
Binghamton University and SUNY Broome to announce details of Presidents Cup hockey game



SUNY Broome students to showcase work at First Friday



SUNY Broome met Finger Lakes Community College in Herkimer this weekend to vie for the NJCAA Region III Championship and a ticket to the NJCAA National Tournament. The Hornets walked away with a 5-0 victory.

The scoring was started by <u>Nicole Harmer</u> (Oneonta, NY/Oneonta) in the 18th minute when she was fed a back pass by <u>Mikaela Mazerolle</u> (Maryland, NY/Oneonta) and finished it in the upper end of the goal. The Hornets followed up 15 minutes later when <u>Margaret Edwards</u> (Brooklyn, NY/Leon M. Goldstein HS for the Sciences) received a drop pass from <u>Kaelyn Michitti</u> (Binghamton, NY/Seton Catholic) and slammed it home for a 2-0 half time lead. The second half was all Hornets when, with the wind at their back, they hammered home three more goals for a final of 5-0.


Goals by <u>Shelby Brassard</u> (Spring Grove, PA/Home School), <u>Rosemary Zelenyak</u> (Binghamton, NY/Susquehanna Valley) and Michitti rounded out the scoring. This was the Hornets 13th shutout of the season behind the defensive effort of <u>Emily Caslin</u> (Vestal, NY/Vestal), <u>Emily Gibson</u> (Johnson City, NY/Seton Catholic) and <u>Brittany Campbell</u> (Johnson City, NY/Johnson City). The shutout was preserved by a great breakaway save by goalkeeper <u>Erinn Catlin</u> (VanEtten, NY/Spencer-VanEtten). The Hornets offense amassed 24 shots to the Laker's 1.

The Hornets were honored at the end of the match with Tournament MVP Zelenyak All-Tournament selections Caslin, Harmer and Mazerolle. Next stop for the team is Toms River, NJ, for the NJCAA National Tournament from November 12 through 15.

Helping Hand: Hornet headed to Haiti, thanks to Endwell Rotary scholarship

Nosa Akol has made only one international trip in her life – as a small child, when she and her family emigrated from South Sudan.

This winter, that will change. She and 19 other students will board an airplane bound for Haiti as part of SUNY Broome's 2016 global service learning course there.

Nosa's participation was made possible by a \$1,500 scholarship, awarded by the Endwell Rotary and Rotary International.

Endwell Rotary President Jeff Smith recently made the trip to campus to award the scholarship, now in its second year. SUNY Broome's Health for Haiti program is a good fit for the club's charitable endeavors, which include efforts to eradicate polio worldwide, a pipeline to bring water to a rural village in Uganda, and a clean water project for a village in Haiti.

A graduate of Binghamton High School, Nosa has been heavily involved in CITIZEN U, a civic engagement program through 4-H and the Cornell Cooperative Extension of Broome County. She won this year's 4-H Youth in Action Award and served as a delegate at the World Food Prize Global Youth Institute, as well as interned as a biological science aide at the Robert W. Holley Center for Agriculture and Health at Cornell University, attended the Norman Borlaug Symposium as a panelist, and served as keynote speaker at the 4-H Career Explorations at Cornell University.

A Liberal Arts – Science major, she plans to transfer to Cornell after finishing her year At SUNY Broome. She's developed a passion for agriculture, and hopes to help women and children in the developing world to create sustainable agriculture-based microbusinesses.

"I'm really excited and nervous at the same time. The last time I traveled abroad was when I was five," she said, adding with a smile: "My mom will probably start crying."

Nosa's interest in agriculture fits in with this year's Health for Haiti trip, which will include a community garden component.

"I was really impressed with her application. Nosa has already been active in global service," said Professor Jennifer Musa, who created the Health for Haiti program with Professor Maureen Hankin.

Choosing between talented applicants is tough, Musa conceded.

"We had really great applicants this year. I wish we could have brought everyone!" she said. "We are fortunate to have so many students who are willing to devote their time and talent to our global service projects in Haiti."

Health for Haiti runs during the 2016 winter term. The major focus of the global service learning course is to organize student and faculty efforts to provide practical assistance to the people of Haiti, the poorest country in the Western Hemisphere. By partnering with local, experienced volunteers, students can use their training to provide simple health education and medical services at clinics, and can participate in projects aimed at providing clean water, solar power and basic computer literacy skills.



David Alan Shrum, an ESL professor in Celaya, helped draw links between the physical climbing of a mountain and the confidence that climbing generates about our ability to conquer other challenges.

Yoel Soriano, a SEED student who graduated in 2015, selected climb, or *escalar*, as the word of the day. The teleconference was part of an ongoing commitment to give our students, faculty, and staff, the opportunity to connect with their peers around the world.

Third annual Talent Show auditions Nov. 16-19




































Buzz Report: Halloween in the Student Village


"I wanted to do this program to help build the confidence of students in a positive atmosphere," Payano said. "I believe having these programs I the residence hall really helps create a sense of community."


The Presidents Cup pits ice hockey clubs from both schools against one another. Binghamton University and SUNY Broome have been ice hockey rivals since 1975.

Flanked by Stinger and Baxter the Bearcat, the presidents of SUNY Broome and Binghamton University held the silver Presidents Cup aloft.

"Should we fight over it?" BU President Harvey Stenger joked in front of a line of television cameras. He tugged one of the silver handles as President Drumm began to chuckle.

SUNY Broome and Binghamton University are frequent collaborators when it comes to research, projects such as the Southern Tier High-Tech Incubator and more. Many Hornets eventually become Bearcats when they transfer to BU. In fact, SUNY Broome sends more students to BU than any other college, President Drumm points out.

But when it comes to the ice, all bets are off: the schools' hockey teams have been rivals since 1975.

The two presidents met Tuesday at the SUNY Broome Ice Center to announce the second annual Presidents Cup hockey game on Thursday, November 5 — and to exchange hats. This year, the president of the losing team's institution will wear the winning team's hat for a week. Last year, the presidents exchanged sweatshirts, and Dr. Drumm wore BU green in defeat.

"Ultimately, that's a plus because it helps both teams develop into excellent players," Dr. Drumm said. "The Bearcats may have one last year, but it was a close game!"

How close? The Hornets led in the first quarter, were tied by the Bearcats in the second corner and were finally defeated by a single goal in the last six minutes of the game. Even the winning Bearcats sustained bruises and were exhausted by game's end, noted Stenger, an ardent hockey fan.

Just because the competition is friendly doesn't mean it won't be fierce.

"I expect it will be a very fast-paced game with a lot of physical contact out there," Stenger said.

This year, the game's on the presidents — and absolutely free to the community. While play starts at 7 p.m., plan on getting there a little early. The stands fill up and the first 100 people through the door will receive a free T-shirt.



Focus on international education: Admissions heads to China

Susan Wellington, SUNY Broome's Assistant Director of Admissions/International Student Studies, recently attended the China Annual Conference for International Education in Beijing.

Prior to leaving for China, she set up a focus group with some of SUNY Broome's Chinese students to see what drew them to the college. The students created a flyer detailing what attracted them to campus and why they like it.

A delegate with the American Association for Community Colleges, Wellington participated in a forum on "Best Practices of the U.S. Community Colleges: Mutual Learning and Exchange for Win-Win Cooperation." She joined panelists from Davidson County Community College in Lexington, NC; College of Lake County in Grayslake, IL; and the Community Colleges of Spokane, a partnership between Spokane Community College and Spokane Falls Community College.

"I spoke about internationalization strategies on our campus and what we are doing (and would like to do) about becoming more globally known," she explained.

Her topics included the SUNY system, COIL, the International Student Organization, LingoNet, International Toastmasters and a future project, "Broome Buddies," that would connect international students with domestic families and/or campus friends. She also met with officials from the U.S. Embassy and discussed ways to promote community colleges in China.

From Beijing, Wellington flew to Chengdu, where she attended the China Education Expo, B2B. The CEE put on a four-city college fair to promote education in China; Chengdu was the second stop. She learned from the Embassy that SUNY Broome was the only community college to attend any of the fairs' venues.

"The overall experience was one that I will not soon forget," she said.

SUNY Broome to hold ribbon-cutting for new X-ray equipment

SUNY Broome students studying radiologic technology now have hands-on access to the most up-to-date equipment in their field. The college recently installed the Carestream Digital X-Ray Ascend system in the Decker Health Sciences Center. The ceiling-mounted unit replaces equipment that dates back to the 1970s.

SUNY Broome will host a ribbon-cutting and open house for the new equipment from 12 to 1 p.m. November 12 in Decker Health Sciences Room 315. Students will be on hand to demonstrate the use of the equipment.

November 8 through 14 is National Radiologic Technology Week, in honor of the discovery of X-rays on November 8, 1895.

Students in the program will now be able to train on all forms of radiology equipment they may encounter in their careers: film screen systems, computed radiography (CR) and now digital radiography (DR). While CR takes 45 seconds to produce an image, DR technology creates images instantaneously.

Medical facilities, including all of the area's hospitals, are also increasingly switching to DR technology. The new technology has other advantages, too: newer versions are wireless and can be moved from wall to table units.

"Medical imaging is such a rapidly changing field that our students and faculty are continually learning new skills. We are grateful for the funding and donations provided to allow us to acquire Carestream's DRX-Ascend system," said Colleen Donahue, Chair of the Radiologic Technology Program. "With digital imaging today, we have to become fluent with the physics and radiation safety required around this kind of technology. Our students will now be able to yield improved image quality and provide enhanced patient care as the Radiologic Technologists do at all of our clinical affiliations."

The purchase and installation of the Ascend system cost \$207,602. Of that, \$150,000 came from Regional Council Capital Funds through Empire State Development and \$57,602 from the Dr. G. Clifford & Florence B. Decker Foundation, with additional support from SUNY Broome's 2014-15 Perkins IV Career & Technology Education Grant award.

"The Decker Foundation's focus is on healthcare and education. When deciding on a grant, we focus on the quality of the organization and the quality of the program. SUNY Broome exemplifies both," said Gerald E. Putman, Executive Director of the Dr. G. Clifford & Florence B. Decker Foundation.


By honing their skills on the most modern equipment, students in SUNY Broome Radiologic Technology program can continue to provide quality healthcare to their future patients. "It's important that SUNY Broome students have the latest technology to work on," Putman added.

"Technology has become an integral part of the teaching-learning environment, especially in areas where hands-on experience is critical to a student's understanding. The new Digital Radiography unit will allow students to learn on state-of-the-art technology similar to that being used on real patients within the health care industry today," said Dr. Kelli Ligiekis, SUNY Broome associate vice president, dean of STEM and acting dean of Health Sciences. "We are very thankful for the funding and donation that made this equipment purchase possible, and also very excited to offer this opportunity to our students as they prepare for careers as



Wall of Inspiration: Artists install 'The SUNY Broome Experience'

Walk into SUNY Broome's Dining Hall and the scarlet side wall immediately grabs your attention.

It's not just the vibrant hue, although that's part of it. Images depict the variety of campus life: laboratories and classrooms, sports and the art gallery, ending in the avalanche of balloons at Commencement. Interspersed are quotations that, like the photographs, literally pop out of the wall. "The two most important days in your life are the day you were born and the day you find out why," Mark Twain proclaims at the start of the panels, on the wall's left-hand side.

More than 9 feet tall and 45 feet wide, "The SUNY Broome Experience" is the largest public artwork on campus. The goal: to inspire the students to embrace their college experience, and ultimately enact that final picture – graduation – themselves.

The three-dimensional work is the first of its kind by creators Jack Braunstein and Gene Czebiniak, who initially met via SUNY Broome music instructor Peter Sicilian. While Braunstein took all but two photographs and compiled the quotations that Czebiniak used for his design, there was an ongoing exchange of ideas between the two that influenced each other's work. Together, the artists crafted 13 photographic panels and the four acrylic panels with quotations, and installed them over the summer.

"This work really explodes with color, life and vitality, and shows what the campus is becoming," said Czebiniak, a local graphic artist and stage set designer.

The inspiration for the artwork originated when Braunstein, a former art and English teacher with a strong background in painting, presented his slide show that highlighted his visits to 12 colleges and universities, including SUNY Broome, to President Kevin E. Drumm and administrators Debbie Morello and Jesse Wells.

"I focused on how visual design elements such as greenery, signage, meeting areas, displays, wall colors, and works of art engage us to feel welcomed, intellectually stimulated, and integral members of the campus community," said Braunstein. "After all, students feel more inclined to participate in activities and learn in an environment that feels less institutional and more humane."

While Braunstein and Czebiniak hope this project leads to others, they already feel rewarded knowing they have reached their audience. During the installation process, the artists recalled two groups of students seeing the artwork in progress and expressing both excitement and gratitude upon seeing how wonderfully

their dining hall was being transformed.

"Being a small college, SUNY Broome is ahead of the game," said Braunstein. "Not only does it have many inviting areas to socialize and study, but it also is beautifully nestled by rolling hills. So the purpose of our work is to enhance the already warm atmosphere of the campus."

To set the tone towards this goal, the artists placed their favorite quotation last, right above the two graduation scenes: "Never believe that a few caring people can't change the world," said Margaret Mead, the famous anthropologist. "For, indeed, that's all who ever have."

SUNY Broome students in Effective Speaking with Kathleen McKenna met with Biomedical Engineering students in Celaya, Mexico, during their English class on November 4, 2015. They enjoyed hearing a Mexican student's modern-day rendition of Little Red Riding Hood, complete with a message about Internet safety for kids, and hearing the story of Dia de los Muertos. They had fun sharing their stories about how one student broke his dad's nose by accident while playing baseball, and about another student's adoption from Lithuania at age 10. They also enjoyed hearing in Spanish (with translation by a classmate) the Mexican legend La Llorona, with the haunting line, "Ay mis hijos....," a story told to them on Tuesday by one of the Mexican students here at Broome on a Becalos scholarship. It's a Mexican tale of loss, tragedy, death and the eternal seeking of missing children — perfect for Halloween.

Here's what the English professor in Celaya, had to say the next day about the collaboration:

Some students and a teacher were waiting for me this morning when I got here. They really enjoyed it too, and asked if we could do it again as well. I also think that it is a great opportunity for your students to practice speaking, like Sean and his baseball story. It was also awesome to hear the adoption story. Very moving. This is really beneficial for my students, too. First, they got really excited when they saw some students were from here. Secondly, it is a great opportunity for them to hear English spoken well and how it is really spoken in the States. And, lastly, for them to start to lose the fear of public speaking and more so public speaking in English.



SUNY Broome to offer drone training program

The next wave of technology primed to sweep the nation and expand workplace opportunity is the small unmanned aerial system (SUAS). A unique and comprehensive Broome County Continuing Education training course prepares operators to ride the wave toward myriad future uses and careers.

Join us at 11 a.m. Tuesday, November 17, in Decker Health Sciences Room 201 for a press conference announcing the program, as well as a demonstration of the aerial equipment.

The course, offered through SUNY Broome's Continuing Education Department in collaboration with Canandaigua-based SkyOp, LLC, provides novices and experienced operators with a comprehensive understanding of small unmanned aircraft and the emerging industry.

"It's the next transformative technology that's going to change our lives," Brian Pitre, co-founder of SkyOp, LLC said. "It's that big."

The Introduction to Small Unmanned Aerial Systems course covers different types of flight systems and their capabilities, safe and legal flying practices, commercial applications for the technology, and emerging career opportunities. Participants practice their skills on a Syma X5C Quadcopter and an AeroSIM flight simulator, which are included in the course fee.

The course is designed to meet all the expected Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) guidelines on operator certification, once legislated.


The estimated economic impact runs in the billions of dollars by 2025, according to the Association for Unmanned Vehicle Systems International. More than 100,000 new jobs nationally will be created in the next 10 years, with nearly 3,400 of them created in New York alone, the organization predicted.

"We see the countless business applications and future workforce impacts," said Janet Hertzog, Director of Continuing Education and Workforce Development. "It fits our program profile perfectly. We're ahead of the curve."

"These are the best data collection systems I've ever seen," Pitre said. "That's what takes me back to my computer roots, understanding the applications and post-processing the data. You can do such amazing things with it."

Current FAA rules and regulations plus operational risk and safety issues will be addressed. Each participant will receive a training certificate of completion.

Class will be held from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. three consecutive Saturdays — December 5, 12 and 19, 2015, at SUNY Broome. People can register for the course online at www.sunybroome.edu/ce or by phone by calling 607-778-5012. The cost of the course is \$1,499.



























































Shine a green light for veterans



Theater Production to host Rod Serling expert for talkback after the show



Honoring Veterans: SUNY Broome holds Veterans Day ceremony

Bearing flags, the Color Guard marched down the Quad path, their passage punctuated by staccato commands and the percussive sound of their feet marching in time. Gathered in front of SUNY Broome's Veterans monument, the campus community watched in respectful silence.

SUNY Broome honored veterans with its annual Veterans Day ceremony on November 11, which included the procession from the Broome County Veterans Memorial Association. Local firefighters flew a giant flag at the college's South Entrance, and the U.S. Army Reserves' 698th Quartermaster Unit from Nichols brought a military Humvee to the Quad for display. Voice major Kristen McPeak sang the national anthem under the gray skies as veterans and military members held a salute.

"No matter when you served – whether yesterday or decades ago – the SUNY Broome community is deeply, deeply appreciative of your service," said President Kevin E. Drumm, whose father served as a minesweeper in the Navy during World War II.

Originally called Armistice Day, the "11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month" was first commemorated in 1919 to remember the end of World War I. It became a federal holiday in 1938 and was renamed Veterans Day in 1954, following World War II and the Korean War, President Drumm recounted.

Veterans have profoundly shaped the nation – including the existence of the nation's community college system. Prior to World War II and the G.I. Bill, higher education was largely limited to the wealthy. After the end of the war, New York State developed five Institutes of Applied Arts and Sciences for returning veterans eager to retrain – including the school now known as SUNY Broome.

"We still have many student who attend class thanks to the G.I. Bill and veterans are an integral part of our campus community," Dr. Drumm said.

Last year, the campus unveiled its new Veterans Resource Center in the Student Services Building, as the result of a partnership with Broome County.

The center is just one of the initiatives the county has undertaken to support veterans, said Broome County Executive and SUNY Broome alumna Debbie Preston. Others include an expanded veterans discount program, a new veterans family area at Greater Binghamton Airport, the expansion of the War Memorial at

the Floyd L. Maines Veterans Memorial Arena, and the purchase of a van to help veterans get to their medical appointments.

"It's just one small way to say thank you," she said.

For SUNY Broome student Matthew Gurney, the day isn't about all the free stuff that veterans receive, or the parades. And he should know.

Gurney joined the U.S. Marines on Sept. 4, 2001 – a week before the 9/11 attacks. He moved up the ranks to sergeant, and experienced deployments in Okinawa, Djibouti and Kuwait. In 2011, he became part of the Army Reserves, completing a deployment in Kuwait. He's expecting to ship out again in January, said Student Activities Director Jason Boring.

"What it's really about is just honoring them," said Gurney, who became a SUNY Broome student in Spring 2012. "It's really difficult to leave your family and go overseas, and come back months or even years later."

Having undergone repeated deployments, he noted that support systems can make all the difference. Veterans can also head to the Broome County Veterans Services Agency on Hawley Street to learn what services are available to them.

"You are not forgotten," Gurney told fellow veterans. "Someone cares. I care."





"We're the only community college in New York with an AA1 program and one of the few in the country," SUNY Broome President Kevin E. Drumm told the students, their mentors and their families during a recent reception. "You're more unique and special than students in Harvard. There are only seven of you."

The program is classical and well-rounded, giving students an introduction to an array of topics while honing their intellectual skills. It's also not open to everyone. Students who rank in the top 2 percent of their graduating class at the time of their application are automatically accepted; those in the top 3 to 10 percent or have a minimum GPA of 95 are encouraged to apply and are reviewed by a selection committee.

Classes encourage the development of critical thinking which is something that Nia and Jon said they appreciated.

"The critical thinking part of it really helps me and my classmates to improve," Jon said.

The program began with a class of five students last year, and is growing increasing interest, noted Dean of Liberal Arts Michael Kinney.

"I thought it was a good deal to get two years done in one," said Nikki, who learned about the college while researching Binghamton University.

Like Nikki, several members of this year's class are considering Binghamton University as a next step, although Stella is aiming for Cornell and Noah considering SUNY Oswego or the University of Buffalo. Graduate degrees also beckon, accompanying a wide range of career goals: Noah and Eni imagine careers in communications, while Nia plans to become an attorney, Jon a biochemist, Taylor an FBI agent. Stella hopes to found a nonprofit to help African children living in poverty. Nikki isn't quite sure yet, but appreciates the opportunity to explore.

Many of them also entered the program with college credit they earned while in high school. Taylor and Stella are also <u>Presidential Honors Scholars</u>.

The AA1 scholars work together on large-scale projects. This year, they're creating a documentary on <u>Lyme disease</u> for their class in "The Art of Science." They have compiled hours of footage, from collecting ticks in the field as part of ongoing research to interviewing patients, medical personnel and researchers, noted Professor Tracy Curtis. They learned to set up lighting to get the best shots and to edit.

Noah and Eny, who are both considering communications careers, are particularly fond of the editing process. When he was small, Noah used to record himself and make his own radio shows, he admitted. But all of the students are exploring their potential and developing skillsets, Eny was quick to point out. Nikki, as it turns out, is a pro at finding royalty-free music.

"We're finding out things about ourselves that we didn't know before," Nikki said. "It's great."

The project and their classes also bring the students together. They have become a close group, observed Donna Rehak, staff associate of to the Dean of Liberal Arts, who has seen the group in action.

Dr. Curtis expects the documentary will be completed at the end of the semester, and plans to stage several showings.

Professors, administrators and mentors alike are optimistic about what the future will hold for this talented crew.

'From here, you really will be able to go anywhere and do anything," President Drumm said. "We are really looking at seven future great leaders of this country."



Cutting Edge Tech: SUNY Broome unveils new digital X-Ray equipment

As a freshman, Kristen Chamberlain never worked with SUNY Broome's old X-Ray equipment, but she's chatted with other Radiologic Technology students who have.

"I heard it was called the dinosaur," she said of the equipment, which dated back to the 1970s.

The dinosaur has since been replaced with the Carestream Digital X-Ray Ascend system, a high-tech ceiling-mounted unit that is becoming increasingly prominent in hospitals. It's not the only upgrade SUNY Broome's Rad Tech program has undergone. Other new additions in the last year include a Hovercam and portable X-ray unit purchased through Perkins Grant funds, as well as laptops for virtual radiography and a whole-body phantom.

On November 12, the college held a ribbon-cutting ceremony for the new X-Ray equipment, as well as an open house where students demonstrated its use. The event occurred, fittingly enough, during National Radiologic Technology Week, which commemorated the discovery of X-Rays 120 years ago by German physicist Wilhelm Conrad Roentgen.

"It's so important for our students to be experienced with everything that's out there," said President Kevin E. Drumm, adding that SUNY Broome has the largest Health Sciences division among SUNY's community colleges.

As with so many initiatives, partnerships helped make the acquisition of this new equipment possible, he noted.

The purchase and installation of the Ascend system cost \$207,602. Of that, \$150,000 came from Regional Council Capital Funds through Empire State Development. The project was in line with the council's five-year strategic plan, noted Robin Alpaugh of Empire State Development, a SUNY Broome alumnus.

The Dr. G. Clifford & Florence B. Decker Foundation gave \$57,602 toward the project cost, and SUNY Broome received additional support from a 2014-2015 Perkins IV Career & Technology Education Grant Award.

"Dr. Decker had a passion for excellence and quality. What better place than SUNY Broome to have that

exemplified?" said Gerald E. Putman, the Decker Foundation's executive director. He noted that more than 90 percent of SUNY Broome Rad-Tech graduates are employed immediately after receiving their degrees, and virtually all of them pass their certification exam.

"Dr. Decker would be so proud that his foundation is supporting such a great program," Putman added.

Radiologic technicians are the third largest group of healthcare professionals in the United States today, exceeded in number only by physicians and nurses, said Colleen Donahue, Chair of the Radiologic Technology Program.

"This equipment allows our students to have training on the state-of-the-art digital system that our clinical affiliations have," she said. "Experience with this type of system on campus will provide our students with increased knowledge on the importance that medical imaging plays in patient care and health care safety, along with the skills sets students will need to enter service-learning."

Students in the program train on all forms of radiology equipment they may counter in their careers: the older, film-screen systems, computed radiography (CR) and now digital radiography (DR). Many medical facilities, including all of the area's hospitals, are increasingly switching to DR technology, which can produce images instantaneously. There are other advantages, too; newer versions are wireless and can be moved from wall to table units.

"With the advent of computerized radiology, we can now clean up the image a little bit and it takes seconds – 10 seconds versus the 90 seconds or more with the analog," freshman Doug Yarrington explained to visitors at the ribbon-cutting. "And it's a lot less radiation for the patient."


Students demonstrated the use of lab equipment to curious onlookers, carefully positioning the patients on the table and donning protective gear. The latter is especially important for the portable X-ray unit, which technologists would use when responding to disasters in the field. Across the hall, students carefully positioned the new full-body phantom – an anatomically correct manikin dubbed "Trixie" that contains organs and a skeleton under her sculpted skin – on the X-Ray table, as if she were a real patient.

Student Jessi McNeilly said she appreciated the chance to learn on the new equipment.

"It's what we'll be working with in the hospital," Kristen added.

Making a Difference: Student groups donate \$4K to BC Center

With bright smiles, students from the Broome Educators of Children Association (BECA) and the Social Wellness Advocacy Group (SWAG) unfurled a large printed check.

The clubs raised \$4,000 for the BC Center, SUNY Broome's on-campus childcare center, through an Oct. 5 pottery sale and an Oct. 30 drag show and competition in the Angelo Zuccolo Little Theatre.

The funds will go toward scholarships for SUNY Broome students, said BC Center Director Nancy Seliga.

"These groups understand that it's educating two generations," said Professor Lisa Strahley. "This is high-quality learning for the children as well."

For many parents, quality childcare is essential when it comes to pursuing an education. However, childcare is often expensive and may seem out of reach for many parents.

"There are many students who wouldn't have graduated if it weren't for programs like this," said Willie Murray, a communications and media arts major involved with SWAG.

Established in 1975, the licensed childcare center accepts children ages 6 weeks to 5 years, primarily of SUNY Broome students and staff. Established in 1975, the BC Center enrolls approximately 45 to 60 children per semester. Typically, 12 parents a year graduate from the college. Through the years, the center has helped more than 3,000 parents graduate.

Fees for services are based on family income and size, and subsidies are available for eligible families. There is, however, a wait list, particularly for infants, Seliga acknowledged.

One of the students on the list is Ashley Marsh, a member of SWAG majoring in the college's chemical dependency program. She's expecting twins, and also used the service years ago when her son was small.

"I remember it being a relief because he was here on campus," she said. "As a parent, you want your kids close."


The donation was deeply appreciated by BC Center and its staff.

Future tech: SUNY Broome offers drone training program

Transformative technologies have a way of sneaking up on us. Decades ago, few could have imagined that computers would be in every home, and the Internet would become a driving force of commerce and global culture.

The next wave of transformative technology will be personal robotics and particularly flight robotics, said Brian Pitre, who spent more than 40 years in the computer industry and co-founded Canandaigua-based SkyOp, LLC.

"It's going to change our lives with the same impact," he said of small unmanned aerial systems (SUAS), commonly called drones. "There are thousands of applications these devices will be used for."

A unique and comprehensive SUNY Broome Continuing Education training course will prepare operators to use this technology. Offered in collaboration with SKyOp, "Introduction to Small Unmanned Aerial Systems" will provide novices and experienced operators with a comprehensive understanding of drones and the emerging industry.

Now offered at five colleges, the course typically draws a wide range of students – teens to septuagenarians, hobbyists to experienced pilots, business professionals and the merely curious, Pitre said.

The course covers different types of flight systems and their capabilities, safe and legal flying practices, commercial applications and emerging career opportunities. Participants practice their skills on a Syma X5C Quadcoper and an AeroSIM flight simulator, which are included in the course fee.

Impact on the economy

Drones are expected to create more than 100,000 new jobs nationally in the next 10 years, nearly 3,400 of them in New York, according to the Association for Unmanned Vehicle Systems International. Overall, their economic impact is expected to run in the billions of dollars by the year 2025.

"We know that unmanned aerial systems will have a lot of impact on businesses in our area," said Janet Hertzog, Director of Continuing Education and Workforce Development.

Like computers and the Internet, drones were first used by the government. They have since made their way

into homes, although a 2007 decision by the Federal Aviation Administration has prohibited their commercial use. That's about to change; the FAA is reviewing new commercial regulations and is expected to release them in 2016, Pitre said. The course, he noted, would help students prepare for future certification through the FAA.

Drones have been used in the military, in police work and increasingly in business – from engineering firms that use them to get an up-close view of rooftops, to the photographer looking for the perfect shot, SUNY Broome President Kevin E. Drumm noted. He noted that his son has one, which he flies around the house.

Dr. Drumm was intrigued by the future uses of the technology, which range from retail to healthcare.

"I'm looking forward to seeing how the big retailers are looking into this for deliveries," he said.







Steve Gardner is gearing up for SUNY Broome's 24 Hours of Giving.

This proud Hornet has his SUNY Broome Alumnus t-shirt at the ready for December 1. While he won't be awake for the entire 24 hours, he plans to put in a long day helping the Broome Community College Foundation.

"I will be here a good 8 to 12 hours," vowed Gardner, a 1973 graduate and Dickinson resident. "I look forward to being here on December 1. It will be fun to be back!"

The first annual 24 Hours of Giving – known as #Broome24 on social media — kicks off at midnight December 1 and supports the Foundation, which provides scholarships to many SUNY Broome students. It's part of Giving Tuesday, a national initiative that kicked off in 2012 and has raised millions of dollars for nonprofits around the globe.

Volunteers – including Steve Gardner – will be taking pledges around the clock. The day also will feature challenges, prizes and just plain fun, both on campus and in the virtual world via social media and a dedicated webpage at www.sunybroome.edu/broome24.

For alumni such as Gardner, the event represents a chance to reconnect with their alma mater, and share memories about their Broome Tech, BCC or SUNY Broome days. (Fun fact: the College has sported five different names during the course of its nearly 70-year history. They are: the State Institute of Arts and Sciences at Binghamton, Broome County Technical Institute, Broome Technical Community College, Broome Community College and, now, SUNY Broome.)

Gardner first enrolled in 1968 after graduating from Binghamton North High School. Back then – BTCC days, he remembers – the campus only had five buildings. He then went on active duty in the Navy and returned a few years later. In his absence, the Cecil C Tyrrell Library was built and "Tech" disappeared from the College's name.

His wife, the former Linda Vescio, is also a SUNY Broome alumna; she graduated in 1972. The two married during Gardner's second year at the school, where he majored in accounting.

"We have fond memories of BCC. It's always had non-traditional students," he said. "We had a lot of fun. It

was a great place to go to school."

He remembers a sign in the Admissions office: "Attend Notre Dame for half price," a reference to the important role community college has in making education affordable. Then, as now, SUNY Broome proved to be a stepping stone to greater things.

"It prepared you to go to any university," he said.

Gardner went on to finish a bachelor's degree in economics at Binghamton University, then called SUNY Binghamton, and spent his career working for banks and credit unions. He spent 19 years as CEO of GHS Federal Credit Union and then eight years as Vice President of National Accounts for Security Mutual Life of New York, before retiring in 2015.

During his career, he and his colleagues took classes at SUNY Broome to keep their skills sharp. They were dubbed "lifelong learners," he remembered.

In addition to his contributions to the work world, Gardner gave back to his community – and the college. A Town of Dickinson Councilman, he served on the board of the BCC Foundation from 2002 to 2008. When he was CEO, GHS established a scholarship for a continuing Business student that is still awarded today.

He and his wife are also proud donors, and encourage other Hornet alumni to consider pitching in.

"For the past 23 years, Linda and I have contributed to the Foundation and I hope that if you're in a position to contribute to it, you will," he said.

Steve Gardner also issued a special challenge to his classmates for the 24 Hours of Giving.

"If you're a member of the class of 1973, I challenge you to make a donation! I want everyone to donate, but especially the class of 1973."



Changing the World: Nosa Akol takes aim at global hunger

She may call Binghamton home, but Nosa Akol's desire to make a difference transcends national boundaries.

Her vehicle of transformation: agriculture, a field she developed a passion for through her involvement with 4-H and the Cornell Cooperative Extension (CCE) of Broome County.

"I can do so much more in the agricultural field. Providing food is so essential," said Akol, a native of South Sudan whose family emigrated to Binghamton when she was five. "It's something that can change somebody's life for the better."

A graduate of Binghamton High School, Nosa has been heavily involved in CITIZEN U, a civic engagement program through 4-H and CCE. She won the 2015 4-H Youth in Action Award and served as a delegate at the World Food Prize Global Youth Institute, as well as interned as a biological science aide at the Robert W. Holley Center for Agriculture and Health at Cornell University, attended the Norman Borlaug Symposium as a panelist, and served as keynote speaker at the 4-H Career Explorations at Cornell University.

A Liberal Arts – Science major, she plans to transfer to Cornell after finishing her year at SUNY Broome. Ultimately, she hopes to help women and children in the developing world create sustainable agriculture-based microbusinesses.

"Women in developing countries are the ones giving back," she said, noting that microbusinesses would help bring income to their families. "I really like agriculture and I also like business. Why not combine the two?"

She'll get a chance to put her passion to work in January, when she and 19 other students will board an airplane bound for Haiti <u>as part of SUNY Broome's 2016 global service learning course</u> there. Nosa's participation was made possible by a <u>\$1,500 scholarship</u>, awarded by the Endwell Rotary and Rotary International.

Nosa's interest in agriculture fits in with this year's Health for Haiti trip, which will include a community garden component. The program has acquired land in the village it serves, and residents have already planted corn, melons and beans.

Professor Jennifer Musa, who created the Health for Haiti program with Maureen Hankin, reached out to Nosa for her expertise.

"I do not have a lot of gardening experience, so this is new to me! Once we started talking about doing it, I've never had a project move this quickly before," Professor Musa said of the garden project. "I'm thrilled to have Nosa here, especially with her interest in agriculture. The timing was perfect."

When she entered high school, agriculture never crossed Nosa's mind. The eldest of six children, she had been considering a career in law enforcement – perhaps as an FBI agent – as a way to protect others. During her freshmen year of high school, she joined CITIZEN U, with the hope that it would nurture her career goals.

Instead, she found her interests changing and expanding in scope.

"CITIZEN U got me out of my comfort zone," she explained.

Through the program, she improved her local community, planting trees and flowers in a local park and spearheading the Great Pothole Solution Project, which used GIS and GPS to map potholes throughout Binghamton; CITIZEN U teen leaders then presented their remediation plan to city officials.

She served as Broome County's delegate to 4-H Capitol Days in Albany, where she met state legislators. She helped design and carry out two health and wellness projects at Binghamton's Theodore Roosevelt Elementary School, where more than 57 percent of students are at risk of childhood obesity.

Research internships through Cornell, meeting with international leaders during World Food Day, serving on a Hunger Task Force through CCE and The United Way – Nosa Akol has a long list of accomplishments, and remains heavily involved in CITIZEN U.

"All of these experiences and honors have focused Nosa's resolve to find solutions to ending global poverty and supporting the human rights on underserved women and children, especially in her native country of South Sudan," CCE-Broome's Dr. June Mead, State Project Director for Children, Youth and Families, wrote in a recent letter of recommendation.

Nosa chose SUNY Broome because it's close to home, and offered a wide variety of interesting programs.

"I can take advantage of a lot of SUNY programs, too, that travel," she said.

At Cornell, Nosa plans to major in international agricultural and rural development – and dedicate her life to making a difference.

"As a native of South Sudan, I am acutely aware of the lack of opportunities and injustices faced by young women living in poverty in a war-torn country," she wrote in her Health for Haiti application. "But regardless of where my education and career goals lead me, I want to help others and fight global hunger."



Dr. Carolyn T. Amory, an adjunct instructor in English at SUNY Broome, presented at the Dante and Music conference on November 5 and 6 at the University of Pennsylavnia (UPenn) in Philadelphia, held in honor of Dante Alighieri's 750th birthday.

The conference was well attended by Dante scholars as well as musicologists, primarily from Ivy League schools, state universities and European institutions. Dr. Amory was the only participant from a two-year school, getting welcome notice for SUNY Broome. Her paper, "Vita Nuova and Operatic Form," discussed Dante's Vita Nuova and how its pattern of description and poem was adopted into the pattern of recitative and aria used in the first opera. That pattern is still used in opera, as well as in modern musical theater and song forms so familiar that we assume them always to have been there.

The paper was very well-received. Several scholars expressed interest in previously ignored points that it brought up, and which will prompt additional opportunities for study. "Vita Nuova and Operatic Form" will be published by UPenn in Conference Proceedings.

Carolyn Timmsen Amory holds her B.A. in music, M.A. in Italian Letters and Literature, and Ph.D. in Comparative Literatures, all earned at Binghamton University. She was associated with Tri-Cities Opera for 33 years as student, chorister, props master, translations coordinator and translator. She has taught voice for many years, as well as Italian, Comparative Literatures, and English.



The passing of Mary McCarthy's mother



New book by SUNY Broome's Dr. Romano explores community college finances

SUNY Broome Professor Emeritus Richard M. Romano has co-authored a book on community college finance that was released this month by Rowman & Littlefield.

Written with Illinois State's James C. Palmer, *Financing Community Colleges: Where We Are, Where We're Going* reviews 30 years of research, highlights current trends and makes projections for the future.

The two long-time scholars foresee a troubled future, unless funding is increased. Supported by research, the authors find no salvation in the free tuition movement, declare that the debt problem is really a repayment problem, and discover that community college students may not be borrowing enough to complete their education. Topics range from college quality, affordability, access, productivity and outcomes to the community college mission itself.

Dr. Romano will also hold an on-campus presentation on *Financing Community Colleges* from 11 to 11:50 a.m. March 17 in the TRC Conference Room in the library. He directs SUNY Broome's Institute for Community College Research and is a Research Fellow at the Cornell Higher Education Research Institute at Cornell University.

The SUNY Broome Jazz Ensemble will performing at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, December 17, in SUNY Broome's Angelo Zuccolo Little Theater. The ensemble will be welcoming and sharing the stage with Andrew Williams as a guest jazz artist.

Williams is a trombonist, bassist and recording engineer based out of Upstate New York. With a professional career spanning more than 30 years, he has appeared with countless jazz stars including Freddie Hubbard, Slide Hampton, Jimmy Heath, Wynton Marsalis, Frank Foster, Billy Mitchell, Jon Hendricks and Milt Jackson.

Having an early interest in Classical and Symphonic music, he studied with Edwin Anderson of the Cleveland Orchestra, George Osborn of the Rochester Philharmonic and Per Brevig of the Metropolitan Opera. Currently, he is nearly as busy performing orchestral and concert music as jazz, appearing with the Syracuse Symphony, Binghamton Philharmonic and Tri Cities Opera. In addition, he has been busy of late playing on national television commercials and programs as well as feature films. The Andrew Williams Quartet can be heard every Friday evening at Moxie in Conkin.

As the former owner of the Sir Pent Studio for Recording in Manhattan, Williams has engineered more than a hundred jazz recording sessions during that time and since, as well as work in the field of location recording for acoustic music, design in electronics for audio, and acoustics. Technology and performance do cross over and he has appeared on many CDs as performer as well, most notably with Andy Farber (Double A), Slide Hampton (Inclusion), The New Jazz Composers Octet (First Steps Into Reality) and Anne Hampton Callaway (To Ella With Love).
