



During the down time, Banner INB TEST8 will be available for lookup of student information and records. However, no updates should be made in the TEST8 instance, but instead held onto to be processed once PROD becomes available. You may use your existing Banner PROD INB username and password to access TEST8 INB during this time.

In addition, anyone who has access to Argos will be able to print student schedules during this time if needed using the PROD Connection by clicking the report referenced below in the Student folder in Argos.

### From the Desk of President Drumm: Happy New Year!

#### Colleagues:

As we commence another academic year, I want to thank you all for your hard work on behalf of our students and the Southern Tier communities we serve. Today you cannot pick up, or rather open up a digital periodical without there being an article or op-ed piece noting the challenging times in which all of higher education is immersed. With small privates struggling under the weight of high tuition and shrinking demographics, public universities struggling with lawmakers on cultural topics from political correctness to campus-carry, and we community colleges struggling with flagging public funding and our own shrinking demographics in the Northeast, our periodicals are replete with both laments on the situation and potential remedies being tried out on campuses across the country. Amidst all of this SUNY Broome has held up pretty well, thanks to all of you. We have our struggles but as a cohesive academic community we have been able to work through them while continuing to offer our students a high quality academic experience. By emphasizing academic quality and focusing on continuously improving our support services, we have been able to keep our college moving forward in spite of any headwinds coming from Albany or anywhere else. Thank you for your part in this! It continues to be honor to lead this great academic community along with all of you who also provide leadership whenever and wherever it is needed to meet our challenges and this primarily is why we are so successful in spite of the tumultuous political and social times we are living in.

And while it's not a requirement for me to share the above personal sentiment with you, the following is a requirement and represents one more of those issues which has greatly impacted college and university campuses over the past couple of years. I also want to take this opportunity to thank one of the many leaders I just generally referred to above, Dean Scott Schuhert, for his leadership efforts on the challenging front of Title IX referenced below:

One of the federally required annual duties of all college presidents is to remind our campus community of Title IX requirements. You may recall that last year SUNY handed down a uniform sexual violence policy Victim/Survivor Bill of Rights. In response to the new SUNY policies, key SUNY Broome faculty and staff participated in various levels of response training. While we have a zero-tolerance policy for violence of any manifestation, sexual violence between or among any individuals falls under SUNY's new policy as well as our own. And beyond violence prevention, it should go without stating that we want civil behavior in all forms throughout our academic community and so a few years ago we created a Campus Civility Statement through our Shared Governance procedures. That statement is attached here and I ask everyone to refresh their memory of it and please refer anyone to it if circumstances warrant.

Attached you will also find the SUNY Broome Community College Students' Bill of Rights created in response to the SUNY policy. I am sharing this as required but more importantly in hopes that all members of our academic community will take time to read these and share them with your colleagues and students. We must continue to support victims/survivors of sexual violence or any violence while working to prevent it wherever we can as a civil academic community.


### Great Books discussion to begin September 9

Drumm and Vice President Debbie Morello. One of the Resident Assistants wore a sign proclaiming "free hugs!" as his colleagues checked in arriving Hornets in the Student Village classroom. Volunteers cheerfully took turns ferrying boxes, pillows and other items to rooms – and also showed off their dance moves on the patio with Stinger.

"It's hard to believe that it's been three years since our Student Village first opened. We have been full every semester, including a wait list," President Drumm said. "Our resident students add so much to campus life, and benefit in turn by being fully immersed in the college experience."

"I love you, mom, but I need to spread my wings," said Tara, a phlebotomy major.

"I'm excited and nervous," confessed Tia, a health studies major who hopes to transfer into the nursing program.




## In the Community: Five and a Half Sopranos on Sept. 2

### **SUNY Broome holds Move-In Day 2016**

SUNY Broome held its third annual Move-In Day on Saturday, August 27. Residential students moved in to the college's residence hall, the Student Village, with the help of volunteers from the campus community. A total of 360 students live in the residence hall.

"On behalf of the entire SUNY Broome community, I offer a warm welcome to our resident students who help make campus such a vibrant place to live and learn," said SUNY Broome President Kevin E. Drumm.

"It's hard to believe that it's been three years since our Student Village first opened. We have been full every semester, including a wait list," he continued. "Our resident students add so much to campus life, and benefit in turn by being fully immersed in the college experience."

The \$18.2 million Student Village opened for the first time in Fall 2014 and continues to draw interest from prospective students. Once beds are filled, students are entered onto a wait list for future openings. The facility is owned by the nonprofit BCC Housing Development Corporation, which was created by the Broome Community College Foundation. State law prohibits community colleges from owning their own residence halls.

SUNY Broome's Housing Office is headed by director Amy Zieziula. Two Residence Directors – Jarvis McCowin, who joined SUNY Broome last year and Brittany Washington, new this fall – live in the building, and oversee 10 Resident Assistants who live on each floor.

Move-In Day is also the start of Welcome Week, a series of events for both residential and commuter students. The week will feature information booths and other help to get students on track for the semester as well as a variety of fun activities.

Classes begin Aug. 29.

### Men of Excellence: Conference tackles tough issues of race, stereotypes and success

Dr. Carlos Medina will never forget Sister Hortencia.

He was in fourth grade at a Brooklyn Catholic School. His mother and father had working-class roots in Puerto Rico and moved to the city in the 1940s, although his father passed away when Medina was only five. He was being raised by his hard-working seamstress mother and his grandmother, both of whom instilled the value of education – even though the latter was illiterate.

He was in high spirits that school day and slow to join the line of children, perhaps a little too busy fooling around.

"Carlos, you ain't ever going to be anything in your life," the nun snarled.

After all these years, the words stuck with him, still lodged in his heart. They could have derailed many a young student, leaving them in a spiral of self-defeat.

"I chose instead to take it as a challenge," Medina told the audience at the college's first Men of Excellence Conference. "I decided to prove her wrong."

It's a conundrum faced by many young men of color. Judged negatively due to stereotypes, they enter the academic world – only to feel that they don't belong. They face classrooms where there are few other black or brown men, either as students or instructors. As a result, they may lack confidence – and abandon their educational dreams.

On Aug. 26, SUNY Broome held its first-ever Men of Excellence Conference to address the needs of male students of color on our campus. Sponsored by the President's Task Force on Diversity and Inclusion, the student-oriented conference launched a year-long program that will focus on providing SUNY Broome's men of color with intensive academic, professional and social support. The conference, which had an earlier session on Wednesday night, included students, faculty and staff.

"Community colleges are supposed to be about inclusion from our inception, whereas higher education was initially about exclusion," said SUNY Broome President Kevin E. Drumm. While the student population has become more diverse through the years, Dr. Drumm acknowledged that the lack of minorities among faculty and staff ranks continues to be a challenge, but one the college is willing to confront.

Discussing diversity and particularly race in today's heated political environment can be especially difficult, he noted.

"These issues we are talking about are among the toughest we will tackle," he said.

#### A numerical gap

Statistically speaking, both black and Hispanic men are under-represented when it comes to earning college degrees. Approximately 27 percent of black men and 34 percent of Hispanic men will earn their college degree, compared to 85 percent of whites and 60 percent of Asians, according to statistics provided by Carlton Goode, founder of Building African American Males (BAAM), which seeks to foster the academic, personal and social success of young collegiate men of color.

The African-American community also has the largest gender gap in educational attainment. In 2005, 35.8 percent of African-American men were enrolled, compared to 64.2 percent of African-American women, Goode said.

In addition to dealing with persistent stereotypes pertaining to race, a student may find himself to be the only person of color in a classroom – leading him to question whether he truly belongs, Goode said. To mask feelings of doubt and insecurity, students may adopt the "cool pose" with an attitude of nonchalance that can be considered rude or defiant. This coping mechanism isn't intended to be rude, but is rather a way for students to keep their dignity, Goode

explained.

To succeed, students need to foster self-esteem, self-efficiency or a belief in their own capacity to achieve, and grit – an attitude of stick-to-it-iveness that will see them through every obstacle. Studies have shown that grit helps determine success, even more than test scores or other measures, Goode said.

"According to the stereotypes, you're not supposed to be here. But you are here because you have got that grit," he told students.

Students can also need a helping hand early in the process, such as having mentors help them apply for their first internship or show them how to study. His example: a former student of his named Jarvis McCowin, who put off applying for internships. One day, Goode sat down with Jarvis to help him complete an application – which the student then received. In semesters to come, Jarvis applied for and arranged his own internships as a far afield as Ghana.

If the name sounds familiar, that's because Jarvis – who went on to graduate school – is one of the college's two Residence Hall Directors and a mentor to young men of color himself.

MCowin asked five students what they most wanted the SUNY Broome community to know about young men of color. Their stories were varied, and sometimes deeply sad: One lost his mother shortly before he came to school; another was a widower and single father from Atlanta who lost his wife and youngest child. Students described themselves as apt to smile and laugh, despite what can seem like a stern demeanor, nervous despite an outer show of confidence and driven to succeed.

"We are not aggressive thugs as people think we are," one student said.

#### Keynote speaker

Dr. Carlos Medina did defy Sister Hortencia's expectations — through long years of hard work. He became the first Latino vice chancellor in the history of the SUNY system and is also SUNY's Chief Diversity Officer, one of only a handful to hold the position within higher education nationally. A graduate of both SUNY Cortland and Cornell University, he was also a national champion in karate, as well as the father of two sons.

While a quarter of SUNY's student population consists of minorities, the system still has a long way to go before reaching equity. Medina pointed to his own bittersweet identity as the system's first Hispanic vice chancellor: a proud achievement, to be sure, but rather late in SUNY's nearly 70-year history. There are currently no Hispanic college presidents in the system, he added.

The vice chancellor stressed that programs such as Men of Excellence ultimately benefit all students by establishing needed services and opportunities. "What's good for students in need is good for all students," he said.

He counseled students not to be afraid of asking for help, to challenge themselves and to stick with others who are trying to improve their lives. Understand that success doesn't come easy, and failure can be part of the learning process.

"The harder the journey, I think, the greater the prize," he said.

#### Rap sessions

In addition to talks by Goode and Medina, other conference events included a student rap session that provided a safe space to discuss issues of masculinity, community and self-worth, as well as sessions for students on etiquette, the transition to college and SUNY Broome's many resources. Faculty and staff sessions included a discussion led by SUNY Broome alumna Lea Webb of Webb Consulting and Brian Rowland of Visionary Leadership on how to support Men of Excellence, as well as the creation of culturally inclusive classrooms.

Participating students received certificates of completion and took an oath of excellence.

Conversations sometimes veered into difficulty territory - but that was part of the point, organizers noted.

"Sometimes you learn something that makes you uncomfortable," Executive Vice President and Chief Academic Officer Francis Battisti said. "That's when the real learning takes place."

### Success and Beyond: Highlights of the Fall 2016 Faculty Staff Assembly

August 25, 2016 Categories: Focus on Accomplishments



It's time to chill out, to dial things back a little. Well, sort of.

If you count a completely renovated Mechanical Building with a manufacturing center, the new Carnegie Center for Culinary Arts, a county economic development building and a future controlled environment agricultural facility as "kicking back," that is. Oh, and future academic programs in culinary arts and aircraft maintenance, participation in the Achieving the Dream initiative and a geothermal system that will save an estimated \$200,000 to \$300,000 in energy costs — not to mention the continued emphasis on student success.



Slowing down is relative!

In this case, "dialing it back" means working on the many initiatives in the campus' ongoing transformation - still an exceptionally busy endeavor.

"I think this might be a good time to slow down a little bit," SUNY Broome President Kevin E. Drumm said during the Fall 2016 Faculty Staff Assembly, as Simon & Garfunkel's "The 59<sup>th</sup> Street Bridge Song" cheerily played in the background. "We have got enough major initiatives in the hopper to keep us busy for a couple years."

A long-standing tradition, the Faculty Staff Assembly provided a chance to welcome faculty and staff back to campus, celebrate the previous year's accomplishments and set the course for the new year. New hires and promotions were announced and celebrated, and retirees honored for their service.

This year's theme was "Student Success: Looking Beyond," which built upon the <u>Imagine Success</u> initiative presented in Spring 2015.

"It's always about learning: the learning that takes place in the classroom and the learning that takes place outside of the classroom," Executive Vice President and Chief Academic Officer Francis Battisti said as he discussed the college's values.

#### **Achieving the Dream and Academic Initiatives**

Among the highlights: The college's <u>Periodic Review Report</u> was fully accepted by Middle States. SUNY Broome also has become part of <u>Achieving the Dream</u> (ATD), a network of approximately 200 community colleges dedicating to improve student success. To become an Achieving the Dream (ATD) College, applicants must demonstrate an institution-wide commitment to spend at least three years working with the organization's experts to implement measures designed to improve student success and completion rates.

SUNY Broome represents a bit of an experiment for the initiative, which typically deals with institutions struggling with completion rates. The college's own success rates are above average; 31 percent of students graduate within three years, compared to 19 percent of community colleges nationally, noted Dr. Battisti.

While the college always aims to improve completion outcomes, SUNY Broome will give ATD the opportunity to look at transfer opportunities and initiatives for the first time. In turn, involvement in the initiative will allow SUNY Broome to develop a logical framework for the many student success initiatives already on campus, bringing them into a cohesive whole, Dr. Drumm said.

This summer, a team of campus leaders attended the ATD Kick-Off Institute in Phoenix, Arizona, which drove home the importance of evidence-based decision-making on all levels and thoughtful analysis of performance gaps, among other issues. The first year of the initiative will include a six- to eightmonth planning period, culminating in an action plan in Spring 2017. Two teams are being formed to lead the Achieving Success initiatives: the Core Team and the Data Team, which will work collaboratively to achieve goals, said Staff Associate for Student Success Heather Darrow, who has assumed a lead role with Professor Gian Roma in implementing the college's ATD process.

"Our students don't behave in isolation," said Roma, noting the importance of interaction at all levels of campus operations. "When our students interact with us, they form connections."

#### Renovations, new buildings and green energy

In his seven years at the helm of the college, President Drumm has overseen a massive transformation of college facilities. Those changes will continue over the next few years, including projects that are a part of the state's <u>Upstate Revitalization Initiative (URI)</u>, which will bring \$500 million of state investment to the region.

On the green energy front, the college has received a \$1 million grant from the New York State Energy Research and Development Authority (NYSERDA) to build a <u>Geothermal Learning Laboratory</u> that will not only show students how the underground system harnesses energy stored in the earth, but save a surprising amount of money – an estimated \$200,000 to \$300,000 a year in energy costs.

"That \$1 million gift is the equivalent of getting a \$5 million endowment," Dr. Drumm said of the system, which will be installed under the Quad and heat the Mechanical Building and the Business Building.

The Mechanical Building – one of the oldest on campus – will be completely renovated, and include an advanced manufacturing center as well as amenities for agri-business and food technology. Work is expected to begin in June 2017 and be completed by July 2018, according to Director of Campus Operations Phil Testa. The Broome Community College Foundation has agreed to provide a \$3.4 million grant for this project, using funds from the \$11.5 million estate gift from the late Emil Calice; the award included a stipulation that funds could be used for an academic building on campus, as well as student scholarships, according to Foundation Executive Director Cathy Williams.

Another future campus development is <u>The Agency's new economic and business development center</u> for Broome County, which will rise on what is now a parking area near the intersection of Upper Front Street with Lt. Van Winkle Drive. The lot that was, until recently, 901 Front Street will then be turned into a parking area so that the campus doesn't lose a significant number of spaces once the new facility opens.

SUNY Broome will also have its own downtown campus with the creation of the new Carnegie Center for Culinary Arts at the historic former Binghamton Public Library. The new space will provide an advanced learning environment for the college's planned Culinary Arts Program, as well as hands-on experience for the existing Hospitality and Events Management programs. A groundbreaking is scheduled for Sept. 29, with work expected to begin in April 2017; completion is slated for August 2018.

A short distance away in downtown Binghamton, the <u>Southern Tier High Technology Incubator</u> is slated to open in the spring. The \$19 million project includes \$6 million in NYSUNY 2020 funding allocated to SUNY Broome for the creation of the SUNY Bridge to Entrepreneurial Excellence (SUNY-BEE), which will nurture a vibrant start-up community for student-led ventures. SUNY-BEE will be located on the building's top floor.

The college is also looking forward to a future project that will involve both Binghamton University and Cornell. The controlled environment agriculture project would be developed on campus through the URI, and draw on the region's importance as a "food hub," President Drumm said.

"The Southern Tier is a major food hub for the entire state," he pointed out. "There are 200 farms in the Southern Tier."

Collaboration, he emphasized, is a major component in the completion of these and many other college and community initiatives.

"We have to be a big team to help serve our students and our community every day," he said.

### Celebrating successes and looking forward to the future

A Resident Assistant in the Student Village, Seth finally has a place to practice his voice lessons: a trio of sorely needed sound-proof practice rooms, which were installed this summer in the <u>Campus Services Building</u>.

The assembly also showcased other campus initiatives and student excellence. Formerly the periodicals room, The <u>Gallery @ SUNY Broome</u> has hosted multiple exhibits of faculty, staff, student and community artwork throughout the year in a professional quality space, noted Library Director Robin Petrus. In the rear of the room, attendees were treated to a mini-exhibit of exceptional artwork by SUNY Broome students, with the promise of more to come throughout the year.

To encourage students to become involved in campus events and clubs, Student Activities is developing co-curricular transcripts that will document student involvement. Available through the Swarm system, this record will remain accessible to students even after they graduate, allowing them to draw on the information when working on resumes and other documentation of leadership experiences, Student Activities Director Jason Boring said.

Located in the Applied Technologies building, the Applied Learning Center will link students with learning opportunities outside the classroom, and have a grand opening sometime this fall. Research has blossomed on campus, with students <u>presenting their work at state</u> and <u>even professional conferences</u>. Pouring rain and the prospect of an unknown chemical couldn't deter students from honing their skills in the <u>Mock Environmental Disaster Drill</u>, which involved more than 322 students from a variety of departments, as well as Broome County Hazmat, the Broome and Tioga county health departments and the Chenango Fire Company.

SUNY's Collaborative Online International Learning (COIL) initiative has brought the larger world into the classroom by connecting professors from different nations. Students in different countries also work together in COIL courses, learning more about each other's culture. COIL will also spark a visit from October 12 to 14 of two Mexican professors, Roberto Orozco Bush and Juan Manuel Lozano de Poo, who will have the opportunity to meet different constituencies on campus.

In additional to virtual visits, SUNY Broome takes students overseas in real time, including this year's trip to Costa Rica that included ziplining, a dip into a tropical waterfall, monkeys, sloths – and plenty of poisonous snakes and other critters, including a scorpion in the rafters at one nightly accommodation, Professor Victor Lamoureaux recounted wryly.

SUNY Broome students, faculty and the general public can also experience natural beauty closer to home – in the campus' own Natural Areas. The college has 125 acres, including 3.8 miles of trails. New developments include an "adventure walkway" made with recycled tires and information kiosks; weekly walks and other events are planned to take advantage of this natural space.

It is important that attendance is posted accurately and on time. When attendance is not posted accurately, or on time, financial aid could be disbursed to students who should not be receiving it. Reporting official course attendance, including for the purpose of financial aid funding, is determined by a student's academic participation in the course.

Official course attendance is defined by any of the following activities:

- \* Physically attending a class where there is an opportunity for direct interaction between the instructor and students
- \* Submitting an academic assignment
- \* Taking an exam, an interactive tutorial, or computer-assisted instruction
- \* Attending a study group that is assigned by the institution
- \* Participating in an online discussion about academic matters

\* Initiating contact with a faculty member to ask a question about the academic subject studied in the course

Official attendance does not include logging into an online class without active participation.





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#### Bang! An old building crumbles to make way for the new

With a metallic creak, the excavator inched toward the last wall standing. With a flick of the bucket, the bricks crashed into the ground – marking the official end of 901 Front Street.

At the controls sat SUNY Broome President Kevin E. Drumm, complete with a Go Pro-bedecked hard hat to film the wall as it fell.

"That was fun!" he said after hopping out of the cab. "I think I know what I'm going to do in semi-retirement."

Frequently used as swing space during campus moves, 901 Front Street actually predated the rest of SUNY Broome's Dickinson campus – and showed its age. Broome Tech, as it was then called, opened its Upper Front Street campus in 1956. The move was prompted by a massive fire on Labor Day in 1951 that demolished the college's original home at the former armory in downtown Binghamton.

The building is being demolished to make way for The Agency's new economic and business development center for Broome County, although not directly; the new center will rise on what is now a parking area near the intersection of Upper Front Street with Lt. Van Winkle Drive. The lot that was 901 Front Street will then be turned into a parking area so that the campus doesn't lose a significant number of spaces once the new facility is open.

The center will house The Agency (formerly called the Broome County IDA), the Alliance for Manufacturing & Technology, the Greater Binghamton Chamber of Commerce, the National Development Council, the NY Business Development Corporation and Visions Federal Credit Union. This will greatly enhance the college's Continuing Education workforce development activities and applied learning programs for students.

Since the college's inception, SUNY Broome has maintained solid relationships with area economic development groups. The center will allow the campus community to benefit from these relationships, while fostering the region's recruitment and retention of businesses and industry.

"It will provide a lot of opportunity for our students and our faculty to be involved even more with economic development than we are already," President Drumm said.





- 3. **Stay hydrated my friends.** Water is the best way to stay hydrated. Reach for water instead of sugar-sweetened beverages like soda and sports drinks, which add extra calories with little nutritional value. Plain water too boring? Try sparkling water or add fruit wedges to jazz it up.
- 4. **Put down the double bacon cheeseburger.** It sounds like a delicious option after that all-nighter you pulled, but your heart won't be happy with you. Instead, reach for a grilled turkey burger piled high with veggies like avocado, tomato, onions and lettuce. In other words, choose lean cuts of meat and poultry without skin and with extra fat removed. Opt for grilled, baked, broiled, poached or roasted (we promise, it'll still taste delish!)
- 5. **Something sounds fishy!** We're talking about that deep-fried, breaded basket that you took in the cafeteria line. Instead, try baked, broiled or grilled fish (especially the oily kind, like salmon or trout) twice a week.
- 6. **Slow down there, slugger.** Let's just say, drink in moderation. Alcohol contains a lot of empty calories and can have other negative effects on your health. The American Heart Association recommends no more than one drink per day for women and two drinks per day for men. Tiny umbrella optional.
- 7. **Stuff your face!** With healthy snacks, that is! In between classes and studying, it's sometimes hard to find healthy options. So when you need a bite, stuff your face with fresh fruits and veggies, unsalted nuts and seeds, and low-fat whole-grain crackers.
- 8. **Strike a (yoga) pose.** Put down the cupcake and fight your stress without food. If you're feeling overwhelmed, try yoga, take a walk, go to the gym or call friends or family. Remember, you're allowed to take breaks from studying in order to recharge.
- 9. **We like to move it, move it.** Cue the dance music, lace up those running shoes or grab a Frisbee. No matter how you like to move it (move it!), maintaining weight is about burning the same amount of calories as you consume. Developing a regular exercise routine (at least 30 minutes a day, 5 days a week) is the best way to burn additional calories and manage stress.
- 10. **Take your phone out.** No, not to tweet. To check your portions. One of the easiest pitfalls for college students is all-you-can- eat cafeterias. Portion control can help you keep track of the foods you are consuming without going overboard. For instance, a serving of chicken breast (3 ounces) is about the size of a smart phone and a medium banana is about the size of a pencil. 



# Dream big: SUNY Broome/Excelsior partnership lets students earn bachelor's and beyond at home

This summer, 38 SUNY Broome alumni achieved their next educational milestone: a bachelor's degree or even a master's through Excelsior College.


While the accredited, nonprofit institution is based in Albany, students don't need to hop onto Interstate 88 and head to the state capital. Instead, students in the SUNY Broome and Excelsior College partnership program take most of their coursework toward their bachelor's degree at SUNY Broome, finishing their degrees online.

The program has received national notice. <u>College Factual</u>, an informational site that ranks colleges and universities, recently <u>listed Albany-based Excelsior</u> <u>College</u> as the top school for non-traditional students.

"I made it through within two years. I did it!" said Katie Magda, who earned her Bachelor's of Science in Business.

Twelve of the 38 graduates did make the trip to Albany for Excelsior's graduation ceremony. Overall, graduates' majors included business, nursing, psychology, healthcare management, criminal justice, health science, liberal arts and social science with a concentration in human services. Many also balanced full-time jobs and parenting with their pursuit of a degree.

"Dream big! This program's flexibility made my dreams easier to reach," said Nicole Paugh, who earned a Bachelor's of Science in Business and received the \$1,000 Phi Thea Kappa scholarship through Excelsior. "Flexible schedules work for single moms!"

Paugh also made a buddy along the way: fellow SUNY Broome and Exelsior graduate Samantha Potter. Potter, who works full-time in the SUNY Broome Registrar's Office, decided to pursue her Bachelor's in General Business after a three-year break after learning that college alumni receive discounted tuition.

Originally nervous about online courses, Potter ultimately grew to prefer them. She met Paugh in a SUNY Broome class and the two pushed each other to succeed.

"If I was feeling unmotivated or letting my procrastination habit get the best of me, she got me back on track," Potter said. "She was my academic rock as I was forced to cope with a devastating family tragedy only two weeks into our final and most difficult trimester."

Potter is considering another return to the college classroom: this time to pursue her MBA. Tracy Brown, who earned a Bachelor's of Science in Healthcare Management in December, is on the same path and just completed her first class toward a Master's in Health Science with a Public Health concentration.

"Forget regret, or life is yours to miss," counsels Stephanie Jump, who earned a Bachelor's of Science in Psychology in just a year and a half, after her SUNY Broome credits transferred to Excelsior. A stay-at-home mom when she started, she scheduled homework and studying around her son's naptimes. The flexible schedule also proved a blessing when she returned to work part-time.

"I would definitely recommend this program to anyone who is thinking about trying it," she said.

Like Stephanie, Stacy Knapp appreciated the flexible course schedule. As a mother of five children who works full-time, this flexibility allowed her to complete her Bachelor of Science degree in Business, with a concentration in accounting.

She read on her lunch breaks and completed course assignments whenever she had a spare moment.

"Despite needing to have two surgeries during this time period, I was still able to complete my online class requirements and not miss a beat," Knapp said.

Stacy, too, is looking toward the future and is now working toward a Master's degree in her field.

"I am very thankful for the professors at Broome and the start they gave me," she said.



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### Drop the Beat: SUNY Broome alum finds a career in sound engineering

You never know what you're going to get in a recording studio: an up-and-coming hiphop artist. A 13-member a cappella ensemble. A string quartet. R&B queen Faith Evans, dropping by to record her single "He Is" – later nominated for a Grammy.

SUNY Broome graduate Juan Peña has worked as a sound engineer for all of the above – including Faith Evans. And that includes work on "He Is," for which he received a certificate from the National Academy of Recording Arts & Sciences.

"I was stoked. I was thinking, 'Wow, that's crazy," said the 2011 graduate of SUNY Broome's Music Program, with a focus on sound engineering.

These days, Peña works in New York City, one of the nation's three hubs for the music industry. (The others, if you're wondering, are Los Angeles and Nashville.) His interest in the music industry started closer to his childhood home of Owego, where he was the drummer for a Binghamton-area rock band called Freaks of the Forest.

To save money, the band wanted to record their own music. Peña enrolled at SUNY Broome and learned the ins and outs of the recording process, honing his skills by running the college's sound-engineering lab.

"I was always trying to find time to bring my band in," Peña remembered. "That helped me learn a bunch of stuff. I got deeper into it."

Ultimately, Peña chose a career in sound engineering over the remote prospect of making it big as a rock drummer. He enrolled in SUNY Purchase, where he earned a bachelor's of music with a focus in studio production, and began working in the industry while finishing his degree.

As his skill level grew, he moved from general assistant to assistant engineer at Bad Boy Entertainment, and then landed an audio engineer position at Area 51 NYC Recording Studios and, later, Downtown Music Studios in Soho, where he works today. Over the past few years, he has worked with a variety of clients, including Justin Bieber, Wyclef Jean, Sean "Diddy" Combs, Black Rob, Machine Gun Kelly, Lil Kim, French Montana, Macklemore and many others – such as those string ensembles and a cappella groups.

"I often think back on the sound engineering program at SUNY Broome and realize how it laid the foundation for the place where I find myself today," he said in an email to Dean of Liberal Arts Michael Kinney, who helped create the college's sound engineering program.

He's continuing to hone his skills. Certain ones can be only learned in the studio – namely the fine art of dealing with the many personalities found in the arts. (Faith Evans, as it turns out, was quite friendly.)

"I'd love to get a Grammy someday," he said. "That would be amazing."



#### Zika Alert

The outbreak of Zika that has spread through Central and South America, Mexico, and parts of the Caribbean has reached the United States mainland, with four locally-transmitted cases reported in Florida on Friday. In addition,1,817 travel associated cases of Zika have been reported in the continental U.S., 491 of which are in New York State. With this in mind and many with travel plans or family traveling for the remainder of the summer, we wanted to share information on the disease and some precautions. The following offers actions that can be taken and links to other resources which may help.

#### Precautions when traveling in affected areas:

- Use Environmental Protection Agency (EPA)-registered insect repellents containing one of these active ingredients: DEET, picaridin, IR3535, or oil of lemon eucalyptus or para-menthane-diol
- Wear long-sleeved shirts and long pants
- Wear clothing and gear treated with permethrin that will provide an added layer of protection
- Lightweight, loose fitting clothing during the warmer months. When wearing longer sleeves and pants, take additional steps to prevent <a href="heat-related illnesses">heat-related illnesses</a> (for example, drink additional water and take rest breaks)

If you are teaching any classes this summer, please read the following message.






