Divine art: In the shadow of the masters, a new one emerges

A pensive St. Anthony cradles a baby, while a stern David holds the head of the giant Goliath. A monk, deeply shadowed in his robes, delicately wraps his hands around a skull, the ultimate memento mori as St. Lucia, a trickle of blood on her face, serves up her own eyes on a silver platter.

With their religious themes, deep shadows and stunning realism, these dramatic oil paintings could come directly from the 17th century, perhaps hung on the walls of a museum. While they were inspired by Baroque masters such as Caravaggio, Rembrandt and Velázquez, they were actually created in the past five years by SUNY Broome alumnus Anthony Hanakovic.

With the title "In the Shadow of the Masters," Hanakovic's work is on exhibit through Sept. 29 in the Gallery @ SUNY Broome, located on the first floor of the library.

"Maybe I'm in the shadow of the masters because I'm not as good as them, but I'm trying to be as good as them," he said, explaining the exhibit's title. "They painted with such high chiaroscuro and shading."

Dramatic style

Hanakovic earned his Associate's degree in Liberal Arts, with an emphasis on art, in 2000. He then headed to SUNY Buffalo State for art education and then to Binghamton University for a master's degree in social sciences. In addition to his studio work, he teaches elementary art at Harpursville's W.A.

Olmstead Elementary School.

While his oil paintings perhaps attract the most notice, he also makes prints, which are also on display in the exhibit.

As a painter, he concentrates on using tools, techniques and themes from the Baroque period, which was marked by chiaroscuro – the high contrast between light and shadow.

"It was the height of technical excellence in painting. It was when painting became very realistic and very dramatic," he said.

The religious themes are both a testament to Hanakovic's own Catholic faith, as well as a reflection of the Baroque period, when the old masters were typically commissioned by the church for their work. Like the masters, he hides symbols in the paintings – and is thrilled when viewers notice them and mark their meaning.

His themes depend on a number of practical factors. He makes his own period props and finds models who fit the traditional interpretation of figures; St. Peter, for example, was often depicted with a long, white beard, while St. James was often painted as a young man with curly hair.

While he enjoys the more dramatic themes, he noted that drama needn't be overt; the St. Anthony painting, for example, depicts a calm, quiet and reverent scene. (St. Anthony was frequently depicted in paintings as holding the infant Jesus.)

"Paintings focus on something profound happening, like the conversion of Paul when he falls off the horse," Hanakovic explained. "It draws my attention and other people's attention more to see someone going through something or having something happen to them, rather than just looking at the viewer."

SUNY Broome roots

SUNY Broome – or more specifically, its professors — played an important role Hanakovic's development as an artist. Professors that made a significant impact on his work include painters Michael Tanzer and Daniel Mosner, and Patricia Evans in design. Richard Baron prompted his interest in art history, which later inspired Hanakovic's research into the methods of the old masters.

"I remember going to shows that involved my teachers at SUNY Broome and I would see their work and think, 'Oh my God, they're so good,'" he said.

Sometimes the toughest professors can be the best teachers. Take Professor Nancy Ryan, who led Hanakovic to realize during his student years that he didn't have an adequate grasp of composition. "My composition is something people comment on," he reflected. "My composition would not have been great if Nancy Ryan didn't come out and tell me it's bad."

Mosner, who taught Hanakovic the Flemish technique, perhaps contributed the most to his current painting style. This classical oil painting technique requires a three-layer underpainting, followed by layers of color – and is a crucial component to the realism seen in Baroque-era paintings. In his striving for realism, Hanakovic had reached an impasse until he perfected the method.

He constantly works to hone his technique. Some experiments include extra layers of paint on the canvas to smooth out grooves and add to the realism, or painting on boards and panels, which the masters often did. (A downside: Paint on panels chips much more easily, making it practical only for pieces that are intended to stay in one place.)

When he began his art career, Hanakovic's dream was to have a single public show. He has far surpassed that and has exhibited his work in both New York and Pennsylvania during the past five years, in addition to participating in juried shows.

While in the community, he sees paintings by Tanzer and Armondo Dellasanta, who have both since passed. "I want my artwork to outlast me," he said – a sentiment that many of the old masters shared.

What also lies in the shadow of the masters are the failed paintings, the experiments that don't produce the desired results – at least not without years of practice. Hanakovic, like any good artist, has plenty of those. And he has a well-rehearsed answer when you ask him how long it took him to master the masters' style – a question he faces frequently.

"It's a combination of 39 years of trying stuff and failing, and then trying some more stuff," he said.

Stay home, go far: Alex gets a head start on his future in biomedical engineering

When it came to college, Alex Khadjadorian had a choice to make.

Long interested in biomedical engineering, the Vestal High School graduate didn't make the cut at two of his top schools for the program: Stonybrook and Binghamton University. He was accepted at the University at Buffalo, but experienced a bit of sticker shock when he looked at the cost of tuition and of leaving home.

"So the decision was, do I go to Buffalo or to Broome?" he recalled.

He chose his local community college, where he majored in Engineering Science. After a year, he was able to successfully transfer into one of the programs that initially rejected him: Binghamton University, where he is now majoring in biomedical engineering and also following a pre-med trajectory.

"Everything transferred over smoothly, allowing me to enter BU as a full sophomore," he said.

His successful transfer doesn't mean that he gave up his chance to earn a SUNY Broome degree, however. He still has the option to complete his SUNY Broome Engineering Science degree through a process known as reverse transfer, in which credits are transferred back to SUNY Broome – at no cost to the student.

Medicine and engineering

Staying local has its benefits. When he was 17, Alex became involved in emergency medical services through the Apalachin Fire Department, where he volunteers. Because he stayed local for college, he was able to take an extracurricular class in Tioga County and become certified in EMT critical care, a step below a paramedic. The certification and related volunteer work allow him to save lives and gain needed experience – a bonus for a future doctor.

That isn't to say that his SUNY Broome classes were easy – far from it, he said.

"Going into it, I thought it would be an extension of high school; I thought it would be 13th grade," he admitted. "The coursework was a lot more difficult than I expected. I grew as a future professional and as a student during my year at Broome."

What he enjoyed most about his SUNY Broome experience: The professors, who are accessible to students and truly wish to see them succeed. He particularly appreciated Chemistry Professor Joel Miller, who he had for several classes. "He really had a lot of interesting things to say and I think he was a really great teacher," Alex said.

Outside of class, Alex also landed an internship with BAE Systems, thanks to an on-campus interview and SUNY Broome's Applied and Career Center.

Looking ahead, he would like to combine his interests in medicine and engineering. He had first considered becoming an engineer, before his involvement in EMS prompted his interest in the medicine. In some senses, the fields aren't as far apart as they may initially seem.

"I became very interested in how drugs influence the body, and the different systems of the body," he explained. "It's kind of like how you can take a computer apart and see how the parts work together."

With a biomedical engineering background, his career options as a physician are broad. Perhaps he may one day work with prosthetics or pacemakers, or tap into nanotechnology, stem cell research or pharmaceuticals. He has time to discover his true passion, and the journey is sure to be fascinating.

Whatever bright horizons his future holds, he appreciates his start at SUNY Broome.

"When I talk to people, I always tell them: 'Don't be afraid to start at Broome," he said. "Smaller classes are less intimidating than a big lecture hall, and you'll save a lot of money. You get a good quality education."



Banner downtime for end-of-year processing



However, no updates should be made in the TEST8 instance, but instead held onto to be processed once PROD becomes available. SUNY Broome will welcome students on Monday, August 27, for the first day of classes.

As of Aug. 24, 2018, 5,388 students are enrolled. Current numbers do not include the Fast Forward program, and enrollment numbers are subject to change during the semester.

Enrollment at a glance:

- Of the students enrolled, 70% are full-time students and 29% are part-time.
- According to data compiled earlier Friday, the population includes 1,878 new, first-time students, 2,464 continuing students and 354 non-matriculated students. These numbers will continue to be updated.
- Nearly 57% percent are female and 41% percent are male.
- Approximately 54% percent are from Broome County, 42% percent from another New York State County, 3% percent from out of state and another 1% percent from another country.
- Traditional, campus-only students number 74% while 11% students take courses both on campus and online, and 15% are online-only.
- 360 students live on campus in the Student Village. Move-In Day is scheduled for Saturday, August 25.

The week of August 27 is also Welcome Week, which features a series of events for both residential and commuter students. The week will feature information booths and other help to get students on track for the semester as well as a variety of fun activities.

SUNY Broome President Kevin E. Drumm will be available for interviews at 10 a.m. Aug. 27 in the Darwin R. Wales Center on campus.

"As a college president, the first day of classes is my second favorite day of the year – the first being Commencement, of course," President Drumm said. "I would like to welcome our new and returning students, our faculty and staff for another successful academic year. I look forward to seeing all of our students achieve their academic goals, and walk across the stage in May."

- A new starter motor, new brine pumps and condenser pumps are being installed at the Ice Center.


Upcoming Construction Activities



Fall 2018 Faculty Staff Assembly: Embracing chaos for a better future

Embracing Chaos, the theme of the Fall 2018 Faculty Staff Assembly

If you're on campus the week before classes begin, look around.

At this very moment, truckloads of furniture are being carted into the new Paul & Mary Calice and Mildred Barton Advanced Manufacturing Center. The fencing is down around the Quad, but it's still an expanse of mud following the installation of a new geothermal system and this summer's rains, which have delayed the planting of grass. In downtown Binghamton, the interior of the former Carnegie Library is being gutted to make way for the future SUNY Broome Culinary Arts Center.

And then there are the factors you don't see, at least not on a stroll across campus. Behind the scenes, the de-registration of students for non-payment happened earlier this year, allowing them to address the issue during College Readiness Week – even if it means they need to re-invent their schedules. While the shift makes sense, it also makes it tough for administrators to track enrollment trends in real time, since one year's numbers are compared to those from the previous year on the same date.

All things considered, it's probably self-explanatory why the Fall 2018 Faculty Staff Assembly theme is "Embracing Chaos."

But just because something looks chaotic doesn't mean that it's random or out of control. Executive Vice President and Chief Academic Officer Francis Battisti evoked the concept of chaos theory, which is a part of mathematics.

"The whole idea is that everything looks kind of crazy but, if you step back, it's like the weather; you can see the patterns," he explained.

Battling the headwinds

While the enrollment situation remains fluid, it's likely that the college will see a slight enrollment decline, which is neither severe nor unexpected.

"Many of our sister institutions are in dire condition these days because of their enrollment situation and we are not," President Kevin E. Drumm said in his address to faculty and staff.

Still, this is no time to be complacent. Student retention numbers need improvement, and efforts are being spearheaded by the college's <u>Achieving Success</u> team. The college is also battling some real headwinds, some national and some regional in scope, Dr. Drumm said.

A strong economy may draw more people into the workforce than their local community college – not a negative factor, surely, but one that needs to be taken into account. But while the Southern Tier economy is doing better, it's not exploding in the same way as other parts of the country, he noted.

The Excelsior Scholarship – or "free tuition," as many know it – does tend to favor the state-operated four-year colleges and universities by its design.

One of the most significant factors is the declining population in the Southern Tier, particularly in the high school-aged population. It's a trend shared by the Northeast in general, although the Southern Tier is shrinking faster than any other region in New York, Dr. Drumm said. How much? A potential 25 percent of the core market – students just out of high school – by 2024, a prospect that the college needs to consider when planning for the future.

"The size of your community college is likely a reflection of the size of your community," President Drumm said. "We either have to look elsewhere for our student population or do business quite differently and be prepared to contract."

Currently, 60 percent of SUNY Broome's students are traditional, meaning that they attend class just after completing high school, while 40 percent are adult learners. That's the inverse of colleges across the nation, where adult learners hold sway. This can present SUNY Broome with an opportunity, but it will likely involve adding night and weekend classes, among other changes, to accommodate the busy schedules of adult learners.

SUNY Broome also needs to continue planning for the careers of the future by making classrooms more technology-oriented. Today's students – the traditional ones, at any rate – grew up among smartphones and now smart speakers such as the Amazon Echo. The world they will live and work in for the rest of their lives will see an increasing amount of such technology.

New technology may seem disruptive initially, as is the case with social media. That was also true for another technology, centuries ago: the printing press and the book.

"It took 300 to 400 years for the textbook to make it into the university classroom," Dr. Drumm said.

Before the advent of the printing press, those who could read – mostly clergy and aristocrats – were the ones who held power. And yes, in the early days, the book "led to all matters of nefarious behavior, just as social media has," Dr. Drumm reflected. Society adapted and eventually flourished.

We can't be afraid of using new technologies in the classroom; indeed, our future depends on it, considering the changing nature of work and the society it supports. Likewise, the question isn't whether students are ready for college, but whether the college is ready for its students.

"We are the community's college, period," Dr. Drumm said. "Do we follow the community, or do we lead it to a bigger, stronger future?"

Ensuring academic integrity

Looking ahead, the college is preparing to do its self-study and other work needed to prepare for the Middle States Commission on Higher Education site visit in 2020. Academic Affairs also outlined its goals for the upcoming year:

- To continue supporting a sustainable and high-quality academic culture
- To incorporate a diverse range of faculty and staff members in the assessment process and increase the use of technology to enhance this process
- To implement student retention efforts through developing a published workflow for student services; improving new and existing systems for student support, such as CRM, Banner and DegreeWorks; using Starfish across campus; and integrating career and transfer messages
- To increase the focus on campus diversity
- To invest in professional development for faculty and staff

The college also adopted the use of an online proctoring service, Examity, to ensure the academic integrity of its online courses. Professor Jennifer Musa took part in the pilot program with her online anatomy and physiology course, a requirement for many Health Sciences majors. Students need to pay a small fee to have the exam

proctored online, and the service confirms the students' identity, makes sure their workspace is compliant (with no notes or other materials) and records them taking the test to make sure no cheating occurred. The service then reviews the video and flags any suspicion of cheating for the professor using the service.

The results were shocking. The same students who passed exams that Dr. Musa proctored herself ended up with low scores on the Examity-proctored exams. At the end of the class, anonymous reviewers were scathing, accusing Dr. Musa of not trusting students.

"It's a good thing I have tenure," she quipped. But despite the hard feelings, use of the proctoring service may help ensure the academic integrity of the exams, she noted, and the college has an agreement with Examity.

Now let's turn to student development. In her year on the job, Vice President for Student Development and Chief Diversity Officer Carol Ross talked to many students about their concerns and experiences.

"They're afraid they're going to fail. They just want to come and fit in, and they want time to adjust," she reflected.

To aid students, the college needs to help them "change the narrative." A vibrant campus life via extra- and co-curricular activities is a must, and a multicultural resource center will go a long way to help everyone feel welcome. The college also needs to make sure students understand the whole financial aid picture to ensure that they don't fall into debt.

Enhancing the diversity of the college's job applicant pool is also crucial. Students have told Dr. Ross that she was the only college employee they met who looked like them, she recounted. Other goals include sprucing up the campus childcare center and making sure residents of the Student Village have a 100 percent retention and success rate.

Campus is flowering

On the facilities side, the Calice Center received its certificate of occupancy on Aug. 21 and faculty and staff are moving in, according to Interim Director of Facilities Dave Ligeikis. A grand opening is scheduled for Oct. 16. The Quad will be graded and hydro-seeded by Aug. 27.

He invited the campus community to tour the building. The terrazzo floor in the connector area, inlaid with the SUNY Broome seal, is one area of note. "That's going to be, in my mind, a great gathering space or focal point for the college," said Ligeikis.

Work began on the Culinary Arts Center in the historic Carnegie Library this June, with a target completion date of September 2019. A wide variety of work also continues to spruce up campus, with items of note including moving the photo lab from the bottom of Old Science to Calice, developing a music rehearsal room in Campus Services, constructing a pedestrian bridge on the hiking trail and replacing the Digital Lounge with a new multicultural center in Old Science.

Taking the long-term view, the master plan includes such items as connecting Old Science and Student Services into a one-stop enrollment center; connecting that one-stop center to the Business Building; and rehabilitating the Library into a campus centerpiece.

And in the short term, there are the Black-Eyed Susans that seem to be popping up everywhere on campus. That's deliberate, since they are the school colors of black and gold, Ligeikis said.

One frequent partner in campus initiatives, including renovations such as the Calice Center, is the Broome Community College Foundation, also the major funder for student scholarships as well as professional development grants. In the last fiscal year, the Foundation drew revenue of \$5.1 million, relying a great deal on its investments, and awarded \$3.2 million.

In fact, the BCC Foundation gives more money to students than foundations at larger community colleges, Executive Director Cathy Williams noted.

The Foundation recently received a \$1.5 million estate gift from a late alumnus, who graduated in 1964 with a degree in physical engineering. Its first installment of \$900,000 will be used to support the Frederick Emerson Jr. Innovation Fund; more news will be forthcoming in the future on this fund and what it will support.

Thirteen years ago, Wendy Schrader joined Tioga Downs to work in its financial office. The company looked far different then: No hotel or casino, no spa or restaurant. Well, to be honest, not much in the way of buildings at all on its swathe of green in Nichols.

"We started in a trailer with a computer and two cell phones. Now here we are!" said the SUNY Broome alumna, who is now the company's senior regional director of finance. "This has been a really great experience, watching this company grow."

Tioga Downs Casino Resort has come a long way since its start, and so has Schrader – while staying a little closer to home. She grew up 10 miles down the road from Tioga Downs and started her financial career working for two small accounting firms, before landing a job she loved at Johnson Outdoors in Binghamton.

Tioga Downs presented not only a professional opportunity, but a way to cut her commute significantly. Still, she applied with mixed feelings; she was happy at Johnson Outdoors, even if it was a bit of a drive. In the end, the gamble paid off and she found herself with another vibrant career.

"There are so many different activities that go on here. Casino, racing, restaurants, events, concerts, hotel, a spa. Here, you get it all – except for manufacturing," she said. "There is always something going on."

And that can make for a complex operation. Schrader oversees accounts payable, finance, the cage – where cashiers redeem vouchers for winning customers – and the money rooms both at Tioga Downs and Vernon Downs, and assists with operations at the Meadowlands, all of which are owned by Jeff Gural.

"One of the best aspects of the casino industry is the number of people you get to meet," she said. "For such a small industry, it seems like everyone knows everyone. I know people in Nevada."

Wendy came to SUNY Broome as an adult learner – also called a "non-traditional student," meaning that she didn't head to college directly after high school. Before college, she had worked retail, beginning with the iconic Endicott-Johnson shoes, which had its start in the area.

"I think SUNY Broome was a good place to start. It was a good transition for me, being out of school for ten years," she remembered. "Being local made it very convenient."

She enjoyed her professors and her classes, and was a member of the honor society Phi Theta Kappa. After earning her degree in Business Administration, she headed to SUNY Oswego where she earned her bachelor's in Business Administration with an accounting emphasis and then her master's degree.

She still has all her books from her SUNY Broome days and even pulls them out every now and then, she said.

"It was a great time! I loved SUNY Broome," she said.



It's the end of summer in Binghamton, which means the LUMA Projection Arts Festival is gearing up for what will be their biggest year yet!

Never experienced LUMA? Think of it as projection art on the side of a building using that building as a canvas. But until you see it in person, there is no way to describe just how incredible the sights and sounds really are!

LUMA began in 2015, when a group of artists, engineers and tech-minded folks started working on the idea of projection mapping. The plan was to try something only seen in much larger cities. The hope was to draw a crowd of 4,000 to 5,000 people. When 25,000 people showed up, they knew they'd hit a home run. LUMA Year One was a success.

However, that was only the beginning. For their third event last year, LUMA presented a fully immersive 3D show that wowed a crowd of more than 35,0000. Downtown Binghamton was once again transformed into a canvas for national and, for the first time, international artists projecting building-sized animation, video, sound and light.

Now, for their fourth year, LUMA is back and bigger than ever. Using 32 projectors, lighting up downtown Binghamton with 650,000 lumens, the show is just too much to light for a single night! In 2018, the show will span three nights, with new presentations, new building canvases, and a few new surprises.

SUNY Broome Assistant Director for Technology Services Fermin Romero is a Technical Director on the project again this year and had a few things to say about the buzz this festival has generated:

"Every year I am surprised by the number of people who begin asking me about LUMA. This year people began asking me in April if we were going to do a fourth year. Now that we've grown so much, I find myself surrounded by more and more talented people. Just the team of folks we've recruited for the technology side of the show is so much larger than what we started with back in 2015. Honestly, looking back, I am shocked at what we were able to do these past three years, and I'm really looking forward to showing what we're able to do this year."

Tioga Downs Casino Resort draws visitors for many reasons. They catch concerts and shows, enjoy the pool and its waterslide, or grab a meal. They see the horses race around the track, cheering in the stands.

But many come for the slots and games, whether it's poker, blackjack, craps or roulette. They come to win big - and, above all, to have a good time.

A trio of table games supervisors at the Tioga County business have ties to SUNY Broome. James Baburchak earned an Associate's degree in Liberal Arts, while Stephen Gaug earned a certificate in Casino Management after receiving a degree from Binghamton University. Lauren Platner honed her skills with several classes at SUNY Broome, which helped her start on a new career. In fact, the three had taken their Introduction to Casino Management class together at Broome, Platner said

So, what does a table games floor supervisor do?

"I protect the integrity of the game. I keep track of the inventory of the tables. Any discrepancies, I help resolve," Gaug explained.

While horse racing has been a part of Tioga Downs' identity from the beginning, the casino took off only in the past few years, after the company received its official license from the New York State Gaming Commission.

Around the same time, SUNY Broome began its Casino Management degree and certificate program. The major is currently being redeveloped into an online format, which will make it more accessible to those interested in casino careers. However, the program has already made an impact, allowing future dealers such as Lauren and Stephen to investigate their career possibilities.

"I don't know if I would have come here if I started without knowing anything about casinos," Platner reflected. "I think it's a good introduction; it gives you an idea what it's all about."

Finding a winning career

For both Gaug and Platner, Tioga Downs represented a new and welcome career path.

Lauren spent years working for Broome Developmental, and jumped at the chance when her employer expressed a willingness to pay for classes. She had long wanted to become a casino dealer, and decided to take courses in casino management and casino games at SUNY Broome.

"I started dealing and I love it. I love the customer service aspect of it," she said of her job at Tioga Downs. "It's rewarding to get to talk to people. I enjoy coming to work."

Stephen studied management at Binghamton University, but job opportunities after graduation seemed limited to retail and he knew he wanted to use his talents elsewhere. Tioga Downs interested him.

He took a bartending class at SUNY Broome and then worked as a bar-back at the resort for $2\frac{1}{2}$ years; this support role involves assisting, stocking and preparing a bar, and filling in as bartender when needed, he explained. While working on his Casino Management certificate, he landed an internship at Tioga Downs, giving him the opportunity to see the broad expanse of careers available in the company.

"At a casino, there are many different departments; it's a unique environment. When I was first coming in, I wasn't sure where I would fit in," he explained.

All of the courses he took at SUNY Broome were instrumental in his current success. His bartending class gave him the skills and knowledge for his first job at Tioga Downs, and subsequent classes taught him the ins and outs of the complicated casino industry, even the parts of the operation that he might not personally see.

Within the next few years, he hopes to work his way up to pit boss, he said. Overall, his bet on a career in the casino industry has paid off.

"I love interacting with the customers and the other dealers. If you have a good table with happy customers, you can't really ask for a much better job," he said.



"My favorite part of the job here is being able to go out to job fairs at colleges and let them know what the casino is about. It's a great place to work," she said. "I love the hospitality industry."


She also has met with Applied Learning & Career Center staff to explore internship opportunities that can give students both needed experience and a foothold in the hospitality industry.

For this attendance posting, there are just 2 different scenarios; posting attendance for those student who have not attended anything before the census date, and posting attendance for all students who have attended at least once before the census date.

"I am extremely passionate about my job. I live it and breathe it," she said. "Succeeding at my job is the most important thing to me."

When she graduated high school, the Binghamton native wasn't sure what career she wanted to pursue. She opted for SUNY Broome, where she earned an Associate's degree in <u>Liberal Arts</u> in 2011 and then transferred to Binghamton University, where she earned a bachelor's degree in English in 2014.

"I liked Broome; it was a good transition into school, and more cost-effective. You have to push yourself; I learned a lot of that there," she said.

The workload SUNY Broome prepared her to succeed at BU, she said. She particularly enjoyed taking online classes, which allowed her to keep a part-time job and also inspired her to become more responsible.

"I really liked the structure of it. Toward the end, a lot of my classes were online," she said. "I learn better that way – researching and doing it myself. I like that they offer a very strong curriculum that you can do online, so you can work and go to school."

While it's a common stereotype that English majors can't find gainful employment – the tired "Want fries with that?" joke that so many Liberal Arts majors hear – it couldn't be further from the truth. English majors also aren't confined to a teaching career, which is also a common misconception, Sheppard pointed out. Their options are far more broad, and include careers that you may not have envisioned a decade ago.

"You need to know how to read and write for everything you do," Sheppard explained. "I also have a little background in art, which currently comes in very handy photographing events. I write a lot to get people excited about Tioga Downs."

After graduating from BU, Brianna was hired by a small business for content writing and web development. Her familiarity with WordPress helped, and she also handled third party platforms.

Tioga Downs felt like a natural progression. After being contracted to work for the company, she met the owner on the floor and discussed the opportunities that social media presents – which helped her get a foot in the door. It turned out to be a great fit.

She has learned a great deal at Tioga Downs, she said. While the environment is more corporate than the small business – she has a director and vice president to report to now – she has more freedom to be creative.

She also appreciates her start at SUNY Broome. She advises current Hornets to explore, take as many classes as they can and find opportunities to get working experience.

"Going to a school like Broome gives you a chance to figure out what you definitely like and what you definitely don't want to do," she said. "They have a great support system; there are a lot of tools they give you to work with. They are there for you. I've been to the Writing Center myself, and I'm a good writer. I've been to the Math Lab. Use what they give you."

And don't let anyone tell you that Liberal Arts majors can't get jobs.

Rebuilding lives: Milagros aids the recovery effort in Puerto Rico

When people asked Milagros Gonzalez's sons where she was this July, the teens had a proud answer: "She's rebuilding

Puerto Rico!'

The Binghamton native was selected as a participant in the SUNY Stands with Puerto Rico Service Learning opportunity this summer. Hundreds of students throughout the SUNY system took part, working with non-profit organizations to assist in rebuilding efforts on the island.

A part of <u>SUNY Broome's Educational Opportunity Program</u> (EOP), Gonzalez learned about the opportunity from college President Kevin E. Drumm, who mentioned it to EOP students. She was immediately interested and applied two days before the deadline.

Her mother was born in Puerto Rico; although she moved to New York at the age of 3, she still had friends connected to the island, Gonzalez explained. She was also inspired by the local community's efforts to aid their fellow Americans in the wake of the hurricane, with an American Legion breakfast and other fundraisers.

"There were over 2,500 applicants and only 500 were accepted from schools across the state," said the second-year Human Services major. "A week before departure, on July 1, I got my acceptance letter. Then I was like, 'Yay!"

Tough and rewarding

Women were the majority of participants during the session of the program Gonzalez attended, which departed from John F. Kennedy International Airport. During the journey, they had the opportunity to speak with a college student from Puerto Rico, heading back home after receiving a scholarship that allowed her to continue her education in Connecticut, Gonzalez remembered.

They arrived in San Juan, where they stayed in housing at the Universidad del Sagrado Corazón. Even before they headed out to the job site with the non-profit NECHAMA, they could see the lasting impact of Hurricane Maria, which devastated the Caribbean last year.

"They still had broken windows and they were still leaking in the meeting room," she said. "The next morning, we got to work."

Further out from the university, the damage was even more pronounced: light poles through roofs, housing still uninhabitable from storm damage. Nonprofits each took a share of the work: NECHAMA, the group the students worked with, tackled the living quarters while HEART 9/11, which had volunteer teams of skilled professionals, worked on the light poles and other aspects of the power grid.

Gonzalez' work sites had four teams of 10 to 13 people each; two teams typically worked on the roof, and another on the interior. Others went on tool runs. While the teams rotated, Gonzalez stayed put since she also acted as the team's Spanish translator. She worked mostly on the roofs – an admittedly tough job in a tropical climate.

"By Thursday, we had blisters. Our hands were swollen. We wrapped each other up," she said.



SUNY students also met former Black Panther Leon Hobbs, who lives on the island. "People in Puerto Rico have your back," he told them.

Despite the devastation, the people of Puerto Rico were generous and appreciative. They shared food, resources and clean water with one another during the worst of times, and thanked the volunteers for their work.

"They were still happy people. They were like, 'Listen, you've got to make the best of what you have," Gonzalez said.

One moment – among many profound moments — that stuck out: Talking with resident Freddy Lopez, an elderly Vietnam War veteran who lost family members during the hurricane.

"He was telling us, 'We're Americans, too.' It was a real eye-opener. Why are they still under these conditions?" said Gonzalez, shaking her head. "We got done with three homes. While it was really hard, we felt we didn't do enough. There are so many kids with asthma living under these conditions, trying to survive through it, making the best of it."

Ironically, the students got word of another hurricane headed toward the island during their stay there, their phones chiming in unison with an alert warning. It turned out to be a tropical storm, but her family back home was worried – as was Milagros herself.

"It really hit me: I'm far away from home. I can't just jump in a car," she said. The people of Puerto Rico, while they were diligently preparing for the storm, were unperturbed; no other hurricane could inflict the damage of Maria, they told her.

Not only was this the first time Milagros took part in a recovery effort, it was also the first time she ever lived in a residence hall. While they did take part in excursions to old San Juan, the SUNY students typically worked from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. and sometimes later, followed by a meeting and discussion. They headed to bed early, exhausted but filled with a sense of mission.

"During that time, we may have had our differences, but when we were on the roof, we were a unit," she said. "I met amazing people; I would do it again and again. It was rewarding, especially when people came up and told their stories."

'You push forward'

Perhaps it's no surprise that Gonzalez learned about SUNY Stands with Puerto Rico through EOP, which provides support to first-time students seeking to reach their educational goals.

Juggling both a job and a family, she is a non-traditional student, meaning that she is older than many of her peers who attend college directly out of high school. (About a third of SUNY Broome students are typically considered non-traditional, or adult learners.) She had long wanted to pursue her education, but needed to wait until her two children were old enough; a promotion at her job in the Binghamton City School District's mailroom also gave her the flexibility she needed to head back to class.

At first, going to college proved a bit overwhelming, she acknowledged. "I was the oldest person in class. I'm the first one to go through college in my family, period," she said.

EOP has provided needed support, both academically and personally. "They're my team! They're my therapeutic session," Gonzalez exclaimed. "They were always there for me."

She has also taken advantage of SUNY Broome's support services, including an academic coach and the Writing Center, and found a tutor when she struggled in an online Spanish course. (She's a bit embarrassed over that, being a fluent Spanish speaker – but literary language isn't quite the same as conversational language, she acknowledged.)

Her professors, too, have helped propelled her toward success – "All of them were amazingly great," she said — and she currently holds a grade point average of 3.6. Just like Gonzalez, one of her professors started out with a GED, making her feel a little less alone.

She plans on graduating in May 2019 and transferring to Binghamton University. Her ultimate goal: to become a social worker, working perhaps in a school setting.

"I want to let kids know – and even adults – that you can always change; there is always a chance. As you get older and you find yourself, you push forward," she said.

Listen and learn: Technology to help student master music theory

This fall, SUNY Broome music students will gain a hands-on understanding of music theory, thanks to new technology that will allow them to hear music as they write it.

SUNY's Innovative Instruction Technology Grant program awarded the college needed funds to pilot a "Music and Technology in the Community College Music Theory Classroom" project. The grant will be used to purchase Surface Pro tablets with the StaffPad app for use in the college's music theory classes. The program will help students understand complex concepts more quickly, promote creativity and intuitive learning, and allow students the opportunity to take their learning into the digital world.

Instructor Heather Worden is the driving force behind the project, which she first presented to Music Coordinator Brenda Dawe three years ago. The grant ultimately made the project possible, Professor Dawe said.

"When I first saw the StaffPad musical software, I knew I wanted to incorporate it into the curriculum. The problem was finding the money to make it happen," Worden said. "Being awarded the IITG grant and making the idea of technology in the music theory classroom a reality is huge for the music program."

Students using the tablets will be able to write compositions, which they will then be able to immediately hear. This will allow them to master concepts key to music and become more adept at differentiating between correct and incorrect notes, chords and intervals, all while building their strength as composers.

When Dawe was in college, she remembered writing compositions and then testing them out on a piano to see if they work. Not every student, however, is an adept piano player, or has access to an instrument, she noted.

"This bridges the gap between people with music playing skills and access to a piano and those who don't," she said. "It's so exciting, especially the fact that SUNY Broome is ahead of curve with this."

More than 100 students are in the college's Music Program and will use the tablets in core courses. Once the project is established, Worden plans to present her findings and resulting best practices at academic conferences for both collegiate and public school music educators.

"It's no secret that technology plays a huge role in our day to day lives, so it's not a surprise that teachers are finding it to be an asset in the classroom. Many public high schools have been using software on laptops or tablets for students, now we will be joining them, just with music software," Worden reflected. "Being able to hear and see the music as it is being written will make composing quicker and easier to understand. Before, students would write solely on staff paper with pencil and only afterwards hear their composition. Now that they will be able to hear as they write, making changes as they go, and improving not only their musical ears, but their understanding of music composition."

We will continue to monitor the weather forecast and road conditions, and take further action if and when necessary.

If you are traveling and encounter flash flooding, consider the following advice from the National Weather Service:

- Don't underestimate the power of water; it only takes 6 inches of water to knock over and carry away an adult, 12 inches to carry away a small car, and 18 to 24 inches to carry away most large SUVs, vans and trucks.
- Never drive around barricades. Most flood fatalities occur in vehicles.
- If you encounter a flash flood, get to higher ground, don't drive into the water and stay informed by monitoring local radar, television, weather radio or the Internet. **Turn around don't drown!**

Focus on Tioga Downs: From SUNY Broome to the head of HR

When you think of **Tioga Downs**, what comes to mind?

Perhaps it's horse racing or casino games, which may be the Tioga County business' biggest claims to fame. But Tioga Downs Casino Resort, which has expanded significantly in the past few years, also hosts concerts and class reunions, helps visitors unwind in its spa, and offers shut-eye and a swim at its hotel. A golf course, restaurants and bars – Tioga Downs offers quite a bit, as it turns out, even for people who would never consider placing a bet.

The Nichols business employs 730 people in a wide variety of careers, from hospitality and gaming to security, finance, accounting and more – and they're hiring. In fact, you'll find Tioga Downs recruiting on the SUNY Broome campus through opportunities in the Applied Learning & Career Center as well as regional job fairs.

"I currently have 40 positions we are actively recruiting for – in food and beverage, security and accounting," said SUNY Broome alumna Michelle Jones, a recruiter in the company's Human Resources office. "We have a big, vast area of jobs, not just in hospitality; there are a lot of behind-the-scenes positions."

This is the first in a series of stories highlighting Tioga Downs, and the SUNY Broome alumni who work there. Their jobs are varied, from the back office to the gaming room floor. And it's not uncommon for someone to start at Tioga Downs in one department – say, food and beverage – and later transfer to another, or to work their way up the company ladder.

"Get your foot in the door," advises Human Resources director Karen Shelp, a SUNY Broome alumna. Internships can lead to full-time careers, as can part-time jobs, she noted.

To kick off our series, we'll start with Karen herself.

As Tioga Downs' Human Resources director, Karen oversees a wide range of activities, from employee recruitment and training to managing benefits and union contracts, overseeing policies, writing the employee handbook and more. On a recent day, she led students from Cornell University on a tour of the facility.

"HR always changes," she said.

The Johnson City native began her college education at Broome – then called Broome Community College – and graduated with a degree in Business Administration in 1985. She then headed to Binghamton University – then called SUNY Binghamton – to earn a Bachelor's of Science in Management three years later, with a concentration in HR.

After that, life happened: She went to Cape Cod, had two children and eventually returned to the Southern Tier, joining Tioga Downs in 2008. They had 300 employees then, far fewer that the 730 post-expansion.

"I fell in love with the atmosphere of the place and the opportunities to grow," she said of Tioga Downs.

It's been a while since she was a Hornet, but Karen remembers the experience fondly. She paid for her own education, thanks to the low cost, and knew she would successfully transfer to her chosen destination school. She made the President's List and aided her peers as a tutor. She connected with her professors, and was impressed by one who also had his own business – a boon for someone in a Business Administration program. Class sizes were small, too – just as they are today.

These days, she is on the other side – reaching out to students at SUNY Broome and other colleges with job and internship opportunities. Many people don't realize the wide scope of careers within the hospitality industry, she reflected.

"In the casino industry, the more you learn, you can go anywhere in the world," she said. "It's really true."

Hornets alumna named head coach at Geneseo

Former SUNY Broome women's basketball player Alyssa Polosky was named head coach of the Geneseo Knights in July.

Alyssa became Geneso's eighth head coach after Scott Hemer was selected to lead Division I Canisius College after 11 years as the Knights head coach. In 2016 Polosky was featured on SUNY Broome's athletic website and appeared in the Spring Alumni Magazine for her success, both as a player for Broome and Geneseo, and an assistant coach for the Knights. The last paragraph of the 2016 article read: "Wherever Alyssa Polosky has been she has left her mark. The question is where will it be next.....On the court, in the classroom or both?" Question answered.

As a player, Polosky has won championships at Union-Endicott, SUNY Broome and Geneseo. Alyssa graduated from Union-Endicott High School, where she led the Tigers to a Section IV Championship and was the recipient of the 2007 NYS Section IV Officials Player of the Year award. After graduation, Polosky attended SUNY Broome where she majored in Liberal Arts while playing basketball for the Hornets.

In 2008 Polosky led an unselfish team to the school's first NJCAA #1 national ranking and the MSAC Championship. Polosky earned All-Conference and All-Region honors during her tenure at Broome as well as being named captain her sophomore year. Upon graduation from Broome in 2009, she made the choice to attend SUNY Geneseo to finish her basketball career there. Once again Alyssa helped capture another championship, this time the SUNYAC Championship. While playing for the Knights she was named captain her senior year, made the First Team All-Conference, Second Team All-ECAC, Honorable Mention All-America by the Women's Basketball Coaching Association (WBCA), and was a State Farm All-American Honorable Mention in 2011.

During her 7 years as an assistant coach Geneseo saw six 20-win seasons, three SUNYAC Championships, a pair of trips to the Sweet 16 and four total NCAA Tournament appearances. The 2016/2017 season saw the Knights post a 25-3 record, 18-0 in conference play, and a SUNYAC Tournament Championship, their third since 2015.

When asked about his thoughts on Alyssa being named as his successor, Coach Hemer responded, "I'm extremely excited for Alyssa and even more so for the program at Geneseo. Alyssa bleeds navy and white and that dedication is what will drive her success there as a head coach." About the importance of Polosky's decision to come to Geneseo after Broome: "When I first became head coach at Geneseo, both Alyssa and BCC teammate Brittany Finkle were my main targets on the recruiting trail as we looked to build a winning culture. Once they committed to join our program, I knew that we were heading in the right direction. What I didn't realize is just how far Alyssa would take us as both a player and a coach. From being named an NCAA Division III All-American as a senior to a pair of Sweet 16 appearances as a coach, Alyssa has been the heart and soul of a program that became one of the premier names in the country."

After graduating from SUNY Broome in 2009, Alyssa transferred to Geneseo, where she earned a degree in Elementary and Special Education in 2012 and her Master's degree in Literacy in May of 2014. Polosky was a reading specialist at Avon Central School District where she also coached Avon Middle School's modified volleyball and softball teams. The former Endicott native resides in Rochester.

Where will Alyssa's next mark be? We can't wait to see!

- Carpet installation in the four BC Center classrooms should be completed in the upcoming week.







OUCH! August 2018: Smart Home Devices

Traditionally, only a few of your devices at home could connect to the Internet, such as your laptop, smartphone or gaming console. However, today, more and more devices are connecting to the Internet, from your light bulbs and speakers to your TV, locks on your door or even your car. Soon, almost every device in your house could be connected to the Internet.
