Calice Advanced Manufacturing Center

- Blacktop paving on the west and north sides of Calice has been completed (pavers to follow)
- Installation of the epoxy floor in both the Fermentation Lab and Food Processing Lab has been completed
- The ceiling grid is 90% complete in the first floor corridor and lighting has been mounted
- VCT (vinyl) flooring and painting has been completed in the basement storage room (soon to become the new photography lab)
- HVAC start up and balancing will take place on June 29, 2018
- Surface mounted lighting has been placed under the overhang within the Connector
- Construction of the east vestibule for the Connector has started
- The new elevator has been delivered and installation will commence
- Door auto operators have been installed
- Glass has been installed at the sidelights on the first level
- Commissioning of the photovoltaic system has taken place
- The Fire Department connection is in place

- The basement concrete floor has been removed
- Excavation exposing the foundation is in progress (for underpinning construction)
- The rear addition to the Library has been completely removed
- Overall demolition is approximately 90% complete

Hardcore Hospitality: Nicole learns more than she expected while pursuing her degree

Nicole Grover didn't expect to learn as much as she did in her college classes.

She has worked for years in the hospitality industry, and has a certificate in culinary arts from the Indiana University of Pennsylvania Academy of Culinary Arts. A dual major in Hotel and Restaurant Management and Event Management, she decided to improve her career advancement opportunities by earning a college degree, and opted for SUNY Broome.

"I feel like it takes both experience and a degree," she said of her decision to head back to school. "This program gives you a lot of experience to go with it. You're not just getting a piece of paper, but a lot of knowledge as well."

She attends SUNY Broome part-time, juggling her classes with a demanding schedule at Guthrie Robert Packer Hospital, where she supervises the kitchen and oversees all catering events. In fact, the operation caters multiple events daily, ranging from a few people at meetings to the annual Guthrie summer picnic with a crowd of 1,500.

As with many jobs in the hospitality industry, hours can vary widely, which can make juggling classes and homework difficult. In addition to working with her boss on schedule adjustments, Grover also opts to take as many online courses as she can to give herself flexibility. So far, she has taken online courses in college writing, hotel and restaurant cost control, and even an internship. (For that last, the internship is in-person, but the coursework is done online.)

Still, she enjoys the hands-on nature of her on-campus courses, including wedding planning, catering and even Food in History and Society, which she didn't initially think she would enjoy.

"So far, I've enjoyed all of my classes. The professor that does food and history was really awesome, a little old school. I learned more than I thought I was going to learn – how food becomes a thing, how coffee became popular, the beginning of Coke products," she reflected. "I came out with something I didn't think I was going to. Even in the catering class, I learned things I haven't learned in the industry."

Hospitality Programs Chair Rey Wojdat and Event Management Professor Maria Montemagno are also "hardcore" – tough professors who demand the best from their students, Grover said. While not every student may appreciate this, the program's rigor and high standards can only help once students graduate and enter the industry, which is also demanding and fast-paced.

But that's part of the reason Nicole Grover loves the hospitality industry.


"I love the ever-changing nature of it – the changing trends, the diet trends, how catering events are set up, planning an event, customer service," she said.

Now 30 years old, she's not entirely sure where her SUNY Broome education will take her – and that's okay. That, too, is the nature of the hospitality business.

"In this industry, there are so many things you can do. You can change your mind in five years and master something else," she said.

Healthy habits start early: American Heart Association donates play equipment to BC Center

It didn't take long for the bats, balls and jump ropes to leave their big red sack, and end up in the hands of some very excited tykes.

On June 25, the American Heart Association presented the "recess pack" to the <u>BC Center</u> on the SUNY Broome campus. The licensed childcare center serves the children of SUNY Broome students, as well as faculty, staff and community members.

"We want these kids to go outside, get active and play," said AHA Regional Director Gina Chapman, as the center's young charges jumped rope and played Wiffle ball on the playground behind the daycare.

The donation of outdoor play equipment came by way of SUNY Broome's designation as a Children's Health Challenge winner following the Southern Tier Heart Walk, which took place in April on campus.

more for the Southern Tier Heart Walk in 2018 than in the previous year. Challenge accepted, challenge completed: The SUNY Broome team raised \$6,486 in 2018, up from \$3,320 in 2017. Overall, the walk raised more than \$268,000 in donations from the community this year.

"Our team was really energized this entire year," said Professor Carla Michalak, speaking on behalf of the campus committee that organizes the campus' Heart Walk efforts.

Fundraising events include a volleyball game that pitted students against faculty and staff, a t-shirt sale that netted \$2,000, a carnation sale, and a basketball game organized by Professor Ed Yetsko's Sports Management students. Committee leaders Deena Price and Erin O'Hara-Leslie were instrumental in this year's success, as well as Jeff Hatala, who played a major role in coordinating the sport events.

The Heart Walk effort also coordinates well with the college's Wellness Challenge, which encourages healthy habits and physical fitness, Michalak said.

She added that the SUNY Broome community also deeply supports the work of the BC Center, which enables student parents to attend class and study while their children enjoy high-quality and affordable child care right on campus.


Making physical activity a habit early in life is important for long-term health outcomes. Studies show that children who are overweight by the age of 12 have a 70 percent chance of staying overweight as an adult – a risk factor for heart disease, Chapman noted.

The BC Center makes an effort to instill a love of movement and keep the children active.

"We try to get them outside every day, no matter the weather," Director Pam Holland said.



Purchasing cutoff for fiscal year 2018

Reminder: June 29, 2018, has been established as the cutoff date for purchasing

(encumbering funds) for Fiscal Year '18.

Please review your department's needs for all items, services, and travel expenses anticipated through the remainder of Fiscal Year '18, and place orders via the requisition/PO process no later than Friday, June 29.

This means **all** anticipated purchases of goods, services and travel expenses using both **college operating** and **grant funding** occurring between now and Aug. 31 must be encumbered and approved by June 29. To accomplish this, requisitions will need to be created and approved at the department level by June 29, 2018. Items on these orders should be received no later than Aug. 15.

To ensure a balanced budget, only critical and essential items will be approved for the period remaining in this fiscal year.

Existing Standing Orders will be good for placing orders through July 31. Items ordered on a Standing Order should be received no later than Aug. 15.

Some items may require significant lead times and departments should plan accordingly.

Items or services received on or prior to Aug. 31, 2018, must be expensed against your FY'18 budget.

Your department's budget may be viewed using the Budget Query function in Banner. The SUNY Broome Purchasing Guidelines are available in Banner Self Service on the Finance tab for easy reference. However, please do not hesitate to call Purchasing at x5196 or x5225 for assistance or questions; we look forward to helping you with your purchases.

The FY'19 budget will open on or about Aug. 21, 2018.

Please remember that all orders must be placed via the requisition/purchase order process. Orders may not be called or faxed in.







A life in art: SUNY Broome hosts Michael Tanzer exhibit, accepts donated painting

The scene has a slight haze to it, perhaps from the summer heat. The Susquehanna River flows lazily under the Exchange Street bridge, leafed-out trees and the sky reflected in its surface. The occasional car travels the road beside the river, as rooftops shine in the sunlight.

Michael Tanzer preserved this Binghamton landscape from the 1970s in a 6-foot by 8-foot oil painting. And now, it's been added to SUNY Broome's permanent collection – a fitting tribute for a beloved artist and professor, who taught Asian art history and studio painting from 1991 until his death from cancer.

"While Michael Tanzer passed away in 2000 – all too soon – his legacy continues in his art, his curiosity and his enthusiasm and generosity," said Executive Vice President and Chief Academic Officer Francis Battisti. "He truly made a difference in the world of art and beyond, and touched the lives of many of our students and alumni."

Conrad and Lorna Steigerwald, SUNY Broome alumni and avid collectors of Tanzer's work, donated the oil painting to the college. Aided by Dr. Battisti, the Steigerwalds pulled off the black sheet veiling the piece during the opening of an exhibit of Tanzer's work in the Gallery @ SUNY Broome on June 8.

A native of the Bronx, Michael Tanzer had a deep love of art in all its manifestations. He studied for a year and a half at the prestigious Frank Reilly School of Art in New York, and worked in a variety of media, from oil painting to ceramics, screen prints and etchings. He once dreamed of covering the City of Binghamton in murals – which, in fact, the Binghamton landscape painting might once have been.

His family came to the area in the 1970s – which was when the landscape painting was made and, coincidentally, when his family met the Steigenwalds. Michael Tanzer taught painting and drawing at the Roberson center in the 1970s and 1980s, before joining the Fine Arts faculty at SUNY Broome. He also taught in many other settings, including a minimum-security prison for young men, public school classrooms and his own studio, where he invited students and other artists to join him.

"It always struck me how engaging he was and how he really welcomed questions about his work," said Dr. Battisti, who observed several of Tanzer's classes.

His art explored a variety of subject matter, from classical nudes, street life and tattoos to Franz Kafka and Asian themes. SUNY Broome has two other Tanzer paintings in its possession: A scene with a dancing bear mounted in Titchener Hall, and another of jugglers along the Susquehanna River that is part of the Gallery exhibit.

"He had an obsession with performers. He loved sideshows, he loved freaks, he loved outcasts," his son, Ben Tanzer, explained to visitors during the exhibit opening.

His focus, however, wasn't to expose or mock. At its core was a commitment to social justice, particularly to peace in the Middle East, but also to the marginalized everywhere. In a way, that was also at the core of his dedication to a community college, which democratizes education and makes it available to all.

"For him, the idea was for everyone to have a voice. Seeing all the work hand together, you see so much how he wanted the oppressed and those who aren't seen and those who aren't heard to have a place in the world," Ben Tanzer reflected at the exhibit reception.

A Binghamton landscape

The Steigerwalds theorize that the Binghamton landscape painting may have been originally commissioned as a mural, perhaps at Binghamton General Hospital before entering private hands. But that's just a theory; all the Steigerwalds know is that the painting had been part of a private collection before it ended up in the Mapes auction house and, after bidding, in their home.

"It is truly a Binghamton landscape. He memorialized Binghamton forever and ever," Lorna Steigerwald said.

But a painting of that size can't be displayed in a house, at least not in such a way to do it justice. Conrad suggested donating it to SUNY Broome, Binghamton University or WSKG. The college where he inspired countless students seemed the best fit.

"Mike taught here. He loved to teach here," Conrad said.

"His students loved him," Lorna added.

"And he loved the students," her husband said.

While the college is still finalizing a home for the painting, the hope is that it will adorn the new Paul and Mary Calice and Mildred Barton Advanced Manufacturing Center when it opens this fall, Dr. Battisti said.

Designing the future: Abigail finds a new career path in Civil Engineering Technology

Abigail Hogan did all the right things, but she wanted a different future.

She attended SUNY Oneonta right after high school, earning a bachelor's degree in biology in 2016. That summer, she took a job running environmental tests with Broome County's engineering department. While there, she worked alongside the engineering interns and found herself intrigued by their jobs. A future spent running lab tests just didn't draw the same interest as the prospect of design.

So, she headed back to college – this time to SUNY Broome, where she earned a degree in Civil Engineering Technology in just one year.

"I loved it! It was awesome," Hogan said of the program, which she graduated in May 2017. "Joe DeAngelo did a great job allowing people to graduate on time or earlier. He and all the other professors did a great job of allowing us to get our degree done on time."

She took classes during Winter Term, and loaded up on courses during the fall and spring semesters to finish in a single year. After graduating, she landed a job in the City of Binghamton's engineering department, where you can find her in the field, dealing with construction inspections and related work.

She is also pursuing her four-year degree in Civil Engineering Technology through Old Dominion University, where she takes online courses.

"I really like anything environmental. It might sound a little weird, but I really like rainwater and stormwater," Hogan said of her interests. "I want to get into that, doing design work. Engineering was a good way to pursue that. Engineering gives you the opportunity to express your ideas more."

A pipeline to rewarding careers

SUNY Broome's Engineering Technologies programs are among the college's oldest, dating back to the 1947 opening of Binghamton's Institute of Applied Arts and Sciences, one of five such institutes and the forerunner to the community college system. The programs are both academically rigorous and hands-on, and students spend approximately half their time working in the field in addition to classroom time spent learning theory and concepts.

Another benefit: The program has an enviable 100 percent employment rate for students transitioning to the work world. Many local companies and the state Department of Transportation also provide Tech students with internship and summer job opportunities that can also ultimately lead to employment.

Abigail said she and other students learned about employment opportunities regularly while at SUNY Broome.

"It was definitely a lot better than when I was coming out of Oneonta. I think this program does an awesome job of getting people jobs," she said.

While she was initially nervous about being one of the few women in the field, she soon discovered that she had little cause to be worried. Contractors are eager to work with you and help you develop knowledge of the field, she found.

"I think it gives you a lot more opportunity than a typical two-year degree will give you," she said of the CET program. "People are very willing to help you."

If she has any regrets, maybe there is just one: that she didn't go to SUNY Broome first. Her father had wanted her to attend her local community college first, but she preferred to go away for school.

"This definitely would have been a better option, coming here. I probably wouldn't have wasted a couple of years and thousands of dollars," she reflected.



Health for Haiti update: Clean water changes everything

The World Health Organization estimates that hundreds of millions of people in the world do not have access to clean water, and that every year over a half million people die from diseases related to drinking dirty water.

Since March 2015, SUNY Broome's <u>Health for Haiti</u> program has been providing clean drinking water for hundreds of families in Grande Saline, Haiti. This clean water effort has been a true collaboration between Health for Haiti and the community in Grande Saline.

For this community, the local river is the only source of water. The Health for Haiti water system filters the water from the local river, making it safe to drink. The system was donated by the Pall Corporation in Cortland, New York, and ongoing technical support is provided by their engineers (assisted by <u>SUNY Broome students</u>). Clean water means better health for the families living in this cholera-affected area.

Last week, more than 14,400 gallons of safe drinking water were distributed to families in the community. Health for Haiti donations help to provide a salary for the local operators who run the system each day and to purchase gas to power the filtration system. Clean water is fundamental to good health. Access to clean water has changed and saved lives.

This year, we hope to build on this success and change the system, which currently relies on gas, to solar power. The system will be less expensive and more efficient if the community does not have to purchase gas and rely on generators. Gas is expensive and hard to obtain, but sunshine is free and abundant.

Building his Bachelor's: Mike pursues a degree in Civil Engineering Technology while balancing career and family

Juggling a career, family life and the pursuit of a college degree can involve acrobatics of a sort and many long days – all for the most worthwhile of causes.

Take Mike Berry, a senior project manager for a construction firm and the father of two young children. With nearly 20 years of experience in the construction industry, he decided to go back to school and pursue a long-deferred bachelor's degree in Civil Engineering Technology through SUNY Polytechnic Institute.

In pursuing his bachelor's degree, he is able to take classes at other colleges and universities. He chose SUNY Broome for its strong Civil Engineering Technology degree program, as well as its proximity to one of the projects he is shepherding: the massive reconstruction of the Binghamton-Johnson City joint sewage treatment plant.

He has enjoyed his SUNY Broome experience, but there have been some stressful days – such as the one when he had a mandatory work meeting in Lock Haven, Pa., on the same day as an exam. He ended up taking the test, jumping in the car and driving three hours to the meeting, only to turn around and drive two hours back home — a rather long day, but one in which all his many obligations were met.

Despite the juggling act, coming back to school later in life has its rewards.

"Returning to school after working in the industry, I tend to enjoy it more, to grasp it more," he reflected. "What you're learning makes sense, and you want to focus more."

Coming back to school

A native of Elmira, Berry earned an Associate's degree in Mathematics and Science from Onondaga Community College in 1997 and then transferred to SUNY Poly, where he continued his studies but didn't complete his bachelor's in Civil Engineering Technology. He played varsity baseball at both schools, and was hired at Welliver in 1999 after an internship during his senior year.

The company encouraged him to continue his education and he took a few courses to finish his degree, but soon became too busy. The last blow to his motivation came when he took a Calculus II course at Ithaca College, earning only a C-minus, a grade that wouldn't transfer to his end degree.

"My initiative went down the tubes," he said.

His education didn't end, however. He went on to earn multiple certifications, including in Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) and as a Certified Healthcare Constructor (CHC). He has worked on a wide variety of projects, from a new hospital in the Corning area to a cocoa plant in Hazelton, two residential initiatives at Cornell University and more.

He took his first SUNY Broome class in 2006: reinforced concrete design. Then, his next project took him out to Hazelton, Pa., and school was off the table until 2017.

"I just sat back one day and said, 'I guess you got to try it," he said of his decision to complete his degree. "I dove in and I've had

a lot of support around me. I just pushed on and I got through it. It was very difficult at times - don't get me wrong."

He has achieved a GPA of 4.0 at Broome, with a few more classes to go. At 41, he's older than the traditional college student, but never felt set apart; instead, he has forged connections with both his professors and his fellow students.

Professors he connected with include Dr. Kelli Ligeikis, now provost at SUNY Delhi, and hydraulics instructor Tom Sullivan. Professor Joe DeAngelo also provided essential guidance on course options.

Connection goes both ways, said Berry, noting that students who are attentive and show initiative prime themselves for success. "There are students who truly want to be there and learn, and that goes a long way with professors," he observed.

He has invited professors to observe work sites, and encouraged his younger peers to pursue careers in an industry he has called home for two decades. And SUNY Broome has rubbed off in other ways, too, in addition to bolstering his confidence as a student: The information and skills he masters in the classroom have had a positive impact on his work.

He finds himself referring to his coursework during the course of his job, such as designing concrete piles. Professor Tom Myers' soil mechanics course was both thorough and helpful in teaching the theory behind the soil and foundation design relative to geotechnical engineering, Berry explained.

"The people and the professors have been very helpful in getting me back in the groove of things. Here, everyone is very personable," he said. "I've always been a one-on-one learner; I don't want the 50 to 60 students in a lecture hall."





June 29, 2018, has been established as the cutoff date for purchasing (encumbering

funds) for Fiscal Year 2018.

Please review your department's needs for all items, services and travel expenses anticipated through the remainder of Fiscal Year '18, and place orders via the requisition/PO process no later than Friday, June 29.

This means **all** anticipated purchases of goods, services and travel expenses using both **college operating** and **grant funding** occurring between now and August 31 must be encumbered and approved by June 29. To accomplish this, requisitions will need to be created and approved at the department level by June 29, 2018. Items on these orders should be received no later than August 15.

To ensure a balanced budget, only critical and essential items will be approved for the period remaining in this fiscal year.

Existing Standing Orders will be good for placing orders through July 31. Items ordered on a Standing Order should be received no later than August 15.

Some items may require significant lead times and departments should plan accordingly.

Items or services received on or prior to August 31, 2018, must be expensed against your FY'18 budget.

Your department's budget may be viewed using the Budget Query function in Banner. The SUNY Broome Purchasing Guidelines are available in Banner Self Service on the Finance tab for easy reference. However, please do not hesitate to call Purchasing at x5196 or x5225 for assistance or questions; we look forward to helping you with your purchases.

The FY'19 budget will open on or about August 21, 2018.

Please remember that all orders must be placed via the requisition/purchase order process – orders may not be called or faxed in.

Attention, job seekers! Tioga County Economic Development and Planning (TEAM Tioga) in partnership with the Tioga County Career Center and the New York State Department of Labor is excited to announce a new workforce development and training program initiative in Tioga County.

The Accelerated Apprenticeship Program (AAP) offers guaranteed direct hire manufacturing jobs in Tioga and surrounding counties, and six weeks of paid training for selected participants. The starting wage during the program is \$13 per hour, and no prior experience is necessary. The successful completion of the program will allow participants to continue in a four-year NYS Apprenticeship program with built-in pay increases based on performance.

"We are very excited to have this opportunity here in Tioga County. The Accelerated Apprenticeship Program is truly a win-win for our employers and our workforce," said Brittany Woodburn with Tioga County Economic Development and Planning.

This type of accelerated program has run successfully in the Syracuse area twice this past year, with more than 20 apprentices being hired into careers in advanced manufacturing. The apprenticeship program will prepare participants for several advanced manufacturing positions, including CNC machinist, maintenance mechanic and industrial manufacturing technician. Manufacturers participating in the program include Applied Technology Manufacturing Corporation, Crowley Fabricating and Machining Co. Inc., Crown Cork and Seal, Granite Works LLC and The Wagner Companies.

The training will take place at the Owego Apalachin Central School District STEAM facility located at 5 Sheldon Guile Boulevard in Owego in partnership with SUNY Broome who will provide both the curriculum and instructor for the program.

The Accelerated Apprenticeship Program in Tioga County is currently accepting applications for the program. There is no fee to participate in the program. Interested job seekers can apply online at https://www.tiogacountyny.com/programs-agencies/accelerated-apprenticeshipprogram/. Applications are due by June 16. Training will begin in mid-July and concludes in August. Successful candidates will begin full-time employment at the end of August.


