

COIL Update from Kathleen McKenna in Celaya, Mexico:

June 28, 2016

I've been in Mexico since June 20, and will be home on June 29. During the first half the trip, Lynda Carroll and I were in Cuernavaca with 58 other US and Mexican professors, attending a workshop on Collaborative Online International Learning (COIL). In pairs, we will be continuing our COIL work in the fall. Each US prof is partnered with a Mexican prof, and we will bring our students together via a mix of Skype, Blackboard, Facebook, and/or other technologies. Our trip is being funded by a State Department grant to SUNY. Our Mexican partners will visit our campuses in the fall.











Since leaving Cuernavaca, I've been in Celaya. SUNY Broome has a long history of collaborating with Celaya, thanks to the relationship established by Alberto Miller and Alejandro Saldana. Celaya holds a very special place in my heart–I've been here twice before, and have some beloved former students here.

In the first picture, you'll see me in Celaya with Gaby Carrillo, who studied with us at SUNY Broome in 2013. We had a lot of catching up to do, and it was wonderful to see her.

Next, you'll see the beautiful city of Guanajuato, then Maggie Sierra Contreras, who studied with us in 2014, and Sebastian Martinez, who studied for two years (2013-2015) at BCC, in the final cohort of SEED students (Scholarship for Education and Economic Development). I shared a delicious brunch with Sebastian, Maggie, and Maggie's family at the beautiful new restaurant she and her sister are running.

Finally, you'll see me on Sunday at the base of the Pena de Bernal, and you'll see the view from as close as we got to the top (85% of the way—we turned around when the thought of coming back down started to look more complicated). The final photo is Roberto Orozco Bush, my COIL partner. We and our students will be collaborating on projects in International Relations in the fall.






Jarvis McCowin Published in the Journal of College Student Development

A Rare Honor: SUNY Broome student to present at scientific conference

Cassandra Domingo, a first-year student at SUNY Broome, will present a research poster on the effectiveness of peer-assisted study sessions on June 25 at the Eastern Conference on the Teaching of Psychology in Staunton, VA.

"This is exceptional in three ways," said Dr. Bill Altman, her psychology professor and research advisor. "Undergraduates rarely present at scientific conferences. When they do, they're usually juniors or seniors who've worked on a research team led by a professor. Ms. Domingo did this research on her own. On top of that, she was invited to a professional conference, while most undergraduate teams present at student conferences. She's a first-year student achieving what's more typical of graduate students."

Domingo found that the final grades of students who took advantage of supplemental instruction for introductory psychology averaged 20 points higher than those who didn't attend the sessions, earning a B rather than a D. "But that wasn't the most important difference," she explained. "Students who attended regularly improved their study skills and self-confidence. They developed the habits you need to succeed throughout college."

While it would be natural to assume that Domingo was always a budding scientist, she didn't even take a science course in her senior year of high school and never considered science as a career. In fact, she's the first person in her family to go to college.

"This opportunity changed my life," said Domingo. "I was surprised by how exciting it was to do research and how badly I wanted to know the outcome."

Before she had the chance to teach and do research, Domingo — like many students — feared failure and often tried to avoid attracting attention to herself. "Now I have the courage to take more chances and I'm not as afraid of making mistakes. We're trained to believe that failure is the end of the world when it's actually the first step toward success."

Her advice for other students? "Don't sleepwalk through college. There are so many chances to explore your interests. Say 'yes.' Try things. You never know what you'll discover."

Ms. Domingo will graduate from SUNY Broome a semester early and likely transfer to Binghamton University to finish her undergraduate work. She's already contacted several graduate schools and is considering a career in aviation psychology.



Student Village donations aid local charities

When more than 360 Student Village residents head home in the end of May, they can leave a lot behind. Those items, however, won't end up in the landfill; rather, they will help schoolchildren, families in need, and even our four-legged friends.

The Student Village's residential life staff, faculty mentor and facilities director have been working on donations since the end of the spring semester. Last year, the Student Village donated approximately 2,800 pounds of usable goods to the Rescue Mission, including clothing, bedding and small appliances, said Facilities Manager Christopher Menzel. They're on track to do the same this year.

Faculty mentor Virginia Shirley has been sorting through donated items.

"So far I've taken two car loads of items to the Front Street Animal Shelter and to The Humane Society," said Shirley. Items included old towels, worn blankets and cleaning supplies — needed in animal care — as well as \$16.86 in spare change that was donated to Camp Bark-a-Lot.

She has also taken a carload of items to The Salvation Army, and is planning to take a load of school supplies to TRIO. Four and a half shopping carts full of food will also head to the local food pantry.

"I'm working on a load of goods for PAL (Parents as Leaders) to include kitchen items and cleaning supplies," she added. "I'm currently working with Volunteers of America to see what items we have left that they're interested in."

We will do this by leveraging the work that has already been done to assess our needs and draw on our existing strengths.

Over the past few years our college has implemented a number of excellent student success initiatives. However, small scale, fragmented efforts struggle to yield the results we seek and are often not sustainable. Our goal is to implement holistic, large scale change that will significantly impact student progression and completion. ATD provides us the guidance and tools to focus our efforts and scale them to achieve this goal; all while aligning with our Strategic Plan and campus culture.

Our next step with the ATD initiative will be for a nine person team consisting of faculty and administrators to attend the ATD Kick-Off Institute where we will meet our coaches, network with colleagues from other colleges and deepen our understanding of the ATD process. Our group will return ready to share what we've learned with the campus and begin our work together.

Throughout our work with ATD, we want to ensure that the campus community is actively involved in implementing the needed changes and kept up to date on our progress. You can expect to hear updates through emails, announcements and monthly ATD newsletters. We will also be formulating work groups to coordinate various initiatives of the ATD process.






SUNY Broome President Kevin E. Drumm accepts a plaque from the American Heart Association's Gina Chapman for the campus' Fit Friendly status.

Proposed 2017-22 Broome County Capital Improvement Plan Presented for Approval

The SUNY Broome 2017-22 proposed capital improvement program is presented this month for approval by the Board of Trustees. This plan needs to be submitted to Broome County Government this month to meet their capital planning timelines.

It may be necessary to modify this proposal later this summer after the final master facilities plan concepts have been vetted and our campus master facilities plan is finalized. We worked with our master planning team in the development of this 2017-22 CIP, and we believe it represents the direction our master plan is heading in.

The first 6 items are listed in priority order for 2017 – and are the most critical at this juncture. If approved, they are associated with formal Broome County approval to proceed with the project and one half of the project funding where Broome County is providing the local required match.

The outer years on the proposed capital improvement plan are for planning purposes only – funding approval isn't included at this juncture. They are revised as needed and roll forward every year until they land in the 'approved' year.

Increase in SUNY Share Of Capital Projects Funding Proposed – From 50% to 60% – 75%

NYSCC presidents have developed and recommended several policy changes to SUNY leaders to help ease community college financial burdens. Five proposals that have the most support within SUNY are being discussed with legislators and leaders (by SUNY) during the final weeks of the legislative session to get support and sponsorship for them.

One of the five – if approved – will bring additional state funding to NYS community college capital projects by increasing the state's share of financing required for critical maintenance projects from 50% to 75%, and from 50% to 60% for new construction projects. This change would allow local sponsors to better afford supporting needed capital improvements and new projects.

\$1 million NYS Energy to Lead Grant Awarded That Will Be Used to Install Geothermal ... funding now in place for a significant part of campus plan to become 'net zero energy consumer' in place

SUNY Broome has been awarded a \$1 million New York State Energy to Lead grant that will enable the campus to install a geothermal system to produce enough energy to heat and cool our 60 year old Mechanical Building, which will soon be undergoing renovation and transformation into an Advanced Manufacturing Center, and (as much as) another equally sized building.

The Geothermal system will be placed deep in the ground in the green space between our AT, Business, Student Services, and Student Center.

Geothermal is a critical part of meeting our recently set campus goal of net zero energy consumption by 2030. In order to meet this goal, we need to produce as much energy as we use. In addition to reducing consumption and pursuing other green energy producing technologies, geothermal sets us well on the path to

meeting this goal.

Solar Remote Net Metering to be Explored as Second Way to Produce Energy for Campus

In the coming months we will be seriously exploring additional green ways to produce energy to meet our Net Zero Consumption Goal including solar net remote metering, where we would partner with a private firm who would invest their capital to develop a solar farm to produce electricity that would offset a significant part of our electrical use on campus.

We will update Trustees as this exploration proceeds.

Carnegie Library Renovation Underway and \$2+ Million in Tax Credits Being Actively Pursued

We had our first job meeting on the Carnegie Library last week. We plan on meeting about every 2 weeks until the design phase of the interior begins.

A second opinion has been sought on how to be most successful in pursuing New Market Tax Credits. This consultation has confirmed the direction we are headed in, and our funding proposal is now in their hands. An additional second opinion is being sought on the feasibility on attaining Historical Tax Credits.

Environmental Consultants Sought and Recommended

The College let a Request for Proposal last month to provide environmental consulting services for the campus. This touches our facilities team primarily because we provide support when remediation is needed in our older buildings – primarily for asbestos. Two firms are being recommended forward for approval this month and will provide additional choices beyond those on county contract.

Business Building Lecture Hall Renovation Underway

Lecture Hall B-110's renovation has started. Seat selection and color schemes have been finalized.

Ice Center Replacement Cooling Tower on Order at Discount ... Investigation into Cause of Failure Wrapping Up

The Ice Center "Cooling Tower" will be ordered next week at a greatly discounted price. The investigation into its failure is coming to an end and will be finalized after pieces of the coil have been sent out to be examined and analyzed.

Mechanical Building Renovation Construction Management Services Search Proceeding

An addendum has been issued with additional information on the construction timeline and budget for the renovation of the mechanical building into an Advanced Manufacturing Center, and the timeline to interview and recommend a firm has been extended into May.

Landscaping Brick Added to Digital Sign on Campus Front Lawn

Brickwork has been added to the digital sign on the campus front lawn.

Counseling Office Renovation and Student Services Building Remediation Proceeding

The asbestos abatement of caulk for selected windows in the Student Services Building has been completed. The Counseling Center renovation will begin right after graduation with new lighting, paint, carpet, ceiling

tile, and furniture in the lobby/waiting area. Color schemes are still being discussed.

Applied Technology Building Floor Patch and Paint Bid Let - Low Bid Vendor Identified

A bid was let this month to patch and repaint all common area floors of our AT building, and a low bidder has been identified, who is being presented for Trustee approval this month. The work will occur over the summer.

Additional AT Improvements Planned - Door Painting and HVAC

Painting of the interior and exterior entrance doors will begin when weather permits. Also, we will be replacing the two air handling units in our Placement Testing Center with two whisper quiet units.

Fall '16 Student Registrations Off to a Slow Start Compared ith Last Fall ... but last fall's 'hot start' melted off by semester start – efforts underway to improve

Early fall '16 enrollments are off to a slow start compared with last year – they are down 14% compared to last year at this time.

This is an improvement since our first fall enrollment comparison in which we were down +17% in registrations compared to last year. This comparison is alarming at first glance – especially with three-quarters of our revenues directly linked to enrollment – until you look deeper into our previous fall enrollment trend – a 'hot start' that entirely 'melted off' by semester start.


It is theorized that the current fall enrollment trend decline compared with last fall will improve as the summer passes and last year's 'hot start' melts off.

However, this improvement is not being assumed – we are doing everything possible to encourage continuing students to register now, to expand our marketing efforts, and to move new students from 'accepted' to registered' for the fall semester.

The fall enrollment picture is being monitored very closely by the executive team on a weekly basis including the new measure displayed below, with enrollment management plans modified as needed.

A 4% enrollment decline is budgeted next year in the name of fiscal conservatism, but our goal is to sustain enrollments.

Below is a comparison of our fall '16 enrollment trend (orange) and our fall '15 weekly enrollment trend (blue). Fall '15 registrations were off to a hot start at a near +10% in student registrations. However, by semester start, student registrations had melted away by nearly 12% before the inclusion of Fast Forward registrations. The additional black lines represent where our enrollments may end up by semester start, a converging line forecast.



Summer '16 Enrollment Improving – Very Close to Budget Target

We have seen major improvement in our summer enrollment picture over the past several weeks. Summer

enrollment is now nearly flat compared to last year at this time. We are up nearly 3% in total student headcounts, while down just slightly in total FTEs. Flat enrollment is budgeted.

'15-16 Enrollment Forecast At ~ 2 % Decline – Flat Enrollment Budgeted ... \$440k negative revenue impact offset by expense reductions

With fall, winter, and spring enrollments nearly final, we have forecasted an overall enrollment decline of $\sim 2\%$ for the year. This results in estimated losses of \$440k in tuition revenues for the fall and spring terms. The revenue decline is forecast to be offset by reductions in spending that are discussed in detail on the budget forecast.

'15-16 Fund Balance Forecast Adjusted

With spring enrollment mostly settled, our projected fund balance is now \$3.7M, or ~7.5% of the current net operating budget – \$100k less than last month, but still several hundred thousand dollars more than this year's beginning fund balance.

'16-17 Budget Proposal with County Executive and Legislature

Our 2016-17 budget proposal has been delivered to Broome County Legislature for their review and recommendations. The proposal includes a 2% increase in sponsor's contribution as well as a conservative enrollment forecast of -4% for the upcoming academic year. The County Executive indicated a continued, strong commitment towards the college, and the financial ability to fund 1% of the proposed increase in sponsor's contribution.

'16-17 Rental State Aid Allocations Announced - Amount 'As Planned and Anticipated'

The allocations for rental aid has been distributed to all New York State Community Colleges. SUNY Broome will be receiving \$259k in rental aid for 2016-17. This is an additional \$30k in rental aid compared to last year, as planned and anticipated.

Department of Education Announces Changes in Student Debit Card Rules to Benefit Students

Recently the Department of Education made some rule changes regarding debit cards that will benefit students who choose this refund option.

There have always been many positive reasons for students to choose the refund debit card for their student account credit balance refunds. The card gets the students' refunds in to their hands quickly and seamlessly. Students do not have to wait for the paper checks to be mailed and then go to a bank to cash them (many banks no longer want to cash checks for non-account holders). Many students do not have existing bank accounts. The debit card eliminates having large amounts of cash for the student to handle and they are able to safely make purchases using the debit card.

- 1. While the choices available are not changing the way in which choices are presented is changing. The new cash management rule prohibits mass mailing of non-active refund debit cards to students without the students' prior consent. Past practice has been to mail a card for students to activate along with providing the other available options ACH to an existing account or paper check. Students will now be contacted with choices available without the card included in the mailing. Students must now actively choose to have the card mailed to them. Using their own bank account will be listed as the first choice available.
- 2. New rules establish that if the student chooses the refund debit card that to better meet the needs of student account holders that they have convenient multiple points of access to ATM machines rather than one

machine located on campus. These must belong to a surcharge-free national ATM network. The network that will be available to our students is the All Point ATM network with 43,000 surcharge free ATMs throughout the US.

- 3. The biggest change for the college is the requirement to make available our contracts as well as account fee information on our website. This will be done by posting a link all necessary documentation and disclosures will be posted and updated.
- 4. For students who choose the debit card they will have the following available:
- a. Participating retailers will provide NO PIN Fee cash back at the register
- b. Teller Withdrawals with no teller withdrawal fee, students can visit their local bank and get a cash advance.
- c. Free checks not only is Online Bill Pay free, but now students can order a checkbook for free with the new account.
- d. Guarantee that an FDIC insured checking account with all consumer protections is available regardless of credit history

Please review your department's needs and place orders via the requisition/PO process no later than Thursday June 30th in order to meet the July 1 cutoff. To accomplish this, requisitions will need to be created and approved at the department level by June 30, 2016. Items on these orders should be received no later than August 15.

Existing Standing Orders will be good for placing orders through July 31. Items ordered on a Standing Order should be received no later than August 15.

Some items may require significant lead times and departments should plan accordingly.

Items or services received on or prior to August 31, 2016, must be expensed against your FY'16 budget.

Your department's budget may be viewed using the Budget Query function in Banner. The SUNY Broome Purchasing Guidelines are available in Banner Self Service on the Finance tab for easy reference. However, please do not hesitate to call Purchasing at x5196 or x5225 for assistance or questions – we look forward to helping you with your purchases.

As we did last year - the new budget year will open mid-August

We will be opening the new fiscal year (FY17) on August 15.

What does this mean?

This means two fiscal years will be open at the same time – the current year (FY16) and the new year (FY17).

The new year is being opened two weeks early to assist departments by providing time to review purchasing needs for the start of the new year/semester and to allow departments to create requisitions earlier so as to be ready for September.

The items and services requisitioned during the early opening for FY'17 must not be received prior to September 1, 2016. Any items or services received prior to September 1, 2016 must be expensed against your FY'16 budget.

To help ensure that the FY'17 items and services are not received prior to September 1, the Purchasing Office will include language on the purchase orders stating that goods and services are not to be delivered until after August 31.

Please remember that all orders must be placed via the requisition/purchase order process – orders may not be called or faxed in.
