



This event is open to all students, staff, faculty and administration. Please come out and help our SUNY Broome PTA students help keep veterans moving.



Broome. In fact, I think community colleges as a whole represent the most diverse institution in the world," Dr. Drumm reflected.

While the United Nations might be more diverse, it doesn't have the open access of a community college, which by the virtue of its mission appeals to a wide range of populations, he said. Even today, community colleges

are often the first place where students encounter people different from themselves.

"This room

has an opportunity to do some informal teaching," acknowledged Joe Angelino, who represented Assemblyman Cliff Crouch at the event. Angelino grew up in Norwich, back when the Chenango County community had only two major ethnicities: Irish or Italian.

The Southern Tier is becoming more diverse, and spaces such as the Multicultural Resource Center play an integral part in quelling fears and forging connections.

Black History Month Career Opportunities in Healthcare Event: Meet panelist Nick White



Function Details: There is no "typical" student; how can we design courses that meet varied student needs? Universal design for learning (UDL) can help us build online courses that are not more accessible and flexible enough to engage a diverse group of students. UDL includes giving students various ways of acquiring information, interacting with the content and demonstrating understanding. Open Educational Practices (OEP) are a key strategy for developing flexible classes. We will look at how to design courses that increase student choice, encourage critical thinking, and improve learning outcomes. How can one build a course with this much student choice? It's not only possible; it's also orderly and fun!

Function Details: During the webinar, attendees will learn about a Montgomery College fellowship in which faculty created renewable assignments that required their students to become agents of change in the community. Attendees will understand the elements of the fellowship, including the application and selection process. The renewable assignments created by faculty fellows required that students tackle a United Nations Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) through their open pedagogy coursework. The fellowship required that faculty be grouped into interdisciplinary and intercampus teams so that student impact is maximized. The ultimate purpose of the fellowship is to achieve greater social justice in the community in which the work can be freely shared with the broader community. There were 15 faculty

fellows grouped into seven teams across 12 disciplines and three campuses. The open pedagogy assignments were deployed in 16 different courses and 25 sections across the College. Through this Fall 2018 fellowship, 571 students were impacted by this groundbreaking and transformative work.

Go global: Scholarship gives Isaac the opportunity to broaden his perspective on teaching

SUNY Broome's first recipient of the Diversity Abroad Honors Scholarship Award knew exactly where he wanted to go: Haiti, as part of the college's premier global service learning course.

"I wanted to broaden my horizons and see an area that has been impacted by natural disasters," said Isaac, who received the \$2,000 scholarship offered by the SUNY Office of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion. "I wanted to go somewhere to help out. Areas devastated by natural disasters can get neglected."

As part of the Health for Haiti class this January, Isaac participated in a number of initiatives, from providing health and dental care, to education, feeding the hungry and more.

"The people actually doing this program are doing it because they want to help somebody," he reflected. "It's different than study abroad programs where you go to learn a language."

Health for Haiti also gave the Sport Studies major the opportunity to teach physical education classes to children and teens in the Caribbean nation. It's an opportunity for applied learning that he appreciates, as he prepares to transfer to SUNY Cortland after graduating this May.

Shafiiqa is originally from Antigua in the Caribbean, and moved to the Southern Tier to join her family. She grew up surrounded by lively events such as Carnival, and a high school home economics course further piqued her interest in creating rewarding experiences for guests.

"I have a passion for fashion, and I wanted to find something where I could use those skills," she said.

Event Management proved to be a perfect fit. She is enjoying her classes this semester, which include Principles of Floral Design, Hotel and Restaurant Cost Control, Catering and Community Service, and Meetings, Corporate Events, Conventions, Trade Shows and Expos.

So far, however, her favorite classes have been Wedding Planning, in which students showcase their skills in

an annual Mock Wedding, and IT for Service Industries. The knowledge she gained from the latter course proved highly useful in other areas of her education, allowing her to create websites, use Excel spreadsheets and more.

Applied learning is a major part of the Event Management curriculum, giving students the opportunity to obtain mastery in their field even before graduation. The first event Shafiiqa will work on this semester is a mock co-ed bridal shower in the Calice Advanced Manufacturing Center, with more to follow, including the Mock Wedding later this spring.

"Applied learning makes things even better," she reflected. "It doesn't matter how much theory you have, you need the real-life experience to go with it."

After she graduates this May, she plans to transfer to SUNY Delhi for an online bachelor's degree in Event Management program. Following that? Entrepreneurship calls.

"SUNY Broome has a good Event Management program. It would be great if we could stay here to get a bachelor's degree," she said.

You are invited to attend the tenth annual Ethics Conference at SUNY Broome!

The event will take place from 3 to 8 p.m. in the Decker Health Science Center on Friday March 15.

This year's theme is the "Ethics of Politics" and we are pleased to announce our keynote speaker will be New York State Assemblywoman Donna Lupardo, who will be discussing the ethical situations that an elected official faces on a daily basis. Assemblywoman Donna Lupardo was first elected in 2004 and is currently in her eighth term representing the City of Binghamton and towns of Union and Vestal. She has a number of leadership positions in the Assembly, including chair of the Assembly Committee on Agriculture, chair of the New York Legislative Aviation Caucus, and former Chair of the Legislative Women's Caucus. We are honored to have Dr. Julia Hastings, professor in SUNY Albany's Schools of Public Health and Social Welfare, lead the discussion on issues affecting healthcare in the Black community.



Dr. Hastings has published works focusing on culturally competent research methods within African-American communities, welfare participation, depression, body weight and Type II diabetes. Her research has been funded by the National Institute of Minority Health and Health Disparities, and the Ford and Robert Wood Johnson foundations. Dr. Hastings earned her M.S.W. from University of Washington and her Ph.D from University of California, Los Angeles. She also completed postdoctoral training at University of Michigan, as well as completing certification in epidemiology from the Department of Epidemiology at the University of Michigan School of Public Health.

Mr. Walston also serves in the New York State Department of Health AIDS Institute in the Bureau Division of HIV. Previously Mr. Walston served as Interim Director of the Whitney M. Young Methadone Maintenance Treatment Program, President of Literacy NY of the Greater Capital Region, Grants Chair of the Albany Fund Education and formally served as Board President of Treatment Alternatives to Street Crimes.

Additional Eligibility Criteria

- Candidates must be United States citizens, permanent resident aliens and New York State residents. Those nominated from underrepresented and low-income categories may receive positive consideration as diversity candidates.
- Campuses may consider financial need and economic disadvantage as a diversity indicator, but applicants must also meet a high academic standard as evidenced by GPA and supporting recommendations.




If you're a size 10 petite, Assemblywoman Donna Lupardo has you covered.

She was among the first donors to <u>SUNY Broome's Career Closet</u>, which provides free professional clothing, shoes and accessories to students for career fairs, job interviews and internships. In fact, she brought another bag full of donations to the Career Closet's official grand opening on Feb. 21.

"As a community college, it's part of our mission to meet people at their need," said SUNY Broome President Kevin E. Drumm, whose first professional outfit during his college years involved a tweed sports coat. "The Career Closet fills a critical need for our students by helping them to bridge the gap between higher education and their future careers."



A part of the college's <u>Applied Learning and Career Center</u> (ALCC), the Career Closet is located just down the hall from the ALCC in the Applied Technologies Building, and features racks of professional clothes, accessories, shoes and even cosmetics. To be eligible, SUNY Broome students must meet with an assigned Career Coach at least twice, develop a final resume with that Career Coach and have a job or internship opportunity, or plan to attend an upcoming career fair. Students keep the outfit.

"The professional outfit they receive is, in essence, part of a plan to help them achieve their first career milestone – landing a job they love," said Executive Vice President and Chief Academic Officer Francis Battisti. "More milestones will follow, but they will build upon that first one, which is why it's so important that they get the best start they can right here at SUNY Broome."

The ALCC has been helping students polish their resumes and practice for interviews ever since they opened in the Fall of 2016. Early on, however, ALCC staff noticed that many students faced a significant challenge in acquiring the right clothes for those interviews because they were tough to afford on a tight budget, noted SUNY Broome Vice President of Student Development and Chief Diversity Carol Ross-Scott, who secured needed funding for the project.


They first referred students to community organizations where they could acquire low-cost professional clothing. But in the long run, offering the service on the SUNY Broome campus made sense as a way to support students.

"We know that people are visual and first impressions in a job interview mean everything," Dr. Ross-Scott said. And it's not just about having the shoes and pantsuits, she emphasized. "A professional wardrobe makes you feel more like a professional and act more like a professional," she said.



A portrait in resilience: From Bosnia to SUNY Broome

When Senada Serifovski first came to the United States from Bosnia, life proved lonely and difficult.

Her sister lived here, but Senada had to leave her husband behind while she established herself in her new country. On her second day in the United States, she learned that she was pregnant. She then tried to expedite the process for her husband to join her.

"I was told it would take 3 to 6 months. It took around 3 years," she said. "I only knew my sister and she didn't speak much English, so she couldn't help. I didn't have a job or know anyone, or know the language. I didn't even have enough clothing or a mattress; I slept on a blanket."

Just four months after her daughter was born, Senada had to find employment, which in turn required her to find a babysitter. Soon after, she received more bad news: Due to a translation error, her husband's paperwork – and thus his entry to the United States – was denied. He would have to begin the entire process over, proving that he was married to Senada and the father of her child.

The days were long, lonely and hard – but the Serifovskis made it through. Sefat joined her in June 2002, when their daughter was two years and four months old.

"Life got much easier," she said.

A better life

Senada Serifovski is no stranger to hardship. When she was just 15 years old, she fled her country during the Bosnian War, taking shelter for the next several years in nearby Croatia. She returned home and married her husband – he's from Croatia – in 1998. But war-damaged Bosnia didn't offer the opportunities she needed to live and start a family, so Senada looked to make a better life in the United States.

Once Safet joined her, the couple worked in a local factory. They split shifts – Senada worked first shift and her husband second – to accommodate their childcare needs. They expanded their family with a son in 2004.

Factory work can be hard on the body, and Senada hurt her back in 2006. Still, she kept at it until she was laid off in 2010. After a year off, she found another job, only to get laid off again last June.

It was time for a change – and Senada enrolled at SUNY Broome.

"I decided to go back to school because I didn't see myself working in factories for the rest of my life," she said.

The Office Administration major is now in her second semester and taking her first business classes, following a semester of English as a Second Language.

She isn't alone. Her husband Safet will graduate this May with a degree in Manufacturing Technology, juggling full-time employment with a full course load. And their daughter, currently a high school senior, will attend SUNY Broome this fall to study International Business.

She has found a helpful guide in her advisor, Business Information Technology chair Mark Ryan. Favorite instructors include Myriam Stanton and Caroline Raychawdhuri in the ESL program, and Professor Denise Wells in BIT.

She is enjoying her time at SUNY Broome and had the opportunity to share her culture last semester during International Students Week, when she made goulash for the Dining Hall. After she finishes her degree, she plans to continue working toward her American dream.





Dr. Hastings will be accompanied by Mr. Barry Walston, M.S.W. Mr. Walston currently serves as the President of the Albany Black Child Development Institute, delivering culturally relevant resources and programs that address early childhood education, health, child welfare, literacy and family engagement. Mr. Walston also serves in the New York State Department of Health AIDS Institute in the Bureau Division of HIV. Previously Mr. Walston served as Interim Director of the Whitney M. Future teacher: Nakeesta finds community and a solid start at SUNY Broome

While working as a special education teacher's aide at Whitney Point Elementary School, Nakeesta Langton knew she had found her calling.

As she worked with students on their lessons, she functioned a bit like a mini-teacher. Noticing her interest, Pamela Carr – the teacher she aided – encouraged Nakeesta to take the next step toward achieving her dream.

"Through Pam Carr's encouragement and the support of my loving husband Chad, I enrolled into college," she said.

She enrolled in the college's Teacher Education program, part of the General Studies A.S. degree program in Liberal Arts. SUNY Broome gave her a solid start, and not only due to its rigorous academics, applied learning opportunities and seamless transfer to schools such as SUNY Cortland. Growing up, Nakeesta's late godfather was the college's basketball coach and she frequently visited BCC – as the college was then called – for games.

"I grew up loving this campus – the community of it, the closeness and the family of it. It made me fall in love with it. For me, it was a no-brainer to go here first," she said.

Mom, student, tutor, leader

Nakeesta had put aside the prospect of higher education as she focused on her role as a wife and stay-at-home mom during her children's important developmental years. While returning to college as an older student can be daunting, she made the transition to college life easily, drawing on her experience both as a mom and teacher's aide helping others with their homework.

"My kids think it's kind of neat. They think it's cool that mom is going to school. Their good scores on tests go on the fridge, and sometimes they say, 'Here's a good one, Mom; you should post it," she reflected. "School is a part of life; it takes determination and striving."

She has enjoyed all of her professors, and counting off a list of their names: Dr. Leira Manso and Dr. Phyllis Amenda in History, Philosophy and Social Science. Dr. Courtney O'Hagen in psychology, Professor Chris Origer in English and Professor Lenny Grozier in Early Childhood Education. Instructors Barbara Trimm and Erin Potter in Physical Sciences, Pamela Troshan in sign language and Rebekah Edwards in the Learning Assistance Department. BECA Club advisor Christine Webb.

"I haven't had a poor experience. Everybody has been amazing and supportive," she said.

She is also highly active outside of the classroom and her required field experience – as a tutor, a student worker in the <u>Accessibility Resources Office</u>, and a member of multiple clubs, including the American Sign Language Club and Phi Theta Kappa.

Nakeesta is also president of the <u>Broome Educators of Children Association</u>, one of the most active clubs on campus. In addition to professional development workshops, the club also raises money through multiple events – from bake sales and volleyball tournaments to the Scholastic book fair – to support the B.C. Center, which provides quality daycare for the children of students and the larger campus community.

"I've got a lot of eggs in a lot of baskets. I'm trying to make the most of it and get experience," she said. "It's very complicated, but I do it all from 8 to 2. After hours, I'm a mom and college gets turned off, excluding homework. During those hours, I'm no different from any other student on campus."

Now in her fourth semester, <u>Nakeesta will transfer to SUNY Cortland this fall via the Path to Cortland Program</u>. She is hoping to teach students in the third through sixth grade range in the community – and give back to her alma mater someday, perhaps as an adjunct instructor or professor.

"During the summer, I want to give back to the college that gave so much to me. It's been amazing," she said.


SUNY Broome Physical Therapist Assistants bring home the Golden Goniometer

Challenge accepted: Engineering Science students present at Chancellor's showcase

When SUNY Chancellor Kristina Johnson visited SUNY Broome last fall, she engaged Engineering Science students about their work in energy conservation, viewing their projects in the campus' Sustainability Sandbox. That's not all.

"She gave them a challenge – to develop a better electrical outlet that would automatically turn itself off to save energy when it wasn't needed," explained Engineering Science Professor Robert Lofthouse. "The students were really impressed by meeting Chancellor Johnson and they worked on some of these ideas in design class."

Three SUNY Broome Engineering Science students headed to Albany to participate in the Chancellor's showcase, which took place just prior to her State of the University System address on Jan. 31. Diana Kelly, <u>Brandon Kipp</u> and <u>Nick Hayko</u> explained their ongoing research into phantom or vampire energy – the electrical current used by devices even when they're not in use.

Take Professor Lofthouse's Keurig

coffeemaker as an example. Even without a display, it uses 4 watts of energy all the time about the same as an energy efficient lightbulb. (This is why it's a good idea to unplug devices you're not using.)

Green energy and energy conservation are particular interests of

the Chancellor, who co-founded a clean-energy and infrastructure company and once served as Undersecretary for the U.S. Department of Energy. During her visit to campus, students learned about a particular quirk of hers: When she stays in hotels, one of the first things she'll do is unplug the unused mini-refrigerator, which uses a great deal of energy.

The energy use of mini-refrigerators of this type was included in the students' presentation, along with a poster showing their progress on the Chancellor's challenge and a demonstration of the energy efficiency of light bulbs.

In the future, intelligent outlets may solve the problem of phantom energy – and perhaps be integrated into smart homes that can alert residents to problems. And who knows? Maybe SUNY Broome students will be the inventors.

STEM Star: Clyde maps his future in computer science

When Clyde Van Dyke was in middle school, college was unimaginable. Even a high school degree seemed unrealistic; after all, his father didn't graduate, and Clyde lost his mother when he was only 3. He grew up poor and without the financial and familial resources of his peers.

Fast-forward to his senior year in high school, and the Johnson City teen is already taking classes at SUNY Broome. A part of the P-TECH program, he was recently named the winner of the 2019 4-H Youth in Action Pillar Award for Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM), sponsored by HughesNet.

In 4-H, he is the national spokesperson for all things STEM and celebrated for his skills with geospatial mapping. He has met with leaders at Google headquarters in New York City, offering his perspectives on how to make STEM more appealing to young people. Clyde has already received one \$5,000 college scholarship and is in the running to win \$10,000 more at the 10th annual 4-H Legacy Awards banquet in Washington, D.C.

All of it – the scholarship, the academic success, the opportunities through P-Tech – may owe itself to one particular day, when a friend invited him to a 4-H technology club meeting and transformed his life. He discovered a knack for all things tech, and the motivation, resources and communications skills he needed to excel.

"I really like computers and computers seem to like me as well," he said. "I'm really getting into computer science and the whole coding aspect."

Through Broome County 4-H, Clyde became involved in the Geospatial Mapping Club, which uses mapping to visualize data. He has since used geospatial mapping to explore a range of societal issues, including the development of the opioid epidemic from 2008 to 2018 and factors that contribute to high overdose death rates, he explained.

He also plotted costs for 4-H day camps, with the aim of helping low-income families with the decision-making process. For a career exploration day at Cornell University, he developed a mobile application that plotted building locations and places of interest; it was a hit.

"There was a lot of positive reaction to that: 'They were like, Oh my God, a kid did this?" he said.

A head start in college

Not only is college in Clyde's future, he is well on the way to earning his Associate's degree through <u>P-Tech</u>. Funded by a grant, <u>Pathways in Technology Early College High School</u> (P-TECH) is a collaboration between SUNY Broome, Broome-Tioga BOCES, area school districts and a half-dozen industry partners, and is designed to provide a career pathway for economically disadvantaged students.

This is Clyde's fourth year in <u>P-Tech</u> and the first taking classes on the SUNY Broome campus. For the first three years in the program, he took Fast Forward courses through Broome-Tioga BOCES, and found his path in computer science.

"Being on a college campus – I have so many friends who are jealous! It's a new level of independence, being able to walk to your own classes," said Clyde, who won P-Tech's Shining Star Award last year.

Of course, there are tradeoffs: The workload is definitely heavier than a high school class, but Clyde doesn't mind. He is currently taking courses in computer programming and online security, and enjoyed an online Winter Term career exploration class that gave him the opportunity to map out his life's path.

Through P-Tech, Clyde also completed an internship at BAE Systems over the summer. "It got me thinking about my career path in the future," he said.

While P-Tech students typically finish their degree at SUNY Broome following graduation, Clyde – who will have half of his Associate's degree completed this May – will transfer to SUNY Delhi this fall to major in digital forensics and computer information systems.

Of course, he can always transfer credits back to receive his Associate's degree at SUNY Broome, through a process known as reverse transfer. Click here to learn more.

"I feel like SUNY Broome gets into project based learning and hands-on interactions. That's something you don't get a lot in a high school class," he reflected. "P-TECH has definitely shown me that college is a viable option."



From Hornet to Red Dragon: Make your Path to Cortland appointment today

Nakeesta Langton knew early on that she wanted to transfer to SUNY Cortland and fulfill her dream of becoming a teacher. That's why she connected with <u>Greg Diller</u>, Cortland's transfer mobility advisor, during her very first semester in the Early Childhood Education program at SUNY Broome.

"During my fourth week at school, I was already talking with Greg about what I could do to maximize my classes here. He provided so much insight," said Nakeesta, who is graduating from SUNY Broome this May. "I'm hoping to have half of my concentration done before I get there."

Now in its second year, the <u>Path to Cortland program</u> helps students plan their futures. Students – who don't have to be committed to SUNY Cortland, or near graduation – can schedule an appointment with Diller, the visiting expert on topics ranging from course recommendations to financial aid, student life and support services.

It's best to make your appointment early in the semester to get the transfer program's full impact. While March 1 is the priority deadline for the Fall 2019 semester, SUNY Cortland will still accept applications after that date – but students shouldn't delay, Diller advised.

Meeting during your final year at SUNY Broome can prove helpful, but Diller recommends meeting during your first or second semester here – much like Nakeesta.

"Some programs at Cortland are large and the more we can take advantage of the great options that Broome has for Cortland, the better the transfer experience can be. It is never too early to meet and it may save you an entire semester down the road," he said.

Diller is on campus weekly on alternating Mondays and Tuesdays, although he's willing to add dates and availability in accordance with student demand. You can make an appointment at cortland.edu/transfer-path or email him at Gregory.diller@cortland.edu for more information.

All appointments will be at SUNY Broome in the Academic Advising Department located in SS-210. Diller will ask you to fill out a form before your appointment takes place, so he can more adequately address your needs. Make sure to bring a copy of your DegreeWorks so he can see your courses.

And don't worry: You won't be pressured to leave the hive early! Your experience at SUNY Broome will complement and enhance your eventual transfer. Just ask Nakeesta (and stay tuned for a future profile story on her experience at SUNY Broome).

"While I am excited and can't wait to be a part of the Cortland Red Dragon family, I am glad that I decided to stay at SUNY Broome and complete the Associate's degree," she said. "I feel at home here and will truly miss the close Broome community and the ECE family next fall."

From paramedic to nurse: Tyler prepares for a different role in emergency medicine

When it comes to saving lives, Tyler Gregory draws his inspiration from his mom.

When Tyler was around 12 years old, his grandfather suffered a heart attack. To help to care for him, Tyler's mother obtained her CPR certification at the local fire department – and ending up staying on as an emergency medical technician. Tyler followed her footsteps, joining the Unadilla Fire Department at the age of 16 and ended up going on calls with his mom.

"She's been my mentor and my biggest supporter," he said.

He was initially hesitant to go to college, due to less-than-positive experiences in high school. In 2012, he took the leap and enrolled in the Emergency Medical Technology/Paramedic program at SUNY Broome – and was glad he did. When he decided to take a different path and become a nurse, he knew just where to go.

"The educators are amazing, the student body is amazing and the ability to talk to people for anything you need," he said of his SUNY Broome experience. "I've always loved this school."

Why the change? Paramedicine is a rewarding career, but it can also be physically demanding. "It takes a toll on the back," Tyler reflected. He also appreciates the opportunity to provide compassionate care to patients in a different capacity: working in the emergency units where he once transported patients.

Tyler's long-term dream is to become a nurse practitioner, and eventually work in the pediatric emergency room at SUNY Upstate Medical University in Syracuse.

He has already accepted an Emergency Room externship position at UHS Wilson Medical Center post-graduation. Nurses who work in emergency units need to have at least a year of experience, he explained. The externship program is designed to offer that additional training with a year-long orientation that covers multiple units before transitioning participants onto the floor as nurses.

As a paramedic, Tyler transported quite a few patients to Wilson through the years, and he appreciates the quality of the UHS system. SUNY Broome's Nursing program is also top-notch, he said, and includes clinical rotations to familiarize students with the field.

"There's always something new to explore in the Nursing program. The educators are exceptional," he said.

Tyler also took advantage of international learning opportunities. In January 2018, he participated in the Health for Haiti global service learning course, where he lent a hand at medical clinics in the pharmacy operation, as well as other humanitarian and educational efforts. Program organizers Jennifer Musa and Maureen Hankin are his favorite professors, and he was deeply touched by the experience. In spite of poverty and adverse living conditions, the Haitian people are friendly and kind, he reflected.

"I would never had thought in a million years I would somehow end up in global education and health, providing care," he said.



Distinguished Faculty Ranks Call for Nominations

February 13, 2019 Categories: Uncategorized



All candidates must be at Full Professor Rank and have received a Chancellor's Award for Excellence in the area for which they are nominated.

The Distinguished Faculty Ranks include: Distinguished Professorship, Distinguished Service Professorship, Distinguished Teaching Professorship and Distinguished Librarian. The Distinguished Faculty Rank is above that of full professor and is conferred solely by the SUNY Board of Trustees as a promotion in rank or an honorific distinction. A candidate who is nominated for an award must not have been nominated for the same award in the past two years.

- 1. Distinguished Professorship recognizes faculty who have achieved national or international prominence through research and scholarship or artistic performance or achievement.a. Academic Rank Candidates must have attained the rank of full Professor.b. Length of Service Candidates must have held the rank of Professor for at least five years and must have at least one year of full-time service at the nominating institution.
- 2. The Distinguished Service Professorship recognizes faculty who have earned a notable reputation for service not only within SUNY but more broadly, to the state and nation.a. Academic Rank Candidates must have attained the rank of full Professor.b. Length of Service Candidates must have held the rank of Professor for five years, must have at least three years of full-time service at the nominating institution, and must have completed at least ten years of full-time service in the State University of New York.
- 3. The Distinguished Teaching Professorship recognizes faculty for outstanding teaching competence at the graduate, undergraduate, or professional levels.a. Academic Rank Candidates must have attained the rank of full Professor.b. Length of Service Candidates must have held the rank of Professor for five years, have completed at least three years of full-time teaching on the campus that recommends the appointment and ten years of full-time teaching in the State University of New York.
- 4. The rank of Distinguished Librarian recognizes transformational contributions in creating a new information environment and fostering information literacy.a. Academic Rank Candidates must have attained the rank of full Librarian or, for community colleges, the rank of full Professor with clear and direct full-time responsibilities pertaining to library service.b. Length of Service Candidates must have completed at least five years of full-time service at the rank of Librarian (or full Professor with direct library responsibilities at a community college), have completed three years of full-time librarianship on the campus that recommends the appointment, and at least ten years of service within the State University of New York.

Upon appointment, Distinguished Faculty are inducted into the SUNY Distinguished Academy, leveraging their collective expertise to address System-wide, state, and global challenges.

The Distinguished Professorship programs nominations forwarded to the System-level must be the product of an **objective and rigorous** campus review. Further, the nomination process should benefit from the involvement of a broad spectrum of the campus community. Under no circumstance, may faculty apply or self-nominate for these programs.

CONFIDENTIALITY

Appointment to the Distinguished Professorship, Distinguished Service
Professorship, Distinguished Teaching Professorship, or Distinguished Librarian is an academic career
capstone. Conversely, non-selection elicits enormous disappointment. The sensitivities inherent in these
programs and the nature of the supporting documentation make it imperative that **all deliberations**, **communications**, **and actions of the campus committee remain strictly confidential.** Ideally, this should
extend to the identity of those selected by the local selection committee as the campus' nominees for these
promotions.

Further, because of the confidentiality of these proceedings, the System-level coordinator of these programs will interact only with the campus President or the President's designee.

Due to the confidential nature of the nomination, the nominator will be responsible for preparing the documentation for the nominee, without the nominee's knowledge. Nominators will be provided more information on documentation requirements shortly after the nomination deadline.






Phi Theta Kappa To Collect Food For CHOW At Student Activities Day on Feb. 14



Additional Eligibility Criteria

- Campuses may consider financial need and economic disadvantage as a diversity indicator, but applicants must also meet a high academic standard as evidenced by GPA and supporting recommendations.



Without instruments to provide the tune, a cappella singing showcases the glory of the human voice, and the intricate possibilities that underlay harmony and melody. But while fairly common at four-year colleges and universities, student-run a cappella groups are rare at community colleges, due to the continual turnover of the campus population.

Enter Anastasia Alexopoulos, a second-year Music major at SUNY Broome and one of the organizers behind the Buzz Tones.

Two of Anastasia's friends started the group in Fall 2018 as the Stinging Singers, but had to bow out when their own schedules conflicted. Anastasia, whose major focuses on vocal performance, stepped in to keep the group going. One name change later, the Buzz Tones is entirely student-run, conducting their own rehearsals, picking musical numbers and finding arrangements.

The singers were friends before the group began, but have grown closer during the practices, which typically take place every other day. They have performed during various campus concerts, as well as the Spring Faculty Staff Assembly, and have made their debut at community and charity events. These include caroling at the Veterans Home in Oxford, singing at a Christmas party for a group home, and participating in Choruses for CHOW, which benefits the Community Hunger Outreach Warehouse.

Originally from Long Island, Anastasia's family moved to Vestal, then Owego. Appropriately enough for a future a cappella singer, she began her musical journey at her Greek Orthodox Church, singing Byzantine chants.

While her involvement in the church choir began at her mother's behest, her high school chorus teacher sparked an increasing interest in voice. She joined her school's chorus, chamber choir and jazz band, along with Making the Band, Owego Free Academy's school rock band. She isn't just limited to singing, either; she

has also played the bass for 13 years.

She has a trio of favorite singers: Esperanza Spalding, who combines jazz singing and bass playing, much like Anastasia herself; Michael Bublé ("I'm a very big jazz fan," Anastasia explained); and the popular singer Adele.

Riffing on the future

Anastasia didn't initially intend on going to her local community college. She applied to many different schools, but advice from family and friends led her in a different direction.

"A lot of people told me that SUNY Broome was changing and I should check it out. At first, I was a little skeptical. My mom said, 'Just try it,'" she said.

She's glad she did, and is especially grateful to her voice professor, Music Coordinator Brenda Dawe.

"Once I came here, I began to be able to see what I'm capable of," she said. "I feel that SUNY Broome gave me a great opportunity."

SUNY Broome has also become part of a family tradition. Anastasia's older sister Panayiota is a student here, and president of the International Students Organization. Her younger brother Vasili will become a Hornet this fall. Their three other siblings are still a little young for college, but don't be surprised to see an Alexopoulos in the hive for years to come.

Now in her last semester, Anastasia is considering her transfer options; her top schools are SUNY Fredonia,

SUNY Potsdam and Queens College. Her long-term goals are to earn a Master's of Music in jazz performance and perhaps a Ph.D. in music education, and teach at the college level – much like her own professors.

Why college? "When you see music majors, they're there because they really want to be in class," she explained. "In high school, sometimes you get kids who feel like they're forced to be there."

She has a role model in her favorite instructor, Laurence Elder – a critically acclaimed songwriter, vocalist and pianist who has toured extensively with Grammy Award-winning music artists.

"He's awesome. I want to be like him – teaching, but with my own jazz band and records," Anastasia said.

Dr. Hastings earned her M.S.W. from University of Washington and her Ph.D from University of California, Los Angeles. She also completed postdoctoral training at University of Michigan, as well as completing certification in epidemiology from the Department of Epidemiology at the University of Michigan School of Public Health.

Dr. Hastings will be accompanied by Mr. Barry Walston, M.S.W. Mr. Walston currently serves as the President of the Albany Black Child Development Institute, delivering culturally relevant resources and programs that address early childhood education, health, child welfare, literacy and family engagement. Mr. Walston also serves in the New York State Department of Health AIDS Institute in the Bureau Division of HIV. Previously Mr. Walston served as Interim Director of the Whitney M. Young Methadone Maintenance Treatment Program, President of Literacy NY of the Greater Capital Region, Grants Chair of the Albany Fund Education and formally served as Board President of Treatment Alternatives to Street Crimes.

Feb. 5 incident in the Student Village



Subject: Deadline for Sabbatical Leave Applications

The deadline for the receipt of Sabbatical Leave Applications is Friday, March 15, 2019.

Specifics regarding application content, per the Faculty Contract, are as follows:

Each application shall include a statement outlining the program of study to be followed while on leave, stating that the applicant intends to continue as a member of the academic staff for a period of at least two years following the expiration of his/her said sabbatical leave and further stating that upon his/her return the applicant shall submit to the President a report (copied to the EVP/CAO preferred) of his/her accomplishment while on sabbatical leave.

At this time, the amount of funding that will be available for sabbaticals is uncertain. However, we are collecting applications and applicants will be notified whether budget conditions will permit sabbaticals.

Sabbatical application forms may be obtained in the Administration Office, Wales 107 from Rhoda Neal. Sabbaticals are available for **full-time permanent faculty members only.**


Great Books Discussion to begin Feb. 8





SUNY Broome finalizes new transfer agreements with SUNY Canton, Ireland's University of Limerick

SUNY Broome students majoring in Sports Management, Music, Mathematics and Criminal Justice now have new opportunities for seamless transfer to finish their bachelor's degree.

The college recently finalized transfer agreements with SUNY Canton and the University of Limerick in western Ireland, its <u>first international partner</u>.

"We often say, 'You can go anywhere from here.' As these latest transfer agreements show, it's really true," said SUNY Broome President Kevin E. Drumm. "You can even take a global path and finish your bachelor's in Ireland. No matter what field you're in or where you are headed, SUNY Broome will get you there — even to Ireland."

The new transfer agreement with SUNY Canton links SUNY Broome's A.S. in Sports Management to the latter's B.B.A. program in the same field. The college also has finalized three transfer agreements with the University of Limerick in Criminal Justice, Mathematics and Performing Arts.

The Limerick transfer agreements apply to students in SUNY Broome's Criminal Justice — Police A.A.S. and Criminal Justice — Corrections A.S. programs; the Mathematics A.S. program; and the Music A.S. program tracks in Education and Performance, Sound Engineering or Music Therapy. All students must maintain at least a minimum cumulative grade point average of 3.0 to be eligible.

To qualify, Mathematics students must take MAT 250: Discrete Mathematics, and MAT 266: Introduction to Higher Math or MAT 282: Differential Equations with Linear Algebra before transfer. Music students, with the exception of those in sound engineering, must complete an audition by Limerick Music Department, which will be conducted on the SUNY Broome campus.

SUNY Broome currently has nearly 150 transfer agreements with almost three dozen different colleges and universities.
