Dr. Bill Altman Leads Presidential Task Force

Dr. Janie Wilson (Georgia Southern University), president of the Society for the Teaching of Psychology (STP is a division of the American Psychological Association), has appointed SUNY Broome's Dr. Bill Altman (Psychology & Human Services Department) to the Presidential Task Force: Psychology in Communities. As chair, Dr. Altman is leading members of the Task Force in their study of best practices for sharing psychological science with the general public. The Task Force's specific charge is to examine:

- What information psychological scientists might share with their communities;
- How teachers of psychology can share their discipline with as many diverse communities as possible, to make their lives better; and
- What outlets are available or that psychology teachers might create.

The Task Force will then develop a plan to guide STP members in sharing insights from the discipline to help people lead healthier, happier and more productive lives. In addition, the Task Force is developing a wiki to serve as a clearinghouse for psychology teachers and other scientists who want to learn more about how to share their passions and expertise with members of their communities.


Music Coordinator Brenda Dawe to teach class at Hartwick



SUNY Broome Art Professor preserves Roberson history through art

SUNY Broome Art and Design Professor Hall Groat II was recently commissioned by the Roberson family to create two original oil paintings of the mansion, which are now included in private collections in Williamsburg, VA, and Wellesley, MA.

The 16 x 20 in. and 20 x 24 in. pieces included the original 1904 porticos with suggestions of vintage autos underneath. The pieces were painted from digital photos that the artist took during mid-afternoon when the sun was a bit lower in the sky. Adobe Photoshop was then used to remove the adjacent museum complex, and add the original architectural features and driveway.

"My earliest recollections date from the 1940s, when I first visited as a young child — the gardens, garage (carriage house) and that side (my) entrance," Robert S. Roberson said.



SUNY Broome receives \$100K to support college career center

SUNY Broome will receive \$100,000 to link students and community members with enhanced career services and employment opportunities, State University of New York Chancellor Nancy Zimpher and New York State Department of Labor Acting Commissioner Roberta Reardon announced.

"Our mission is to provide a quality education to a diverse population of students, helping them meet their life goals – including a rewarding career," said SUNY Broome President Kevin E. Drumm. "This program will truly help us become a career center for our students – and for the larger community, which benefits by retaining educated professionals in the area."

Working in partnership with Broome-Tioga Workforce New York, the college will expand services in the Southern Tier, building on the annual Department of Labor job fair that attracts more than 70 employers and 500 job-seekers each year.

The college plans to launch on-campus training and outreach using Department of Labor resources, such as its case management system, which aligns students and local employers to better retain young talent in the area.

The college also plans to expand such practices as mock interviews with local employers, occupation-specific job fairs, in-class guest lectures by area professionals, help with job searches and resumes, and more.

Both the college and Broome-Tioga Workforce New York share a commitment to enhancing employment prospects for hard-to-place populations, such as the unemployed, veterans and adult learners, noted Broome-Tioga Workforce Director James Tripp in a letter supporting the proposal.


"By joining forces with our community's workforce development system, we make our own expertise more powerful and achieve far more than when we labor alone," Dr. Drumm said.

Black and Beautiful: SUNY Broome showcases the art of Elton Fax **updated with photos**

Robed figures bustle about in a busy Sudanese marketplace. Standing tall, a woman from Uganda deftly balances a basket on her head as she walks. A woodcarver displays his work, and a stern family patriarch gazes out at the view from beneath the folds of a turban.

Every image – in all its incredible detail and shading – is worked out meticulously in pencil.

Welcome to the amazing work of Elton Fax, an internationally renowned African-American artist, author, lecturer and educator. Fax, who was born in 1909 in Baltimore, had his artwork exhibited in many of the galleries and universities in the United States – and now, SUNY Broome.

The Black Student Union hosted an exhibit of nearly a dozen of his drawings, *Black and Beautiful*, on Feb. 11 as part of Black History Month. These drawings – which depict scenes and individuals Fax encountered during his travels in Africa – will soon be on permanent display on the second floor of the Business Building, on the breezeway to Mechanical.

While SUNY Broome has an extensive art collection that rotates throughout campus, Fax is the only African-American among the showcased artists.

"He wanted to show that black is beautiful," said Katherine Shelton, a second-year Liberal Arts major and vice president of the Black Student Union, as she walked among the opening exhibit in Decker 201. "All of the different art pieces show different aspects of African art and culture. It looks incredible."

The Black Student Union pitched in, not only hosting the reception but purchasing the frames for the artwork, said library archivist Robin Valashinas.

In an odd twist of fate, Fax's contributions to SUNY Broome's art collection had been lost for years. Valashinas discovered them by accident, when she was scouring the archives for posters of Professor Angelo Zuccolo's theater productions for a campus event.

"When I saw them, I said, 'They are so beautiful. They need to be on the walls!" she remembered.

The way they were packaged together leads Valashinas to believe that Fax was a Convocation Day speaker years ago, and that he donated the drawings to the college. But there is no documentation to prove that, she noted.

The artist has some upstate connections; he received a BFA from Syracuse University in 1932, and then became an art teacher. During the Great Depression, he was involved with the WPA Federal Arts Program, which provided relief for artists, and became famous in the 1940s as a "Chalk Talk Artist," illustrating his stories with spontaneous sketches.

During the course of his career, he published more than 30 books, including the biography *Garvey* and *17 Black Artists*. Fax, who died in 1993 in New York City, was also a world traveler, heading across the globe to record the plight of people in impoverished countries, as well as their beauty and dignity.

Visitors to the opening exhibit were awed by the beauty and detail of Fax's work, and look forward to further displays.

"This is really incredible," said Kim Lamar Shelton, a former Liberal Arts staff associate as she strolled through the exhibit. "The artwork is just spectacular."


































































Your turn on the catwalk: Models sought for BSU fashion show

Hornet wings: SUNY Broome gets its first airplane

SUNY Broome received a one-of-a-kind donation from a retired area dentist and his late wife: an airplane.

"And no, it will not be the president's plane," SUNY Broome President Kevin E. Drumm joked during the Feb. 24 press conference at Greater Binghamton Airport.

Meticulously maintained through all its years of operation, the 1966 Piper Aztec will be used to train future mechanics in the college's future Aircraft Maintenance degree program. It made its last flight this winter, when it flew from Tri-Cities Airport to Greater Binghamton Airport.

The college is currently seeking approval for the Aircraft Maintenance A.O.S. program, which is a multi-step process. Prior to receiving approval from the State University of New York system, the program must first receive the nod from the Federal Aviation Administration. To gain FAA approval, the program must first have an airplane.

Enter Dr. Bedosky. In addition to his longstanding dental practice, Dr. Bedosky has been an avid pilot for more than 40 years, taking his family to spots all over the country, from the Tetons and California to the Ozarks and Key West. His wife, Helen Jane Bedosky was a key component in those travels, accompanying her husband and her children on countless trips despite her fear of heights.

"Imagine going to Nantucket or Martha's Vineyard for a Sunday afternoon," Dr. Bedosky reminisced. "That's what we did."

The airplane is a gift from both Dr. Bedosky and his wife, who passed away in October. The Aztec, purchased 36 years ago, is his fourth plane; prior to that, he flew in a Tri-Pacer and two Cherokees.

Dr. Bedosky learned about the possibilities of donation from his long-time mechanic, Chris Eucchenhofer of C&F Aircraft Service, who has served as an advisor in the development of the aircraft maintenance program.

"I called my wife, she says 'Do it,' and here we are," Dr. Bedosky remembered.

Dr. Bedosky also has a longstanding connection to the college in other ways. During the early years of SUNY


Broome's dental hygiene program, he served as a supervising dentist. The dental hygienists hired in his practice also trained at SUNY Broome.

While Dr. Bedosky's donation allows him to give back to the college and the community, it will also grant him the opportunity to visit the airplane he flew for so many years. His children – sons Richard and Matt, and daughter Lisa – also took the opportunity to say goodbye to an era, reminisce about their many travels, and have a peek inside the plane they all knew so well.

On the academic front, the aircraft maintenance program is an ongoing effort, with involvement from a number of different parties. Euchenhofer has donated airplane equipment and tools to the program, while Milton Petzold donated additional aircraft parts to the college.


Broome County Executive Debbie Preston has wanted to get the program off the ground for the past several years, noted Deputy County Executive John Bernardo, who spoke at the press conference on Preston's behalf.

"This is truly a community effort and testament to what we can do when we all work together to improve our community," President Drumm said.





















Feb. 25 public deliberation canceled

A unique and comprehensive SUNY Broome Continuing Education training course will prepare operators to use this technology. Offered in collaboration with SKyOp, "Introduction to Small Unmanned Aerial Systems" will provide novices and experienced operators with a comprehensive understanding of drones and the emerging industry.

The course covers different types of flight systems and their capabilities, safe and legal flying practices, commercial applications and emerging career opportunities. Participants practice their skills on a Syma X5C Quadcoper and an AeroSIM flight simulator, which are included in the course fee.

SUNY Broome alumna becomes U.S. ambassador

SUNY Broome alumna Linda Swartz Taglialatela began the next chapter in her career on February 1, when she presented her credentials to Sir Elliott Belgrave, Governor-General of Barbados.

The Vestal native is now the U.S. ambassador to the island nation. She was nominated by president Barack Obama late last year, followed by a U.S. Senate confirmation in December. Not just limited to Barbados, the Vestal High School graduate also will have responsibilities for a range of Caribbean islands, including the Federation of Saint Kitts and Nevis, Saint Lucia, Antigua and Barbuda, Dominica, Grenada, and St. Vincent and the Grenadines.

She earned an Associates of Arts in 1969 from what was then called Broome Technical Community College, followed by a bachelor's in economics from SUNY Oneonta and a MBA from Virginia Polytechnic Institute.

"During her 36 years of service to the Department, Ms. Taglialatela has amassed an outstanding record of performance, leadership, and accomplishments," the U.S. Department of State wrote in a November 2015 memo.

She began her career in 1973 as a management analyst with the Government Accountability Office, where she focused on federal personnel and compensation reviews. After transferring to the international audit group, she became interested in the State Department and joined the Foreign Service in 1979. Working for the Office of the Inspector General, she inspected 45 embassies and consulates, and also served as Special Assistant to the Inspector General, where she focused on strategic planning, congressional affairs and interagency coordination.

Following several assignments, including a tour as the Management Counselor at the United States Embassy in Bern, Switzerland, she returned to Washington, where she served as deputy director and then director of the Office of Resource Management and Organization Analysis in the Bureau of Human Resources.

During the course of her career, Taglialatela has received numerous awards. In 2004 and 2014 she was the recipient of a Meritorious Presidential Rank Award, and in 2008 she received the Distinguished Presidential Rank Award. She has been a sponsor and mentor to countless Foreign Service Officers and Civil Service employees during the course of her career, according to the Department of State.

"Excelling at resource management, goal setting, delivering results and team building, she is a proven senior leader with the right combination of problem-solving, creativity, and interpersonal skills that will serve her well as Chief of Mission both inside and outside the Mission in Bridgetown," the State Department said in its report.



SUNY Broome to receive \$37.5K for its Education Opportunity Program

SUNY Broome will receive \$37,500 to expand its Educational Opportunity Program (EOP), officials from the State University of New York announced.

The college is among 16 SUNY campuses to receive a total of \$2.3 million in Investment and Performance Fund awards for the program, which will provide access to nearly 800 new students. Currently active on 43 SUNY campuses, EOP provides access, academic support and financial aid to more than 10,000 low-income and academically underprepared students, helping them prepare for and succeed in college.

"As a critical aspect of our unique mission, community colleges educate a wide range of students from all backgrounds, abilities and talents. EOP makes a college education accessible for absolutely anyone of any background and especially those who can benefit from it the most," said SUNY Broome President Kevin E. Drumm. "The support services provided by EOP help students meet their unique challenges, which otherwise may keep them from the goal of a college education, a door to so many opportunities."

Funds will be used to expand access to the summer Bridge to Success initiative for qualified EOP students, providing them with on-campus housing during the duration of the four-week program. Bridge to Success will give students the opportunity to improve in English, writing and mathematics, as well as attend workshops on topics ranging from financial literacy to college success study strategies, career readiness and more.

"This funding will result in the development of a 28-day intensive academic orientation and classes for this group of students," said Executive Vice President and Chief Academic Officer Francis Battisti. "Students will be living on campus while attending classes in English, math and literacy. Each student will also participate in an academic Applied Learning activity while in this intensive program."


During the Fall 2015 semester, SUNY Broome had 63 EOP students.

"The Educational Opportunity Program at SUNY is one of our most success and sought-after programs, with more than 30,000 students applying for 2,500 available seats each year," said SUNY Chancellor Nancy L. Zimpher. "Bringing programs like EOP to more students – that's what our completion agenda sets out to do, and it is precisely what the Investment and Performance Fund can accomplish. We are thrilled to be sharing these awards with our campuses today in recognition of their excellent work and dedication to student success."

In concert with the EOP program, SUNY's Educational Opportunity Centers (EOC) and Advanced Technology Training and Information Networking (ATTAIN) Labs deliver community-based, academic and workforce development programs and services to more than 20,000 adult learners at more than 40 locations across the state.

<u>The Binghamton Opportunity Center</u>, a collaborative initiative between SUNY Broome, the Broome County Urban League and SUNY ATTAIN, serves displaced workers who have been unemployed for 20 weeks or more. Classes in computer literacy, Microsoft certifications, math readiness, and career and college readiness are free to qualified students.

Students who do not meet the unemployment qualification can still attend computer literacy and training courses free of charge at the SUNY ATTAIN labs. These courses boost technical skill levels and offer free Microsoft certification in all areas of the Office suite.

Affordable Care Act Compliance 2015

February 11, 2016 Categories: Uncategorized

For the 2015 year employers are required to issue Form 1095-C to report information relating to the health coverage that they offer (or do not offer) to their full-time and eligible employees.

Originally, the forms were required to be distributed no later than January 31st, 2016, but the distribution deadline has been extended to March 31, 2016 by the IRS.

SUNY Broome Community College has been diligently working on this project and it is our goal to get the required forms to employees as soon as they are readily available. Once the forms are completed and ready for distribution, all full time and eligible employees will be receiving Form 1095-C for the 2015 plan year.

What does this mean to you?

Form 1095-C is now a required, annual IRS form.

Individuals generally use this information to confirm that they have had minimum essential health insurance coverage for purposes of the individual shared responsibility requirements (also known as the individual mandate).

As a result of the IRS extension, individuals may not receive this information before they file their income tax returns.

PLEASE NOTE: ***For 2015, you can file your income tax returns without the Form 1095-C. Your income tax returns need not be amended once you receive your Form 1095-C, but keep the form with your tax records.

Navigating cultures: Author Cathy Bao Bean describes her cultural journey **updated with photos**

"I hate you," Cathy Bao Bean's mother told her as she lay dying.

She meant it, Bean knew – even though she had given her daughter power of attorney, even though her daughter took care of her until the day she died.

Cultural divides are often curious and even humorous. "You can't understand a culture if you don't understand its humor," Bean told SUNY Broome students Feb. 8 during a special presentation of "The Chopsticks-Fork Principle: A Memoir and Manual." Because humor is so culturally specific, it can be tough to catch the joke – unless you're secure enough to admit your ignorance and ask.

During the talk, which kicked off Civility Week, the author shared humorous and poignant stories of her upbringing as the middle child in a Chinese immigrant family. They were the only Chinese family in Teaneck, New Jersey, at a time when racial quotas sharply limited the number of immigrants from Asia.

Her older sister Bette knew two phrases in English – "Lucky Strike" and "shut up" – vaulting her ahead of Cathy in class. Bette went on to marry a State Department employee, Winston Lord, who lost his job because the federal government considered his new bride a security risk. He went on to become ambassador to China under President Reagan, and Bette Bao Lord to achieve success as a bestselling novelist.

Cathy attended Tufts University – one of her favorite photos shows her performing as a cheerleader in the 1960s – and then earned her master's at Claremont Graduate College in California. That's where she met ceramic artist Bennett Bean, a sockless artist who first thought she was Japanese – and married her after a short courtship. They settled in northern New Jersey, where Cathy went on to teach philosophy at nearby colleges and universities, lead diversity workshops and talks around the country, publish her book and raise their son, who today works in China as a venture capitalist for startups.

Throughout her life, Bao Bean has navigated divergent cultures: the pyramidal, individualistic and non-relational culture of the West, and the relationship-driven, non-individual and consensus-based culture of east Asia, which resembles more of a web.

"Only once in my 74 years did I have to choose between one world and the other," she said: when her mother

professed her lifelong hatred for her daughter.


Bao Bean struggled to make sense of it, but concluded that it had to do with the cultural divide and the importance of family roles. Her elder sister lived up to the expectations of fame and fortune, and her younger sister dutifully became the supportive handmaiden after she retired from the corporate world, visiting and caring for her parents every weekend. Bao Bean was supposed to be the scholar – a prestigious role in China – with a Ph.D. and a lucrative gig "somewhere my mother had heard of." She didn't become the scholar her mother had hoped for – and didn't apologize for it, either.

"I liked the decisions that I made. For that, my mother hated me," she reflected. "It wasn't personal."

Bao bean encouraged the listeners to look at ordinary events – birthday parties, jokes, the ins and outs of daily life – to understand the "culturally extraordinary."

"If you take multiculturalism seriously, there is no norm," she said.










Cathy Bao Bean speaks






BSU to unveil collection of prints by prominent black artist

"Black and Beautiful" will be permanently displayed on the second floor of the Business Building.



Origins: Exhibit explores the beauty and tradition of African art

The slender statue of a woman graces the Gallery @ SUNY Broome, facing a row of intricate masks hung at varying heights. In a corner, the statue of a man playing a drum joins a djembe, agogo bells, a kalimba and a rattle, along with a harp-like instrument. Pillars hold an array of statuary and a piece of checkered cloth, while an ornate door leans against a wall, flanked by a roaring bronze lion.

The pieces – some connected with religious rites, others purely decorative or functional – come from numerous countries in Africa: Mali, Cameroon, Burkina Faso, Congo. And they come to the SUNY Broome campus by way of the Bundy Museum in Binghamton, which generously loaned the items in its collection.

"Origins: Traditions of African Art" will be on display at the library gallery through March 1.

"There aren't many African art displays on campus. We think it's a great way to show the culture and get deeper insight into African culture," said Katherine Shelton, a second-year Liberal Arts major and vice president of the Black Student Union, which hosted the show's opening reception.

Three SUNY Broome students – <u>Matt Pitcher</u>, Alanna De La Cruz and Miranda Buckland – selected the pieces from the Bundy collection. With the help of SUNY Broome library archivist Robin Valashinas, they created the exhibit, designing the flow of traffic. Hanging the masks was difficult, conceded Pitcher, a second-year Liberal Arts major who heads the campus Art Club.

"We wanted to create a sense of direction and a sense of movement. We looked at how the room flows and where your eyes go," explained De La Cruz, a first-year Business Administration major who is vice president of the Art Club.

The three students particularly appreciated the opportunity to explore the Bundy's collection, and chose items that represented an array of cultures as well as physical sizes and themes.

While impressive, the exhibit isn't the only one on campus this month that will highlight African culture. The Black Student Union will present "Black and Beautiful," a collection of 10 prints by African-American artist and illustrator Elton Fax (1909-1993), from 3 to 5 p.m. Friday, February 12 in Decker Health Sciences Room 201. After the reception, the collection will be permanently displayed on the second-floor of the Business Building.

Community members are more than welcome to visit the Gallery @ SUNY Broome for Origins, as well as other exhibits during the year, said SUNY Broome President Kevin E. Drumm, who attended the opening reception. The gallery is located on the library's first floor.

"We're dedicated to the arts throughout our mission here at SUNY Broome and we would like to invite the community to visit this gallery anytime," President Drumm said.

SUNY Broome policy: Smoking/vaping in vehicles is prohibited

SUNY Broome's Board of Trustees recently revised the campus' smoking policy. Please note **that smoking or vaping in personal vehicles is prohibited.** In the future, we will also be expanding the smoking gazebo in the Hickory Road area.

The policy is as follows:

To promote campus health, SUNY Broome Community College prohibits the use of tobacco products and smoking devices on campus, except for two designated outdoor smoking gazebos. This ban covers all smoking and/or tobacco products, including chewing tobacco, smokeless tobacco, cigars, cigarettes, pipes, electronic cigarettes and personal vaporizers. Individuals are prohibited from smoking or using any of the above listed products on College property except in the designated gazebos. This policy for off-campus locations shall be dictated by the property owners except in SUNY Broome owned, leased or rented space. SUNY Broome asks the campus community to be considerate of others in regard to the use of tobacco products and smoking devices.



in his ear—while clenching the green. As if on the edge


of a pool, he tilts his head to drain water out of his canal.






SUNY Broome's MOOC now on-demand, includes free online textbook


I have lived in the Residence Hall since Fall 2014. I looked forward to living on campus and being right in the middle of all that the campus had to offer. However, a few weeks into my first semester, I noticed a growing disdain from professors and commuters alike for the Residence Hall students.

I wasn't sure why this stigma was being created; all of the people that I had met in the Residence Hall were good people who were going places. Sure, you met a few people here and there who weren't taking advantage of the education that was being given to them, but I saw that everyday in the classroom too. 
