's guidance, Becca is learning to run deliberations and developing the skills she hopes to use one day in the classroom. She participated in one such deliberation in the Chenango Valley school district, focused on the problem of mass shootings.

"It wasn't just parents and students; we had a police chief, the county executive, school employees, different voices and opinions. It was cool to have them hear each other's perspectives," she said.

Griswold stays involved in the community in other ways as well. She coaches a travel softball team in Windsor and has also volunteered at The Children's Home, which gave her the opportunity to witness how educators can make a difference in the lives of children in difficult circumstances.

As she approaches Commencement, Griswold is grateful for her second chance at a college education – right here in her hometown. From professors Strahley and Christine Duffy-Webb to her advisor Tom Quain, SUNY Broome faculty and staff have pushed this future educator to improve her academic standing and succeed.

"They have helped me to think bigger and expect more of myself," she reflected. "They have also taught me to get involved, and that you do not have to look far to make an impact on this world. There are many opportunities right here in our communities."

Roads and drainage are intriguing, but Suehaidee Masso finds her inspiration in bridges.

"I like bridges just because how everything has to be laid out so specifically. You can see exactly where those soft points of pressure are," explained the Engineering Science major, who will transfer to the University at Buffalo this fall to major in civil engineering.

She had the opportunity to explore the intricacies of infrastructure, including bridges, during an internship with the New York State Department of Transportation. As a transportation construction inspector (TCI), she watched over workers on the job, making sure they received the right directions and followed their spec book.

Some of that work did involve bridges – under the Industrial Park exit. She worked on sounding the concrete beams below the road, which have to be constantly monitored to make sure they can handle the complex stresses placed upon them. She's looking forward to returning to the DOT for another internship this summer before she heads to Buffalo.

While women have made headway in the engineering field, the profession is still dominated by men, Masso acknowledged. Her first introduction to the field came in fourth grade, when she took part in the Girls in Engineering Program at her Binghamton elementary school. More opportunities followed, including the Broome-Tioga BOCES New Visions Engineering Academy, which brought students to the DOT, Lockheed Martin, BAE Systems and other engineering firms.

"As a woman in engineering, sometimes it can be hard to be looked at in the same way as a man would be," the Chenango Valley High School graduate explained. "On the other hand, women bring a different kind of perspective to the field, which is nice."

Before her internship with the DOT, Masso considered a future in mechanical engineering. Once she had a taste of infrastructure, however, she knew her path lay in the civil engineering field.

SUNY Broome proved to be an ideal destination for Masso, who chose the college both for its low tuition and its proximity to her family. The courses for an Engineering Science student are the same both academically and in terms of rigor as a four-year school, with one main difference: Students are encouraged to work together, and develop teamwork skills that will be useful on the job later on.

"Everything is more individualized and you can really get that solid learning background," she said. "It's a great place to go to really get your head in the game. I honestly don't know how people can go straight into a four-year school."

Small class sizes allow students to interact with their professors and develop an academic support system. Masso particularly appreciates the guidance of Professor Robert Lofthouse, who has a great depth of knowledge in his field - which he imparts to his students.

"He knows absolutely everything you can possibly think of," she said.

Long term, Suehaidee Masso hopes to continue her work on bridges – not only bridging the gap for women in engineering, but bringing her knowledge to developing countries and aiding the infrastructure there.

While she was unable to go on SUNY Broome's Health for Haiti trip, she and other engineering science students did research ways to improve Grande Saline's clean water and gardening irrigation systems, providing ideas which community members found useful.

"I want to go out to third world countries to have a sense of what they're facing and how we can fix it," she said. "Maybe I can get out there with some really good designs."

In Haiti, Grace Muggeo worked alongside engineers from the Pall Corporation on repairs to a water filtration system.

The Cortland-based company donated the system in 2015, and since then it has provided drinking water to hundreds of families in the rural community of Grande Saline. But even the best system needs periodic maintenance, and Muggeo eagerly worked alongside the Pall engineers as they made the needed fixes during the SUNY Broome Health for Haiti global service learning course in January 2018.

"It helped me realize that in the future, I could travel to another country as an engineer and do something like this," reflected the Engineering Science major, who also participated in other Health for Haiti initiatives, including food distribution, teaching youngsters and visiting orphanages.

Health for Haiti has long intrigued Muggeo, and the possibility of traveling the world to make an impact on people's lives. In some ways, that's surprising; she sought to stay close to home and close to her family while attending college, and plans to stay in New York State once she is a full-fledged engineer.

"I've always wanted to stay close to home. The first two years of engineering are the same wherever you go, and I get to be with my family every day," she said of her decision to stay local for college.

Despite the distance, she found that she wasn't homesick at all while in Haiti with her classmates. They were simply too busy, working as a team in an intricate humanitarian effort while seeing a different culture first hand.

"It makes you appreciate life a lot more," she said of her experiences in the Caribbean country.

Learning to fail: Spurred by disappointment, Joshua improves as a filmmaker and an artist

When he came to college, Joshua Wahl had a simple plan: Make as many short films as he possibly could.

He thought he knew filmmaking, and that all his creations would shine with creativity and technical skill. Maybe he would spend a year at SUNY Broome before moving on to a four-year school and his future as a director.

But for every good project he produced, he seemed to make eight bad ones – and he began to question his ambitions, whether he should continue in his Communications and Media Arts major or find a new path. His peers and his professors, however, provided needed insight and Wahl stayed on course – while learning some needed life-lessons.

"The moments of failure are just as important, if not more important, than the moments of success because that's how we grow," he reflected. "I was, and still am, in the beginning of my career as a filmmaker. There's still a lot left for me to learn and I can't give up based on failure. I have to learn from it and change to get better."

A Union-Endicott High School graduate, Joshua Wahl originally saw himself attending a four-year college out of the gate. His mother, however, suggested SUNY Broome as a smart way to take needed prerequisite courses while getting a good academic footing. It worked for her; she attended SUNY Broome before transferring and later graduating from St. John Fisher College, Joshua said.

He agreed to give his local community college a try. As a Presidential Honor Scholar, he received a full-ride scholarship, a smart start by any measure.

Originally skeptical about the benefits of a two-year degree, he fell in love with the Communication & Media Arts program and is glad he stayed to graduate.

"It's not only production, but media and how we communicate. It has opened my mind; I'm looking at the world in a different way," he said. "Who I am now is not the same person as I was in terms of artistry."

A passion for film

Wahl first became interested in the world of film when he was five years old and wanted to become an actor. During his early years, performance called to him, everything from magic tricks to stand-up comedy to musical theater. When he was 13, however, he began to consider another aspect of performance: the view behind the camera.

He began to question what makes something good and what movies, film and other media were trying to say, the stories they sought to tell and the messages behind them. In high school, he avidly watched Aaron Sorkin's *The Newsroom* and was enthralled by the screenwriter's work.

He wanted to write, film and create, not just act, he determined. And he had a vision of what he wanted to create: dramas with snappy dialogue, with storytelling arcs and an underlying message. He also drew inspiration from director David Fincher, writer-director Christopher Nolan and other luminaries in the field, and kept questioning what makes a film good.

Storytelling that allows the viewer to connect with characters in the film is a must; people must be able to connect their own stories to the ones they are witnessing. Take, for example, what Wahl considers the standout film of 2017: *Ladybird*.

"It was a perfect year in the life of a character, a perfect moment in time. It felt so personable," Joshua said.

Getting to the level of excellence seen in films such as *Ladybird*, however, takes years of honing one's craft and learning all the ins and outs of the media world.

Wahl's classes help him gain that needed experience. For his classes, he has worked on lighting projects, interview packages, short films, informational videos and even a music video. Each class approaches film production in a different way so that students gain the skills they need, he said.

He deeply appreciates the mentorship of his professors, who are experienced in the field. One standout is his video productions professor, Chris Keaty.

"He gave us a lot of creative control and also kept us grounded. He's very friendly and open," Wahl said.

Student Ambassador

While you can mostly find him behind a camera or video production console these days, Joshua Wahl hasn't entirely given up his love for performance. As a Student Ambassador, he works as a campus tour guide. Leading tours draws on those acting skills, as he tries to inspire excitement and enthusiasm in his audience – in this case, prospective students and their families.

Wahl is currently weighing the next step in his journey to become a filmmaker. He has already been accepted by SUNY Fredonia, Ithaca College and Long Island University Post, and is waiting to hear back from New York University and Columbia University.

Looking back, he remembered a stray comment from a high school teacher that may have skewed his initial perception of SUNY Broome. The teacher referred to it as "13th grade" – something Wahl found to be very untrue.

The academics, the resources available to students and the sense of community are comparable to four-year colleges, Joshua said.

"Each semester changes you in more ways than one, whether as a student or as a person," he said. "Coming here is a great choice."

This is more than a viral moment. Because of the work Tarana Burke has done, we actually have the opportunity to hand our children a different world."

'I met a lot of good people'

In some senses, it seems natural that Elena Honovich should aspire to become a police officer.

Her uncle and brother served in the military, and her grandfather fought in World War II. She has always been fascinated by uniforms and those who wear them and, as she puts it, "being disciplined runs in my blood."

But in her native Moldova, that dream was out of reach.

"I always wanted to be a police officer, but back in Europe it's a very difficult process and police officers are not respected," said Honovich, who came to the United States in 2012.

As she leads the Business and Professional Services division during Commencement 2018, Honovich will be one step closer to achieving that dream.

"I'm excited! I'm a student marshal, so I can't wait to put on my golden robe," she said.

The political and economic situation are difficult in Moldova, a small Eastern European country that was once part of the Soviet Union, Honovich acknowledged.

Elena had wanted to come to the United States since she was 15 years old, and took part in an exchange program that allowed her to work and travel in the United States for a summer. She cherished the chance to see New York City, a city she came to love and, for a while, call home.

"I met my husband and the rest is history," she said.

While she had studied psychology and educational success in her homeland, the United States opened a new realm of educational possibilities. A friend graduated from SUNY Broome's Criminal Justice program and Honovich decided to follow suit.

College could be challenging at times, and occasionally Honovich had to translate her coursework into her native Romanian and back to English. Like many Europeans, she is a polyglot.

"I know four languages and I'm learning a couple more. Over there, we are encouraged to learn more languages," she said. In fact, she's learning Spanish this semester.

She opted to major in Homeland Security, appreciating the range of subjects covered in the coursework. In her final semester, in addition to Spanish, she is taking classes in forensics, hazardous materials, criminal procedure, constitutional law, and fitness.

Favorite professors include Criminal Justice and Emergency Services (CJES) instructors Mary and Steven Yurenda, who have backgrounds in the New York State Police, as well as Professor Darin Schmidt. Professor James Sheerin has also been a supportive mentor and guide.

Honovich particularly loves classes with labs, and the opportunity to explore concepts in a hands-on way, she said. One of the first lab classes she took was criminal investigations, which inspired her love of forensics.

After graduation, she will transfer to Excelsior College to earn her bachelor's degree in investigative forensics, and then seek work in the field. Police work is preferable, but careers in an embassy or in a forensics lab are on the table, too.

A member of the Phi Theta Kappa honor society, Elena Honovich is also busy outside the classroom. She and her husband own a restaurant, Food Fusion Bar and Grill, in Endicott.

While she juggles work with her studies like many students, she is glad she made the commitment to education and her future.

"I met a lot of good people here," she said. "I never expected to be able to graduate in the United States."

Born in Brooklyn, New York, in 1937, Alicia Ostriker has been a finalist for both the National Book Award and the Lenore Marshall Poetry Prize She currently serves as a Chancellor of the Academy of American Poets.

Chris Origer in the English Department recommended this poem. It's a ghazal. The ghazal is composed of a minimum of five couplets—and typically no more than fifteen—that are structurally, thematically, and emotionally autonomous. Each line of the poem must be of the same length, though meter is not imposed in English. The first couplet introduces a scheme, made up of a rhyme followed by a refrain. Subsequent couplets pick up the same scheme in the second line only, repeating the refrain and rhyming the second line with both lines of the first stanza. The final couplet usually includes the poet's signature, referring to the author in the first or third person, and frequently including the poet's own name or a derivation of its meaning.

Traditionally invoking melancholy, love, longing, and metaphysical questions, ghazals are often sung by Iranian, Indian, and Pakistani musicians. The form has roots in seventh-century Arabia, and gained prominence in the thirteenth- and fourteenth-century.



The BCC Foundation awarded over \$1,300,000 in support in 2017 and is projected to exceed that amount again this year.



A tradition of excellence: SUNY Broome celebrates 50 years of nursing

are involved in a truly dazzling variety of roles, all the way up to highly trained nurse practitioners who see and treat patients," reflected SUNY Broome Executive Vice President and Chief Academic Officer Francis Battisti, who was a student himself when the nursing program began.

Nursing took center stage during the recent Alumni Reunion. During the President's reception, alumni – nurses and non-nurses alike – gathered for a ceremony recognizing the program's half-century of accomplishment. Governor Andrew Cuomo also wrote a letter praising the program's commitment to care, which was read to the crowd by a representative of his office.

In the fall of 1967, Broome Tech's first nursing students began their education. Lois Roach headed the department in those early days, and that first class of 27 students – all of them women – graduated in 1969.

While the focus on care, compassion and excellence are the same as today, the Broome Tech nursing program operated in a much different world. There was no high-tech Decker Health Sciences Building; that opened in 1998. Instead, the Nursing program operated out of the now-demolished 901 Front St. for years in rather Spartan accommodations.

They were white hats, white stockings and white dresses, in contrasts to today's lanyards and multicolored scrubs. The roles they filled were different, too.

"In those early days, nurses had more limitations on what they could do professionally. These days, they

"Sooner or later, everyone ends up in the doctor's office — and chances are, the nurses there received their training at SUNY Broome. Or maybe your medical provider is a nurse practitioner, which is increasingly common – and they may have received the first step of their training here as well," noted SUNY Broome President Kevin E. Drumm.

At the reception, college officials, alumni, faculty and staff also showed their appreciation to Professor Linda Jowett, who retired in December after 25 years in the classroom. Jowett is an alumna herself, graduating in 1979 while raising four children. She went on to earn degrees from Binghamton University, becoming a nurse practitioner specializing in family practice.

She started teaching as an adjunct in 1993, balancing teaching with her healthcare work. After a decade, she shifted the balance and began teaching full-time, focusing on training the next generation of healthcare providers.

"Linda perhaps embodies every one of you here in that she has the common characteristics of a nurse, that include love, work and knowledge," said 1978 Nursing alumna and retired Nursing Professor Jennifer Houghtalen.

Like Houghtalen wowt, many of the program's instructors are also SUNY Broome graduates, and have demanding careers in the field.

At the end of the ceremony, Nursing Chair Susan Seibold-Simpson invited

two members of that original Nursing class – now retired – up to the podium, along with two current Nursing students, both men wearing scrubs in

SUNY Broome gold.

"We can't do it without the next generation," said Seibold-Simpson, reflecting on the profession's future. "Nursing is a family in this community."
