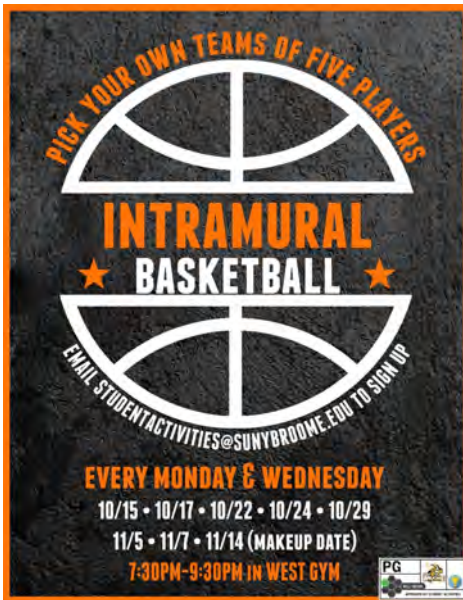
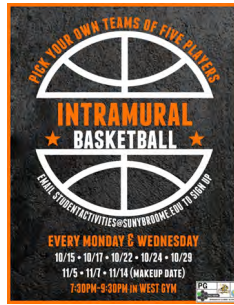

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Join SUNY Broome President Kevin E. Drumm and the campus community at 11 a.m. Thursday, Oct. 4, as we dedicate a rare, original United States Civil War-era map that was donated to campus by Professor Douglas Garnar.

Preserved and framed, the map is located in the first-floor east end of the Titchener Building. This map was created in 1860 by Samuel Augustus Mitchell, and exhibits the United States with the North American British Provinces, Sandwich Islands, Mexico and Central America, together with Cuba and the other West India Islands.

Diversity Abroad Honors Scholarship Requirements

Academic Criteria

- Students will be enrolled in a degree program with a declared major.
- Transfer students will become eligible to study abroad during the second semester of enrollment.
- The minimum GPA requirement is a 3.0 for the scholarship nomination; recipients may be enrolled in less than full-time status, provided they continue to meet campus definition of continuing success.
- Leadership, community service and extracurricular activities will be considered for review.

Financial Criteria

A SUNY Broome student holds a Haitian boy. Candidates are not required to demonstrate financial need.

- A statement of financial need can be submitted for consideration.

Additional Eligibility Criteria

- Candidates must be United States citizens, permanent resident aliens and New York State residents. Those nominated from underrepresented and low-income categories may receive positive consideration as diversity candidates.
- Campuses may consider financial need and economic disadvantage as a diversity indicator, but applicants must also meet a high academic standard as evidenced by GPA and supporting recommendations.

Documentation Required

- Student essay (1-2 pages) on the anticipated study abroad goals.
- One faculty or department recommendation letter.

“It’s a great way to make friends and to have people keep you focused; we form study groups,” she said.

Honors students are required to take on a capstone project in their final semester, which allows them to pursue their academic interests. Stephe is still finalizing her prospective project, but she plans to look at different diseases that affect children, along with suggested treatments and complications. During the course of the project, students partner with a chosen professor – an experience that Safari said she anticipates.

“It’s an opportunity to work closely with a faculty member and learn from their expertise,” she said.

Medicine is a definite career interest for Stephe Safari, who currently works on the surgical and pediatric floor at UHS Wilson Medical Center as a nursing assistant.

“I’ve always loved patient-centered care. My mom is a nursing assistant at

Honors students present on the need for a centralized student lounge in December 2017. Lourdes and she tells me great stories,” she reflected. “I really love the idea of being on a team. I think that’s what distinguishes nursing from physicians in medicine.”

She is interested both in pediatric and emergency medicine, and plans to eventually become a nurse practitioner. Long term, Stephe – an active member of Brothers and Sisters in Christ (BASIC) on campus and Christ Church in the community — hopes to combine her medical expertise with her faith through missionary work in underdeveloped nations.

Stephe’s decision to attend SUNY Broome was inspired by her older sister Stella, a recent alumna who also earned the PHS scholarship. Like her sister, she has truly enjoyed her experience.

“I heard so many stories about the support of the faculty members she met and the tight-knit environment offered at Broome,” she said. “I really like how small the campus is.”

Stephe Safari isn’t afraid to test herself.

A recipient of the prestigious Presidential Honors Scholarship, the Liberal Arts and Sciences major plans to transfer to Binghamton University’s nursing program and spend her future career helping those in need.

When the Johnson City resident decided to attend SUNY Broome, she made another important decision, too: to enroll in the academically challenging Honors Program.

“I was very interested in the opportunity to challenge myself,” the sophomore said. “It is definitely a challenging course load, and also an opportunity to stay on track.”

Dr. Altman receives Teaching Excellence Award from the Society for the Teaching of Psychology

The Society for the Teaching of Psychology (STP) recently awarded SUNY Broome Psychology Professor William S. Altman with the Wayne Weiten Teaching Excellence Award, for faculty members teaching at the two-year college level. Teaching award recipients were honored at STP's 39th anniversary Conference on Teaching in Phoenix, Arizona, and received a plaque and a \$1,500 prize.

Professor Altman earned his bachelor's in history at the University of Pennsylvania, and his MPS in communication arts and MS and PhD in educational psychology from Cornell University.

In choosing Dr. Altman for the award, STP notes that he creates "an environment conducive to learning" and uses evidence-based practices to encourage student participation, such as having them design and implement their own research studies. He also provides opportunities beyond the classroom for students to become involved in the field of psychology, such as working with a student on a research project that she later presented at professional conferences and submitted for publication.

Dr. Altman also provides students a safe environment in which they can fail at an assignment and learn from that failure without jeopardizing their grade. "This type of environment encourages students to learn how to cope with failing so that when they fail in the real world, they know how to respond and act," STP notes in an article on Altman.

Dr. Altman also has been involved with curriculum development for more than 25 years, has more than 70 publications and presentations at local and national conferences, and

a history of editorial service to publications in the field.

Congratulations, Dr. Altman, on an award well-earned!

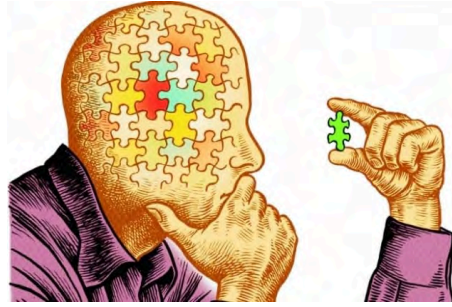

The Darwin R. Wales Center elevator is currently out of service and we apologize for any inconvenience. During a recent routine inspection, it was determined that a number of critical parts need replacement. These parts are on special order and will be installed once received. The entire campus will be notified once the elevator is functioning. Again, we sincerely apologize for any inconvenience.

Calice Advanced Manufacturing Center

Minor punch-list items are being completed by both Facilities staff and the general contractor. We are still awaiting delivery of a few remaining furniture items for the Connector and other locations in the Center.

Also, as part of this project, new heavy-duty outdoor furniture is being installed around the new Calice Center. In all, 12 new benches, three metal tables (with built-in benches) and seven picnic tables will be installed near or around the Calice Center. Please enjoy them.

The grand opening (ribbon cutting), which will be attended by the new SUNY Chancellor, is scheduled for 10 a.m. Tuesday, Oct. 16, 2018.

Culinary Arts and Events Center

Plaster remediation work (which includes the stripping of lead paint) continues.

Augercast piles (for the new addition) are approximately 75% complete.

Micropiles (in the basement of the existing building) are approximately 50% complete.

Framing of soffits and walls is ongoing. Selective demolition and insulating continues. We expect temporary heat within two weeks.

Electrical underground conduit in the basement and electrical “rough-ins” continue throughout the building.

HVAC layout and miscellaneous HVAC demolition has started.

Miscellaneous selective wood flooring removals continue.

Miscellaneous masonry infills are still ongoing at certain wall openings.

Below slab piping has been completed in the basement of the existing building and was inspected by the City of Binghamton.

The first shipment of new windows is expected to arrive this week.



Both NYSEG and Verizon were on site to review new service locations.

A press conference was recently held on-site to announce potential additional funding for the project.

Other notable on-campus design/construction activities

Refurbishing (new floor, painting and carpet mats) of the main entrance (Circulation Area) in the Learning Resource Center (Library) will begin this weekend.

A masonry repair project, which included four locations across campus (Decker, Business, Wales and Titchener), has been completed.

A sidewalk installation/repair contract at four locations across campus (Business, Ice Center, Wales, BC Center/Day Care) has been completed.

Interior and exterior signing for the new Calice Advanced Manufacturing Center has been installed.

New bollard lighting (with much improved illumination) is being installed in front of Titchener.

Repair of the Campus Services loading dock, which will include repair and reinforcement of the damaged dock wall, new bumpers and door seal, will commence once materials have been received.

October Is Cybersecurity Awareness Month!

National Cybersecurity Awareness Month (NCSAM) is a collaborative effort to ensure everyone has the resources they need to stay safe online. NCSAM is spearheaded by the U.S. Department of Homeland Security and the National Cyber Security Alliance (NCSA).

The theme for the first week of NCSAM 2018 is Make Your Home a Haven for Online Safety. Cyber Security starts at home. Security lessons you learn and practice at home will help protect you at school, work and beyond. Secure your home network and personal devices and protect yourself, your family and your community by following these steps:

- Password protect your home network with a strong passphrase; 12 characters is the minimum recommended length, but the longer the better. Hint: combine four random words as your passphrase: brown-horse-racetrack-haystack. You don't need any capitalized/special characters or numbers in your passphrase if it's above 22 characters in length, though adding complexity is even better: Br0wn-H0r\$3-R@c3tr@ck-H@yst@ck.
- Personal Information is like money. Value it. Protect it. Don't share sensitive personal information on social media, hackers can use this knowledge against you during social-engineering attempts. Monitor what your children post online – teach them to value their privacy.
- Be careful of what apps you install on your smartphone. Monitor what permissions apps need, some track your location and can access all of your photos and text messages! Delete apps you don't use anymore.
- Keep a clean machine! Having the latest security software, web browser and operating system is the best defense against viruses, malware and other online threats. Install Anti-Virus protection on all your personal devices, including smartphones. There's a lot of good products out there, we happen to like Malwarebytes for home/personal use.
- Back it up! And back it up regularly! Having a recent copy of all your files, photos and important work means you can retrieve them if you fall victim to #ransomware.
- Use the hashtag #CyberAware this month to support #Cybersecurity Awareness!

A glimpse of the past: SUNY Broome honors professor for donation of historic map

Now hung in the first floor of Titchener Hall, a vintage 1857 map gives students a glimpse of the nation's pre-Civil War past.

Hand-colored and created by S. Augustus Mitchell, the large wall map was donated to the campus by Professor Emeritus Doug Garnar, an avid preserver of local history. Professor Garnar was honored for his donation in a Oct. 4 ceremony in Titchener Hall.

“We’re so grateful for Doug’s decision to donate this to the college, to preserve this piece of pre-Civil War history,” SUNY Broome President

Professors have already made use of it as a pedagogical resource. “I sometimes bring my students out here for my Civil War class,” Professor Steven Call said.

He has them note the features that place the map securely in its timeframe: Kansas and Nebraska have been separated, courtesy of the 1854 Kansas-Nebraska Act, but West Virginia hasn’t yet separated from Virginia – a divorce prompted by the Civil War. Oklahoma is still listed as “Indian territory,” a legacy of the Trail of Tears that forcibly relocated Native Americans from the southeastern states.

The Broome Community College Foundation facilitated the donation, and arranged for the historic map to be preserved – an intricate task.

“This is an amazing piece that he unselfishly gave so students, staff and faculty can learn about history in a more tangible way,” Foundation Executive Director Cathy Williams said of Garnar.

The map came into Professor Garnar’s hands by chance. Until just recently, he lived in a historic four-room schoolhouse in Smithville Flats. In the early 1980s, a man buying a store located at the end of Garnar’s driveway gave him the map for free – fittingly, as it turns out, because Mitchell, a former teacher disgusted with the cartography of his day, designed maps such as this one for schoolroom use.

Intending to install the map on the second floor, Garnar put it in his attic for safekeeping – and promptly forgot it until he was readying the house for sale over the summer and rediscovered it.

“There’s a lot of history in this map. Three years after this map was created, the guns at Fort Sumter began to roar,” Professor Garnar said.

Zak Allen fished out a newspaper from his backpack. True, it was a test run and white space lingered where columns had yet to be laid out. The masthead – The Fulcrum, a name dating back to the college’s Broome Tech days – wasn’t yet in place.

But it was undeniably a student newspaper, the first such endeavor on campus in at least a decade – no small feat in these digital days. (While students are welcome to write for The Buzz, the college’s digital news site is ultimately run by the college’s Office of Marketing & Communications.)

A student in the SUNY Broome Honors program, Zak is also deeply involved in campus life. He became involved with the Student Assembly last year, serving as a senator, and briefly considered running for president. Instead, he chose a different path: helping found the Fulcrum.

A second-year Business Administration major, Zak Allen is deeply interested in the law and politics. Once he graduates, he plans to transfer to either Binghamton University or the University at Albany for a dual major in business and political science. After that: law school.

His career plans haven’t yet taken shape, but he is exploring his options – while enjoying his time at SUNY Broome.

The Binghamton native opted for his local community college for several reasons. It’s close to home and has highly regarded academic programs. Plus, like many of his peers, he wasn’t entirely sure what he wanted to major in; SUNY Broome seemed an optimal place to figure out his trajectory.

Hunger Banquet: Think poverty is far away? Your fellow students have experienced it firsthand

Attending the Hunger Banquet for the first time, Allen Conti was assigned to the floor of Decker 201 – the ranks of the poor.

Without even tables or chairs, they were physically lower than students assigned to the middle or upper classes, and consigned to share a meager dish of rice and beans. Reflecting global conditions, they were also the largest group – and would have been even larger.

“As I was sitting there, as it was going on, people were in the lower section got up and left. It felt like a hot knife going through me because they thought they were better than that, better than being poor,” said Conti, now an Event Management major.

Allen knows that poverty isn’t a mark of character. He himself grew up in poverty in California. His mother, brother and half-sister shared a house with another family. It was difficult to make ends meet, and Allen didn’t even have his own bed; he shared one with his brother.

Like many children, he didn’t realize he was poor at the time; it was simply the life he knew.

“Since I’ve known what poor is, I’ve grown up to be a humble person,” he said.

When he was 6 or 7 years old, his mother found a way out for Allen and his

brother: She relinquished custody to his father and step-mother in New York State. He didn’t realize the sacrifice his biological mother made until years later.

“She gave my dad custody because she wanted a better life for us. That’s something I will always love her for,” he said.

During the banquet, which serves up an important lesson about social class, sexism and food insecurity, the men have the opportunity to eat first – mimicking the social realities of people around the world. It was an uncomfortable moment for Allen and his fellow male students assigned to the lowest class, he said.

Moments of discomfort – such as those fostered by the Hunger Banquet experience – are an essential ingredient to both learning and empathy.

Join us on Nov. 15

This year’s Hunger Banquet will be held at 11 a.m. Nov. 15 in Decker 201. Join us not only for the free lunch, but the opportunity to engage in deep experiential learning about poverty and food insecurity.

Food insecurity is real — even for college students. Statistics show that at least 42 percent of community college students have experienced hunger due to food insecurity.

Allen lives independently now. After finishing his first degree – in Business Information Management – in May 2017, he's now working on his second in Event Management.

Pay it forward: Carolina helps her peers succeed in the classroom

Now an academically accomplished student who plans to graduate this semester, Carolina became a tutor herself as a way to contribute to the campus community. As a paying job, tutoring also helps her support herself – an added plus for an international student who isn't eligible for the type of financial aid many American students receive.

A native of Carabobo state in northern Venezuela, Carolina isn't in Upstate New York alone; she lives with her older brother, currently a student at Binghamton University. She plans to follow him to BU next semester and major in accounting, with a future career in big business.

"I want to go back to my country once it's stable. I really miss my friends and my parents," she said.

Carolina initially chose SUNY Broome for the same reason many local students do: Its low cost, high quality and transfer options to BU. As an international student, however, she also must navigate cultural differences, in addition to mastering a new language.

"This is a different culture, with different weather and new people," she said.

The cold upstate climate can be a bit challenging for someone accustomed to a more tropical environment. Venezuela doesn't have snow, said Carolina, who admitted she was very chilly during her first year.

Venezuelan students also prefer to work more in groups, whereas American students prefer to work independently, she noticed.

"The American people are really nice and helpful, and very respectful to women," she said.

Sadly, she often feels unsafe on the streets in Venezuela, which is currently going through harsh economic times and social upheaval. The comparison between the two countries, as a result, can be particularly stark in the grocery store.

"When you go to the supermarket, they have no food over there. Here, there is plenty of food," she said. "Americans throw a lot of food away. That's very sad."

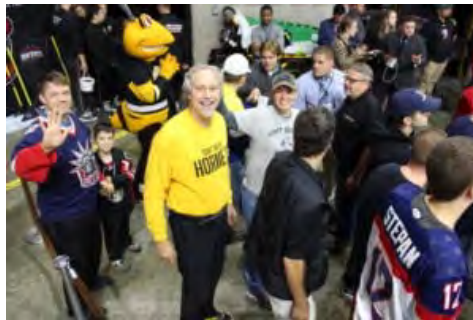

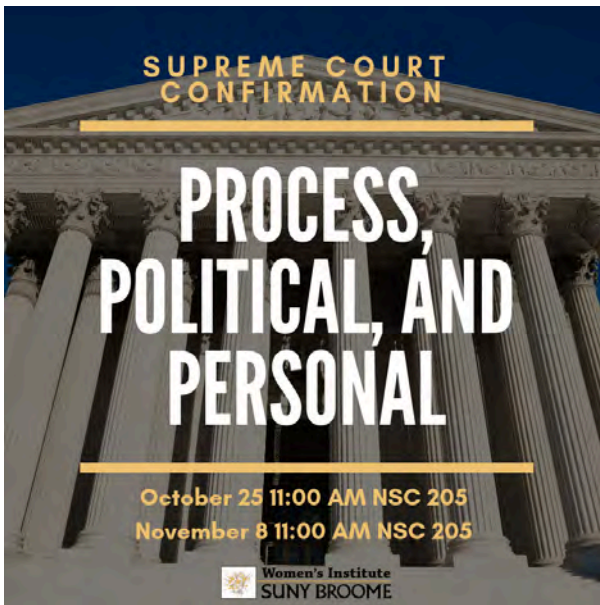

What does it tell us about our own private lives and personal traumas? How can it inform our decisions both personal and public going forward?

A group of faculty from SUNY Broome's Women's Institute began asking these same questions, drawing from diverse areas of expertise including law, political science, performing arts, literature, information technology, nursing, counseling, education and psychology. Grappling with the profound political processes and the social and personal ramifications of this confirmation requires critical thinking, civic discourse, a sharing of professional and personal perspectives. Making sense of this type of complexity is, in fact, exactly what higher education hopes to accomplish.

Come explore these questions with us. Our dialog is not complete without the voices of our students and colleagues. We would like to know your thoughts on the process, your experiences in gleaning information from social media or from more formal news sources, and how this has affected you personally. We will offer some answers from our areas of expertise, but we hope to come together for dialog and

discourse and to learn together from our shared experiences and our differences. We hope participants will leave the sessions with a broader perspective, a deeper understanding of the political process, and a sense of personal and professional support from within our SUNY Broome community.

The first session, **Process and Political**, will run from 11 to 11:50 a.m. Thursday, Oct. 25, in NSC 205. It will focus on the U.S. Supreme Court nomination process, the political setting in which it took place, and the role of citizen voice in the process.

The second session, **Personal**, will run from 11 to 11:50 a.m. Thursday, Nov. 8, in NSC 205. It will look at the effect of this process on individual lives (of the accused and the accuser), its relationship to the #metoo movement, and the effect of such explosive public hearings on survivors of sexual assault. It will also ask how all people committed to respect should interact with one another moving forward.

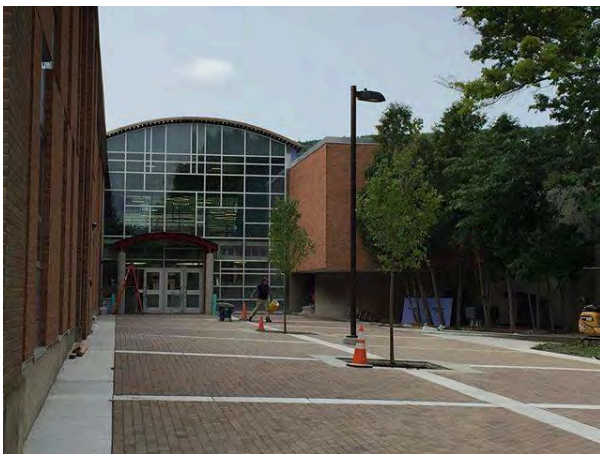

Drumm. “Green energy, food science, advanced hard-product manufacturing, and more: It’s all here, courtesy of partnerships with an array of critical stakeholders and funding partners.”

“Investing in workforce development is crucial to training New Yorkers for 21st century jobs and the Calice Advanced Manufacturing Center on the SUNY Broome campus will do just that, educating the next generation of entrepreneurs to support and spur economic growth throughout the Southern Tier and New York State,” said Empire State Development President, CEO & Commissioner Howard Zensky.

State University of New York Chancellor Kristina M. Johnson on Oct. 16 announced the opening of the Paul and Mary Calice and Mildred Barton Advanced Manufacturing Center at SUNY Broome, a \$12.7 million renovation project housing classrooms and laboratories with the latest technology to prepare students for jobs in advanced manufacturing, clean energy, and other growth sectors.

The approximately 43,000-square foot facility was funded by \$4.3 million from the State University Construction Fund; \$2.8 million from NYSUNY 2020 funding; \$905,688 from New York State Energy Research and Development Authority; \$925,000 from Broome County; and \$330,000 from Empire State Development and the Regional Economic Development Council. The AMETEK Foundation donated \$10,000.

In addition, the Broome Community College Foundation contributed \$3.4 million. This funding was made due to the historic \$11 million estate gift in 2014 from the late Emil Calice, who stipulated that any building that received funding from his estate would bear the names of his parents, Paul and Mary Calice, as well as Mildred Barton.

“I am honored to have my first visit to SUNY Broome coincide with the opening of the Calice Advanced Manufacturing Center. This investment is a testimony to SUNY’s dedication to providing high quality academic spaces to our

Italian immigrants, Paul and Mary Calice ran a corner store in Binghamton. Emil Calice, who served during World War II with his brothers, spent his career with IBM. He never attended SUNY Broome himself, although several of his and Barton’s relatives went on to graduate from the college.

“Emil Calice has been a true friend of the college, and his incredible gift has played such a critical role in the success of our students,” said Margaret Turna, chair of the BCC Foundation. “Not only did his gift help create the Paul and Mary Calice and Mildred

Barton Advanced Manufacturing Center, it funds scholarships for 80 students every single year. We continue to be deeply appreciative of his profound legacy.”

Work on the Calice Center began in the summer of 2017. The building opened for classes at the start of the Fall 2018 semester.

Streeter Associates Inc. of Elmira is the general contractor, while Postler & Jaeckle of Endicott is the HVAC contractor, Petcosky & Sons Plumbing & Heating of Vestal is the plumbing contractor, and Nelcorp Electrical Contracting of Endwell the electrical contractor.

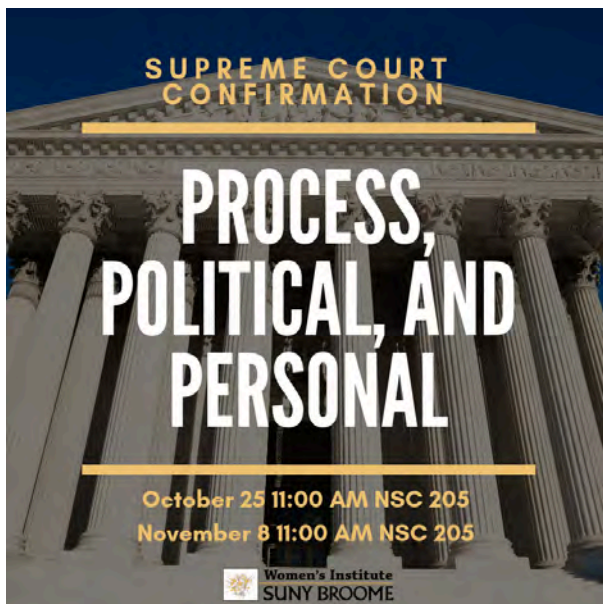

Supreme Court Confirmation: Process, Political, and Personal on Oct. 25 and Nov. 8

Do you have questions, thoughts, frustrations about the U.S. Supreme Court confirmation process for Judge Kavanaugh? It has played out on national news, social media, and political rallies, but information overload does not always help us understand the complexity of issues and the extent to which they affect us as a democratic society. The process has affected many on a personal level as accusers and accused came forward to tell their stories. What does it tell us about our democracy? What does it tell us about our own private lives and personal traumas? How can it inform our decisions both personal and public going forward?

A group of faculty from SUNY Broome's Women's Institute began asking these same questions, drawing from diverse areas of expertise including law, political science, performing arts, literature, information technology, nursing, counseling, education and psychology. Grappling with the profound political processes and the social and personal ramifications of this confirmation requires critical thinking, civic discourse, a sharing of professional and personal perspectives. Making sense of this type of complexity is, in fact, exactly what higher education hopes to accomplish.

Come explore these questions with us. Our dialog is not complete without the voices of our students and colleagues. We would like to know your thoughts on the process, your experiences in gleaning information from social media or from more formal news sources, and how this has affected you personally. We will offer some answers from our areas of expertise, but we hope to come together for dialog and

discourse and to learn together from our shared experiences and our differences. We hope participants will leave the sessions with a broader perspective, a deeper understanding of the political process, and a sense of personal and professional support from within our SUNY Broome community.

The first session, **Process and Political**, will run from 11 to 11:50 a.m. Thursday, Oct. 25, in NSC 205. It will focus on the U.S. Supreme Court nomination process, the political setting in which it took place, and the role of citizen voice in the process.

The second session, **Personal**, will run from 11 to 11:50 a.m. Thursday, Nov. 8, in NSC 205. It will look at the effect of this process on individual lives (of the accused and the accuser), its relationship to the #metoo movement, and the effect of such explosive public hearings on survivors of sexual assault. It will also ask how all people committed to respect should interact with one another moving forward.

Once the oversized scissors sheared through the ribbon and smiling faces captured for the camera, SUNY Chancellor Kristina Johnson knew exactly what she wanted to see.

She followed Dean of STEM Michele Snyder through the vibrant halls of the newly opened Paul and Mary Calice & Mildred Barton Advanced Manufacturing Center, past the metrology lab, the soldering lab – as a professional engineer, she knows such facilities well – and sundry classrooms. She made sure to stop in the food processing and fermentation lab for a conversation with Chemistry Professor Howard Trimm and took a quick glance at the simulated clean room down the hall.

Upstairs, in the Sustainability Sandbox with its bevy of future engineers, Dr. Kristina Johnson was in her true element. She chatted with Professor Robert Lofthouse’s Engineering Science students about their projects, which showcased energy conservation and green energy.

Green energy – a particular interest of the Chancellor — is a major component of the Calice Center. Patrick O’Shei, the director of market development for the New York State Energy Research and Development Authority (NYSERDA), recited the specs: Under the Quad, 36 wells drive the Center’s 100-ton geothermal heating and cooling system. On the roof, 133 kilowatts worth of solar panels collect the energy from the sun.



All told, the Calice Center will keep 135 metric tons of greenhouse gases from entering the atmosphere this year, all while saving money on utilities and educating students on green energy, SUNY Broome President Kevin E. Drumm said.

The Sustainability Sandbox is the educational component of energy conservation, providing an interactive classroom space where students can learn firsthand about the renewable energy powering the building – and plan future conservation efforts through a green revolving fund. On Oct. 16, Engineering Science students eagerly demonstrated their work to the Chancellor.

“It’s sensing whether or not it’s plugged into a phone or a laptop,” said student and green energy intern Diana Kelly, explaining one experiment that dealt with “vampire energy,” the electricity that many devices use when they are off but still plugged in.

Dr. Johnson, who co-founded a clean-energy and infrastructure company and once served as Undersecretary for the U.S. Department of Energy, expressed an avid interest, and even encouraged students to follow up with her on the results of their work.

“Do you know how much vampire energy is wasted in the U.S.? Enough for seven nuclear power plants,” the Chancellor said. “If you solve this problem, it will be phenomenal!” And then, an aside with a smile: “Just make it cheap.”

Not just ‘Mechanical 2.0’

The SUNY Broome community welcomed the Chancellor to the grand opening of the Calice Center, the very first time she visited the campus since her inauguration. Joining in the celebration were partners integral to the success of the project, elected officials, industry and workforce leaders, local educators and even a chemistry class from Chenango Valley High School who are earning college credit through the Fast Forward program.

Alumni also took part and provided the memorabilia on display in the airy new atrium, including one of only 15 jackets made for the “electricals” – as Engineering Tech majors were once called – back in 1950.

While the \$12.7 million project is technically a renovation, it is virtually a new building, noted SUNY Broome President Kevin E. Drumm. State-of-the-art educational space includes:

- A high-tech soldering lab funded by Empire State Development and equipped by the Ametek Foundation

The 43,000-square foot facility was funded by \$4.3 million from the State University Construction Fund; \$2.8 million from SUNY 2020 funding; \$905,688 from NYSERDA; \$925,000 from Broome County; and \$330,000 from Empire State Development and the Regional Economic Development Council. The AMETEK Foundation donated \$10,000.

The name change, while it pays homage to Mr. Calice’s loved ones, also shows the evolution of technology and the Southern Tier’s economic base through the decades.

Built in 1956, the Mechanical Building offered a direct view of how the 1950s looked in education, noted Broome County Executive Jason Garnar, a SUNY Broome alumnus who attended the school in the late 1990s. In fact, when Executive Vice President and Chief Academic Officer Francis Battisti took classes

there in the 1970s, it was already known as an old building. The following decades hadn’t been kind.

Its original name was a nod to its purpose: training students to become engineers and technicians, using the post-War technology of the day, President Drumm explained. The Southern Tier was a manufacturing hub then, home to IBM and Endicott Johnson shoes, and many people relied on jobs that used both their hands and machines.

Technology has changed dramatically over the college’s 70-year history, and so has the Southern Tier’s manufacturing base. These days, manufacturing relies increasingly on computer programming and robotics, and requires more than a high school diploma.

“There are still great jobs in the field, but you need an education – and SUNY Broome can help you get there, just as it has for the past 70 years,” Dr. Drumm said.

The original Mechanical Building also didn't cover an industry central to Upstate New York: food production. The Southern Tier is a major food hub for the entire state and indeed the entire Northeast, and food manufacturing is one of the region's most significant industries, according to the Department of Labor.

touches upon an additional theme that she included in her State of the University Address: partnerships, linking philanthropy with government, private support and the SUNY system in addition to SUNY Broome. One partnership in particular made a massive impact on the college, both in terms of the Calice Center and in the 80 scholarships made in his name to SUNY Broome students every year.

"This extraordinary building wouldn't have been possible without the visionary support of Emil Calice," said the Chancellor, adding that he, like her father, was a World War II veteran. "I think he understood that this is the community's college."

While he advanced his career at IBM through continuing education and courses at several colleges, Emil Calice never graduated from SUNY Broome. In fact, the Broome Community College knew little about him until his passing and the historic estate gift, the largest ever presented by an individual to a SUNY community college, noted Margaret Turna, president of the Broome Community College Foundation.

Paul and Mary Calice were hard-working Italian immigrants who ran a corner store in Binghamton, while Mildred Barton, Emil Calice's companion of many years, was a passionate naturalist, gardener and philanthropist. Emil Calice – known as "Sonny" to friends and family – served in World War II with his brothers, spent his entire career at IBM and was known as an avid ham radio operator. His family remembers him as a deeply generous man who never spent a dime on himself, Turna said.

"It's deeply moving to all of us that Mr. Calice wanted his legacy to be about other people, and not about himself," she said. "That's true when you're talking about all those life-changing scholarships and this much-needed facility – which is named after the people that Mr. Calice loved."

"This project is surely a sign of progress for our community – growth and progress," said Assemblywoman Donna Lupardo, noting that its food processing labs connect thematically with another project under way in downtown Binghamton: the transformation of the historic Carnegie Library into the SUNY Broome Culinary & Events Center.

Broome County currently has 4,000 open jobs and facilities such as the Calice Center play an integral role in addressing these vacancies, while providing local residents needed opportunities, the county executive pointed out.

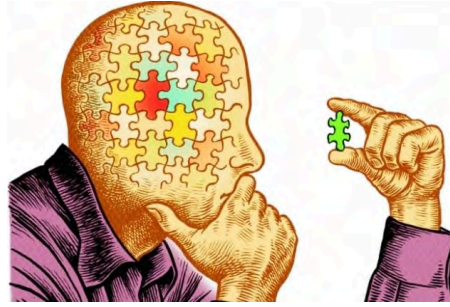

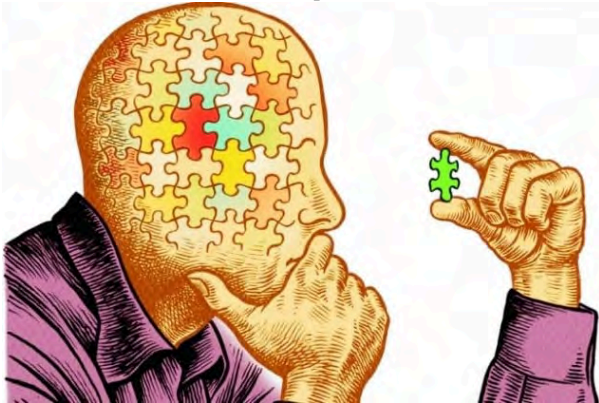

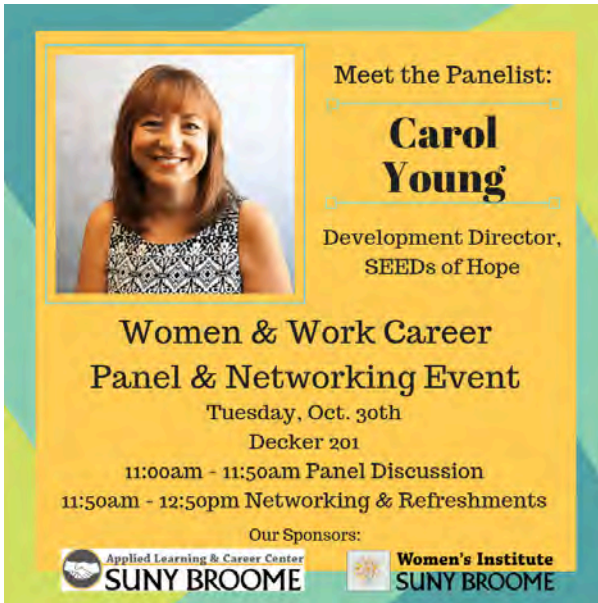

Life-saver: Jack uses his EMT training to aid a fallen classmate

Jack Najarian and his team were in the hall, taking photos of a staged crime scene, when he heard a thump from a nearby classroom. He didn't think anything of it until a fellow classmate came to the door and peered out into the hall, his eyes searching.

"I've seen that look before in the field," said the Homeland Security major, a volunteer with the Greene Emergency Squad. "One of my classmates was face-down on the floor passed out."

He quickly sprung into action, rolling his classmate on his back and checking vital signs as fellow students called 911. He aided the student in regaining consciousness, putting a soft backpack under his head. The student, who remained disoriented, was taken to a local hospital for treatment.

Instructor Eric Kelley described Jack as a "big help" as the incident unfolded in his Criminal Investigations class.

"Jack responded without hesitation and took control of the situation until the EMTs arrived," he said. "Jack's EMT training and professional demeanor not only helped the student medically but make a difficult situation a lot easier for the student, the students in the class and me."

It's all in a day's work for sophomore Jack Najarian, who has EMT basic certification and serves as a second lieutenant on the emergency squad.

He actually became certified as an EMT last summer after taking a course at SUNY Broome. He had tried taking the course previously through the Chenango County, but didn't finish.

"I loved it down here, as opposed to the county class. It was a lot more structured," he said. "The people taking the class here want to pursue something medical."

Finding his path

While he plans to graduate with a Homeland Security degree this spring, Jack Najarian's path led him to experiment with a number of different majors.

"I had no idea what I wanted to do," he admitted.

He came to SUNY Broome in 2016 after graduating high school, first opting for Business Administration and then switching to the Early Childhood program. Then, he tried Liberal Arts, switched again to Criminal Justice – Police, and finally did an independent study in the health sciences when he considered following his father's line of work as a chiropractor.

During his educational journey, he continued volunteering with the Greene Fire Department and emergency squad. He began volunteering in high school, after he ran into a friend at a car wash the fire department hosted in 2014.

"He said, 'When are you going to sign up?' I said, 'Right now.' There would never be a better time," he remembered.

His volunteer experience finally led him to Homeland Security, a field that addressed his interests in emergency services.

While he no longer volunteers with the fire department due to time constraints – he hopes to re-join in the future – he has continued with the emergency squad. His time in the fire department also led him to his current job at Lights & Sirens Ltd. In Chenango Bridge, where he installs equipment on emergency vehicles.

He met the business owner, a retired police officer, at a fire scene and the two began talking. The business owner invited him to check out the shop. A month later, Jack had landed a full-time job that he truly enjoys and plans to continue.

It can be tough to juggle his job, volunteer work with the emergency squad and his classroom obligations, but Jack tries to "deal with things as they come."

What makes SUNY Broome stand out? "Definitely the professors," he said. "I've had the opportunity to meet professors in Liberal Arts, Biology and Criminology."

Some of his favorite professors include Eric Kelley, who is teaching his current crimin... investigations class, and Professor Diane Kelly in Biology.



Although Jack Najarian took the scenic route when it came to finding his ideal major, the journey has proven worthwhile. “I think you settle in and get to a point in your schooling where you feel you’re where you should be,” he said.

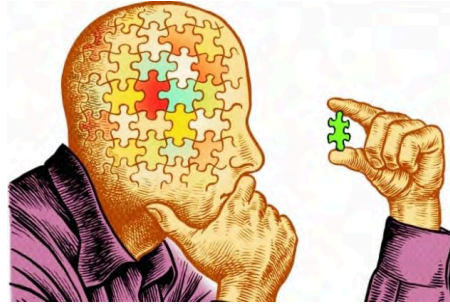

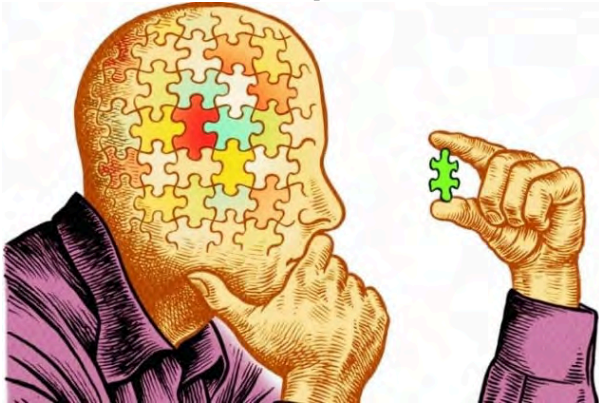

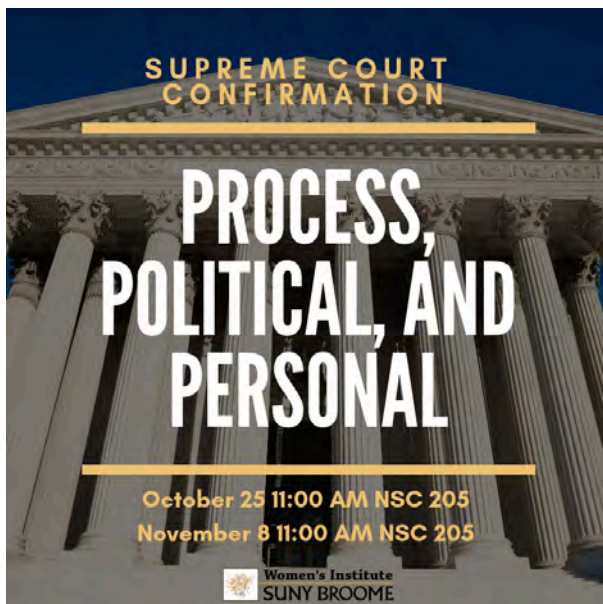

Supreme Court Confirmation: Process, Political, and Personal on Oct. 25 and Nov. 8

Do you have questions, thoughts, frustrations about the U.S. Supreme Court confirmation process for Judge Kavanaugh? It has played out on national news, social media, and political rallies, but information overload does not always help us understand the complexity of issues and the extent to which they affect us as a democratic society. The process has affected many on a personal level as accusers and accused came forward to tell their stories. What does it tell us about our democracy? What does it tell us about our own private lives and personal traumas? How can it inform our decisions both personal and public going forward?

A group of faculty from SUNY Broome's Women's Institute began asking these same questions, drawing from diverse areas of expertise including law, political science, performing arts, literature, information technology, nursing, counseling, education and psychology. Grappling with the profound political processes and the social and personal ramifications of this confirmation requires critical thinking, civic discourse, a sharing of professional and personal perspectives. Making sense of this type of complexity is, in fact, exactly what higher education hopes to accomplish.

Come explore these questions with us. Our dialog is not complete without the voices of our students and colleagues. We would like to know your thoughts on the process, your experiences in gleaning information from social media or from more formal news sources, and how this has affected you personally. We will offer some answers from our areas of expertise, but we hope to come together for dialog and

discourse and to learn together from our shared experiences and our differences. We hope participants will leave the sessions with a broader perspective, a deeper understanding of the political process, and a sense of personal and professional support from within our SUNY Broome community.

The first session, **Process and Political**, will run from 11 to 11:50 a.m. Thursday, Oct. 25, in NSC 205. It will focus on the U.S. Supreme Court nomination process, the political setting in which it took place, and the role of citizen voice in the process.

The second session, **Personal**, will run from 11 to 11:50 a.m. Thursday, Nov. 8, in NSC 205. It will look at the effect of this process on individual lives (of the accused and the accuser), its relationship to the #metoo movement, and the effect of such explosive public hearings on survivors of sexual assault. It will also ask how all people committed to respect should interact with one another moving forward.

Ivy League Hornet: Keith returns to his alma mater to tutor and to prepare for his future in pharmacy

If you need a little extra help in science class, Keith Hughes will offer his guidance and expertise as a professional tutor in the college's Learning Assistance Department.

He has some impressive credentials: He graduated from the college in 2014 with a degree in Liberal Arts and Sciences, and went on to earn a bachelor's degree in biology from Ivy League Cornell University – yes, *that* Cornell.

"Initially, I was pre-med and planning on going to medical school. I came here right out of Windsor High School," Keith explained. "After graduation, I transferred to Cornell and got my two years there."

He needed to take a gap year before entering medical school, and decided to return to SUNY Broome as a professional tutor while he planned his future. The gap stretched into 2½ years while he considered some tough questions: Were the long years of medical school and residency worthwhile, or were there other ways of achieving his goal – to help children with cancer heal?

The opening of Binghamton University's School of Pharmacy and

Pharmaceutical Sciences offered an answer.

"With a pharmacy degree, I could still achieve my goal of working with kids with pediatric cancer. I can stay here locally and earn a degree in a field I want to be in," he said.

And so, he's back on campus not only as a tutor – a job he has always enjoyed – but to knock out the prerequisite courses he needs to enter pharmacy school in the Fall of 2019. And while he's here, he figured that he would earn two more degrees: in Engineering Science and Health Studies.

Initially, Keith Hughes dreamed of becoming a pediatrician. His interest in pediatric cancer developed while he was at Cornell and involved with a student club that raised awareness of the issue.

According to the National Pediatric Cancer Foundation, fewer than 10 drugs have been developed for use in children with cancer since 1980, and only 4 percent of federal cancer research funds goes to study childhood disease.

Keith envisions a future as a clinical pharmacist, perhaps doing rounds with doctors and reviewing potential drug interactions and treatment options. His added expertise in Engineering Science may prove helpful, too; he'll be able to come up with new modeling for drugs and their effects, he explained.

SUNY Broome proved to be a springboard for Keith, first to Cornell and now to the Pharmacy School. As a pre-med student at Cornell, he faced a heavy workload – triple the average college class – but he learned the skills he needed to cope early on in his college career.

"Chemistry during my very first semester here was a wake up call, and a model for the classes at Cornell," he said.

Among his favorite professors is Dr. Tracy Curtis in Biology; Keith will be working with her his spring on a research lab pertaining to Lyme disease.

What's the secret to Keith's academic success, and balancing challenging coursework with his tutoring job? Time management. "I plan out my day, take it day by day, and focus on one major objective every day," he said.

That's good advice for the fellow Hornets he sees in the Learning Assistance Department.

If you need extra help in class, don't hesitate to take advantage of this free academic service. Keith and his fellow tutors are eager to help.

"I love the fact I can help people achieve their academic goals," he said.

Hunger isn't just a reality in faraway lands. It's right here, in Broome County and even on campus.

Ask Investigator Marie Finelli of SUNY Broome's Office of Public Safety. A local resident who sees a wide variety of SUNY Broome students during the course of a day, she is no stranger to the faces of hunger. She also remembers her own life as a hungry college student – selling blood plasma so she could earn money for food, or even eating ramen noodles dry, like a cracker, because she didn't have a pot.

Statistics show that at least 42 percent of community college students have experienced hunger due to food insecurity. And it's certainly real in the community outside campus, where the hungry resort to food stamps and food pantries such as the Community Hunger Outreach Warehouse (CHOW).

“When you're hungry, you eat what you can. You make it last,” Finelli said.

The faces of the hungry aren't unfamiliar to you. They include families, people who work but whose jobs don't pay enough for both rent and food, and senior citizens whose food stamps – even wisely shepherded – can't stretch the entire month.

That's really humbling when you think about all the perfectly good food that is thrown in trash cans and Dumpsters. “We waste so much food,” Finelli said.

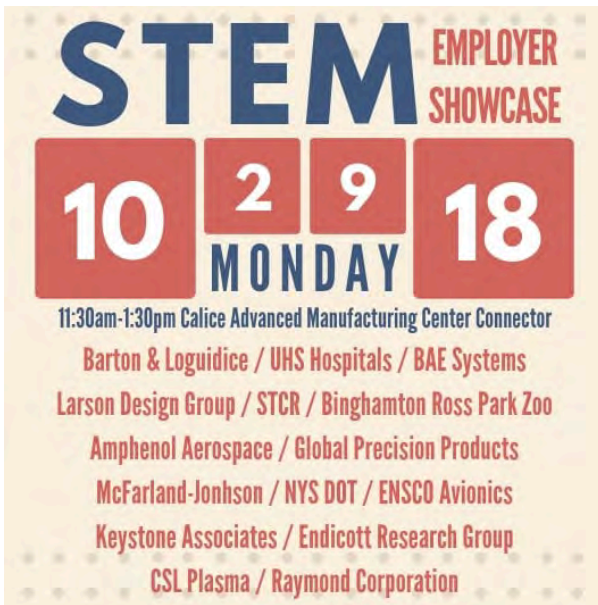

Juggling academics with family life and job obligations can be a complicated dance for many students. Kara not only makes it work, but she has opted for the academically challenging Honors Program, stays involved in campus life and has even studied abroad in London, England.

Time management is a must, but even with laser-sharp focus, Kara will sometimes double-book herself – and make the tough choices on what to accomplish and what to lay aside. During class time, her children attend Mom's House, which provides childcare for single parents pursuing their educational dreams. Her family, friends and faith community also provided a helping hand and encouragement when needed.

"I have a huge family and I go to a huge church. I have tons of friends who are always there to support me on my way," she said. "That what you need when you have children and are going to school; you need that support."

Take the London and Literature international course she attended with her SUNY Broome classmates. Her mother noted Kara's interest in the class and encouraged her to take it. During the class' eight-day stay in England, her mother took vacation time herself to take care of Kara's young children.

"It was a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity," Kara reflected.

As a Student Ambassador, she is a familiar face on campus, and also active in the Business Club and Alpha Beta Gamma (ABG) Business Honor Society. ABG has given her the opportunity to travel to conferences and network with students from across the United States. Kara is working with Psychology Professor Jesse Boring on a project involving psychopathy in the business world.

"He's really energetic and he guides you to the resources you need," she said. "I don't typically do research papers for my studies; he has helped me and guided me."

Her project idea, curiously enough, came by way of the London trip. En route, she picked up a copy of Jon Ronson's *The Psychopath Test*, which sparked her fascination with the subject matter. Psychopaths lack empathy, although high-performing psychopaths can mimic more-typical human responses and even exhibit charisma useful in the business world – hence the project.

When it came time to choose a college, SUNY Broome was the one that made sense for Kara; going away wasn't an option due to her family situation. Affordability and an easy transfer path to Binghamton University were major pluses.

Life can be a whirl of activities and obligations, but going to college was very much worth it – and not just in terms of career trajectory. “I made a lot of new friends. People here are awesome,” she said. “You realize there is a bigger world out there.”

Lunch with the Law: Men of Excellence Making a difference

SUNY Broome's Men of Excellence students facilitated its second Lunch with the Law event on Oct. 17 at Union-Endicott High School. Lunch with the Law is a series of discussions between the local Law Enforcement Community and young Men of Color in middle school, high school and college that takes place while sharing a meal. The goal of this initiative is to reduce bias and stereotypes between members of both communities through substantive discussions and activities as well as expose students to careers in law enforcement. Lunch with the Law is born out of SUNY Broome Vice President of Student Development and Chief Diversity Officer Carol Ross hope that a way forward in creating impactful change is by creating space for members of these communities to get to know each other in a safe, non-threatening environment.



The initiative is a big undertaking and requires several

entities to work together. Specifically, Lunch with the Law is a collaborative effort between SUNY Broome's Grants Development Office, the local Law Enforcement Community, Union-Endicott Middle and High School administrators, and students from the Middle School's "Brother to Brother" program and the High School's "The Squad," as well as the Men of Excellence program.

At the helm is the Lunch with the Law Student Coordinator and member of Men of Excellence Talik Farmer. Talik works with his fellow Men of Excellence Brothers (Terry Solomon, Gregory Thurston and Lamont Neal — pictured — as well as Christopher Murray, Isaiah Kablack, Devarious White and Travis Joseph, not pictured) to plan the format of the monthly lunches. The coordination of these events is taken very seriously and Talik is intentional and thoughtful about the best way to facilitate a meaningful dialogue between the two groups, devoting many hours to the planning process.



When asked about the impact of the program on Men of Excellence student Gregory Thurston, he replied, "The meeting was full of familiarities and new discoveries for me. The students that I had the pleasure to meet for the first time reminded me of the friends I had in my childhood and the law enforcement community became more relatable in a setting like Lunch with the Law. I learned so much and I am honored that I was able to participate."

When asked what he hopes the impact of the program will be on the student and professional participants, Gregory explained, "I hope that this



program helped students learn that law enforcement is an important career, but our work does not define us totally. While it is important to take you job seriously and especially one as inherently dangerous as law enforcement, your job should not keep you from being a human being. I hope students have learned in a field such as law enforcement, community policing is what happens when we can sit and have lunch with the law, and that is a respectable effort to do a job correctly and increase the trust





among the students and law enforcement. What the police must come away with leaving this event is knowledge of the young people in the community.”

The initiative, which began in Spring 2018 has brought together an impressive amount of students and law enforcement community members (more than 200 to date). Equally impressive are the discussions



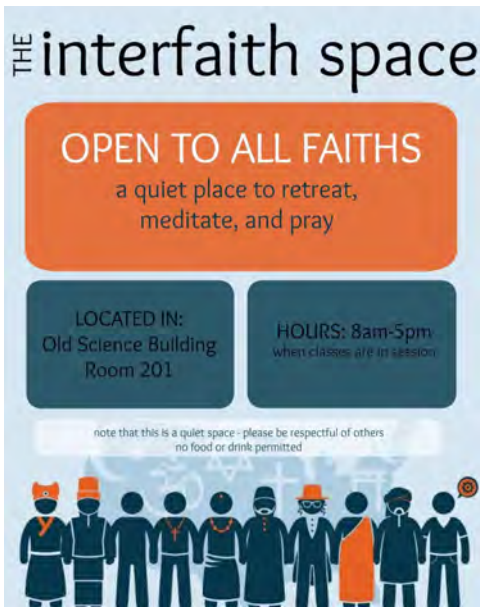
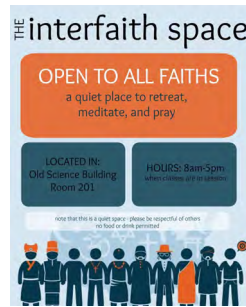
happening during these lunches. The students have asked thoughtful, riveting questions of the cadets, police and probation officers, chiefs, sergeants, lawyers and judges who have participated. Their questions are answered thoughtfully and honestly, no matter how uncomfortable.

Perhaps most importantly, the professionals are building a trusting relationship with the student participants that allows them to feel comfortable asking the hard questions. To see the smiles, the mutual respect, care and concern exchanged throughout these events is a sure sign that the initiative is impactful. It is in these moments where the hope for a better way forward lives.

Reflections from the Tree of Life Congregation Vigil

Tears flowed as psalms were read, candles lit, and community members of every faith, race, ethnicity and age gathered together at the Binghamton Jewish Community Center on Monday, Oct. 29, 2018, in a vigil for the victims of the Tree of Life Congregation shooting.

Many members of SUNY Broome Community College were in attendance, mourning the loss of life in Pittsburgh as well as other similar terrorist attacks on churches, schools, mosques and shopping areas. The loss of life this weekend in the Kentucky Kroger shooting brought home the similarity of hate across all these senseless acts of violence.

A Rabbi reminded us that today we are all Jews. An Imam looked around the auditorium which was filled well past capacity and declared, “This is America.” A leader from the NAACP spoke of righteous love and his deep empathy. Every one of the speakers and singers and prayers asked of us a simple task, to do good deeds and to be kind.

This community. This day. Reach out to each other with acts of kindness. Honor those who have died for the privilege of being Jewish, or for the color of their

skin, or the country of their origin, or the person that they love. Honor them with kindness. Overcome hatred with love. Be the part of this community and this country that rejects hatred and bigotry.

Please read the following reflections from other SUNY Broome participants.

SUNY Broome Executive Vice President and Chief Academic Officer Francis Battisti: “I felt that last evening’s vigil was very inspiring. The themes of love and good works were meaningful and healing. Not losing our voice, during these difficult times, is so important.”

Professor Scott Corley: “Our society has problematically and unfortunately assumed a posture where we are not only desensitized to mass tragedies, but we also fail to mourn, collectively the loss of life, even under the most egregious and despicable circumstances.”

Professor Virginia Shirley: “Hate wants us to say ‘us’ and ‘them.’ Hate wants us to build walls. The vigil was proof that strength and love resides in ‘WE.’ We are at our best when we work together.”

Instructor Ellie Rivera: “I took my family and it proved to be such a very special experience. Before going, we spoke to our children of safety and awareness everywhere we go. I was moved to tears, as it reminded me of the days that followed 9/11 and the world stopped to catch their breath from all the fighting of the world’s ugly. I am accustomed to greeting women I see of the Muslim faith with their familial greeting of ‘As-Salaam-Alaikum,’ meaning ‘Peace be Unto You.’ They responded in kind. When I see a woman wearing a hijab, I see a most powerful and brave woman. They defy society’s expectation of conforming but instead stand firm in their beliefs to the point where they wear it for the world to see their confirmation of such faith. In honor of them and their beliefs, I say it. My daughter asked me what that was. At seven years old, she took in such powerful lessons and she practiced the greeting all the way home. The lesson they most definitely heard was that kindness blinds hate.”

Professor Kathleen McKenna: “I suspect there were 1,000 people there — people gathered together at the Jewish Community Center by the Children of Abraham, a local interfaith group that has been meeting, doing service together, and supporting one another since 2008. There were older folks, there were small children, college students, and everyone in between. Among others, Orthodox, Conservative, and Reform rabbis spoke, as did a Presbyterian minister, the head of NAACP, student leaders from BU, and an imam from the Islamic Organization of the Southern Tier.

“The imam told his Jewish neighbors and friends that we would be there to accompany them to the grocery store if they are afraid to go shopping, or that we would stand outside their houses of worship if they are afraid to gather and pray, poignantly offering to the Jewish community what people of good faith had offered to the Muslim community after the backlash against Muslims in 2001.

“I kept asking myself how many more times this group would need to gather to mourn a loss.

“The Presbyterian minister reminded us that there were good people in Hitler’s Germany too — they were just too busy to get involved — raising kids, putting bread on the table. The president of the Jewish Federation asked us to fill the local synagogues this Friday night and Saturday as a sign of support.

“There is work to do — emotionally, socially, and politically. For that brief hour last night, though, the gentle songs in Hebrew and English reminded me how comforting it can be when people of good faith come together in loving kindness.”

Women's Discussion Group Student Club Collaborates with Phi Theta Kappa Honor Society to Donate Books to Women's Prison Book Project

In celebration of literacy and supporting women's issues, SUNY Broome's Women's Discussion Group, a student group focusing on women's issues, donated multiple boxes of **books** to the Women's Prison Book Project on Oct. 30, 2018. This project was a collaboration with the campus' two-year international honor society, Phi Theta Kappa.

Faculty Adviser, Professor I.J. Byrnes of the Philosophy Program, noted that the project was inspired by reading *Orange is the New Black* by Piper Kerman, a nonfiction memoir by the author who spent a year in prison on drug charges.

Officers Orion Barber, Dawn Shefler, Shyanne Daye, Grace Parker and Faculty Adviser Professor I.J. Byrnes decided to support this literary and rehabilitative project in light of the skyrocketing increase of the number of women behind bars since the 1980s, the problems faced by the children of single women in jail and the correlation of imprisonment and mental health and addiction issues among women inmates.

Officer Orion Barber said, "Ensuring continued literacy for the incarcerated is a vital issue of equity in their rehabilitation and preparation to re-enter society."

Officer Dawn Shefler noted, "Books are a wonderful way to explore one's interests and values. Reading can help a person envision multiple versions of the future and figure out which one is the right path to follow. I can think of few populations so in need of the opportunity for personal discovery as the prison population, so I am pleased to assist in providing them a catalyst."

Officer Shyanne Daye noted, "I'm proud to be a part of something for a bigger purpose. Books lead to literacy and deep, critical thinking. I'm happy to help others develop these ways of thinking through reading."

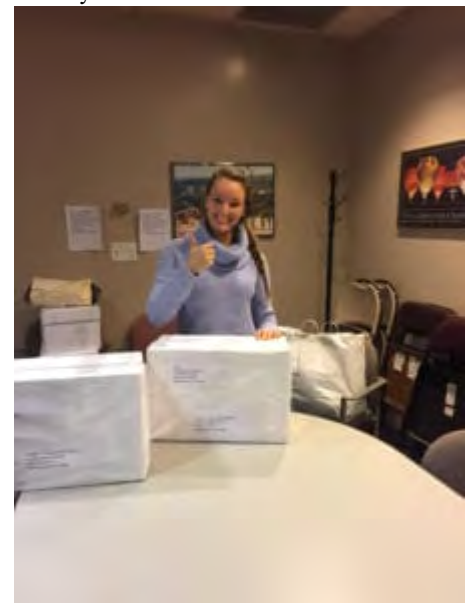

The CMA department had worked for years to establish a station, noted Professor Tim Skinner, an alumnus of the program himself who fulfilled his own dream of working in radio, before returning to campus as a professor. "It's my hope that this new facility on campus will help fulfill the dreams of others to come," he said.

The station adheres to FCC guidelines and standards, along with college policy. It serves as a lab space for CMA students, who are studying commercial radio. Shows are currently pre-recorded and carefully monitored by class instructors, and all music is edited for radio broadcast.

Without the class and the station, neither Kylie nor Chaz would likely have experimented with radio. It's an opportunity they appreciate, they said.

In the basement of Titchener Hall, SUNY Broome students are on the air with their playlists, providing a lively musical backdrop to campus life.

On Oct. 30, 2018, the college held a ribbon-cutting and grand opening for The Hive, the campus' online-only radio station. You can listen to it from anywhere in the world by pointing your Internet browser to www.sunybroome.edu/thehive.

"This is a great addition to an already great Communications program," said SUNY Broome President Kevin E. Drumm, noting that the station gives students the opportunity to experience all different types of media firsthand.

While the death of radio has been forecast ever since the advent of television, the medium is perhaps more robust than ever, noted Dr. Drumm, who always listens to local stations as he drives in his car. So too does Executive Vice President Francis Battisti, who noted that many media professionals, from broadcast to radio, had their start in SUNY Broome's Communications & Media Arts (CMA) degree program.

"It gives them a real world experience," said instructor Ray Scott, whose day job is on local radio. "Being on radio is actually a difficult thing to do, although people think it's an easy thing to do. You have to learn how to talk to people without having a direct conversation."

In his class, students must create a one-hour radio broadcast each week that their instructor and fellow classmates must listen to and critique. It can be a tough experience, but also a rewarding one.

"No one's in the room with you, but it feels like a thousand people are watching you," explained CMA major and sophomore Chaz Weir. "You get better over time."

Like Chaz, sophomore and CMA major Kylie Gage tends to focus more on film and photography, but took the radio class to challenge herself and expand her horizons. Unlike many classroom assignments, which allow revisions, the radio students have one shot to get it right.

"You don't get to start over and do it again when you're live," Kylie explained.



“I’m not a very talkative person, so I wanted to step out of my comfort zone and sign up for something that would help me with that,” Kylie explained. “It allowed me to focus on a new form of media arts.”

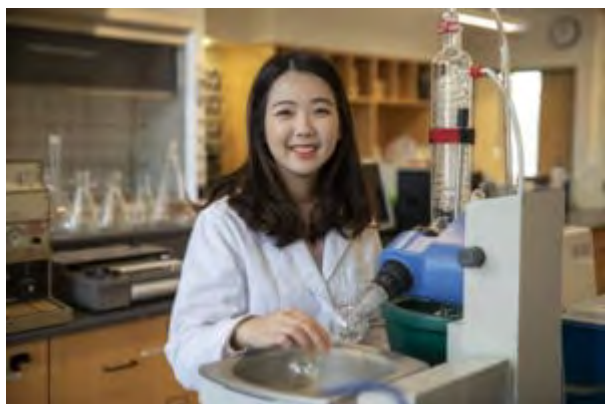

Imagine heading to the other side of the world to study – and finding out that your grasp of the language isn't as firm as you may have believed. You struggle to communicate and make friends in a place where everyone seems firmly fixed into their own social group, and unwilling to meet you halfway when you reach out.

In essence, that was high school for Minhyung Park.

As a teenager, she left her South Korean homeland to attend high school in America – first in Nebraska, and then in Michigan. In Korea, one of her favorite subjects in school was English, and becoming an exchange student seemed enticing – even logical. But written facility with language doesn't equate to the skills you need in every day conversation, much less at the age of 15. Add a totally new culture into the mix, and high school was as great a trial as they come – especially for someone who loves to interact with other people.

"I had lunch in the bathroom because no one would include me. My English was pretty bad. They didn't understand me, but they also didn't try to understand,"

Min remembered. "I took a lot of art classes. I didn't have to talk in art class, so I didn't get lonely there. I cried every night."

After she graduated high school, she returned home for a gap year, uncertain of the path she wanted to follow. She asked herself some hard questions: Where does she find meaning? What career could she truly feel passionate about?

That period of self-reflection was difficult on many levels. Her parents questioned her path, pointing out that many of her peers were already in college or even starting on their careers.

But she found her answer: biology, with the ultimate goal of becoming a dentist. And she also found a path to reach her goals: through SUNY Broome, which laid the academic foundation she needed to transfer into Ivy-League Cornell University for her bachelor's degree, and then on to dental school.

"Dentistry is really amazing. It's like science and beauty at the same time," she said.

Inspiring others

Minhyung Park learned about SUNY Broome from her best friend back in South Korea, who attended Binghamton University. She recommended SUNY Broome as a great place to start, setting her up to transfer to BU or other schools. And while Min initially dreamed of going to California – "I have sort of a romance about America," she quipped – she decided to head to an environment where she at least knew a few people.

Her experience at SUNY Broome has been rewarding, and far less lonely than high school. She found her biology professors very encouraging; they were the ones, in fact, who encouraged her to aim high and apply for Cornell.

"I love it here. I wish this was a four-year college," she said. "The people are really supportive and encouraging. I would never have expected to apply to Cornell. My professor said I could do it."

During her time at SUNY Broome, she helped Dr. Tracy Curtis with Lyme disease research and became involved with Student Assembly as the group's vice president of academic affairs.

She also became a Resident Assistant in the Student Village, where she tries to be an ambassador for international students. She knows what it's like to struggle because you come from a different place with a different language and customs, and also appreciates the opportunity to get outside of her comfort zone.

She also draws on her personal experiences while tutoring her fellow Hornets in biology.

"I am very confident telling other students, 'I've been through the struggle,'" she said. "I just want to help others."

She has become more familiar with American culture and speaks English well now, although she still remarks on the differences between here and home. Much of the United States truly seems designed for the automobile, while public transit is much more prevalent in South Korea, where the buses run every few minutes and Park frequently took the subway. The food is different, of course.

She hasn't been home for 2½ years while completing her Associate's degree, but she has been too focused on her academic work and campus life to feel homesick. Her career goal, so much clearer now, motivates her, as well as her peers.

"I keep myself busy and my friends from SUNY Broome are really intelligent and work so hard. I want to be like them. They're my role models," she said. "I recommend people come here. This is really changing my life."
