Purchasing Cutoff FY '19

May 31, 2019

June 28, 2019, has been established as the cutoff date for purchasing (encumbering funds) for Fiscal Year '19.

Please review your department's needs for all items, services and travel expenses anticipated through the remainder of Fiscal Year '19 and place orders via the requisition/PO process no later than Friday, June 28.

This means **all** anticipated purchases of goods, services and travel expenses using both **college operating** and **grant funding** occurring between now and August 31 must be encumbered and approved by June 28. To accomplish this, requisitions will need to be created and approved at the department level by June 28, 2019. Items on these orders should be received no later than August 16.

To ensure a balanced budget, only critical and essential items will be approved for the period remaining in this fiscal year.

Existing Standing Orders will be good for placing orders through July 31. Items ordered on a Standing Order should be received no later than August 16.

Some items may require significant lead times and departments should plan accordingly.

Items or services received on or prior to August 31, 2019, must be expensed against your FY'19 budget.

Your department's budget may be viewed using the Budget Query function in Banner. The SUNY Broome Purchasing Guidelines are available in Banner Self Service on the Finance tab for easy reference. However, please do not hesitate to call Purchasing at x5196 or x5337 for assistance or questions – we look forward to helping you with your purchases.

The FY'20 budget will open on or about August 22, 2019.

Please remember that all orders must be placed via the requisition/purchase order process – orders may not be called or faxed in.

The deadline for posting attendance is 8 a.m. on the attendance due date. For example, if you are teaching a Full Term class this summer, your attendance needs to be posted by 8 a.m. June 18, 2019.

It is extremely important that attendance is submitted in a timely manner. Students receiving financial aid are penalized when attendance is not submitted on time.

If the attendance is posted after the deadline, after financial aid is disbursed, we cannot recover the funds from those students who should not have received it because of poor attendance. It is important that attendance is posted accurately and on time. When attendance is not posted accurately, and on time, financial aid could be disbursed to students who should not be receiving it.

Reporting official course attendance, including for the purpose of financial aid funding, is determined by a student's academic participation in the course.

The following information is posted in our college catalog:

Official course attendance is defined by any of the following activities:

- **Physically attending a class where there is an opportunity for direct interaction between the instructor and students**
- **Submitting an academic assignment**
- **Taking an exam, an interactive tutorial, or computer-assisted instruction**
- **Attending a study group that is assigned by the institution**
- **Participating in an online discussion about academic matters**
- **Initiating contact with a faculty member to ask a question about the academic subject studied in the course**

Official course attendance does not include activities where a student may be present, but not academically engaged, such as:

- Logging into an online class without active participation.
- Participating in academic counseling or advisement.
- Living in institutional housing.
- Participating in the institution's meal plan.

Students who are attending your class, but are not on your class roster, should not be allowed in your class. These students need to be officially enrolled in your class. Please direct these students to the Registrar's office in SS-105.

We will continue to use MyCollege to record attendance.

Achieving dreams, embracing change: Commencement 2019

Amid a flurry of confetti, the Class of 2019 walked forth boldly into their future as SUNY Broome graduates and alumni. At 1,333 graduates, it's one of the largest graduating classes in recent years, with proud Hornets ranging in age from 18 to 74.

The 71st annual Commencement marked not an end but a beginning for the assembled graduates, in their robes, stoles and mortarboard hats.

All of the graduates in attendance have made sacrifices to attain their goals, both great and small, SUNY Broome President Kevin E. Drumm reflected. These include time, money, opportunities for leisure – and other qualities that, although less tangible, aren't any less real.

“You have sacrificed old beliefs about what you can and can't do, and about who you are,” he said. “Education requires us to give our consent to change, and change is never easy – even when it broadens your horizons and leads to a better life.”

U.S. Senator Charles Schumer wasn't able to give his annual speech due to thunderstorms that grounded his flight from the nation's capital. Instead, the Buzz Tones – the college's student-led a cappella group – delighted the audience with their rousing rendition of "Lean on Me."

The college also took a moment to remember a long-time community leader and SUNY Broome champion: Board of Trustees member George Akel Jr. A prominent local businessman, Mr. Akel served on the college's Board of Trustees for 29 years. He passed away after a two-year battle with lung cancer shortly before graduation – a ceremony that he looked forward to every year.

Dr. Drumm also addressed another bittersweet milestone: the retirement of Executive Vice President and Chief Academic Officer Francis Battisti, a SUNY Broome alumnus who has been part of the campus community since 1978. He started on campus as a counselor, then became an inspiring professor and dean before joining the administration.

“Thank you, Francis, for all your incredible contributions, which have helped to shape SUNY Broome into the amazing academic community it is today,” President Drumm said to a roar of applause.

As is traditional, during his 10th annual Commencement address, Dr. Drumm shared the stories of several students who exemplify the best of SUNY Broome:

- [Joshua Baker](#), who grew up in a tough New York City neighborhood and was inspired by his high school English teacher to succeed. The General Studies major became the first in his family to graduate college and moves one step further to his ultimate goal: becoming a teacher himself and inspiring future generations of students.
- [Tyler Gregory](#), a nursing major and one of this year's Vanguard Award winners. Inspired by his mother, Tyler became a paramedic and returned to SUNY Broome to shift paths in the healthcare field. He has already accepted a position in the UHS Wilson Hospital emergency room and ultimately hopes to become a nurse practitioner.
- [Minhyung Park](#), an international student from South Korea who found community, friendship and academic excellence at SUNY Broome. Minhyung will transfer to Cornell University to work toward her dream of becoming a dentist.
- [Rachael Klug](#), a criminal justice – corrections major who overcame addiction and personal tragedy to achieve her degree later in life. She is transferring to Binghamton University, with the eventual goal of going to law school to become an attorney and judge.
- [Orion Barber](#), a dual major in mathematics and paralegal studies who served multiple terms on the college's Board of Trustees. Incredibly involved in campus life, Orion established his own scholarship for SUNY Broome students who advocate for the LGBTQ+ community. He is headed to the University at Buffalo to study mathematics, and also plans to someday study law and run for political office.



Dr. Drumm also celebrated the year's accomplishments, including:

- [The grand opening of the Calice Advanced Manufacturing Center](#), attended by SUNY Chancellor Kristina Johnson during her first trip to campus.
- The grand opening of the Applied Learning & Career Center's new [Career Closet](#), which provides free professional outfits for jobs, interviews and internships. The center also held its very first Career Week to connect students with their professional futures.
- The start of the [Hive, the college's online radio station](#), and the opening of the [Multicultural Resource Center](#).
- The IEEE Club's first-place win for the most efficient vehicle at the [2019 Toyota Green Grand Prix](#).
- A new degree program in [Culinary Arts](#), which will eventually be housed in the [Culinary & Event Center](#) currently under construction in downtown Binghamton.
- The [Health for Haiti](#) global service learning course, which continues to bring clean water, solar power, healthcare and more to people in need. Students also [slept outside to learn about the plight of the homeless](#), brought holiday cheer during the annual [Giving of the Toys](#), [donated books to women in prison](#), and created an elaborate edifice for [Canstruction](#), donating the proceeds to people in need.
- Events such as the [Mock Environmental Disaster](#) and Mock Wedding, which allow students to hone their skills outside the classroom, as well as clinicals, internships, service-learning projects, and adventure courses both across the U.S. and abroad.
- The annual [Ethics Conference](#) and [Convocation Day](#), which challenged the campus community to engage with complex ideas, and visits by an [Irish law professor](#) and the [nation's oldest park ranger](#).

Anthony Paniccia, a SUNY Broome alumnus and vice chair of the college's Board of Trustees, also offered some words to encouragement to graduates. He encouraged the newly-minted alumni to follow their dreams and passions, adopt an attitude of gratitude and not to fear life's failures, but instead find mentors, have faith and respect for others and remember to give back.

Above all, they should enjoy the ride.





Brenna King and her Star Wars-themed hat



Summer hours to begin May 28

Summer hours will begin Tuesday, May 28, 2019, and will end at the close of business on Friday, August 16, 2019. Office hours will be from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Each individual office should be staffed adequately to maintain the required services expected by the public from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. all week. As needed, offices are expected to be staffed earlier and remain open beyond these hours to perform essential college services.

SUNY Broome nominated for 2019 Educational Advances Award

Hobsons recently named SUNY Broome as a finalist for its 2019 Educational Advances Award for the college's use of the Starfish Student Success Network.

SUNY Broome was recognized in the Student Success and Advising category. Since implementing the Starfish platform in 2014, the college has seen significant improvements in student success.

As part of the Starfish system, students who are struggling in a class receive notices called flags, which connect them to the resources they need. In fall 2015, 24% of students who received a flag or early alert earned a grade of C or better in their course; by fall 2017, that number

had grown to 44%, thanks to the use of interventions. During the same time period, course failures dropped from 28% to 19%.

“Our faculty and staff take retention seriously and use a wide range of measures to ensure that students have the help they need to succeed in the classroom,” said SUNY Broome President Kevin E. Drumm. “Starfish truly helps bridge the gap between students and the resources they need. Congratulations to our dedicated Starfish team, and all the faculty and staff who made this award possible.”

Hobsons recognized four K-12 schools and school districts and six colleges and universities as finalists for the award, which covers three categories: College, Career and Life Readiness; Match and Fit Admission; and Student Success and Advising.

Finalists were selected by an independent panel of judges and education leaders. The winners in each category will receive a donation of \$2,500 to use in continuing their efforts in helping students succeed. Runners-up will receive a donation of \$1,000 each.

“When we look at the numbers, students who received alerts were more likely to stay in class and finish successfully than those who didn't use the Starfish system. That's because academic success is so often a team effort, relying on communication not only between instructors and students, but with advisors and mentors of all kinds,” reflected Executive Vice President and Chief Academic Officer Francis Battisti. “As they say in Starfish: Kudos on a job well done!”

The three winners will be announced July 30 at the Hobsons Summer Institute 2019 in Marco Island, Florida. The company develops education technology solutions for both K-12 and higher education institutions.



Engineering excellence: SUNY Broome celebrates Green Grand Prix win

The silver Chevy Metro doesn't look like a trophy-winning race car, but it wasn't competing for speed.

Instead, it took top honors at the [2019 Toyota Green Grand Prix](#) as the most efficient vehicle – besting Teslas, Priuses, Chevy Volts and other hybrid vehicles on the market. During the April 5 competition at Watkins Glen, the car used nearly 19 kilowatts of electricity to travel about 100 miles – the equivalent of 180 miles per gallon in a gas-filled car.

What's even more amazing: this hyper-efficient electric vehicle was the creation of SUNY Broome students.

“Pretty much everything on this car is a student project,” said student team-member Mike DiGiacomo, as he walked Broome County Executive Jason Garnar through the car's many components, from its LED lights and lithium ion battery pack to the solar panel on its roof.

Ten students participated on the team behind the car, under the direction of Professor Gary DiGiacomo and technical assistant Donovan McCarty: Mike, Jeff Anderson, Ali Abdur-Rahim, Billy Judd, Kathryn Proppe, Chase Roy, Sam Rickenback, Curtis Eaton, Madison Wetzel and Gavin Pica.

The car has a complicated history. It was damaged in a flood, then converted to electric by the owner of

Sarnicola Simulation Systems, who then donated it to the TechWorks Museum. There it sat in a parking lot, ransacked by vandals before ending up at SUNY Broome.

“It needed some TLC. We looked at this as a rebuild,” said Mike DiGiacomo, who drove the car during the Green Grand Prix.

Students made all the decisions on the project, installing a new battery pack, low-power LED lights and a new third brake light, as well as instrumentation to monitor energy use. The project also received support from sponsors, including RedBarn, HackerThreads, BAE Systems, Raymond Corp and the IEEE club at SUNY Broome.

The Metro’s fastest recorded speed is 70 mph and it drives just like a regular car, Mike DiGiacomo said. As a hyper-efficient race car, it does lack amenities that many drivers prefer – such as a car radio.

Professor Diana LaBelle, co-chair of the Engineering Technologies Department, noted that the competition gave students a chance to practice what they learned in the classroom on a real project with design constraints, deadlines and system integration challenges.

“They get to hone their critical thinking skills and work as a team. We know that these are the skills that employers want to see because they tell us so,” she said.

“You can theorize anything, but if you can make it work, it’s a completely different level. We’re about making things work,” added Professor Gary DiGiacomo.

Broome County Executive Jason Garnar, a proud SUNY Broome alumnus, congratulated the winning team on May 20 – and took the Metro out for a spin around campus.

“It actually does look like the car from *Back to the Future*,” he observed.

“It may have been our inspiration!” Professor DiGiacomo said.

Colleagues: it's been another wild ride through the rough seas buffeting almost all of higher education at this time in the history of our industry. Yet while several of our sister colleges are retrenching and dramatically downsizing, we have weathered the storm well so far. Thank you for your hard work in keeping our ship sailing on while so many in the fleet struggle just to stay afloat. And not just here but all across the country.

In the past year we settled what was back-to-back the best contracts throughout SUNY while at the same time some of our sister colleges have been working on claw-backs to balance their budgets. We are also second among SUNY's 30 community colleges in maintaining our enrollments through the ongoing demographic trough running throughout New York for the next several years; this is in spite of our region having the fastest shrinking teenage population in the state. And the percentage of our students being taught by full-time faculty has soared. We have

wonderful adjunct faculty here, it's one of our greatest strengths, but research shows that especially community college students are better served overall by full-time faculty because of the availability to engage in out-of-class work with students and I think that's obvious to all on its face. Thank you to all our great faculty, both full-time and adjunct, for what you do for our students!

Thank you to all of our support staff as well! We wouldn't be #2 in enrollment if it was not for all you do for our students. From admissions and marketing (MarCom) to Student Accounts and ITS, Counseling and student life staff and Maintenance and Facilities, we've pulled together through these challenging times to make it work for our students and the communities we serve. Thank you thank you!

I want to take this opportunity to especially thank our Maintenance and Facilities staff. The campus is looking great for all of our year-end gatherings. And I also want to thank them for working with us through a reorganization of our maintenance shifts which will be fully implemented by next month. As I mentioned in an earlier note, our last CESS report noted some maintenance issues after a number of years where we had it mostly under control. Ours is one of SUNY's five or six oldest community college campuses among the 30, so it is particularly challenging for us to keep up in spite of the great work our Maintenance and Facilities crews undertake every day. So it was determined that our structure was largely to blame there. In that light we have undertaken a restructuring of our previous traditional 3 shifts to a different rotation of 3 shifts: a day shift, a later day shift, and soon a weekend shift while we have basically eliminated the 3rd (overnight) shift. During this transition the feedback has been good re the results and we wish to thank in particular all of the 3rd shift staff for working with us on the big change. We will be monitoring the results through all of next year to see if any further adjustments might be needed and our crew has demonstrated that we can work through truly major change in peoples' lives in order to improve how we serve our students.

Finally (for now), this Friday the college will undertake its customary practice of closing early for the first holiday weekend of summer. We will close at 2pm on Friday for the memorial Day weekend and when we return next Tuesday we will be on summer hours.

STEM Stars: SUNY Broome honors 2019 Frank Paul Medal winners

Kara Anderson is drawn to the logic behind math and science, the clear paths that take the seeker to the ultimate answer. For Marilyn Peterson, it's the love of the sea and all of its diverse life, while Trinity Purdy is intrigued by the intricate details of a new building as it takes shape. For Douglas Trotter, the answer is simple arithmetic: He's good at math, and what you're good at often ends up being your passion.

The 30 high school seniors receiving the Frank G. Paul Medal of Excellence have different paths and different dreams, but they share a love of science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM). On May 15, they were honored for the academic success in a ceremony on the SUNY Broome campus, receiving the medals they will proudly wear during their high school commencement ceremonies.

Kara, from Johnson City High School, will study computer science at the University at Buffalo, while Marilyn, from Whitney Point, will study marine biology at Stony Brook University. "I've wanted to be a marine biologist since I was 5," she said.

Douglas, a student at Windsor High School who plans to major in finance at Binghamton University, said he was honored and grateful to receive the award – a sentiment shared by many of his peers.

"It influenced me to look into what the award might mean and who is behind it," he said.

The Medal of Excellence's namesake, Frank G. Paul, spent more than four decades as an IBM engineer and

believed in math, science and education. Frank Paul served as a SUNY Broome trustee as well as president of the Broome Community College Foundation, which provides scholarships to many students.

“My dad was just a community-minded man,” said his daughter, Rebecca Komorowski, who has been awarding the scholarship for the past 23 years. She is a SUNY Broome alumna herself, having graduated from the nursing program, she said.

Another future Hornet alumna is Trinity Purdy. The Vestal High School student will attend SUNY Broome for the next step in her journey toward becoming a civil engineer.

Trinity has an added honor, along with Steven Thomas from Union-Endicott, Nathaniel Hrehor from Susquehanna Valley and Marrison Rogers from Chenango Valley: All four will receive Francis and Lillian Paul merit scholarships valued at \$1,000 per year, with an additional \$1,000 a year when they transfer to a four-year school to complete an engineering degree.

“It boosts my confidence a lot more and makes me feel ready to go into the field,” Trinity said.

Many paths

When SUNY Broome President Kevin E. Drumm looked out at the young faces during the Medal of Excellence reception, he saw more than standout students. Some may become engineers or mathematicians, researchers or professors, inventors or entrepreneurs, surgeons or even zoologists.

“Some of you will create technologies we can’t even imagine today. I certainly couldn’t imagine this when I was your age,” he said, holding up his smartphone.

A STEM career can lead in unexpected directions — something that

the keynote speaker, SUNY Broome's Associate Vice President and Dean of STEM Michele Snyder, knows from her own trajectory.

Dr. Snyder started her career in radiologic technology, with an Associate's degree from SUNY Empire State College. During her eight years in that field, she had the opportunity to become one of the first magnetic resonance imaging (MRI) technicians at the hospital where she worked.

While common today, MRI was an emerging field back then, and Dr. Snyder was intrigued by the science – the mathematics, physics and chemistry – that made the technology possible.

“It was a new opportunity for me, and

you're going to have those all the time. You never know what will come your way,” she told students.

Her interest in science inspired her to return to school for her bachelor's, master's and ultimately her doctorate. As a master's student, she conducted research on algae concerning a mitochondrial pathway that helps plants deal with abiotic stresses. While the topic may seem obscure, it actually has real-life applications – such as how our flora can adapt to climate change, she explained.

Just as one research project can lead to another, so too can other opportunities. A mentor suggested that Dr. Snyder teach a night class at a community college. She loved the work, and ended up becoming a full-time professor in biology and chemistry at Clinton Community College, eventually joining the administration there.

Coming to SUNY Broome, she appreciates the college's culture of sustainability, exemplified by the geothermal system and solar panels powering the recently renovated Calice Advanced Manufacturing Center. Her background in biology has also proved helpful as the college moves toward creating a new controlled environmental agriculture facility.

While Dr. Snyder's career has changed significantly through the years, she owes her success to her foundation in math and science, and her deep love for the STEM field. She encouraged the Medal of Excellence recipients to draw on that same foundation as they build their futures.

“Capitalize on the opportunities presented to you. Always ground yourself in the discipline you love and it will take you places you haven't even considered,” she said.

May 2019 Budget Forecast

SUNY BROOME 2018-19 BUDGET FORECAST

(as of April 30, 2019)

2018-19 Budget Forecast:

(1) Enrollment for Fiscal Year 2018-19 is forecasted at 4,600 student FTE's, which is approximately 5.4% lower than the 4,864 budgeted student FTE's. The total student FTE's projected for FY 2018-19 is approximately 7.0% below the 2017-18 actual student FTE's.

(7) Total Revenues are forecasted to be approximately \$1.3 million or 2.3% lower than the 2018-19 Budget. Both State Aid for student FTE's at \$14,188,534 and County Sponsor Share at \$7,334,045, which totals approximately \$21.5 million or 38.2% of total projected 2018-19 revenues, is fixed and does not change due to enrollment declines for the current 2018-19 fiscal year. Student Tuition revenue is projected at \$21.9 million which is \$786,279 or 3.5% less than the 2018-19 Annual Budget. Out of State revenue is projected to be approximately \$150,000 or 8.6% below budget due to lower enrollment of out-of-state students. Other Fees and Charges revenues are projected at \$11,338,435, which is approximately a 3.2% decline due to lower enrollment of out-of-county students.

(13) Total Expenses are projected to be approximately \$1.3 million lower than the 2018-19 Annual Budget. Total Personnel Expenses are forecasted to be reduced by approximately \$625,000 or 1.9% in payroll/instructional costs, primarily due to the reduction of approximately 90 additional course sections for both the Fall 2018 and Spring 2019 semesters compared to the 2018-19 budgeted levels. Additional payroll and benefit cost-savings are projected due to employee turnover, delay or not filling of funded positions, and lower new-hire rates of pay compared to higher level compensated retirees. Fringe benefit costs are projected to be approximately \$100,000 higher than budget due to a 5% increase in health insurance premiums adopted by the County, effective January 1, 2019. Contractual expenses are forecasted to be approximately \$776,000 below budget, as a result of department budgets generally being reduced to FY 2016-17 spending levels.

(14) Net Assets: The forecast for FY 2018-19 is a balanced budget.




The Business Club, accompanied by Professor Erin Frye, traveled to New York City on Saturday, May 18.

The SUNY Broome Electrical Engineering Technology Department and the IEEE student club will celebrate their win at the [2019 Toyota Green Grand Prix at Watkins Glen International Raceway](#) at a May 20 ceremony.

Broome County Executive Jason Garnar will join campus officials for a press conference and student recognition ceremony at 12 p.m. Monday, May 20, in the Applied Technology Building atrium. Afterward, the team's electric car will be on display outside the Applied Technology Building for viewing and demonstrations.

The student team designed and built the electric car that won the grand prize on April 5 for Most Efficient Vehicle. The team used 18.8 kWh of electricity to travel approximately 100 miles, besting production vehicles such as Teslas, Priuses, Chevy Volts and other hybrids.

The owner of Sarnicola Simulation Systems originally converted the Chevy Metro to electric and then donated it to the Techworks Museum. Stored in a parking lot, the car was subsequently vandalized and ended up at SUNY Broome in need of some TLC.

The student team, under the guidance of Professor Gary DiGiacomo, set out to fix the car and meet design goals of having a range of 100 miles at an average speed of 45 mph. Students installed a new battery pack, low-power LED lights and a new third brake light, as well as instrumentation to monitor energy use.

Sponsors for the project included RedBarn, HackerThreads, BAE Systems, Raymond Corp and the IEEE club at SUNY Broome.

Go green: Clean Energy Open House highlights sustainability

As fellow students and local television reporters looked on, Engineering Science major Diana Kelly demonstrated how to boil lukewarm water – without a spark of flame.

The set-up involved a bell jar, a hose and the creation of a vacuum that lowered the air pressure inside; the cool water soon broke into a rolling boil. Another device demonstrated the principle in the opposite manner: increased pressure in a tube can cause tissue paper to burn.

The scientific principles aren't just fascinating, but they're key to understanding the geothermal energy system under the Quad that heats and cools the Calice Advanced Manufacturing Center, explained Professor Robert Lofthouse.

Student demonstrations were just one part of SUNY Broome's Clean Energy Open House on May 16. Local companies and nonprofits were also on hand, sharing information on how to save money, conserve energy and help the environment. Topics ranged from utility rebates and home energy audits to solar energy, LED lights, electric cars and more.

Diana is one of the college's green energy interns, who work to promote sustainability efforts both on campus and off. Many of the demonstrations on display during the open house were student projects.

"It's a wonderful opportunity for students to become more involved on campus and learn more about sustainability and sustainable energy," said Diana, who plans to present a proposal promoting carpooling on

campus. “There are so many little ways in which a person can make a difference.”

Focus on Honors: Students present capstone research projects

The ethics of drone warfare, the opioid epidemic, the student debt crisis, the First Amendment on college campuses: The capstone projects chosen by students in SUNY Broome's Honors Program touched on a range of sensitive issues with real-life impact.

For their Honors 270 course, graduating seniors Nicholas Hayko, Shyanne Daye, Stephie Safari and Zachary Allen found topics that ignited their interest, and met with a faculty consultant and a librarian to develop their research questions and strategy. They presented their findings May 10 to a room of faculty members and administration, receiving the purple cords they will wear during Commencement afterward.

“Thanks for going the extra mile! That’s the main thing your diploma says when you graduate from an honors program at a community college,” said SUNY Broome President Kevin Drumm. “You never know where an experience like this will take you.”

Is drone warfare ethical?

While all of the issues under review are complex, sometimes they lead to simple questions with equally simple answers.

“Is drone warfare ethical? There’s a very simple answer: No,” said [Nick Hayko](#), an Engineering Science major, who will transfer to Clarkson University to major in engineering and management.

In 2015, more than 7,000 drones were used by more than 2,000 trained American military operators, [Hayko](#) found through his research.

While he acknowledged that drones, which have a range of 2,000 to 3,000 miles, are efficient and make warfare safer for our military, he pointed to a variety of ethical concerns. The devices enable governments to eliminate people thousands of miles away, devaluing the purpose of war and potentially killing more innocent civilians than the target.

In essence, human contact acts as brake on behavior during war. The move to robot warfare could make it easier for governments to declare wars that have little cost to their own people,

potentially leading to chaos, he said.

“They create as many new hostile targets as they eliminate,” he said.

Debt regret

[Shyanne Daye](#) chose a topic close to her heart as a college student: student debt.

Like Nicholas, Zachary and Stephanie, [Shyanne](#) is a Presidential Honors Scholar – meaning that she received a full ride scholarship to SUNY Broome. But the Business Administration major initially considered going to private Hartwick College and taking on loans to pay for her education, she said.

Sometimes, college debt can be worth it; a degree can lead to significantly higher earnings over the course of a lifetime. However, the positive benefits of an education don't necessarily outweigh the debt load, which can impact such wide-ranging decisions as purchasing homes and cars, marriage and children.

Even careers with large earning potential – say, physicians and attorneys – aren't necessarily good bets if they require students to take on massive amounts of debt, as these fields often do.

“I don't think a ‘good return on investment’ approach is solid because you can't go into large amounts of debt without facing a burden,” explained Shyanne, who is transferring to Binghamton University to major in finance. “Medical professionals and law professionals have debts so high, their salaries can't cover it.”

To avoid “debt regret,” students should be aware of the full amount of their loans. They also should avail themselves of grants and scholarships and apply for federal financial aid. Employment can also offset college costs and not just through a paycheck; Shyanne's employer, for example, offers scholarships to workers pursuing a degree.

Perhaps one of the wisest choices is going to a more affordable public college, such as SUNY Broome. It's

the choice Shyanne made, and she is grateful for the experience.

“I’m really lucky to have gone here and have these opportunities,” she said.

Battling the opioid crisis

Opioid overdoses are now a leading cause of death for Americans under the age of 50, and Broome County is no exception, found [Stephie Safari](#), a Liberal Arts and Sciences major transferring into Binghamton University’s nursing program this fall.

Opioid-related deaths in Broome County rose from 47 in 2015 to 76 in 2016, retreating slightly to 66 in 2017. While the drugs have legitimate medical uses in treating short-term and surgical pain, up to a quarter of people with an opioid prescription struggle with addiction issues, she said.

Any long-term approach to combating the opioid epidemic must focus on prevention and education, Stephanie advocated in her research project. These measures include prescription guidelines for doctors, drug monitoring programs and increased communication between patients and medical providers. Safe storage and disposal are also necessary to keep the drugs from falling into the wrong hands, as well as improved awareness and the removal of the stigma surrounding addiction.

“It’s important to emphasize that addiction to prescription opioids can happen to anyone,” she said.

Stephie pointed to the case of [Michael David Israel](#), who suffered from Crohn’s disease and became addicted to his prescription pain medication. While he sought help, Michael ended up committing suicide at the age of 20. After his death, his parents created Save the Michaels of the World, an organization that raises awareness

and offers community resources to those suffering from drug addiction.

“Addiction is a disease, not a choice,” she said.

Free press

[Zachary Allen](#) restarted The Fulcrum, the campus’ student newspaper, after an absence that likely spanned decades. The Business Administration major, who is transferring into Binghamton University’s School of Management this fall, has a vested interest in the First Amendment and the free press.

Schools, however, have served as battlegrounds for First Amendment rights, with the lines of victory shifting back and forth. *Tinker vs. Des Moines* 1969 Supreme Court case, for example, determined that public school students had the First Amendment right to wear black armbands to class in protest of the Vietnam War. On the other side is the 2005 decision before the Seventh Circuit Court of Appeals in *Hosty vs. Carter*, which held the free press rights of college student newspapers to a lower level of First Amendment protection.

The 2005 decision forced many student newspapers to go private and thus maintain independent status, Zachary said. Not all could afford to do so – which risks losing student journalist’ watchdog role.

While encouraging free speech and diverse viewpoints on campus could be seen as chaotic, it can also spark an honest discussion of the issues and lead to a more involved student body, he said.

Returning graduates

In addition to current students, a trio of SUNY Broome alumni returned to present their capstone projects. Alexis and Ashley Sisson and Ana Conceicao had completed the Honors Program under a different set of rules, which requires a community internship.

The Sisson twins, who are now studying business at SUNY Cobleskill, both interned with SUNY Broome's Admissions office. They conducted tours of campus and the Student Village, where they lived at the time, pitched in at walk-in Wednesdays and more. They also gained in-depth knowledge of their college and all it offers, and were able to forge personal connections.

"People were more like a family than just co-workers," Ashley said.

Ana Conceicao, now a Binghamton University student, participated in the [Health for Haiti global service learning course](#). The experience changed her career trajectory; while she initially considered becoming a doctor, she now envisions a future in public health.


In Haiti, SUNY Broome students provided healthcare, dental care, education, nutrition and more. Ana is already inspired to return.

"Seeing these kids and working with them – they had so much potential. Haiti changed my career path and SUNY Broome made my dreams come true!" she said.

Writing a new script: Rodney discovers a passion for filmmaking

Rodney opted to major in Individual Studies, which gave him the opportunity to customize his degree – and allowed him to find his passion. He will transfer this fall to SUNY Buffalo State, where he will major in Television and Film Arts.

“I really want to be a director, producer and screenwriter – everything to do with making films,” he said. His role models: Seth McFarlane and Quentin Tarantino, who follow their own vision in filmmaking.

“He broke it down in a way I could enjoy more,” Rodney said.

The SUNY Broome Dental Hygiene Club will receive the 2019 American Dental Hygiene Association's (ADHA) Student Member Community Service Award for their work in Haiti.



The Health for Haiti School-based Dental Sealant program was overseen by Professor Maureen Hankin.

The students provided the same outstanding and high quality dental hygiene services that they provide in our state-of-the-art dental hygiene clinic at SUNY Broome. They provided this quality care and education with more than \$67,576 of donated dental hygiene services to more than 200 children in Haiti.

All of the 216 children received an exam, oral hygiene instructions, dental sealants and a fluoride varnish. The students applied more than 1,750 dental sealants to children's

permanent teeth that needed restorative treatment where access to care is limited.

permanent teeth. They also used silver diamine fluoride to arrest severe decay on

SUNY Broome was chosen out of 335 student chapters throughout the United States. The prize includes \$3,000 cash, an engraved award and recognition in *Access Magazine*, ADHA's official publication. The monetary award will be used for future Health for Haiti oral care efforts.

The award will be presented at the ADHA Annual Conference on June 22, 2019, in Louisville, Kentucky.

The SUNY Broome Electrical Engineering Technology Department and the IEEE student club will celebrate their win at the [2019 Toyota Green Grand Prix at Watkins Glen International Raceway](#) at a May 20 ceremony.

Broome County Executive Jason Garnar will join campus officials for a press conference and student recognition ceremony at 12 p.m. Monday, May 20, in the Applied Technology Building atrium. Afterward, the team's electric car will be on display outside the Applied Technology Building for viewing and demonstrations.

The student team designed and built the electric car that won the grand prize on April 5 for Most Efficient Vehicle. The team used 18.8 kWh of electricity to travel approximately 100 miles, besting production vehicles such as Teslas, Priuses, Chevy Volts and other hybrids.

The owner of Sarnicola Simulation Systems originally converted the Chevy Metro to electric and then donated it to the Techworks Museum. Stored in a parking lot, the car was subsequently vandalized and ended up at SUNY Broome in need of some TLC.

The student team, under the guidance of Professor Gary DiGiacomo, set out to fix the car and meet design goals of having a range of 100 miles at an average speed of 45 mph. Students installed a new battery pack, low-power LED lights and a new third brake light, as well as instrumentation to monitor energy use.

Sponsors for the project included RedBarn, HackerThreads, BAE Systems, Raymond Corp and the IEEE club at SUNY Broome.

Focus on STEM: Engineering Science students design community garden

Once in full bloom, visitors to Endicott's newest community garden will pass through an arbor and into a mandala of raised vegetable beds, surrounding a circular heart of fragrant herbs with a bird bath, feeder and fountain. Berry bushes, fruit trees and perennials will flank the sides in a harmonious construction that not only maximizes garden space, but dazzles the senses.

The winning design was created by SUNY Broome students in Dr. Craig Jefferson's Engineering Design class. Volunteers Improving Neighborhood Environments, or VINES, will bring the \$10,000 project to life this fall, the latest in its network of community gardens.

"We split into different groups, and each group worked and designed their own idea, and (VINES) picked what they liked," explained Engineering Science major Dylan Shimer. "Each group had elements that were used. It was a team effort."

Students came up with a range of possibilities for the 130-foot by 120-foot plot, and created their designs on computer-aided design and drafting software.

"We were able to more easily keep our drawings in order that way," explained Engineering Science major Max Novack. "It was an open-ended project with some constraints. We were able to practice problem-solving without a whole lot of details involved."

While the students won't build the projects themselves, they look forward to seeing their work take shape this fall. Great job, Hornets!

Professor Garnar reflects on the 10th annual Sleepout for the Homeless

Ten years ago, I worked with Sara Doane (my VISTA for service learning) and the late Wes Warren to do a sleepout at the college to raise both money for the homeless and to raise awareness about the issue. On May 17, we will hold our 10th annual consecutive sleepout.

I would encourage faculty and staff to let everyone including students know about the event and participate if possible. Participation can be a simple donation (checks should be made out to the "Coalition for the Homeless of the Southern Tier"). Cash, checks, gift cards etc. should be sent to Doug Garnar (he has a mailbox in T-210). For those who wish to sleep out, we have 10 two-person tents.

Dick Romano recently told me that 17% of all community college students nationally are "homeless." How many are at Broome is anyone's guess, but Hal Koster and I have known of students over the years who have even lived out of their cars.

This past Sunday's New York Times had a major story on the current economic situation involving students attending "public colleges." Half of these students are now facing a situation where they must choose between buying food and paying college tuition, fees and books. SUNY Central mandated that every SUNY school now have a food pantry for students.

An adviser told me recently that an increasing number of students dropping out of the college are leaving for health reasons. At a time when we are experiencing the arrival of spring with the renewal of life in all its splendor, we should be mindful of the conditions a number of our students are experiencing, that over 20% of children in the county live in poverty, and that there are about 1,700 homeless people with upwards of 300 who have no place in doors to sleep at night.

The interactive session will be given by our Alexander teacher for the past eight years, Frances Robertson. Mostly theater and music students have benefited from this valuable course so far.





The SUNY Broome Electrical Engineering Technology Department and the IEEE student club will celebrate their win at the [2019 Toyota Green Grand Prix at Watkins Glen International Raceway](#) at a May 9 ceremony.

Broome County Executive Jason Garnar will join campus officials for a press conference and student recognition ceremony Thursday, May 9, at noon in the Applied Technology Building lobby. Afterward, the team's electric car will be on display outside the Applied Technology Building for viewing and demonstrations.

The student team designed and made alterations to the electric car that won the grand prize on April 5 for Most Efficient Vehicle. The team used 18.8 kWh of electricity to travel approximately 100 miles, besting production vehicles such as Teslas, Priuses, Chevy Volts and other hybrids.

The owner of Sarnicola Simulation Systems originally converted the Chevy Metro to electric and then donated it to the Techworks Museum. Stored in a parking lot, the car was subsequently vandalized and ended up at SUNY Broome in need of some TLC.

The student team, under the guidance of Professor Gary DiGiacomo, set out to fix the car and meet design goals of having a range of 100 miles at an average speed of 45 mph. Students installed a new battery pack, low-power LED lights and a new third brake light, as well as instrumentation to monitor energy use.



Critical thinking, compassionate care: 2019 Mock Disaster is the ultimate test of applied learning

As blood soaked their tattered orange uniforms, a bevy of screaming inmates limped out of the bus, under the watchful eye of a corrections officer. Bodies littered the grass – some emitting howls of pain, others ominously still – as a mysterious white powder descended in a cloud, released from the backpack of a slain motorcyclist.

SUNY Broome's 2019 Mock Environmental Disaster Drill had begun.

The annual event, which brings together different departments across campus, serves as training for first responders, future healthcare providers and more – some in areas you might not expect. Hospitality students cooked up lunch, drawing on mass food production skills used by organizations such as the Red Cross, while budding reporters gathered footage for a nightly newscast.

As the drill unfolded, a crowd of dental hygiene students watched, clustered together in their maroon scrubs. Their role came a little later in the drill.

“We work in the morgue and help identify the victims through their teeth,” explained student Emily Bates.

Medical Assisting students were central to the event, evaluating patients alongside the paramedics and, later, working in the makeshift hospital's clinic.

Coated in flour, Binghamton Advantage Program student Danyel Christopher lay motionless on the grass, awaiting the arrival of paramedics. The flour substituted for the scenario's dangerous chemical, scrubbed off – virtually speaking – by the county HazMat team in an inflatable shower.

Danyel learned about the drill in her chemistry class and volunteered for extra credit, she explained. “I have to seem to be in a lot of agony and pain,” she said. “I’ve never been an actor; it’s kind of outside my box. I’m trying out new things.”

Blue-vested Criminal Justice students worked to secure the scene. The drill provides a good opportunity for the campus community to reflect on their own disaster preparedness, while honing skills outside the classroom, reflected Criminal Justice – Corrections major Rachael Klug.

“We are here to learn these techniques. This is great practice,” she said.

First on the scene were paramedic students, who evaluated the extent of patient injuries, set up a triage system and carefully transported their charges to the makeshift hospital in the Decker Health Sciences Building.

“This is a good integration between different departments and programs at the college,” said

Adam Johnson, a first-year student in the Paramedic program, who participated in the drill for the first time. "Teamwork is important, and the interrelationship between the different emergency services."

Along the way, students in the Health Information Technology program gathered the needed data that follows patients throughout the healthcare labyrinth. White-coated students in the Clinical Laboratory Technician program conducted tests and, later on, Hornets in the Physical Therapist Assistant program helped the wounded regain their full mobility.

Patients were evaluated in the staged emergency room, with nursing students conducting a variety of life-saving maneuvers at the direction of the scene's physicians – their professors. In the hallway, nursing and radiologic technology students conducted the delicate transfer of a non-responsive patient from a large bed to a gurney, which was then wheeled into the X-ray room.

By including shackled prisoners in the drill, future healthcare providers were tested both on the procedures they learned in the classroom – and on their mission to provide compassionate care, no matter the identity of the patient.

“Every experience is going to be a little different. Generally, when you’re dealing with patients who are incarcerated, you often have an officer with you in the room. The exam is usually the same, as long as they’re compliant. If there not, you might have to use other measures,” explained Trisha Illsley, a second-year Rad Tech student. “There is a lot of critical thinking that goes into this.”

Campus Communication: Phishing Simulation to Begin

As part of our mandated security awareness training program, our campus will participate in a “phishing simulation” beginning May 13. This is an educational exercise, sponsored by the SUNY Security Operations Center. It will be helpful for you to complete our online awareness training modules in advance that shows how to avoid being “Phished” for your username and password.

You will receive a message in your Gmail inbox, between May 13 and 15, which will contain a “Phish” or solicitation for your username or password from what looks like is a valid source. Don’t take the bait!

What to look for:

- Grammar/spelling/format mistakes
- Sender’s address is outside of sunybroome.edu
- Sender’s name and address do not match
- Suspicious links that point to cryptic websites outside of sunybroome.edu
- Login pages that do not resemble sunybroome.edu
- Logos that are inconsistent SUNY Broome’s branding
- A sense of urgency

If you fail the exercise by submitting your username and password into the phishing website, you will be notified immediately. Just a reminder: it is only a simulation.

Again, the goal of this exercise is be able to recognize the signs of a phish, and to protect all usernames and passwords. As always, report phishing and suspicious emails by forwarding the message to ITSecurity@sunybroome.edu, and then click the “report phishing” button in Gmail or delete the message from your inbox. If you are unsure, call ITS at ext. 5212.

As a disclaimer, this program is managed by SUNY and is strictly educational in nature. All results will be anonymous and results will never be used to reprimand, punish, embarrass, shame or otherwise disparage any participant at any time. No persons will be targeted for individualized, personalized phishing simulations, i.e. spear-phishing. SUNY Broome may internally publish the anonymized aggregate click-rate and submit-rate of users. Users who repeatedly fail the simulation by submitting their username and password will be offered additional security training. Again, this is a training exercise, not a test, and is ultimately for the good of the campus community.





The drill will take place near the Annex Building. **Please be aware that this is a scheduled learning event and there is no emergency.**

Students from programs across campus gain valuable real-life experience in their field of study as they participate in the mock environmental exposure disaster. Departments involved in the effort include Medical Assisting, Nursing, Health Information Technology, Radiologic Technology, Physical Therapist Assistant, Dental Hygiene, Clinical Laboratory Technologies, Criminal Justice and Emergency Services, Communications, Hospitality, Business Information Technology, Special Events and Productions, Office of Marketing & Communications, Public Safety and Chemistry.
