# Step by step: Rachael works toward her dream of becoming an attorney

Rachael Klug had always dreamt of becoming a lawyer, but life took her down some dark roads.

She has struggled with addiction herself, although she has been in recovery and rebuilding her life for the last six years. Two years ago, she lost her daughter to a heroin overdose, as the opioid epidemic swept the Southern Tier.

When it came time to pursue her professional aspirations, she decided to enroll at SUNY Broome, planning to use the credits she earned 10 years prior at Rochester Business Institute. But it turned out that the school, which had since changed its name, was owned by Corinthian Colleges Inc. – a for-profit chain that ended up shuttering all its campuses.

The school was unaccredited and none of the coursework transferred.

"It was one of those crossroads," she said. "I thought, 'I'm this old. I can stop right now, or I can continue to go on."

She chose to go on. This May, she will graduate with a degree in Criminal Justice – Corrections and transfer into Binghamton University's Philosophy, Politics and Law program. From there, it's off to law school, with the ultimate goal of becoming a judge in drug court and an attorney.

Even if she ultimately decides against going to law school, she has professional options, she pointed out.

"If I go for two years and get my associate's, there are plenty of criminal justice jobs I could work in. I can go on to get my bachelor's, and there are fields I can go into," she said.

#### **Opening doors**

Rachael has excelled in the classroom, and recently won the SUNY Chancellor's Award for Student Excellence, along with <u>Orion Barber</u> and <u>Minhyung Park</u>. She also tutors her fellow Hornets in criminal justice courses and participates in the very active Criminal Justice and Emergency Services Student Association (CJESSA), which performs volunteer traffic control for community events and holds multiple oncampus activities throughout the semester.

#### Adult learners at SUNY Broome

Off campus, she works at a restaurant, raises her teenage son – he helps her study for class — and spends much of her free time volunteering at CASA-Trinity, which helps people with addiction issues find the resources they need in Tioga County. She also does a good deal of outreach, sharing her story of addiction, loss and recovery with the Tioga County community at various events.

"I work with addicts and have done so for a while. I find that to be a passion of mine; it's where my heart is," she said. "I can understand the road they're on and the despair they feel, and the need for hope. I think it's a great place to put my career dreams and goals."

Professors who have made a major impact on Rachael's SUNY Broome experience include Kerry Weber, Leigh Martindale, Kathleen McKenna, Joseph Julian, Jesse Boring and Diane O'Heron. She took her first online course in forensic science with Professor Daniel Brennan, who was very approachable and helped allay her fears of digital learning. So did Professor Steven Call, when she nervously took a history class; he, too, was available to students, even answering student emails sent on a Saturday night.

"It's not easy to come back to school at my age, but never once at this school have I felt out of place — whether with faculty or staff or even students. Everybody has been very welcoming and supportive of the things I wanted to do," she said. "The staff have gone out of their way to open doors to further my goals. I've gotten lots of positive feedback that allows me to grow as a student, as a person, as an all-around fellow human being."

Coming back to school after losses, setbacks and a long time away can be daunting – but for Rachael Klug, it ultimately proved a worthwhile experience.

"It has been amazing. It has been very rewarding and encouraging," she said. "I have met people who are interested in my success, people who encourage me along the way."

# Final frontier: Engineering Science alum works on projects for the International Space Station

At 220 miles above the Earth, the International Space Station (ISS) relies on a complex web of systems to keep astronauts safe and healthy in the void of space.

Repairing or replacing equipment in space proves difficult, which is why teams of engineers – including SUNY Broome alumnus Phuc Vo – make sure to troubleshoot systems while they're still on the ground.

"We have to anticipate any potential failure modes, design its redundancies and control the potential hazards on the ground, before it's sent up to the ISS," explained Phuc, a 2016 Engineering Science grad who is now a reliability engineer for Collins Aerospace in Connecticut.

#### **Coming to SUNY Broome**

While Phuc Vo didn't face the kind of journey astronauts do, he has followed his own globe-trotting course.

Originally from Vietnam, he joined his parents and older sister in Binghamton in 2014. Going to college was a priority, but he needed to hone his English language skills and familiarity with American culture first.

"The U.S. and English were a whole new world for me," he explained. "I didn't know much about the education system, as well as the study style here."

He did have family ties to the college, however; both of his brothers-in-law had attended what was then called Broome Community College. They had good things to say and encouraged Phuc to earn his associate degree at the college before transferring on.

Initially, his tenuous grasp of English made college an isolating experience. Phuc – known during his SUNY Broome days for his beautiful social media shots of campus – often avoided conversations with his fellow students early on, fearing that he wouldn't be able to make himself understood.

What helped: four <u>English as a Second Language classes</u>, small class sizes and understanding professors, who could read the questions in his eyes and help him understand.

"My professors, they know even when I don't say it," Phuc remembered. "They look at my face, and they understand my thinking."

He has a special appreciation for Engineering Science Professor Thomas Grace. After discovering that he needed an electrical circuit class to meet the requirements of one of his prospective transfer schools, Phuc enrolled – three weeks after the class began. The week after he started, he faced a quiz and a test – giving him

essentially five days to master topics his fellow students had been studying for the past few weeks.

During those five days, he spent most of his time studying in the Applied Technologies Building lobby, and meeting with Professor Grace during any available office hour.

"He always answered my questions with a smile, and ... he explained it until I was clear on what I was asking," said Phuc, who ended up earning a perfect score on the quiz and test. "I always feel that he is one of the best professors I've met."

#### To the Ivy League and beyond

The future engineer was accepted by multiple transfer schools, including Virginia Tech, Binghamton University, Carnegie Mellon University and the Georgia Institute of Technology, to name a few. Ultimately, he chose Cornell University, and earned his bachelor's in electrical and computer engineering in 2018.

His time at SUNY Broome gave him the skills he needed to succeed – not only when it comes to the English language, but in critical thinking, problem solving, teamwork and the ability to work independently, he said.

"Sometimes I thought (that) if I didn't go to SUNY Broome and went directly to Cornell, I would fail there," he said. "The two years (I spent) at SUNY Broome is very important in my life. Without those two years, I couldn't make it this far."

During his second semester at Cornell, he decided to accept an information technology internship at UTC Aerospace Systems in Windsor Locks, Connecticut. The following year, he returned to Connecticut as a software engineering intern at the aerospace manufacturer Pratt & Whitney, providing assistance on an aircraft engine project.

Aerospace interested him and he decided to join the field once he graduated, taking a job as a reliability engineer at Collins, also in Windsor Locks. (UTC acquired Rockwell Collins, and they merged to form Collins Aerospace in 2018.)

"When I was a kid, there was a question always in my mind: Where else can we go if, one day, Earth is no longer a home for humans? People are still working on the answer to that question and I want to be part of that team," he said.

Long-term, Phuc Vo plans to pursue his master's degree in systems engineering at Cornell or a master's in cyber-security at the University of California-Berkeley. His ultimate goal is to work at NASA headquarters or for the Navy's submarine program.

He encouraged fellow STEM-savvy Hornets to consider a future in engineering science. The program is academically challenging, but always interesting and leads to great career options. Solving problems and being at the forefront of new technology are also very fulfilling, he said.

"I shared with you my story, but I know one day, it will be your turn to share with the world your story," Phuc Vo said to his fellow Hornets. "And I will be proud to say that our stories have one thing in common: SUNY Broome Community College."



## ASK! will be held April 9. Here's how it started

ASK!, an interactive safe space for dialogue around difference, will be held from 1 to 2:45 p.m. April 9 in Decker 201. The event is sponsored by the President's Task Force on Diversity and Inclusion and offered as part of this year's Convocation Day activities.

In preparing for this year's event, organizers reached out to Deb Hibbard, retired SUNY Broome counselor, who first proposed and implemented this idea, to see how she originally conceived of the event.

Hibbard: The idea for ASK! came after I read an article in The Chronicle of Higher Education in 2015 called, "Bring Muslims, Evangelicals and Atheists Together on Campus," in which the authors Eboo Patel and Mary Ellen Giess advocated for conversations about religious diversity and recommended that conversations should be high-level, cross-campus, sustained, and actively woven into everything, including first-year orientation.

It occurred to me then, that as a culture, we're increasingly comfortable accepting stereotypes about all sorts of categories of people. If you know I am a veteran, a lesbian, a professor, a Pagan or a police officer, you have a short and often erroneous list of things you immediately think you know about me. These assumptions we have about one another keep us from understanding not just the person who identifies with or is identified with a particular group, but also how complex, rich and beautiful every one of us is.

The first year we sent out flyers, made Diversity Passports which were stamped by one of the many people sitting at tables where they identified themselves as Christians, gay people, people who identified as mentally ill, veterans and many others. If a student asked the person at the table questions, they got a stamp. If they were too uncomfortable coming up with a question, each table had a list of questions they could use. We sent

a letter to professors asking them to consider giving their students extra credit for coming and being curious.

The purpose was multi layered: to spread awareness and acceptance of differences across campus and learn about others; to highlight the importance of open-mindedness and how first impressions are not a reliable source in creating a community with equality and social justice; to promote face-to-face communications; and to provide safe and welcoming environment for the open-minded and curious.

The first year several people sat for 15 minutes at one table surprised, they later said, at how much they had in common with a person they felt was "other." One table had three people who didn't agree how they should be named and those that came to the table saw them discussing the merits of being labeled "disabled" vs "differently abled" and joined in the conversation. ASK! is now going into its fourth year.

While this year's convocation theme asks us to reflect on the effect of daily technology use and the immersion into our cell phones and social media sites, ASK! will focus on the interpersonal connections that can be made one on one in a safe environment where we can just talk to each other. We hope to see you there!

#### The motivator: Chris finds that connection is the key to success

Chris Gardner loved to swim in high school, but in other ways he was adrift.

His college hopes centered on recruitment to a swim team, but his grades proved to be the buoy that held him back. The Vestal graduate didn't want to attend his local community college, but his mother convinced him to check out an open house.

Walking around the tables, he stopped at a display for Business Administration and chatted with the professor. Focus more on your schoolwork and you could go far, the professor counseled – even to Cornell University.

It's a lesson that Chris took to heart – and remembered two years later, after he sent off his application to Cornell's School of Industrial and Labor Relations.

"Just submitting the application makes me feel really accomplished," said the Business Administration major, who was also accepted into Binghamton University's School of Management. "I never would have thought of that two years ago."

That initial conversation sparked his interest in the business field and made him determined to excel in the classroom. He also shares that success with his peers, tutoring them one-on-one in statistics, financial accounting, and micro- and macro-economics.

While he's sharp with numbers, he's "more interested in the people aspect of business" and is aiming for a career in Human Resources.

"As I finish my time here, I realize I'm interested in the ways people become motivated," he reflected. "I've been studying my own motivational factors, and what I'm doing in the tutoring lab."

What makes the difference for Chris Gardner: The support of people around him, believing that he can accomplish great things. He has made good friends among his fellow Hornets, which gives him the confidence he needs to excel in the classroom and share his knowledge as a tutor.

He also has found support and encouragement from his professors, including Dr. Tracy Curtis in biology, Jasse Katen in the English Department, and Stephen Ohl and Dr. Lee Heron in business.

"They're very understanding. They go the extra mile to see their students succeed," he said. "They're very good at motivating the class."

Chris does his best to provide that motivation to the students he tutors, sharing his own story of success. Be willing to ask questions, he counsels; a willingness to engage not only helps you learn, but enables you to form positive relationships with your professors and peers.

"You really can go anywhere from SUNY Broome. Hard work, anywhere, will always pay off in the end, even if you don't reach your immediate goals," he said.



# Dream big: Renee goes to D.C. and is working toward her college degree in high school

The rolling hills of Greene are a long way off from cosmopolitan Washington, D.C., with its storied monuments and the halls of power where elected officials shape the future of our country.

But last fall, Renee Clark was at the heart of it, running messages and errands as part of the Senate Page Program, one of the most selective and prestigious programs for teens in the United States. The Greene High School junior was appointed by <u>Senator Charles Schumer</u>, although she and other pages worked for all the Senators in the non-partisan program.

So, how did the SUNY Broome Early College student learn about the opportunity?

"Like any high school student, I was looking at my Senator's website," she quipped.

The idea first sparked in middle school; while on a class trip to Washington, Renee read about the page program in a book. As a lover of history and a fan of *The West Wing*, she was intrigued. She never forgot about the opportunity and, when a teacher encouraged her to apply years later, decided to go for it.

"I had that mentality: 'Why not?' It's an absolutely fantastic opportunity, especially for a kid from this area," she said.

While there from Sept. 4 through Jan. 25, she served with teens from all over the country – many of them

students at elite schools. Like all pages, she woke up at 5 a.m., headed to class from 6 to 10 a.m., and then went to work on the Senate floor for as long as they were in session.

It was a world away from small-town Greene, where the graduating class is only 63 students. Renee, however, has been taking college courses through SUNY Broome since she was a high school freshman, which left her well-prepared for the rigors of Washington.

"It helped me feel secure," she said. "You have this understanding: 'I can handle this rigor and this material. I can do this."

#### A head start on college

The page program isn't the only dream Renee is working to fulfill. Years ago, she learned about a family friend who managed to earn his high school diploma and his Associate's degree at the same time. Before she even entered high school, Renee Clark knew that was the path she wanted to take.

Greene is too small to offer Advanced Placement courses – the usual route for college credit in high school – so Renee opted for SUNY Broome. She began with online courses in her freshman year, followed by classes on campus as a sophomore. As a junior, she is taking Calculus 1 and Microeconomics on campus this semester.

"It's really great. You get to learn from professors who are excited about the content," she said. "I'm taking classes none of my peers in high school are taking."

After graduating from both high school and SUNY Broome, she plans to attend a four-year university – which one, she's not sure yet – and then join the Armed Services.

"I'm a languages person. I've been studying Arabic for four years, and I may possibly major in political science and Arabic," she said of her future plans. "I want to serve my country and use the skills I enjoy using."

From there, off to law school and, perhaps, a career in government. While Renee won't rule out a run for office someday, she prefers a different kind of role: "I want to be the guy 'the guy' counts on," she said.

Renee Clark has big dreams – and the dedication to accomplish them. SUNY Broome has a part in that success, and is a popular college destination for many of her peers from Greene, she said.

"I think the college does a really good job of preparing people for their next step," she said.



The program gave students from East and West Middle Schools the opportunity to explore a variety of career options.

The two professors chatted with enthusiastic and interested teens, showing them models and a transcutaneous electrical nerve stimulator (known as a TENS unit). They also provided pedometers to every student.

"They thought it was cool when I could make my hand move just by turning up the intensity of the TENS unit," said Professor Abrams, the program chair. "We suggested that students interested in any of the health sciences should take science and math classes. We also discussed our program and explained what PT was and how a typical day in the life of a PTA might look like. We also suggested they volunteer at the hospital to gain insight into the many careers available in medicine."

Other tables touched on everything from baking to television news, pharmacy, and the trades.

"We were the only table from the community college perspective, so we gave our college elevator speech a few times as well. Overall, it was a really successful career fair," Professor Abrams said.







David truly reaches a high percentage of his students and does the one thing all of us as educators try so desperately to do. He gets his students to think.

Dave is also a tremendous asset to the department for the exact same reasons he is an asset in the classroom. He thinks beyond the normal boundaries and often comes up with solutions to departmental problems that were invisible to the rest of us.

We are proud to have David as a member of our department and hope he continues to listen to that drumbeat and keeps on marching.



# The Arts at SUNY Broome: FACES project brings portraits of the marginalized to life

With careful strokes of a pencil, Amanda Valentin detailed the emerging face of Faith Spotted Eagle with an accuracy typically reserved for photographs.

"I thought she was inspiring as a Native American and as a woman," Valentin said of her subject, an educator, activist and member of the Yankton Sioux Nation perhaps best known for her role in the protests against the Keystone XL Pipeline. "People with powerful stories really speak to me."

Native Americans – famous or unnamed, current or historical – are the latest portraits in the five-part <u>FACES series</u>. Every semester over the past three years, Professor Patricia Evans' beginning drawing students have produced detailed pencil portraits intended to celebrate the marginalized and overlooked.

The project began three years ago, when Professor Evans was asked for her ideas on how to celebrate the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of women's suffrage in the State of New York. She then had her beginning drawing students create the FACES of Women's Suffrage as the first exhibit in the series. A trip to Germany and the Holocaust Museum provided the somber inspiration for the next round of portraits: those of Holocaust victims and survivors. Others followed: the Underground Railroad and the legacy of slavery, veterans and, this semester, Native Americans.

"The students have worked so hard. I am so proud of all of you!" Professor Evans said during the March 21 reception for the exhibit.


detail, is especially amazing when you consider that it was created by beginning drawing students – many times, students new to art, noted Executive Vice President and Chief Academic Officer Francis Battisti.

"The classroom is sacred ground and this is an example of that," Dr. Battisti said. "When I look into the eyes of these portraits, I can really see it – the anguish and the experience in them."

It took 2½ months for Asmae Lhamrani to complete her



portrait of Henry Ossian Flipper, a former slave who was the first African-American to graduate from West Point in 1877, after which he became a second lieutenant in the U.S. Army.

An Individual Studies major who plans on going to dental school, Asmae enjoys drawing as a form of relaxation and creativity. So does <u>Nursing major</u> Rachel Seifert, who was working on her portrait, depicting an unknown Native American girl, her eyes wide with shock or grief.

"I picked her because she could be anyone," she said, noting the impact of the Trail of Tears on countless Native Americans who lost their homes. "The look in her eyes was too much to ignore."

While students come from diverse majors, others – such as Valentin, who is interested in animation – have a longstanding interest in art. Anya Karlgut, who created a detailed portrait of Sitting Bull, is among them.

Communications Arts major. "It was an interesting project."

During the March 21 event, students stood next to their already-produced pieces in the Gallery @ SUNY Broome, eagerly chatting with exhibit visitors about their work. Others, such as Rachel and Amanda, labored on their works in progress, to the delight of viewers.

Jordan Paugh perfected the shading on the face of Wolf Robe, a Southern Cheyenne Chief from the 19<sup>th</sup> century. A Liberal Arts major, he plans to earn a bachelor's degree in game design – probably at SUNY Canton. The drawing class is one way for him to master the "art aspect of game design," he explained.

Visitors were impressed by both the quality of the students' work, as well as the depth of the message.

"When you find meaning in life, you change not only yourself, but you change others," Professor Evans said.



# Dual major, one dream: Suki designs her future as a prosthetic engineer

Leaving high school, Sukanya Vallon frequently passed a veteran who was trying to raise money for a prosthetic leg. Others may have passed him by, but Suki didn't; she frequently gave him a few dollars. On one bitterly cold day, she took him for a cup of coffee and struck up a conversation, learning how prosthetics can change lives – if people could afford them.

That cup of coffee helped shape a vision of her future as a prosthetic engineer, where she will design devices that restore function and quality of life.

"I used to be a dancer for 15 years, and I had to decide if I wanted to pursue that or do STEM. I chose STEM. I could help people in something I know I'm good at," explained the Brooklyn native. "Not many people think of prosthetics for a living, but someone has to make them. I want to be a part of that small group of people."

There are only a few biomedical students in SUNY Broome's challenging Engineering Science program, but Suki Vallon considers the program's diversity an asset.

"It's cool meeting a lot of people going into so many different aspects of engineering. One of my classmates is interested in working on cars and he wants to get a degree in automotive engineering," she explained. "I like being one of the outliers because it really makes me stand out. You don't need to go into mechanical, electrical or computer engineering; there are other forms of engineering out there."

#### From BAP to Broome

Suki came to SUNY Broome by way of the <u>Binghamton Advantage Program</u>, a joint admission program with Binghamton University.

BAP, however, didn't give her the opportunity to take the engineering courses she wanted. Enrolling in SUNY Broome directly gave her more options – including the option of having a dual major in Engineering Science and Health Studies. Having a health sciences background makes sense for a future biomedical engineer, and she is looking for transfer schools strong in both areas.

#### Lean about Health Studies at SUNY Broome.

Binghamton University is still an option, and Suki fell in love with Clarkson University during a visit there. Her dream school, however, is Cornell University. She still has some time to decide – another year at SUNY Broome, and a chance to build more of a foundation in her niche field with courses in anatomy, physiology and organic chemistry.

"It's tough but not impossible," she said of her dual majors.

Professors who made an impact include Robert Lofthouse and Glenn Modrak in engineering science, and Dr. Tracy Curtis and Professor Diane Kelly in biology.

"Professor Kelly – I love her. She expects a lot out of you, but she makes anatomy so fun to learn about," Suki said. "And Professor Modrak – he's really cool. He's hilarious! He punched a wall to show how every force has an equal and opposite counter-reaction."

#### A Hornet love story

Outside of the classroom, Suki is involved with the Engineering Club and the Gardening Club. She also has a <u>clean energy internship</u> funded by SUNY Broome's \$1 million Energy to Lead grant from the New York State Energy Research and Development Authority.

"The goal is to transform campus into a <u>clean energy</u> learning center. I'm leading the social media part of it to raise awareness." she said.

Future green projects will include lesson plans for youngsters who visit campus. Suki field-tested them on her 9-year-old brother, a "mini-engineer" who found the lessons in sustainability "super-cool."

She's also planning her wedding – to a fellow Hornet she met in her first biology class on campus. To add to the charm, an actual bee was involved in this SUNY Broome love story.

At certain points in the semester, you'll see biology classes wandering through campus, identifying trees. On one of these classroom trips, Sukanya was followed by a bee – which turned into the subject of a debate with a classmate. They ended up going on a date that weekend and engaging in similar lively debates throughout the course. The rest is history – or at least it will be, once they walk down the aisle.

Two great majors, an inspiring future and a love story? That's a scientific formula for an amazing college experience.


"SUNY Broome allowed me to grow. When I first came to college, I was extraordinarily shy," Suki said. "In

# No excuses: Freddie turns his life around and aids others on the path to recovery

Freddie Stevenson wasted 30 years of his life. He acknowledges this – not with sadness or blame, but with a stern determination to break the pattern.

He was, by his account, a normal kid of divorced parents; his mother worked as a police officer and his father for General Motors. But when Freddie turned 14, he fell into the life of the streets, with drug use and the violence that can follow in the steps of addiction.

The next three decades were spent ricocheting back and forth to jail in multiple states, with more than 25 felony arrests to his name. There were temporary breaks in the pattern; when he was 32 years old, he had the opportunity to play football at Lackawanna College in Pennsylvania. Benched by an injury, he fell back into his old pattern and went off to jail yet again, his college dream deferred.

"I was a piece of work. One day, I decided not only was I going to get well, but I would help others get well, too," he said.

Released from prison in 2013, he's now a second-year student at SUNY Broome, working toward a degree in Chemical Dependency Counseling. He's already working in his field at Fairview Recovery Services, and giving back to his community as a football coach with the Broome County Stallions.

"I have this motto: no excuses," he explained. "The way I look at it, each person has their job in a community, whether it's as an educator or a teacher, an electrician, et cetera. I was a liability to my

community, not an asset. Today, I want to be an asset."

### From convict to college

During his last stint in prison, a faith-based program made a major difference in his recovery and he received the Dallas Leadership Foundation's Onesimus Hope Award. The program, he remembered, went above and beyond, which made him determined to help others in a similar way.

"You can't rule out the natural elements of life like love and caring. I want you to know that I care," he said. "Our stories and those connections are the things that bring us together."

To change addiction treatment for the better, Freddie Stevenson needed an education – but his felony convictions proved a barrier to admission. That changed when SUNY instituted its "ban the box" initiative in September 2016, removing the admissions requirement that asked students to declare prior convictions.

Finding a job in the field was difficult for similar reasons, but Freddie found a stalwart advocate in Professor Mary Whittaker. She and staff at Fairview helped gain needed approval from the State of New York, which then cleared Freddie to work at the recovery center.

He hopes that his personal insights into addiction can help others attain healing and recovery. All too often, the treatment process is too short and relegated to a set period of time, not taking into account that addiction is a lifelong problem.

"The textbooks tell you that this disease is chronic. Then why is the treatment acute? If it's a chronic illness, why doesn't it have chronic treatment?" he asked. "We need more caring professionals. People are caught up in their own biases and don't realize they have them. People don't fully understand chemical dependency, and sometimes schools can't prepare you for what you'll see."

Stories bring us together and Freddie Stevenson is willing to share his, even to an audience of strangers. He recently participated in "My Life, My Story" at Penn State, where his daughter is a student.

Going to college at the age of 51 — when people typically juggle family obligations and careers – can be challenging, he admits. But he pushes on, relying on his trusty motto: No excuses.

"I don't quit. I broke the fences down trying to get into prison; nothing would stop me from doing the wrong things. Why not use the same energy to get good things done?

"I met a lot of beautiful people," Freddie said of SUNY Broome. "My professors, I love them to death."

# Global stage: Music instructor April Lucas tours with the New Sousa Band

SUNY Broome instructor April Lucas shares her love of music with her students at the college – and, before that, with youngsters in the Susquehanna Valley School District where she taught.

For nearly 30 years, she has also performed on a national and even global stage, as a saxophonist for the New Sousa Band, under the direction of Keith Brion. She has performed the works of John Philip Sousa in China and Japan, as well as locations across the country, most recently as the first chair alto sax.

"I still pinch myself every time I go on tour with them," she said.

### Going on tour

Lucas grew up in a small Pennsylvania town – so small that she didn't even see a violin until high school. While music was a passion, she didn't have the opportunity to pursue it as an academic subject until later in her adult life.

She enrolled in Binghamton University when she was 28 years old, first taking anthropology courses because that's what fit into her schedule as a wife and mother. She then joined the band, began studying with Al Hamme and

ultimately became a music major, setting the course for her future.

Around 1990, she was in New York City recording with her colleague Paul Cohen, an internationally known saxophone player, arranger and historian, when the New Sousa Band had an opening. One of Cohen's students had been scheduled to go on the 2½-week tour, but was unable due to work commitments. Cohen offered the opportunity to Lucas, who eagerly accepted.

She vividly remembers the band's first meeting at a New York City YMCA, where she set up her portable music stand amid a sea of professional musicians. The first number was the national anthem, and the swelling chords made her pause and simply absorb the experience.

"I couldn't believe the quality and the beauty of the simple opening of the Star Spangled Banner. I was in awe," she said.

She was invited back time and again, touring Asia, the Northeast and the Gulf of Mexico. The band also performed twice at the Mid West International Band and Orchestra Music Festival in Chicago in 2016 and 2019. Lucas has played principal saxophone with the band many times and has also appeared as a soloist with the band.

The saxophonists in the Sousa band play period instruments with large-chamber mouthpieces, which give them a color far different from the typical contemporary saxophone setup. Their uniforms also mirror the ones Sousa's band traditionally wore.

The musicians don't receive their music ahead of time, but practice at just two rehearsals before they go on tour. They're also a close-knit bunch; all three saxophone players have been playing together on tour since the 1990s.

"I got to do things I never dreamed I would do in my lifetime," she said, looking at photos from the 1996 Japanese tour.

Then there are the intersections, the little vignettes that thread together Lucas' experience as a student and performer. She studied classical saxophone with Steven Mauk at Ithaca College during her own college days; Mauk joined the New Souza Band for the Japanese tour, and he and April are founding members of the Empire Saxophone Quartet. She had met Paul Cohen in graduate school, when she studied with David Bilger in Reading, Pa. SUNY Broome's adjunct clarinet instructor, Robin Seletsky, has also joined the New Sousa Band for a northeast tour.

"There are all these little entrapments and friendships that lasted over 30 years," she said.

One of the most meaningful moments on tour didn't come from the big-name musicians. Her former high school band director and his wife came to see Lucas perform with the New Sousa Band in Florida – a proud moment for them both.

"For me to be able to have them there, it was really big. I'm lucky," she remembered.

### From touring to teaching

April Lucas' experiences with the New Sousa Band have helped her grow as a professional musician, but also as a teacher. At Susquehanna Valley, she applied what she learned to her elementary school band, which produced remarkable music.

Today, she brings those experiences into her classroom at SUNY Broome, where she inspires the next generation of musicians. She remembers one student – a hockey player who one day wanted to play in the U.S. Army Band, but didn't have the skills he needed when he began at SUNY Broome. He applied himself and practiced diligently – and ultimately attained his goal.

"It was like an education for me that lasted 30 years and is ongoing. Every concert, I learned," she said of her time with the New Sousa Band. "These folks have such high standards. It teaches you to hold high standards and be demanding. It teaches you how to practice and how to teach."

# Can politics be ethical? SUNY Broome explores the topic in this year's Ethics Conference

This year's Interdisciplinary Conference on Applied Ethics tapped into the current crisis in American culture: the Ethics of Politics.

Held March 15, the conferenced featured Assemblywoman Donna Lupardo as its keynote speaker, as well as breakout sessions on a wide array of topics, from how to create a more engaged citizenry, to science and politics, the impact of hackers and trolls, political tribalism and more.

"Have American politicians really support a democracy for all?" asked Dr. Carol Ross, Vice President of Student Development and Chief Diversity Officer. "It's so important for you to 'stay woke' – not only for politics from a national perspective, but from a local perspective and even an international perspective, because that affects you too."

The 10<sup>th</sup> annual conference kicked off with a panel discussion on the Ethics of Campaigning, featuring Town of Dickinson Councilwoman Sharon Exley; Professor Giovanni Scaringi, a Binghamton City Councilman; Broome County Legislature Minority Leader Mary Kaminsky; and Broome County Executive Jason Garnar. Exley and Scaringi are Republicans, while Kaminsky and Garnar are Democrats.

For too many Americans, the main source of authority is how many times they have heard a statement – not

whether it's factually true, warned the moderator, the Reverend Dr. Arthur Suggs. There is also a cumulative effect, in which small acts of dishonesty erode our trust in each other.

"To the person on the street, what's the truth content of a campaign promise?" he asked.

"Zip," a member of the audience responded.

Ethics begins even before a candidate files a petition, with such matters as whether they truly live in the district and what they promise, Kaminsky said. It's unethical to promise something that you know you cannot accomplish, as well as to dodge statements of where you stand on tough issues, she said.

"Some people will say they're 'fact-finding' when they know full well how they're going to vote on an issue," she said.

No one is ethically perfect, Garnar acknowledged, but officials should always strive to improve. For Garnar, the ultimate standard is his wife and three sons; if he can show his family what he's doing on a campaign with pride, he knows he's doing the right thing, he said.

Officials owe it to the public to keep an open mind and work across the aisle as needed, rather than be bound strictly by party or municipal lines, the panelists agreed. Garnar and Exley worked together on bringing a treatment center to the former Broome Developmental site, and Exley and Scaringi cooperated on an issue involving a stop sign.

When Garnar had a vision involving redevelopment of Binghamton's First Ward, he made sure to first call Scaringi, as well as the legislator representing the district for their input – a move the economics professor appreciated.

Scaringi had the following advice for public officials and the voting public: always listen and be the last to speak, and always vote policy over party and personality.

Audience members asked tough questions of the panelists, including whether ethical behavior is taught or learned, and how to reach disenfranchised groups. There were no easy answers to the first query, but the latter revolved around getting out of the office to meet people, whether one-on-one or in issue-focused town halls.

Push polls – which deliberately distort someone running for office in favor of a candidate – and other dirty tricks were also a topic of discussion.

New York State law mandates that campaign mailers include a line stating who funded the material, Scaringi said. However, external political action groups can and do fund negative advertising, Garnar pointed out. Facebook ads can be even more insidious. Negative campaign mailers are often released just before the election, when the opposition doesn't have time to respond, Exley added.

Candidates have the ethical responsibility to campaign on the facts and let the voters decide. Voters, however, have an even greater responsibility: to educate themselves and not fall for the dirty tricks, and vote against the people who use them.

"It's incumbent on voters not to vote in unethical people," Exley said.

Voters need to become more involved, and remember that elected officials aren't leaders but public servants – with an emphasis on the last word, panelists agreed. Garnar pointed out that candidates in the 2016 county executive race held three public debates – attended by no more than 60 people, for a position that represented 200,000 residents.

"Democracy doesn't end at the ballot box. It begins at the ballot box," Professor Scaringi said.

# SUNY Broome's Dr. Bill Altman brings resources to high school teachers of psychology

What is the Society for the Teaching of Psychology and what can it do for me?, a column by SUNY Broome Psychology Professor Bill Altman, has just been published online by the American Psychological Association's (APA) Board of Educational Affairs. In this month's entry, Dr. Altman introduces high school teachers of psychology to three free resources available from the Society for the Teaching of Psychology (STP is Division 2 of the APA).

Instructors in psychology and in many other disciplines may also find these resources useful.

The <u>Teaching of Psychology Idea Exchange</u> contains a plethora of materials, including large collections of activities, handouts and classroom demonstrations; video and audio files that instructors can use directly in class, organized by topic; lists of books and films for each topic; and news stories to illustrate particular concepts in class. In addition, there are materials to help students learn about critical thinking and information literacy, study strategies, and ways to become more effective writers.

The <u>Today in the History of Psychology</u> wiki is a constantly growing online compilation of key events and people in psychology, with more than 3,000 entries. It's organized in a cross-referenced calendar format and has links to other online content. Instructors can use it to find information for class, or as an excellent tool for projects and assignments.

STP designed the <u>Psychology in Communities</u> wiki to help instructors share their knowledge with our wider communities, enriching the lives and improving the interactions of our friends, neighbors and communities in general. It contains ways to work with your local media, strategies for becoming a popular speaker for local groups, and even scripts and PowerPoint presentations that you can use for particular talks. There's a link to STP's media training website, to help you figure out your preferred way to work with the media (for example, becoming a trusted source, or getting your own column or time on the air), and to give you the step-by-step directions for achieving your goal. Some instructors have also used the information in this wiki to create assignments for their students. For instance, asking them to write letters to the editor or short columns for their local newspapers, or to engage in a class project that culminates in a presentation for local officials or members of the media on a topic of interest.

<u>The Society for the Teaching of Psychology</u> provides all of these resources, and many others, free of charge under the **Resources** column on their <u>website</u>.





# Remembering Armand: May 16 concert to honor jazz trumpet player

Armand Olevano Jr. never earned a degree at SUNY Broome, but he spent decades on campus, helping shape students' musical education with his soulful trumpet.

Olevano, who died in December at the age of 71, played with SUNY Broome's Jazz Ensemble for 34 years, as well as bands throughout the region and in his winter home of Sarasota, Florida. On May 16, SUNY Broome will hold a tribute jazz concert in Olevano's memory, featuring Manhattan Brass' Tony Kadleck on trumpet.

A graduate of Union-Endicott High School, Olevano served in the Army and worked in a range of jobs, but his real passion was music. He played in Dean of Liberal Arts Michael Kinney's 15-piece jazz band, the Jazz Exchange, as well as the Maine and

Endicott community bands, the Melody Masters, the Kirby Band and his own group, Night Sounds. Look to Florida and his list of musical engagements grows even longer: Gentlemen of Jazz, Savory Swing, the Southshore Brass Quintet and, again, his own Sophisticated Swing Band.

"His whole trumpet education was developed by playing for numerous groups — small bands and big bands; that's how he learned things," Dr. Kinney remembered.

He first met Olevano in 1983, when he was still new to SUNY Broome and playing jazz trumpet in the community. The two were hired to play a church gig for Easter – Olevano on lead trumpet, a rare gift.

"That's a player who plays the stratospheric high notes that give the band energy, and very few people can do that," Dr. Kinney said. "In the music world, there's a saying: Lead players are born and not made. He had a natural gift for that."

Community members play an integral part in SUNY Broome's bands and choruses, sharing their talents for the love of the art. Olevano was among them: a musical member of the larger campus community who learned from each of the teachers and conductors he worked with along the way.

"He would go to the rehearsals and helped move equipment. When we had our jazz artist guests — Maynard Ferguson and Doc Severinsen, and others from New York City — Armand was always there to help with the arrangements. He did all of this because he loved doing it," Dr. Kinney said. "All of the students benefited from his willingness to help out."

It's fitting that Tony Kadleck will be the featured soloist during the May 16 concert, which begins at 7:30 p.m. in SUNY Broome's Angelo Zuccolo Little Theatre. A Binghamton native, Kadleck is one of the most sought-after trumpet players in the state, and has performed and recorded with Stevie Wonder, Michael

Jackson, Elton John and the Boston Pops.

Dr. Bob Pompi, formerly the physics chair at Binghamton University and a former member of Dr. Kinney's Jazz Exchange band, is making the arrangements, and Olevano's wife and son plan to attend. Dr. Mike Dubaniewicz, a SUNY Broome instructor who is internationally famous in his own right, will direct.

Interestingly enough, Olevano and Dr. Kinney had played trumpet during Tony Kadleck's wedding reception years ago at the Sons of Italy in Endicott – just one strand in a web of connection, linking diverse individuals into the larger jazz community.

#### Memorandum From: Tod Laursen, Provost and Senior Vice Chancellor

Thank you for your thoughtful and insightful comments on the Draft White Paper from the SUNY Online Working Committee. We are carefully working our way through your responses now, in a process which will definitely strengthen the final white paper. Questions raised during the comment period will be addressed in a variety of ways — both in the final document and likely via other means, i.e., FAQ, webinars, etc.

At the same time, to further support our planning, we are initiating a series of thematic- or cluster-specific webinars to identify potential academic programs to support through this initiative. The webinars will be academically focused discussions to determine specific campus interest in expanding or starting online programs in each academic theme, and have the following goals: to generate an inventory of existing offerings; to assess needs for possible deployment of such programs; to identify potential pathways for students; and to explore partnering options and opportunities across campuses or with corporate entities. 



# The Leader: Gregory works to build a better campus and a more vibrant community

#### **Gregory Thurston**

Until a few years ago, Gregory Thurston walked the SUNY Broome campus as a recruiter for the U.S. Marine Corps. He struck up conversations with students and faculty members and enjoyed the interactions.

The Fort Lauderdale native was a sergeant in the Corps, and previous duties included supply chain management and heavy equipment operation. He traveled around the world – Australia and Afghanistan, Japan and Thailand, South Korea and Hawaii – and developed himself as a leader.

"By the age of 21, I was in charge of 60 grown men," he said. "I met wonderful people in the military, some really good friends. It was a really good experience that helped me mature."

He came to the Binghamton area in 2013, but it proved to be more than the typical military post. He met his future wife, decided to stay and raise a family, and left the Marines in 2016.

"It was always in my plans to go to school," said Gregory, who will graduate in May with a degree in Business Administration. "I enjoy school very much because I love to learn. Being a civilian is great."

Gregory Thurston is still a leader – as part of <u>SUNY Broome's Men of Excellence Program</u>, and now as president <u>of Student Assembly</u>. His long-term dream is to become a successful entrepreneur, building a

family business that inspires others to do the same.

His current idea revolves around a cereal bar – think Sweet Frog-style, but with cereal rather than yogurt. Cereal bars aren't new, he acknowledged, but he wants to sell a family-friendly environment centered on '90s nostalgia and hiphop. Maybe they'll broadcast a radio station there too, and give small performances akin to NPR's Tiny Desk Concert series.

It's a wild dream, Gregory admitted – but most successful businesses start that way.

"I want to learn how to be a businessman so I can show my community that we can all do it. When I was growing up, I never saw many thriving black business owners," he reflected. "Where have all the black-owned businesses gone? Like Black Wall Street – I feel like there's got to be more."

#### 'Do something'

It can be a temptation – particularly for <u>older students</u> juggling careers and family life – to shun campus involvement and head home after class. Gregory Thurston took the opposite course and became more involved, from the Creative Writing Club, where he enjoys writing poems and rap songs, to <u>Men of Excellence</u>, <u>the President's Task Force on Diversity and Inclusion</u>, the Business Club and, of course, Student Assembly.

Professor Carla Michalak in her political science class alerted Gregory to opportunities within the Assembly.

"I had a curiosity about how government works. I decided to put myself in Shared Governance and see what good I could do," he said.

While he lost the election for Student Trustee, he was elected to Vice President of Student Affairs and, this semester, as President. Assembly officers are hard at work, facilitating events such as <u>Your Voice Matters</u>, which solicits student input on a range of campus issues, and a future sleep-in slumber party (separate from the <u>annual Sleep Out for the Homeless</u>). The Assembly also participates in Student Activities Day and other campus activities, runs the <u>Food for Thought pantry</u>, and works with Shared Governance and the Administration to address issues of importance to students, such as textbook prices.

"I think everybody is so excited to get to work. They're putting forth a lot of effort," Gregory said.

He has some advice for his fellow Hornets, too: Get engaged on campus. There are a lot of opportunities through clubs and student life, and extracurricular experiences can make college even more meaningful

"Do something. Your tuition pays for it and you're allowed to be involved, and you might end up liking school even more," he said.

#### **Building community**

Successful leaders don't change the world by themselves; they rely on the support and inspiration of their mentors and loved ones. At SUNY Broome, Gregory has found inspiration and support in Educational Opportunity Program director <u>Venessa Rodriguez</u>, who runs the Men of Excellence Program, as well as Professor Michalak and <u>Vice President of Student Development and Chief Diversity Officer Carol Ross</u>.

But the deepest source of inspiration comes from the women in his life – his mother and sisters, his wife and daughter.

"Every step of my life, there has always been a black woman to encourage me," he said. "I've never had

anyone inspire me more than black women."

After graduation, Gregory plans to take a semester off and visit his family in Florida. He's also interested in seeing how far an Associate's degree will take him in the business world. Longer term, he is looking to transfer to Binghamton University and do his best to improve the Southern Tier.

"I really want to stay in this community; I like the peace of it. It's a good place to raise a family," he said. "I'll get an education and build something here."

He will build on the foundation he began at SUNY Broome, where he learned not only about his chosen field, but also about himself and the excellence he can achieve through hard work.

"People seem to genuinely want you to succeed and do well here," he said. "I can see there is effort in wanting students to do better and feel comfortable."

## Get a 'paycheck checkup'

It's important to check your paycheck withholding every year. Having too much or too little withheld from your paycheck may result in a large tax refund or a large tax bill. The IRS updated the special <u>Withholding Calculator</u> tool on IRS.gov to reflect changes in the <u>Tax Cuts and Job Act</u> passed in December 2017. The IRS always recommends employees check their withholding each year to make sure they have the right amount of tax withheld from their paychecks.

The IRS and the American Payroll Association (APA) have created <u>Publication 5330</u> with information regarding the major changes to the tax law.

This year, it's more important than ever to check following major changes from the new Tax Cuts and Jobs Act, especially for:

- Two-income families
- People with two or more jobs at the same time
- People who claim credits, such as the Child Tax Credit
- People who claim older dependents, including children age 17 or over
- People who itemized deductions on their prior year's tax returns
- People with high incomes and more complex tax returns
- People with large tax refunds or large tax bills in 2017
- People who experience a change that affects the number of their withholding allowances (such as marriage, divorce or the birth of a child)

## Women's Discussion Group collaborates with Phi Theta Kappa Honor Society to donate books to the Women's Prison Book Project

In celebration of literacy and supporting women's issues, the SUNY Broome Women's Discussion Group, a student group focusing on women's issues, donated multiple boxes of books to the Women's Prison Book Project on March 5, 2019. This project was a collaboration with the campus' two-year international honor society, Phi Theta Kappa.

Faculty adviser, Professor I.J. Byrnes of the Philosophy Program, noted that the project was inspired by reading *Orange is the New Black* by Piper Kerman, a nonfiction memoir by the author who spent a year in prison on drug charges.

Officers Orion Barber, Dawn Shefler, Shyanne Daye and Grace Parker and Professor Byrnes decided to support this literary and rehabilitative project in light of the skyrocketing number of women behind bars since the 1980s, the problems faced by the children of single women in jail, and the correlation of imprisonment with mental health and addiction issues among female inmates.

"Ensuring continued literacy for the incarcerated is a vital issue of equity in their rehabilitation and preparation to re-enter society," Orion said.

"Books are a wonderful way to explore one's interests and values," added Dawn. "Reading can help a person envision multiple versions of the future and figure out which one is the right path to follow. I can think of few populations so in need of the opportunity for personal discovery as the prison population, so I am pleased to assist in providing them a catalyst."

"I'm proud to be a part of something for a bigger purpose," Shyanne said. "Books lead to literacy and deep, critical thinking. I'm happy to help others develop these ways of thinking through reading."
"Books can tell a story and they change people," Grace noted.





# The Catalyst: Nasha finds her mission in communications and social justice

### Nasha Taylor

Sometimes, to find our truest self, we must navigate a maze of dead ends, pushing on through our losses and disorientation. But once we come out on the other side, we may find a new identity: as a guide for those facing similar challenges, and a force to create a more equitable world.

Nasha Taylor came to SUNY Broome in 2003, a few years after a rough start at the University at Albany. Heading to a four-year university right after her high school graduation proved socially and academically overwhelming for the Binghamton native. A dismal first semester culminated in a date-rape experience and Nasha simply gave up, withdrawing from school that winter.

"I didn't have a confident sense of self, no study habits, no real vision for life," she remembered.

Over the next three years, she worked and bounced between different living situations. Without a college education, her future seemed limited.

Interested in audio engineering, she enrolled in the Communication & Media Arts program at SUNY Broome – and found the motivation to succeed. During her first semester, she earned all As and one B, "a huge confidence boost" that helped her set a new trajectory. One of her first instructors in a core class was Monique Simón, whom Nasha found to be "brilliant, experienced and dedicated."

"That first semester influenced my interests from being an audio engineer to studying the relationship

between media and society," Nasha said. "This was a strong catalyst for the rest of my time on campus and it opened my mind and many doors."

The Phi Theta Kappa honor society and the college's Honors Program also gave Nasha the opportunity to broaden her horizons, and earn an array of grants and scholarships. She credits Professor Bruce Oldfield, one of the faculty advisors of PTK at the time, with encouraging her to think big when it came to her transfer options. She did and enrolled at New York University – but hit a block due to unmet financial need a few weeks before her first semester was scheduled to begin.

Her story didn't end there, however. Nasha Taylor won the Jack Kent Cooke Foundation Undergraduate Transfer Scholarship, the premier community college transfer scholarship in the nation, ensuring her a free ride to her transfer school. She opted for Temple University in Philadelphia, owing to its diversity, the reputation of its communications program, the size of its media market and Philadelphia's cultural history of community organizing.

### Learn about SUNY Broome's Honors Program.

Nasha earned her bachelor's degree in Broadcast, Telecommunications and Mass Media from Temple in 2009. Her career mission since then has focused on fostering people's personal and professional growth, and working to build communities and systems free from fear, scarcity and deception.

Post-graduation, her journey took her from the People's Emergency Center in Philadelphia, where she coordinated its Broadband Technology Opportunities Program and managed its center for Digital Inclusion & Technology, to classrooms at the Children's Home of the Wyoming Conference and a stint as a community engagement specialist at the United Way of Broome County.

She returned to Philadelphia as program manager for Year Up, which provides young people with the training and opportunities they need for meaningful careers at top companies. In the fall of 2018, she landed her current gig as community engagement director for PhillyCAM, a public access TV and community radio station in Philadelphia.

She has made an impact on a more personal level, too, adopting a teenager whom she has mentored for several years.

"I love it. The mission is meaningful and my colleagues and the members are inspiring," she said of her current career. "My role allows me to support the growth and development of individuals and partnerships. I'm where I want to be right now, exploring the intersections of creative consciousness and social justice."

- The minimum GPA requirement is a 3.0 for the scholarship nomination; recipients may be enrolled in less than full-time status, provided they continue to meet campus definition of continuing success.
- Leadership, community service and extracurricular activities will be considered for review.

### **Financial Criteria**

- Candidates are not required to demonstrate financial need.
- A statement of financial need can be submitted for consideration.

### Additional Eligibility Criteria

- Candidates must be United States citizens, permanent resident aliens and New York State residents. Those nominated from underrepresented and low-income categories may receive positive consideration as diversity candidates.
- Campuses may consider financial need and economic disadvantage as a diversity indicator, but applicants must also meet a high academic standard as evidenced by GPA and supporting recommendations.

### **Documentation Required**

- Student essay (1-2 pages) on the anticipated study abroad goals.
- One faculty or department recommendation letter.





## Skater, student, entrepreneur: Kristine goes for the gold in the rink and the classroom

A SUNY Broome Health Sciences student and personal trainer during the week, Kristine Northrup has a different identity once Friday rolls around and she straps her helmet under her chin.

Then, she becomes Bomber – or #39 – for the <u>Penn Jersey She Devils</u>, where she rules the rink in the rough-and-tumble sport of women's roller derby.

The Binghamton native also skates with <u>Team USA Roller Sports</u> and will head to Barcelona, Spain, this July to compete in the <u>2019 World Roller Games</u> – the top level of derby. The ultimate goal: to have roller derby achieve the ranks of an Olympic sport in 2020, and go for the gold.

"It's a recognized sport throughout the entire world," said Kristine, a current Health Studies major who has been skating for nine years. "It's awesome that the derby community is able to get to this level. They're finally getting recognition."

While it has recently experienced a resurgence, roller derby actually has its origins in the 1930s and used to be featured on television with a banked track. Back in its heyday, it earned the reputation as both playful and aggressive, and – although this is slowly changing – has largely drawn female athletes.

"Now it's very professional," noted Kristine, although the sport retains its tradition of flashy style and fanciful player names; some of Bomber's teammates on the She Devils, for example, include Glitz 'N Slam,

Misfortune Cookie and Parks & Amputation.

### 'A wild ride'

A Union-Endicott High School graduate, Kristine Northrup earned a bachelor's degree in photography from SUNY Purchase. While in college for the first time, a friend introduced her to roller derby.

Life took her across the country. She headed west to California, where she worked at an art gallery until it was shuttered by the economy. While living in Virginia, her interest in derby reignited and she joined her first team, transferring to another team when she returned to the Southern Tier five years ago.

A little over three years ago, she tried on a new role: entrepreneur. Drawing on her interests, she opened KNorth Fit, which offers personal training and nutrition coaching, as well as skate clinics and even "sip and art," a combination of painting and happy hour.

On top of that, she decided to return to college and opted for SUNY Broome. Currently in Health Studies, she is preparing to transfer into the challenging Physical Therapist Assistant program.

"The focus is on promoting health and helping others. It was very complimentary to what I currently do for my business and I want to broaden my horizons," she said. "I chose SUNY Broome because it was local and it was a good way for me to get my foot in the door. The courses I have taken on campus were excellent, and the professors are great at guiding students."

Juggling coursework with a business enterprise and roller derby – which essentially amounts to a second job – can be grueling, but Kristine makes it work. She's able to schedule classes around her derby games, and meeting clients at their homes and online allows her to be flexible with her career, as well.

"I'm away almost every weekend, flying somewhere. It's been a wild ride," she said.

Long-term, the future has all the glitz and glam of a roller derby rink: maybe a Ph.D. in a health-related field, even a shot at the Olympics. In the meantime, she's giving it her all – in the rink, where she's working to master new forms of skating; in her business as a personal trainer; and, above all, in the classroom, where she's working hard to achieve top grades.

Just over the horizon is Barcelona, and Kristine "Bomber" Northrup can't wait,

"It's absolutely mind-blowing. You can't go any further than that — it's the top of the top, representing the U.S. in something I love so much," she said. "I've been trying to do this for a very long time."
